Historic Steam Engine Touring for USA 250th

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - The world's largest operating steam locomotive rolled into Oroville on April 9, and for a moment, time bent in its favor. Union Pacific Big Boy No. 4014, a 1.2 million pound giant from the golden age of American railroading, drew hundreds to the historic Oroville Depot for a 30 minute whistle stop that felt less like a scheduled pause and more like a celebration. People lined the tracks waving American flags and cheering as the locomotive eased into view, its whistle rolling across the rail

yard with a deep, resonant call that seemed to carry generations with it. For many in California, it was something never before seen. The Big Boys did not operate in the state during their original service years. Built in the early 1940s to conquer the steep grades between Ogden, Utah, and Cheyenne, Wyoming, the 4 8 8 4 locomotives spent their working lives in the rugged spine of the Rocky Mountains, far from the Sacramento Valley and the communities that grew up along the Western Pacific and Southern Pacific lines. For decades, they existed here only in stories, photographs and museum

displays, powerful and distant symbols of an era people could imagine but never experience firsthand. That distance made the arrival of 4014 feel like a rare gift. As part of the nationwide USA 250 celebration marking the country's upcoming 250th anniversary, Union Pacific sent the restored locomotive on a coast to coast tour. Oroville was one of the few Northern California stops, and by the time the train arrived, the depot was filled with families, rail enthusiasts and longtime residents drawn together by something larger than history.

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Yuba County Certifies Broadband EIR

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County supervisors approved certification of a program-level Environmental Impact Report (EIR) that will streamline future broadband expansion projects and reduce costs for both the county and providers.

The board voted unanimously March 24 to adopt the Final Program Environmental Impact Report for the countywide broadband infrastructure project, along with required findings and a mitigation monitoring program. County staff said the program EIR is designed to make broadband deployment faster and more efficient by allowing individual projects to rely on a single environmental review framework rather than completing separate studies.

"This project will allow broadband projects both underground and above ground to be able to utilize this EIR to help make the projects faster, easier and cheaper to get across the finish line," said Community Development Services Assistant Director Kevin Perkins.

The program covers installation of fiber optic infrastructure, including underground conduit up to 12 feet deep and utility poles up to 150 feet high. Projects would primarily be located within existing road rights-of-way or utility corridors, minimizing new ground disturbance.

Perkins said the program-level document will allow future projects to move forward more quickly while still requiring project-specific environmental review when needed.

County officials said the effort is intended to expand high-speed internet access across the county, particularly in unserved and underserved areas, while positioning Yuba County to compete for state and federal broadband funding.

Project objectives include increasing broadband capacity, supporting telecommuting, reducing vehicle miles traveled and creating a consistent framework for evaluating environmental impacts tied to broadband deployment.

Health Fair Brings Services Together

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sutter County Public Health marked National Public Health Week with its fourth annual Cultural Health and Wellness Celebration April 9, drawing an estimated 200 residents to a two hour resource fair designed to connect families with low cost and no cost services.

The event, held in Veterans Memorial Hall in Yuba City, brought together more than 30 agencies offering support for seniors, families, people with disabilities, farm workers and veterans. Organizers said the goal is to put as many community resources as possible in one place so residents can meet providers face to face. The celebration also featured free drawings, activities for children and entertainment.

"This is in honor of National Public Health Week, and it's our way of bringing low cost or no cost resources to the community," said Lucia

Campos, health education and promotion coordinator for Sutter County Public Health. "Anything that can improve the quality of life for our residents, we want it here."

National Public Health Week is observed each April to highlight the work

of public health agencies and promote community well being.

Campos said the county launched the celebration four years ago to expand outreach and make services easier to access.

Public Health Program Manager Tony Vang said

the fair continues to grow.

"We bring together agencies from across the area who provide resources for all community members," Vang said. "We usually see around 200 people come through."

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'Finding Oz' to Debut at the Acting Company

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - A new original play exploring the life behind one of America's most enduring stories is coming to The Acting Company in Yuba City, as auditions open for "Finding Oz," written and directed by Sacramento playwright Bob Cooner. Auditions were scheduled for April 13 and 14, with performances planned for May 29 through June 21.

"Finding Oz" traces the life of L. Frank Baum, author of The Wonderful Wizard of Oz, blending biography with theatrical storytelling as characters from Oz emerge alongside moments from Baum's real life.

"It's all about how his life informs his creation of his masterwork," Cooner said. "We see these elements of Oz throughout his life."

The play follows Baum from childhood in the 1870s through 1900, when his landmark novel was published, weaving together personal struggles, historical context and imagination. Cooner

described it as "a great American story" of perseverance, shaped by repeated failure before success.

"It's 'try, try, try again,'" he said. "He tries, he fails... and he doesn't write The Wizard of Oz until he's in his mid-40s."

A longtime theater artist, Cooner said his interest in storytelling began early.

"From the time I was a little kid, I wanted to do plays and write plays," he said, recalling how he persuaded teachers to stage his work as a student.

He later trained as an actor in Houston and New York City and performed professionally into his early 30s before stepping away from acting. After earning a master's degree in education, he spent years teaching high school English while continuing to direct and work in theater.

Cooner eventually returned to playwriting, beginning with a Christmas production at the Woodland Opera House. Since then, he estimates he has written 15 to 20 plays, with productions staged locally and

across the country. Several have been published, with "Finding Oz" set for publication later this summer.

"This will be the premiere," he said. "You're

getting a pre-publishing."

The opportunity to bring the show to Yuba City came through both creative interest and existing connections. Cooner has

worked extensively at the Woodland Opera House and previously collaborated with Diane Haas, president of The Acting Company.

"She's been the props person on some shows that I've directed and has just done a fantastic job," he said. "I think she's a brilliant props person."

In developing the play, Cooner said he was drawn to Baum's life beyond the familiar 1939 film adaptation. His research revealed a story marked by ambition, instability and reinvention — from failed businesses in the Dakotas to a struggling newspaper and shifting financial fortunes.

"He's kind of a privileged kid, but then he loses that privilege... then gets some back, then loses it again," Cooner said.

The play also explores Baum's involvement in the social issues of his time, including his support for women's suffrage and his complex, sometimes contradictory views during Native American communities. Set against post-Civil

War America, the story incorporates influences such as the Chicago World's Fair, which helped inspire Baum's vision of the Emerald City. While not strictly allegorical, Cooner said familiar themes from Oz — courage, heart and intellect — appear throughout Baum's life.

"You see the germs of them all the way through," he said. "This idea of needing courage, of needing heart, of having to use your brain... finding home."

The production is designed as an ensemble piece, with nine actors portraying multiple roles.

"I'm looking for people who can kind of dive into creating these different unique characters," Cooner said.

For Cooner, the production also marks his directorial debut at The Acting Company, bringing both excitement and some uncertainty.

"I'm really excited about directing my own play," he said. "But also... I'm a little nervous about it just because it'll be new for me." ★

Among the agencies participating this year was the California Department of Rehabilitation, which supports individuals with disabilities who want to return to work or pursue new training. JoAnne Cummins, business specialist, who staffed the booth, said many residents still don't know the program exists. The department helps people with verified disabilities, including mental health and autism spectrum disorders, gain skills, education or job training so they can enter or reenter the workforce.

"I've been in this community for more than 30 years and didn't know about the Department of Rehabilitation until I needed it myself," she said. "If I went through that, other people are going through it too. When one person gets a job, that's the reward."

California Human Development also attended, sharing information about its workforce programs for farmworkers, including truck driving and vocational training offered in Woodland, Marysville and Williams.

Director of Strategic Communications Jorge Salvala said the nonprofit has served California since 1967 and works closely with One Stop centers to help residents gain new skills.

Other booths included Sutter County One Stop, Prevention

Services, WIC, MCAH, the American Red Cross, the American Lung Association, Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter and multiple Sutter County Public Health programs. Attendees collected initials from each booth on a passport card for a chance to win prizes.

Campos said the event is intentionally broad, reflecting the wide range of needs in the region. "We want seniors, families, pregnant mothers, people with disabilities and anyone looking for support to know these services are here," she said. ★

The environmental review evaluated a wide range of potential impacts, including air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, noise, transportation and wildfire. Several categories were identified as potentially significant; however, all impacts can be reduced to less than significant levels following the mitigation measures, officials said. A Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program will be used to track compliance with those measures as individual projects are developed.

The county completed a full environmental review process, including a public scoping period and a 45-day public review of the draft EIR in 2025. No public comments were received during the formal review period, and no revisions were required before final certification, officials said.

Supervisors voiced support for the effort, noting the benefit of reducing regulatory hurdles for infrastructure projects.

"I know this board appreciates every opportunity that we have to make things

easier and cheaper when it benefits our residents," one supervisor said.

With certification complete, future broadband projects that meet the program criteria can move forward using the EIR, while still undergoing project-specific review to ensure compliance with mitigation requirements. ★

Retired railroad workers stood shoulder to shoulder with children seeing a steam locomotive in motion for the first time. The air carried the scent of hot oil and warm metal. Phones and cameras rose above the crowd, but for many, the moment pulled their eyes away from the screen.

Twelve year old Ian Rodriguez of Oroville said that until that day, the 1912 Western Pacific steam engine on display at Hewitt Park across from the depot was the largest locomotive he had ever seen up close.

"Big Boy is like four times bigger," Rodriguez said. "It is huge, and it is not just the engine. It is a whole train."

Nearby, 78 year old Roger Gardner of Redding watched quietly as the engine came to a stop, the dozen train cars and locomotives it pulled settling

behind it. He grew up in Oroville, spending much of his childhood along the tracks just east of the depot, where passing trains were part of the rhythm of daily life.

For him, the whistle stop reached beyond spectacle.

"There is something nostalgic about trains that few people understand today," Gardner said as the crowd pressed closer. "Even when they stop at a crossing, people do not realize how rare it is to see something like this anymore."

Gardner said he made the drive from Redding that morning with one purpose.

When 4014 came into full view, steam lifting from its stack and sunlight catching the massive drive rods, Gardner smiled and shook his head.

"I had to see this," he said. "It is definitely a Big Boy. It certainly does not disappoint."

For a brief stretch of time, the depot became a meeting place for past and present, linking the wartime 1940s when locomotives like this powered a nation, the decades when Oroville's rail yard stood at the center of local industry and movement, and today, when a single train can still gather a crowd and hold it in shared awe.

Children climbed onto their parents' shoulders. Veterans raised their hands in salute. Others stood quietly, taking it in, aware they were witnessing something uncommon.

Then, as quickly as it arrived, the moment began to move again.

A long, low whistle sounded, felt as much as heard. The crew waved from the cab. The crowd answered in kind. And slowly, almost reluctantly, 4014 pulled away, gathering speed as it headed west over the Union Pacific trestle above Myers Street, then south toward Marysville and on

to Roseville for a two day stay before continuing east toward Utah as part of its coast to coast tour.

A few cars behind Big Boy, Union Pacific's Abraham Lincoln commemorative locomotive (No. 1616) traveled with the rest of the train. Built in 2025 to honor the president who signed the Pacific Railway Act of 1862, the unit added a modern touch

to the historic steam run. The unit and the other brightly painted train cars, some emblazoned with patriotic artwork, added a burst of color as the long train rolled through town.

Of the 25 Big Boy locomotives built by the American Locomotive Company at its Schenectady, New York, plant, 4014 is the only one still in operation. In

recent years, it has made several limited trips into California, each drawing large crowds eager for a rare look at a machine once considered out of reach.

A plume of steam lingered as the train disappeared from view, leaving behind a platform full of people who understood they had just witnessed something that will not soon pass their way again. ★

Sue Cejner-Moyers, Mike Moyers and Stacey Hinton will be honored at noon with the Pioneer Day Volunteer Award, recognizing their contributions to the Gold Rush-themed festival.

"In the year 2026 we're happy to recognize three members of a family who have faithfully contributed to Pioneer Day with a variety of activities and ideas," organizers Janet Burton and Kathy Smith said.

Cejner-Moyers has played a key role in organizing children's activities and performs in the Timbuctoo Theatre, while also encouraging others to portray historical characters.

"Sue is creative and enthusiastic, offering children's activities and performing in the Timbuctoo Theatre, and has encouraged others to portray historic characters as well," organizers said.

Mike Moyers, known for portraying stagecoach robber Black Bart, has served as master of ceremonies for many years and will again take part in this year's program, sharing stories from the Gold Rush era.

Hinton, described as "ever dependable," assists with setup and coordinates children's activities, including gold panning and trading their findings at the Assay Office.

"These three volunteers ... will be recognized on the main stage at noon on Pioneer Day. Their names on our perpetual plaque are a small way to thank them for years of major participation," Burton and Smith said.

The award program began last year with the recognition of Leroy Prindle, who portrays Father Andrew Twomey, and will also include remembrance of the late Ken Freeman, a past master of ceremonies.

Following the recognition, the annual Pioneer Day festival will continue from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. throughout Smartsville, offering a look at life during the Gold Rush era.

Visitors can tour nearby

mining areas and the historic town of Timbuctoo, enjoy live music, food and craft vendors, and watch demonstrations such as blacksmithing and weaving. Family-friendly activities, including gold panning, are planned throughout the day.

Held each year on the last Saturday in April, the event serves as the primary fundraiser for the Smartsville Church Restoration Fund and highlights ongoing work at the former Church of the Immaculate Conception.

Smartsville, located along the Yuba River northeast of Marysville, traces its roots to the 1850s when flooding forced the relocation of the mining town of Rose's Bar to higher ground. Named after early settler James Smart, the community became a stagecoach stop during the height of hydraulic mining before declining after the 1884 Sawyer decision.

Today, Pioneer Day continues to reflect that history while supporting preservation efforts.

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Sutter County Joins Jail Medical Study

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Facing rising jail medical costs, Sutter County will join a regional feasibility study to explore new ways of delivering inmate healthcare.

Supervisors approved the agreement March 24 as part of a 25-county effort to evaluate service models and identify potential cost savings and liability reductions.

The board adopted a memorandum of understanding with the Golden State Finance Authority for participation in the study, at a cost not to exceed \$39,520.43.

County officials said Sutter County spent more than \$4 million on jail medical services in the last fiscal year, with rural and mid-sized counties facing higher costs due to a limited number of health-care providers.

Deputy County Administrative Officer Matt Robertson said the study will examine multiple service delivery models, including county-run systems, contracted providers and regional partnerships.

Robertson said a consultant specializing in correctional health care will lead

the study, supported by experts in management and fiscal operations, with the goal of identifying long-term operational efficiencies.

Participation in the study does not commit the county to any specific service model but will provide data to guide future decisions, he said.

Supervisor Jeffrey Boone asked about participation levels and implementation timelines during the discussion.

Robertson said 25 counties are participating statewide, with Sutter County part of a smaller regional group of eight counties collaborating more closely on the study.

He also noted that 14 counties have already implemented the CalAIM Justice-Involved program, with a statewide deadline of Oct. 1, 2026, adding pressure for counties to evaluate their service delivery systems.

Health and Human Services Director Sarah Eberhardt-Rios and Dr. Yu Lu were recognized for their work on the study group, along with Sheriff Brandon Barnes.

The board approved the agreement unanimously. ★

Supervisors Approve Sutter Mental Health Facility

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Sutter County Board of Supervisors approved \$550,000 in funding March 24 to support construction of a 16-bed residential mental health treatment facility operated by Willow Glen.

The funding includes \$300,000 from Health and Social Services development impact fees and \$250,000 from Mental Health Services Act funds and will serve as the local match requirement for the Behavioral Health Infrastructure Continuum Project grant.

Health and Human Services Director Sarah Eberhardt-Rios said the project has been awarded approximately \$9.7 million from the California Department of Health Care Services.

The facility will provide long-term residential treatment for individuals with

significant mental health needs, including those under conservatorship. Eberhardt-Rios said the project is expected to reduce reliance on costly out-of-county placements by expanding treatment options in Sutter County.

"This will allow us to serve clients locally rather than sending them out of county," Eberhardt-Rios said.

Yuba County is also contributing \$300,000 in development impact fees, with the facility expected to serve residents from both counties.

Eberhardt-Rios said the mental health facility is projected to provide approximately 11,680 bed days of treatment annually and is expected to operate for 30 to 50 years.

County officials said the funding is consistent with development fee requirements and has been reviewed by Development Services. ★

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Yuba City Police Department has awarded Dispatcher Brooke Harris the Police Achievement Ribbon for her role in a Dec. 24, 2025, emergency call involving a child born before responders arrived.

Harris answered the 911 call as a young mother went into labor without EMS on scene. She stayed

on the line through the delivery and the moments that followed, giving steady, direct instructions.

Police said Harris advised the caller on how to keep the newborn warm and dry, how to position the infant and how to watch for signs of normal breathing until fire personnel and EMS took over.

The department said Harris remained

composed during a high-pressure situation and applied emergency dispatch training to guide the caller through each step.

Officials said her actions exceeded the normal scope of her duties and reflected a strong commitment to public service. They credited her with helping secure a safe outcome for both mother and child. ★

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Mobile Crisis Services Return to Sutter, Yuba Counties

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Mobile Crisis Response services are now available again in Sutter and Yuba counties, offering around-the-clock, in-person support for individuals experiencing mental health crises.

The service relaunched April 1 and is available 24 hours a day and can respond within 60 to 120 minutes.

Mobile crisis teams respond in the field, working to stabilize individuals and connect them with appropriate care.

The teams include trained mental health professionals who provide on-site intervention and assess next steps based on each situation.

Services may include transportation or referrals to facilities such as rehabilitation centers, emergency departments or psychiatric health facilities. Follow-up care is also provided within 72 hours, either by phone or in person, to support continued recovery.

Officials said the goal is to reduce the need for emergency room visits or law enforcement

involvement by addressing crises early and connecting people with the right level of care.

The service is intended for use in community settings. It is not available in locations already required to provide crisis care, including hospitals, psychiatric facilities and skilled nursing facilities.

Residents can access the service by calling 1-888-923-3800. The line is available at all times for immediate assistance.

For life-threatening emergencies, call 911. For immediate suicidal thoughts, call or text 988. ★

Automated Strike Zone Debuts in Bryant Field

YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The Yuba-Sutter Freebirds will implement full Automated Ball-Strike technology for all home games during the 2026 season, becoming the first professional team to use the system for an entire season.

The system will call every pitch, removing disputes over balls and strikes while keeping the home plate umpire in place.

"This is about bringing fans closer to the game without changing the heart of it," said Freebirds General Manager Harrison Shapiro. "The home plate umpire remains a central part of Freebirds baseball."

Shapiro said the system allows every fan in the ballpark to see the same strike zone in real time, adding transparency to each call rather than replacing the role of the umpire.

The system, powered by TrackMan technology, determines whether each pitch passes through the strike zone and sends the call to the home plate umpire, who will continue to signal balls and strikes. Fans will also see a live strike zone displayed on the video board with pitch location and the call in real time.

The Freebirds' move builds on testing within the Pioneer Baseball League, an MLB Partner League that has served as a testing ground for new rules and technology. Major League Baseball recently



introduced a challenge system for ball and strike calls, but the Freebirds will use a fully automated version throughout the season.

League experiments have previously influenced the major leagues. The Pioneer Baseball League tested a home run derby format to decide extra-inning games, which later appeared in the 2025 MLB All-Star Game.

Shapiro said the goal is to improve clarity for fans while preserving the pace and structure of the game.

The Freebirds will debut the system May 19 at Bryant Field against the Long Beach Coast.

Beware of Those Prepaid Credit Cards

Prepaid credit cards are those cards that are on the rack at a variety of quick stop stores, pharmacies, grocery stores and a handful of other merchants. People might use them to send money to a college student, pay a bill, charge stuff or even have an "off the grid" charge card that only the buyer might see and be aware of.

Sounds pretty clandestine doesn't it, and it can be.

Money launderers and con artists use these and probably a host of other shady characters for shady reasons, but regular folks buy them too. They may not qualify for a regular revolving credit card because of bad credit or just don't want to use a revolving credit type of account.

You buy the card at a variety of stores, prepay any amount and get the card and a receipt. Then you must register the card with your personal information including a social security number.

The card then gets activated. The card doesn't have your name on it but the company may send you another card in the mail which might be a debit card or a copy of the card you bought. It may or may not have your name on it.

I bought a few in my younger days and a few more over the years for gifts and to use when traveling but my experience with them has been dismal.

I used one that had a colored dot on it and another that came from a large bank somewhere I had never heard of.

Put simply, I don't use them anymore and for good reason. I don't have kids in college anymore, have business cards with revolving credit and don't get them as gifts much in recent times.

That said, I did see how they work and it stunk back then and still does. This opinion comes from my most recent experience getting one as a promo gift from a company I use.

Every so often the cards would not work. I would be required to go to a website and reactivate the card or something like that. They used terms like verify due to suspicious activity or some damn thing.

You could check your balance on the website you initially activated the card on and do some sort of verification. That's if you didn't lose your log in information you used when you registered the card, which I did on occasion.

After all, I thought once the card was active, it would charge until it ran out. Not so I found out on more than one occasion.

One time when the card stopped working, I had to call an 800 number, and it took me multiple tries to get a real person. I got some story that the computer deactivated the card somehow.

Yeah, right.

Another time a card stopped working for the person I gave it to as a gift. I logged in, couldn't get in, then wrestled another hour or so on the website with no success. I finally got in and the balance was way off. In the company's favor of course.

Still another time, a card again stopped working, logged in and the balance was negative.

Huh?

I kept good records on the balance, so I knew something was amiss. What was amiss was my money. It went "missing".

Unable to get through to someone after many tries the website said to write a letter.

Ok, so I wrote a letter.

I never heard back and tried relogging in again. Another hour wasted, as was my money.

You would think these cards would be regulated heavily to prevent this obvious confiscation of people's funds. Apparently not.

I am not the world's most savvy technology person or website user, but you think prepaying a card and then using it would be pretty simple.

Not so, and thinking many people that use these cards, or HAVE to use them, may be even worse at negotiating the clusters I saw.

This might be due to their lower income, lower education or just a lack of exposure to such cyber nonsense.

I am of the opinion that there is more than just petty theft going on here.

I won't be using these prepaid cards anymore. I don't have any use for them and am thankful for it.

Even if I did need a prepaid card, I wouldn't buy one. Not after what I experienced. I will stick to company gift cards from specific companies from now on like Starbucks, Amazon or Walmart. Almost all big stores have them now. They work, and without all the BS, not to mention the theft, that I am of the opinion, is taking place on a massive scale.

Governor Hopefuls Vow to Cut Regulations

Governor hopefuls vow to cut regulations Six candidates running to be California's next governor said last week during a televised forum in Fresno that if elected, they would roll back regulations that have made it challenging to farm in the state. Antonio Villaraigosa, a Democrat and former mayor of Los Angeles, referred to a study from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, that found the cost to California lettuce growers of complying with the state's environmental, labor and food safety regulations increased by more than 1,300% from 2006 to 2024. "That's not sustainable," Villaraigosa said. "There actually is agreement that things are broken in Sacramento." The forum, which was hosted by the California Farm Bureau and more than two dozen other agricultural groups, kicked off the final stretch of campaigning ahead of a June 2 primary election that will determine which two candidates advance to the general election in November. "We found it to be a critical time to highlight to candidates that agriculture and our rural counties are important," California Farm Bureau President Shannon Douglass said.

Farmers Gather to Talk Sustainability Projects at Dairies

California dairy farmers have faced new challenges in recent years as they work to beef up their sustainability practices. About a decade ago, the state passed the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act and legislation setting a target to reduce livestock methane emissions by 40% of 2013 levels by 2030. "The reality of implementation is right here, right now," California Department of Food and Agriculture Secretary Karen Ross

said last month at the annual California Dairy Sustainability Summit in Visalia. The event focused on connecting dairy farmers with tools to save water and reduce methane emissions and other ways to make their operations more sustainable amid changing state requirements. Speakers said reaching California's sustainability targets will be challenging, but there's hope in the progress already made. "I really have a lot of optimism that this can be done, but it's going to take the collective will of all of us," said Bill Swanson, Stantec vice president of global practice leader for water resources planning and management.

Democrats Vying for Governor Criticize Overtime Law

Pam Marrone, founder and former CEO of Marrone Bio Innovations, now ProFarm Group, shared her insights on biological pesticides, or biologicals, in a recent interview with Ag Alert®. Marrone said she believes that by 2040 biologicals will be more widely used than traditional pesticides on farms. "It all comes down to education," said Marrone, who is an entomologist by training. "The products are there. There's good science behind them. There's plenty of registered products and more coming every day." She noted there are just nine new chemical active ingredients awaiting approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, whereas there are about 70 biologicals awaiting EPA approval. "The innovation in biologicals is huge," Marrone said. "We're going to have lots of registered products, so it's about bridging the gap between products registered and how to use them on the farm." ★

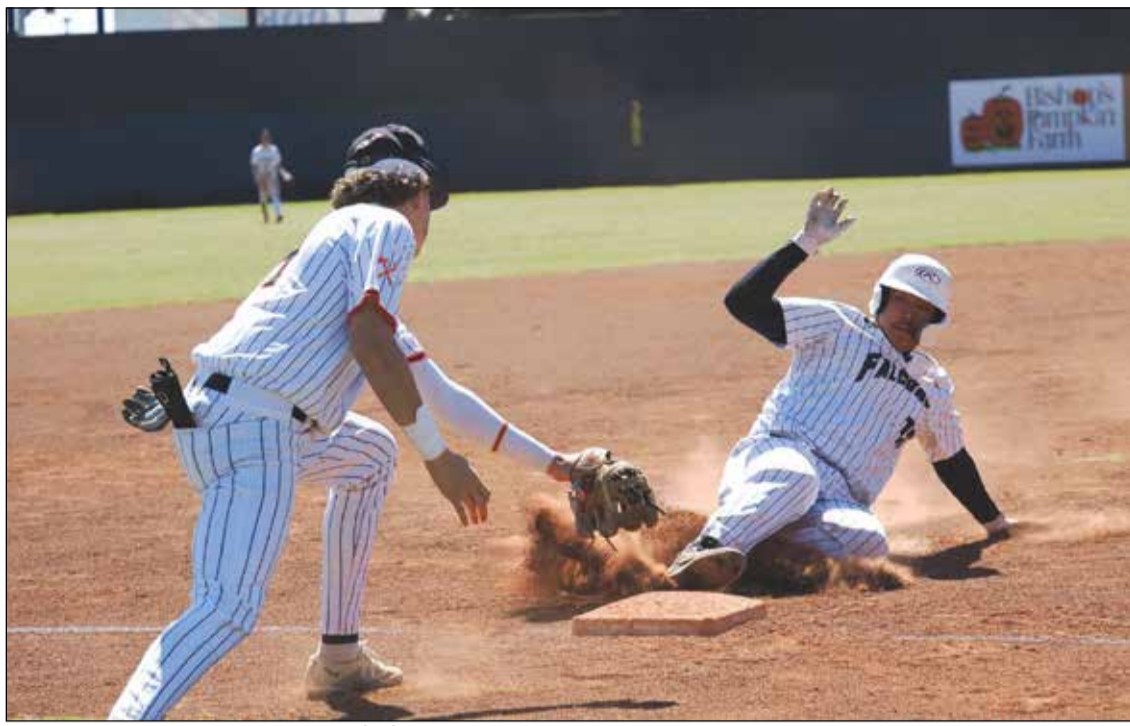

Yuba City went 2-1 in the tournament and played three games due to the adjustment of the tournament going from 10 to eight teams throughout the tournament.

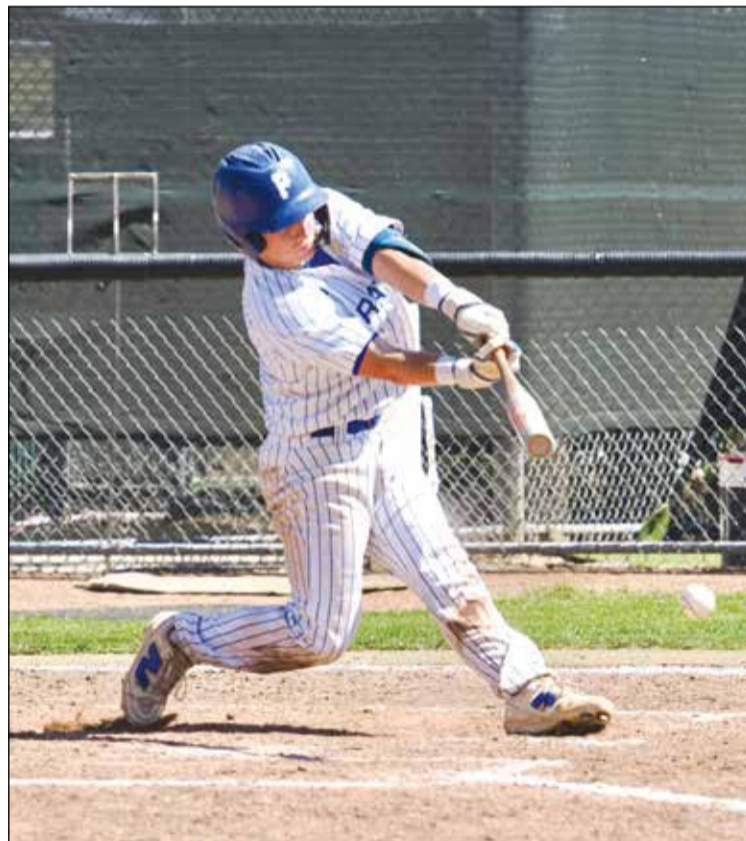
