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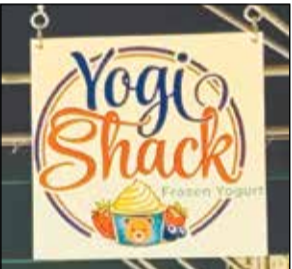

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Lessons from Our History

Students Learn Civil Liberties in Sutter County Courtroom

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - More than 100 students from nine Sutter County schools filled the Superior Court on May 5 for a courtroom-based lesson in civil liberties. The program was organized by Judge Fitzgerald A. Javellana, the first Asian American judge to serve on the Sutter County bench.

The event was held in recognition of Asian American History Month and featured a reenactment of the Fred Korematsu Supreme Court case using original transcripts. Students also viewed Jim Tanimoto's Journey,

a documentary produced by Chico State faculty that recounts the wartime incarceration of Japanese Americans.

Jim Tanimoto, a 103-year-old Gridley native and the last surviving member of the Block 42 resisters at the Tule Lake Segregation Center, attended the program in person. He spoke about his family's forced removal and incarceration during World War II and the discrimination Japanese Americans faced during the war years. He told students that the loss of homes, businesses and community ties left lasting wounds and said the experience shaped his belief that constitutional rights must be

protected in every generation.

"This is going to happen again if we don't learn anything from history," Tanimoto said.

Later in the afternoon, the Sutter County Board of Supervisors formally proclaimed May as Asian American History Month. The proclamation noted that Asian Americans make up more than 23 million people nationwide and 18 percent of Sutter County's population, and it highlighted the long-standing contributions of local Asian American communities to the region's cultural and civic life.

Supervisors also honored Tanimoto

Freebirds Unveil Bryant Field Upgrades, New Fan Experience

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Freebirds held their official launch party Thursday, May 14, at Bryant Field, unveiling a series of upgrades aimed at putting baseball back on the map in Marysville.

From shaded gathering areas and a new party deck to kid-friendly play spaces,

expanded concessions, an Automated Ball-Strike system and a new "\$1 million wall" promotion, team officials said the changes are part of a broader effort to make Freebirds games a full summer entertainment experience for local families.

"The value of minor league baseball, I think, is that parents can come to a baseball game and let their

kids roam free, knowing they're safe and secure and have a place to play," said Harrison Shapiro, president and general manager of the Freebirds. "They're not going to sit and watch a whole game, and the parents can go over to the patio and have a drink. That's the critical experience we have to nail for fans to enjoy their time."

Yuba Water Awards Penstock Contract

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba Water Agency has awarded an engineering and design contract to GFT Inc. as part of ongoing efforts to rebuild the penstock that ruptured above New Colgate Powerhouse in February.

The penstock is the large pipe that carries water between New Bullards Bar Dam and Reservoir and New Colgate Powerhouse for hydropower generation.

According to Yuba Water, the initial contract totals nearly \$2 million and will fund a condition assessment of the damaged penstock along with an analysis of possible repair alternatives.

Agency officials estimate an additional \$6 million will be needed for detailed engineering design work and support during future construction efforts. Final repair costs and a construction timeline will depend on the results of the ongoing forensic investigation and condition assessment.

"While this contract does not cover the actual construction of the repaired penstock, it does position us to move quickly once we have the results from the forensic investigation," said Bryan Perrin, Yuba Water's project manager overseeing the effort. "Our goal is to take what we learn from the investigation, develop engineering design plans and award a future construction contract to rebuild the penstock and get us back in business."

Yuba Water officials said restoration work continues in several areas connected to the rupture. Crews are investigating the cause of the failure, rebuilding Lake Francis Road, stabilizing the hillside and removing debris and sediment near the powerhouse.

for his courage and commitment to justice, recognizing his role as the last surviving member of the Block 42 resisters and his work sharing the history of Japanese American incarceration. Board members described the documentary as eye opening and said his story showed the importance of constitutional protections.
The board issued additional proclamations to local Asian American organizations, including the Marysville chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League. Founded in 1938, the league has worked to advance civil rights, support redress efforts for survivors of wartime incarceration and document the experiences of Japanese American families in the Sacramento Valley. Supervisors noted the group's role in community education,

its outreach to local schools and its work preserving stories of families who were removed from the region during the war.
JACL treasurer Walter Masuda thanked Judge Javellana for creating the educational program and for bringing Tanimoto's story into the courtroom for local students. "Your dedication to public education, historical truth and civic engagement strengthens our community and ensures that the lessons of Korematsu v. United States remain alive for future generations," Masuda said.
Javellana, who previously worked in the Sutter County Counsel office, thanked the public employees who supported his career and said their guidance helped shape his path to the bench.
"It is the greatest professional accomplishment of my life," he said. ★

Fallen Marysville Officer Honored Nationally

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Marysville Police Officer Osmar Rodarte is among the 363 fallen law enforcement officers whose names were added this year to the National Law Enforcement Memorial in Washington, D.C., including 109 officers killed in the line of duty in 2025.

Rodarte's name was also read May 13 during the Regional Peace Officers' Memorial Ceremony in Yuba City.

Rodarte was shot and killed on March 26, 2025, while serving a search warrant at Kestrel Court in Olivehurst as part of a multi-county operation targeting a transnational drug-trafficking ring. He was struck during an exchange of gunfire, transported to a hospital and later died from his injuries. The suspect, a convicted felon, was also killed at the scene.

"The impact in our local area was profound," said Yuba City Police Chief Jim Runyen, who officiated the ceremony. "Through difficult circumstances, the Yuba-Sutter area came together to grieve and be there for one another as we lay one of our own to rest, who paid the ultimate sacrifice serving his community."

The ceremony opened with the national anthem performed by Riley Cornwell and Maureen Sekamanya, followed by an invocation from Yuba City Police Chaplain Ron Fortenberry. The 2025 Roll Call of Fallen Peace Officers, read by Marysville Police Chief Vance Nabeta, included officers from Riverside County, San Bernardino

County, Baldwin Park, Los Angeles and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

The perpetual roll call, read by Yuba County Sheriff Wendell Anderson, reflected how loss has shaped law enforcement in this region for more than a century. Marysville has recorded five duty-related deaths since 1901, beginning with Officer Butch Dobler and continuing through Officer Osmar Rodarte. Yuba County's fallen, including Deputy Eugene Reardon, Deputy Donald Brown and Deputy Brian Meilbeck, represent decades of service cut short. Sutter County's history carries its own weight, including Sheriff Alva Webb Kimerer, who died in 1946 while returning from an investigation, along with Undersheriff Charles E. Blackburn and Deputy John L. Talley, both lost in 1955. As each name was read, a rose was placed on a table where a photograph of Rodarte

stood among the memorial displays.

The program included wreath presentations, a rifle volley by the regional honor guard and Taps, performed by Yuba City Police Detective Chad Cornwell, followed by "Amazing Grace."

According to the National Law Enforcement Memorial, 24,775 names are now engraved on the monument, including the 363 added this year.

On May 4, California held its annual Peace Officers' Memorial Ceremony at the State Capitol to honor officers, including Rodarte, who died in the line of duty. State and local law enforcement officers, surviving families and community members took part in a Walk of Honor from the west steps of the Capitol to the memorial monument, where the names of newly enrolled officers were formally added and their sacrifice honored. ★

That family-focused approach can be seen throughout the ballpark. Near the food vendor area, sun sails have been installed for shade. Concessions include pretzels, hot dogs, burgers, Bishop's corn dogs, apple cider slushies and pretzel dogs.

Up the stairs on the right side of the field, the new party deck gives adult fans a place to gather, drink and watch the game from a closer vantage point. The bar area will offer beer, wine, cocktails and street tacos.

On the opposite side of the field, the Freebirds added a kids zone featuring a covered cornhole court, bounce house and inflatable strike zone. The play area is included with admission and monitored by attendants and security. Portable cooling systems also will be used during hotter games.

"We're trying to give

a little bit of Savannah Bananas, but with pro baseball and our team," said Celeste Brown, the Freebirds' director of partnerships. "And it's not just aimed at baseball fans. We're aiming for families who want to find something local, enjoyable and affordable to do over summer."

That sense of fun also carries into the team's rebrand, announced earlier

this year with two chicken mascots, Yuba and Sutter, and a bright color scheme designed to feel both retro and modern.

"We really wanted it to be a wild, avant-garde brand and totally different while at the same time being very family-friendly and kid-oriented," Shapiro said.

The team's new asymmetrical jerseys are intended to reflect the

"wackiness" of the Freebirds' chicken mascot and help the team stand out. Team manager Frank Gonzalez said the look is part of a broader effort to make the team more recognizable throughout the region.

"My God, look at the color. It's awesome, right?" Gonzalez said. "We're excited about getting this team really recognizable in the community, not only here, but all the way to Sacramento."

One of the most unique additions at Bryant Field this season is the use of MLB's Automated Ball-Strike system, or ABS. The technology uses a tracking system to determine whether each pitch is a ball or strike.

While ABS is being used elsewhere as a challenge system, the Freebirds are using it more broadly at home games. Shapiro said the point is not to replace umpires but to make the game easier for fans to follow from anywhere in the ballpark.

"I firmly believe that if you come to a baseball game and you don't have the money to sit right

behind home plate, you get a lesser experience because you can't really see where those pitches are," Shapiro said. "It's not as fun to watch. By putting it up there, it changes the dynamic of how you consume a baseball game, which I think is very special."

Calla Kra-Caskey, who was helping promote the Freebirds, said Major League Baseball typically uses ABS only for challenges, similar to replay reviews in other sports. The Freebirds, however, are using the system to call every pitch at home games.

"The Freebirds are the only professional team using it completely at all of their home games," Kra-Caskey said. "That means it calls every pitch, not just the questionable ones."

Fans also will have a chance to win big this season through the Freebirds' new "\$1 million wall"

promotion. Each ticket will be tied to a 2-by-2-foot board on the outfield wall. If a Freebirds player hits a fan's board during the game, that ticket holder wins a prize. If the same board is hit twice in one game, one ticket holder connected to that board will be randomly selected for a chance to win \$1 million.

Freebirds co-owner Lon Hatamiya said the upgrades reflect the ownership group's commitment to continue improving Bryant Field each year.

"There's no more exciting time than coming out to the ball field," Hatamiya said. "We want to make sure everybody locally feels the same way, and that when they come out here, it's a once-in-a-lifetime experience for the kids. When they see the field, they want to come back. That's our commitment to the community." ★

Veterans Memorial Event Opens Sunday

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Calvary Christian Center will host its annual "A Grateful Nation Remembers" Memorial Day weekend tribute May 24 and 25 at its campus at 2620 Colusa Highway in Yuba City.

The free event begins at noon both days and honors veterans, active-duty military personnel and those who died serving in conflicts including the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The event will feature military reenactments, displays of military vehicles and presentations at a six-panel replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall. Organizers

will also present a tribute at a replica of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and display the Freedom's Heroes Memorial, an outdoor monument honoring service members killed during the War on Terror.

According to event information, the memorial's 21 panels include more than 7,000 names of fallen service members who died during operations connected to the War on Terror through April 30, 2026.

Sunday's keynote speaker will be retired U.S. Army Capt. John Arroyo, a Green Beret and combat veteran of Iraq and Afghanistan. Arroyo survived the 2014 mass shooting at Fort Hood, Texas, after being critically

wounded. He now speaks nationally on resilience, faith and recovery.

Monday's keynote speaker will be Dave Roeber, a decorated Vietnam veteran and founder of Eagles Summit Ranch, a training and recovery center for wounded warriors. Roeber served in the U.S. Navy Special Warfare Division and suffered severe injuries during combat in Vietnam in 1969. He has since become a national speaker focused on hope, recovery and support for military personnel.

The event will also include a reconstructed Afghanistan field hospital exhibit highlighting the experiences of military

medical personnel serving in desert war zones.

Children's activities for infants through fifth grade will be offered Sunday. Childcare for infants

through age 5 will be available Monday.

Organizers said the memorial gives community members an opportunity to reflect on

the sacrifices made by military personnel and their families.

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Frozen Yogurt Shop Opens Downtown

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Marysville's historic downtown got a little sweeter May 13 as residents, city officials and local business supporters gathered on Third Street to celebrate the ribbon-cutting and grand opening of Yogi Shack, the city's first frozen yogurt shop.

Located at 317B Third St. inside a roughly 100-year-old downtown building, Yogi Shack sits between a butcher shop and a soon-to-open bakery, a combination city leaders said reflects growing momentum in Marysville's downtown corridor.

"This has been an awesome day for us, the City of Marysville, but also just our whole community," said Dan Flores, community and economic development director for the City of Marysville. "I mean, how can you go wrong with having a frozen yogurt shop right downtown?"

According to Liz Gates, membership and marketing specialist for the Yuba-Sutter Chamber of Commerce, the ribbon cutting marked the first joint ceremony between the chamber and the City of Marysville.

"This is incredible to see this amount of people," Gates said. "This is huge for the Chamber of Commerce."

Gates thanked city staff,

chamber ambassadors, local police and fire departments, business owners and community members for supporting the event.

"This really takes a community to come together to make all this work," Gates said.

For owners Sofia and Natalie Williams, Yogi Shack is rooted in family, local ties and a desire to create a welcoming gathering place. According to the owners, the business' mission is "to provide a place of happiness for our community by creating meaningful experiences and making every visit a sweet memory for all."

Sofia Williams said she grew up in the area, attended local schools, played sports, worked in the community and is now raising her family locally.

"Yogi Shack was created as a community gathering place built on local roots and relationships, family values and a love for bringing people together," Williams said.

Natalie Williams thanked those who supported the business during the opening process, including people who promoted the shop online.

"It's been a long journey, but there are many people here today who helped

keep us going," Natalie Williams said. "I do appreciate everybody who has

posted and shared and just came together for us. We really appreciate you."

Marysville Mayor Chris Branscum attended the event while enjoying a cup of vanilla-chocolate swirl frozen yogurt topped with chocolate syrup and encouraged attendees to visit the shop.

"I'm here to testify," Branscum said. "I've already been inside. It's really good!"

Branscum also presented the owners with a city recognition congratulating them on joining Marysville's business community. Councilmember Margie Rollins highlighted continued growth along Third Street.

"Third Street is where the real momentum is happening in Marysville, so please pay attention and support," Rollins said.

Councilmember Stuart Gilchrist said Yogi Shack's evening hours and central downtown location make

it a convenient stop for visitors exploring nearby restaurants, shops and bars.

"After you have dinner, you come here and have a fabulous yogurt, which I have been doing since it opened," Gilchrist said. "Watch the waistline!"

Yuba County Supervisor Jon Messick also congratulated the owners, noting the opening carried personal significance.

"I've known you girls since you were little and were still singing at church," Messick said. "So it's just a personally great thing for me as well. I just wanted to say congratulations."

Sofia Williams said the shop plans to offer a variety of flavors, including seasonal options, and welcomed customers to suggest future flavors.

Yogi Shack is open from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday. ★

Taking it a step farther, inflation crushes the lower income families first and does so very quickly. And since wealth, like energy, can never be destroyed, it just gets transferred. The wealth taken from the poor migrates up the food chain to fewer and fewer, but wealthier and wealthier folks.

The wealth pyramid, where the pyramid gets wider and wider, and the point gets smaller and smaller, until the great majority of wealth is concentrated in the hands of a very few.

The "one-percenters" as we say, better said as the super wealthy.

When the lower-class portion of the population get so large, the cries for a better way and redistribution of that concentrated wealth yields the cries for socialistic policies.

Unfortunately, socialism works no better. In fact, it further impoverishes the lower income and concentrates the wealth even more.

But the idea sounds good, so forward the people go.

The fault lies not in the call for socialism or similar economic mechanisms. The fault lies in the previous policies that bring about inflation and allow it to persist for many years.

Therein lies the problem. That the majority of those impoverished do not understand the inherent problems the mechanism of socialism or similar economic models have is to be expected.

Those feel-good economic models sound good and make good propaganda to move a select few into the ballot box. But the end result is an even greater disaster for those calling for such changes.

Chico Creek Tests Show No E. coli O157

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Butte County Public Health announced that recent water and sediment samples collected from Big Chico Creek tested negative for E. coli O157, the strain linked to an outbreak of illnesses connected to recreational water exposure during summer 2025.

Public Health officials said samples collected May 4 from several locations along the creek were analyzed by the State Water Board's laboratory. The testing was part of an ongoing investigation into last year's outbreak.

Butte County Public Health said it will continue consulting with the State Water Board in the coming weeks to determine whether additional testing will take place.

Officials cautioned that conditions in natural waterways can change quickly because of weather, wildlife activity, water flow and erosion from past wildfires. They noted the recent results represent conditions only at the time of sampling and do not guarantee future water quality.

According to Public Health, the testing specifically targeted E. coli O157, a rare strain of bacteria that can cause severe illness. Officials said the county does not routinely test Big Chico Creek and only began testing as part of the investigation into the 2025 outbreak.

Separately, the City of Chico conducts

seasonal water quality monitoring at Sycamore Pool during warmer months to measure common E. coli levels typically found in natural waterways. The city may issue swimming advisories if bacteria levels exceed public health thresholds. Current Sycamore Pool monitoring results are available through the City of Chico website.

Public Health officials reminded residents that swimming and recreating in natural waterways always carries some level of risk, particularly for young children, older adults and people with weakened immune systems. Exposure to bacteria and other germs can occur if water is swallowed or enters the body through cuts or abrasions.

Officials recommend that people avoid swallowing creek water, wash their hands before eating or drinking, rinse off with clean water after swimming and avoid entering the water with open wounds or after recent illness. Public Health also advised parents to closely monitor young children and use properly fitted swim diapers for children who are not potty trained.

Symptoms of E. coli infection can include diarrhea, stomach cramps and fever. Residents who believe they may have contracted a waterborne illness are encouraged to contact their healthcare provider and report the illness to Butte County Public Health at 530-552-3929. ★

Young Farmers Talk Policies During Capitol Advocacy Visit

Participants of the California Farm Bureau Young Farmers & Ranchers, a program that supports agriculturalists between the ages of 18 and 35, converged in Sacramento last month for a day of advocacy. The YF&R participants spoke with lawmakers and their staff about policy issues such as a proposed tax credit to address unintended consequences of the state's agricultural overtime law, compensation for cattle ranchers impacted by gray wolves, and regulations limiting the use of self-driving tractors on California farms. Jennifer Cortez, a Farm Bureau member based in Sacramento County, said it was her first time joining the Calling on the Capitol event. "Throw me on a farm and I know a lot about livestock and animals, but this is where the disconnect happens," she said. "This is exactly where we need to be in order to have our voices heard."

USDA Announces \$9 Million for Cling Peach Tree Removal

The U.S. Department of Agriculture said it will make available up to \$9 million to fund the removal of cling peach orchards by growers whose long-term contracts with Del Monte Foods were voided following the company's bankruptcy and the closure of its cannery in Modesto. In business for 139 years, Del Monte contracted about 35% of California's cling peaches last year. The funding from USDA will support the removal of up to 420,000

cling peach trees, or approximately 3,000 acres. "We're grateful for the swift action taken to protect peach growers, the peach industry, their families and the rural communities that depend on this industry," Rich Hudgins, president and CEO of the California Canning Peach Association, said in a statement.

Scientists Aim to Reduce Cost of Making Lab-Grown Chocolate

Chocolate remains a favorite treat for Americans. A 2024 report from the National Confectioners Association found that 65% of U.S. consumers eat chocolate, driving \$21.4 billion in confectionery sales. But the future of chocolate is under pressure because cacao plants, which produce the cocoa beans used to make chocolate, are struggling in key growing regions. Excessive heat, erratic rainfall, prolonged droughts and flooding have already caused significant cocoa crop failures in Ivory Coast, the world's leading producer of cocoa beans. Farmers are seeing lower yields, dying trees and in some cases total crop loss. Scientists at the University of California, Davis, are working with California Cultured, a Sacramento-based food-technology company, to develop a new way to source cocoa: growing it directly from plant cells in a lab. With grants from the National Science Foundation and BioMADE, the research team is working to lower production costs and create a more reliable, sustainable source of chocolate. ★

Former Prison Finds New Purpose

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - When the former Leo Chesney Correctional Facility went up for sale near Live Oak, Pastor Dave Bryan saw more than an empty women's prison sitting on 10 acres. He saw the possibility of turning a place once built for incarceration into a place of refuge.

In February 2025, Glad Tidings Church was raising funds to purchase the former correctional facility at 2800 Apricot St., with plans to transform the property into Peace of Heaven Children's Paradise, a residential sanctuary for children rescued from sex trafficking.

More than a year later, the vision has moved from fundraising to physical progress. Alex Anaya, executive director of Peace of Heaven, said the organization officially became owner of the property in December 2025 after last year's REV17 conference helped raise millions of dollars toward the purchase.

"We raised enough to get the building, the whole property," Anaya said. "All six buildings plus the shed and the mobile home in the back. It's about 10 acres."

The former facility is now in its first major phase of renovation, described by Anaya as a "facelift phase" focused on making the site feel less institutional and more welcoming. Exterior painting, paving, cleanup, repairs and landscaping are already underway while the organization continues working through planning, licensing and permitting questions that will shape future phases.

Rick Griffon, a project supervisor helping oversee renovation work at Peace of Heaven, said crews have completed blacktop and concrete work, added handicap-accessible concrete, painted buildings, removed razor wire and begun repairing gutters, trim and doors.

"We're making it feel more welcoming," Griffon said. "We're keeping the fence up for security, but we're going to camouflage it with a lot of landscaping."

Plans include landscaping near the entry, a Peace of Heaven sign, awnings over windows and continued work inside the buildings, including the kitchen and cafeteria areas.

"There's a lot of work still left to do," Griffon said, "but it's going to be very pretty when it's all done."

The cafeteria is one of the spaces receiving immediate attention because it will be used during the upcoming REV17 conference, scheduled for May 29-31 and hosted by Glad Tidings Church. Anaya said REV17 serves as both a fundraiser and an awareness event, bringing in speakers from across the nation focused on child sex trafficking and related issues.

"Part of what we do at Peace of Heaven is create a refuge for trafficked children," Anaya said. "The other part is raising awareness and combating the issue through activism, prayer and getting the word out."

In a previous interview, Bryan said the church's long-standing

ministry motto helped inspire the project.

"Child trafficking is so horrendous that a lot of people don't like to even think about it and the problem seems too big to solve," Bryan said. "But our ministry motto, the one that's guided us for the past 38 years, is 'find a need and meet it, find a hurt and heal it.'"

That philosophy continues guiding the project as it develops through multiple phases involving construction, fundraising, legal guidance, consulting teams and coordination with city and state officials.

"How we set this up is going to impact not just the city, but also the state in terms of licensing," Anaya said. "We have consulting teams, legal teams and others helping us navigate."

Anaya declined to provide a projected capacity for the facility, saying Peace of Heaven is still working with the city on details related to that portion of the plan. He said the full project is expected to include at least three phases, with future phases requiring additional permitting and regulatory review.

Programs serving children rescued from trafficking remain limited and require extensive

licensing, staffing and trauma-informed care.

Peace of Heaven's website states its initial focus will prioritize girls, including young mothers, while the broader vision includes expanding care to all survivors seeking refuge and restoration. The organization describes its approach as trauma-informed, relational and restorative, focusing on physical safety as well as emotional, spiritual and practical support.

"We don't want kids coming here to feel institutionalized," Anaya said. "We very much want to create a home here."

Human trafficking remains a global and national concern. The International Labour Organization estimated in 2024 that forced labor generates \$236 billion in illegal profits annually worldwide, while the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime reported detected trafficking victims increased 25% in 2022 compared with pre-pandemic levels in 2019.

"We have to activate, lean in and raise our voices," Anaya said. "We're trying to do our part."

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - A new community fitness fundraiser brought teams together in Yuba City to support airmen and military families connected to Beale Air Force Base.

Spouses Connections helps incoming military families build local networks and find support, while Operation Warm Heart provides emergency financial relief through the First Sergeants Council. The Airmen's Market offers pantry goods and household items to help enlisted members stretch their budgets between paydays.

Untz Festival builds community at Sycamore Ranch

BROWNS VALLEY, CA (MPG) - Jan "The Man," a caretaker and camp host at Sycamore Ranch in Yuba County, celebrated his 81st birthday much the same way he spends most festival weekends: picking up trash, maintaining campsites and making his rounds by golf cart.

The morning of May 10 was quiet at the 10th annual Untz Festival as many attendees caught up on sleep after a late night of music and festivities. Jan seemed perfectly content handling business as usual.

"Last year was actually the first year I stayed here all the way through," Jan said. "I love it, basically because of the people. The music's not my bag, but that's OK. It's the people. The people are what make this more than anything."

Jan's sentiments were echoed by employees, volunteers and attendees throughout the weekend, many of whom highlighted

the event's strong sense of community and safety. Security guards stationed at the entrance described the event as one of the "chillest" festivals they work each year, citing few incidents despite hundreds of attendees on site.

"It's usually the big concerts with alcohol that you really have to worry about," said Jeremy, one of the guards. "People get drunk and go crazy, but alcohol isn't the focus here."

The three-day underground bass music festival drew attendees from across

California and beyond. Organizers capped attendance at approximately 2,500 people this year in an effort to preserve the festival's intimate atmosphere.

"This is my first time in California and my first Untz," said an attendee who went by the name Tropics. "The atmosphere they curate here is so homey and inviting and warm. It feels very intentional."

While some attendees are new to the festival, others such as Noralina Freedom have attended since its early years in Mariposa County nearly a decade ago.

Based in San Francisco, Noralina specializes in handmade clothing crafted from upcycled silk saris and surplus fabrics, transforming discarded materials into one-of-a-kind wearable art pieces. Each year, she returns to the festival with her children, balancing business with family tradition.

"They've grown up going to festivals, so they do like it," Noralina said. "Definitely my youngest. He's more of a dancer than the others. My daughter is really into hula hoops and

flow arts and even started doing aerial silks classes back where we live. It's kind of like growing up in the park, you know? We're actually about to head to the sock puppet workshop now. We missed it yesterday and the kids really want to go."

Vendors such as Noralina often camp beside their booths and appeared largely unconcerned about locking up their goods at night. Many simply lowered a tent flap, pulled in a display rack and trusted fellow festivalgoers.

That sense of camaraderie could be felt

throughout the campground. Open camps welcomed visitors. Small treasure boxes filled with trinkets and supplies dotted the trails with handwritten invitations encouraging passersby to "take one, leave one." Campsites became explosions of color and creativity, decorated with whimsical mascots ranging from cats and aliens to unicorns and handcrafted art installations.

"I think it's really cool to see people living their passion," said Kylee Torkkola, a project manager for capital improvement projects with Yuba County Public

Works. "That's what lights my heart on fire. Watching the culture and the community, the big sense of community that's created here, is such a beautiful thing to witness."

For Jan, the festival remains another way to connect with people at one of his favorite places, Sycamore Ranch. He continued making his rounds throughout the day, knowing festival cooks would soon have a special strawberry birthday cake waiting for him.

"Why? Don't you think she'd go out with me?"

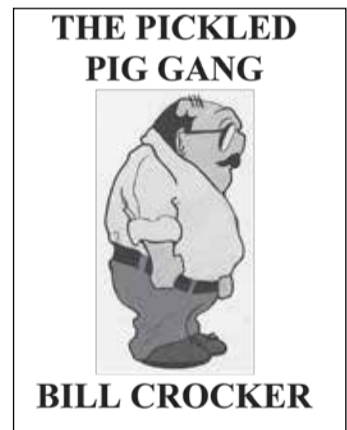
"She'd go out with Undergirth's ugly brother if the price was right."

"You're just using that as an excuse. You say you're not too good at socializing. Well, you need to work at it, and talking with a parrot is not my idea of working at it." ★



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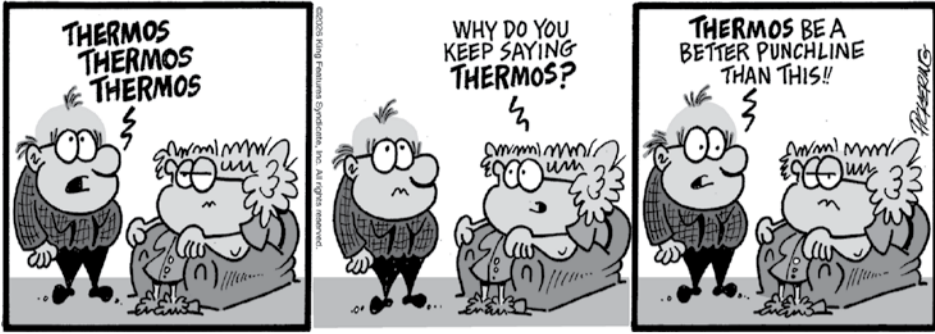
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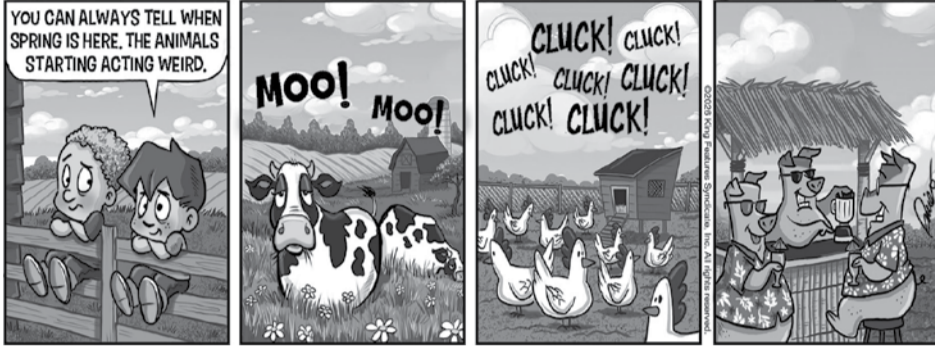

Sutter County DUI Checkpoint Planned May 22

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Sutter County Sheriff's Office will conduct a DUI checkpoint from 8 p.m. May 22 to 2 a.m. May 23 at an undisclosed location in Yuba City. Sheriff's officials said

checkpoint locations are selected based on data showing areas with a history of crashes involving impaired drivers.

The checkpoint aims to improve public safety by identifying and removing suspected impaired drivers from local roadways, according to the Sheriff's

Office.

Officials reminded drivers that impairment is not limited to alcohol. Prescription medications, over-the-counter drugs and cannabis can also affect driving ability and judgment.

Although cannabis use is legal in California for medicinal and

recreational purposes, driving under the influence of cannabis remains illegal.

Drivers arrested for DUI can face penalties that include an average of \$13,500 in fines and penalties, along with a suspended driver's license for a first offense, according to the Sheriff's Office.

Funding for the checkpoint comes from a California Highway Patrol Cannabis Tax Fund Grant Program grant. The program supports education, prevention and enforcement efforts aimed at reducing impaired driving and improving roadway safety throughout California. ★

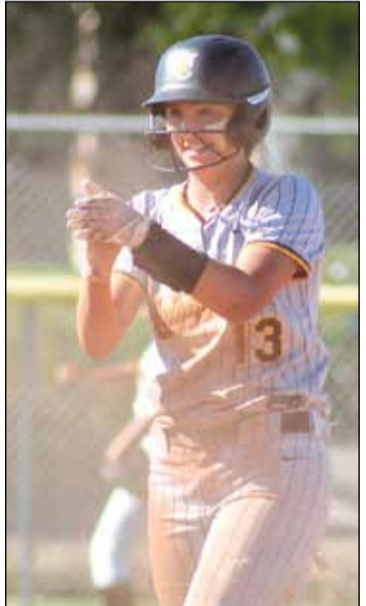
As Calaveras was defeated on May 15 by Eacalon, the Huskies will now host the semifinal matchup instead of being on the road.

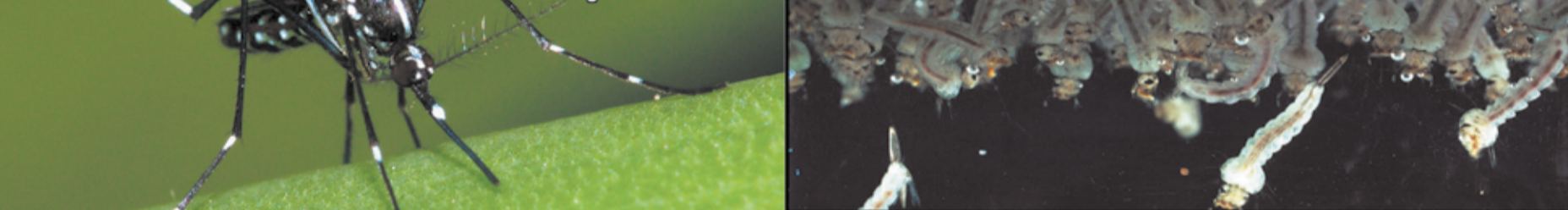


Sutter junior Malaina Wilder (19) blasts a home run on May 13 in the Huskies' win over Galt. Photo by Chris Pedigo

Application of a thin film of a mineral oil quickly kills the immature mosquitoes living in the water. For a long term solution, mosquitofish are introduced. There is no charge, penalty or fee for an inspection or treatment to a pool. You can still get your pool ready for swimming later.



ARE YOU GROWING MOSQUITOES?

A tiny amount of water that sits for just a few days can breed thousands of new mosquitoes. Check through your yard regularly through the season for standing water. Places that hold rain or irrigation water make perfect breeding sites. Regularly dump and drain plant pottery, birdbaths, wheelbarrows, tarps, uncovered boats, lawn sculptures, tires and other containers.

Can't maintain your pool this year? You can self report your green pool or anonymously report a neighbor's. An easy inspection and treatment, at no cost provides season long mosquito control.
