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Affordable Housing Complex Breaks Ground

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - City officials, community members and housing advocates gathered May 14 to celebrate the groundbreaking of Coral Blossom Apartments, an 81-unit affordable housing development intended to serve formerly unhoused and low-income households.

The project, developed by Accelerate Housing Group in partnership with Hope Cooperative, will be built on the west side of Elk Grove

Florin Road south of Calvine Road. Once completed, the development will provide permanent supportive housing through fully furnished one-bedroom apartments paired with on-site supportive services.

The groundbreaking marks a significant milestone for a project that emerged from a yearslong dispute over a prior affordable housing project in Elk Grove.

Coral Blossom Apartments replaces the previously proposed Oak Rose Apartments, a 66-unit development in Old Town Elk Grove

that was also planned by Accelerate Housing Group to serve individuals experiencing housing insecurity and disabilities. City Council denied that project, a decision that later prompted a lawsuit from the California Attorney General's Office alleging violations of Senate Bill 35, a state law designed to streamline qualifying affordable housing projects.

In 2024, the city reached a settlement agreement with the developer that called for the relocation of the project to a different site through a

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Council Reviews \$491 Million Budget Proposal

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - City Council members received a presentation at their May 27 meeting on the city's proposed 2026-2027 budget; a \$491 million balanced budget \$80 million larger than the 2025-2026 budget.

"It is a significant increase over the prior year," City Manager Jason Behrmann told the council.

Behrmann said most of the increase comes not from operating costs but rather from capital projects and related activity slated for this budget cycle, such as some future projects going into design contracts while others will begin turning dirt.

Some of these projects were detailed during a presentation on the 2026-2030 Capital Improvements Program prior to the budget by Capital Program Division Manager Christina Castro. The city is proposing spending about \$450.77 million in capital projects over the next five years with \$304.25 million in funding already secured, leaving \$146.52 million unsecured.

"This unsecured funding represents project funding needs that are reasonably anticipated to be available from grants, bond financing, or other yet to be identified funding sources in the coming five fiscal years, but which are not currently secured, making the delivery timing uncertain," Castro wrote in her council report.

The city lists 97 projects in its five-year plan, 74 of which are capital improvement projects, 23 minor projects under \$250,000 or studies, 17 new projects added this year, seven completed projects in 2026 and on track to complete another 12 in 2026-2027.

Project funding makes up the difference between the \$491 million the city expects to spend in this coming cycle vs. just over \$351 million in expected revenue. Of those expenses, the largest is almost \$240 million in capital outlays, accounting for 49% of the total expense budget.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Lions Clubs from across the Sacramento region gathered at Depot Park (16 Business Park Way) on May 16 for the annual Special Kids Day, an event designed to provide youth with special needs a safe and inclusive space to enjoy a carnival-style

celebration with their families.

Organized by members of District 4-C5 Lions Clubs, which includes Yolo and El Dorado counties and cities such as Placerville and Elk Grove, the free event featured games, arts and crafts, motorcycle rides, entertainment and booths tabled by local organizations offering resources.

Special Kids Day Co-Chair Kitty

Kramer said the event intends to create a welcoming environment for children or teens with a range of disabilities, such as autism and cerebral palsy, while also providing a fun experience for their parents and siblings.

Kramer told Messenger Publishing Group that she and her husband,

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separate application process, paving the way for Coral Blossom Apartments.

Dana Trujillo, president and chief executive officer of Excelerate Housing Group, reflected on the evolution of its relationship with the city and acknowledged the challenges surrounding the earlier proposal during opening remarks at the May 14 ceremony.

“Our relationship started off a little rocky over an early project that we wanted to develop,” Trujillo said. “Though we were not able to agree on the Oak Rose project, working with the city on Coral Blossom has really been great.”

Trujillo said assembling the project’s financial partners was critical to making the development possible. Funding partners include Century Housing Corporation, Citi Community Capital, the California Municipal Finance Authority, the City of Elk Grove, the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee and the California Debt Limit Allocation Committee.

Hope Cooperative will provide on-site supportive services through offices located centrally within the development. Project leaders said the combination of stable housing and support services is designed to help residents achieve long-term stability and successfully transition out of homelessness.

As a key partner in the project, Hope Cooperative Chief Executive Officer April Ludwig spoke about the purpose behind the development, describing it as a reflection of the community’s compassion and commitment to helping those in need.

“We’re celebrating the culmination of what’s to come. Today is about what becomes possible when a community comes together around hope, dignity,

healing and opportunity,” Ludwig said. “This project represents stability for individuals and families... It reflects what can happen when people move beyond conversations and into action.”

As part of the effort to help residents maintain long-term housing, rental subsidies will be administered through the Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency (SHRA).

Cheyenne Caraway, director of the agency’s Housing Choice Voucher Program, said Coral Blossom Apartments will become the agency’s second project-based voucher community in Elk Grove and its largest in the city to date.

“It’s a strong reflection of a continued shared commitment to expanding housing opportunities not just within the city, but also across the county of Sacramento as well,” Caraway said at the ceremony. “When affordable housing is paired with access to supportive services, it helps families maintain stability and improve their

quality of life.”

Caraway added that the project joins more than 3,600 voucher-supported housing units across the region. The Project-Based Voucher program provides rental assistance at designated affordable housing communities through long-term agreements with private property owners, helping eligible residents to afford stable housing.

Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen also spoke, emphasizing the project’s significance in addressing homelessness and expanding affordable housing options in the city.

“Coral Blossom Apartments represents a compassionate and forward-thinking investment in our community through permanent supportive housing that will address homelessness here in Elk Grove and the surrounding community,” Singh-Allen said, acknowledging the “bumps” encountered along the way and the collaboration that ultimately moved the project forward.

“I want to recognize the incredible work of Excelerate Housing Group and Hope Cooperative for their commitment to creating meaningful solutions... projects like Coral Blossom will address a critical need in our city,” Singh-Allen added.

In addition to the ceremonial groundbreaking, attendees participated in a “Foundation of Hope” activity, writing letters of encouragement that will be placed into the building’s foundation when it is poured as a “lasting reminder of hope, community and new beginnings.”

Construction, led by Pacific West Builders, for the affordable housing complex is expected to be completed by fall 2027. ★

Council Reviews \$491 Million Budget Proposal

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“The total proposed budget of approximately \$491 million includes not only current-year revenues, but also the planned use of existing fund balances, reserves and other accumulated resources that were collected in prior years,” Elk Grove Budget Manager Nathan Bagwill said in a May 28 email.

Many capital projects are funded over multiple years. That revenue must be recorded in the accounting process as the project moves forward and can sometimes result in annual expenses exceeding revenues until those funds are spent.

Bagwill said the 2026-2027 budget includes capital improvements carried forward from previous years, along with those restricted funds accumulated for specific projects.

“These resources bridge the difference between the approximately \$351 million in current-year revenues and the \$491 million total expenditure budget,” Bagwill said. “In short, the budget is balanced because expenditures are supported by a combination

of current-year revenues and previously accumulated fund balances and reserves that are legally available for their intended purposes.”

During his presentation, Behrmann pointed to the wide variety of funding sources the city utilizes as a strength of the budgeting process. Of the nine sources, Behrmann was proudest of the over \$66.5 million in grant funding staff has been able to secure.

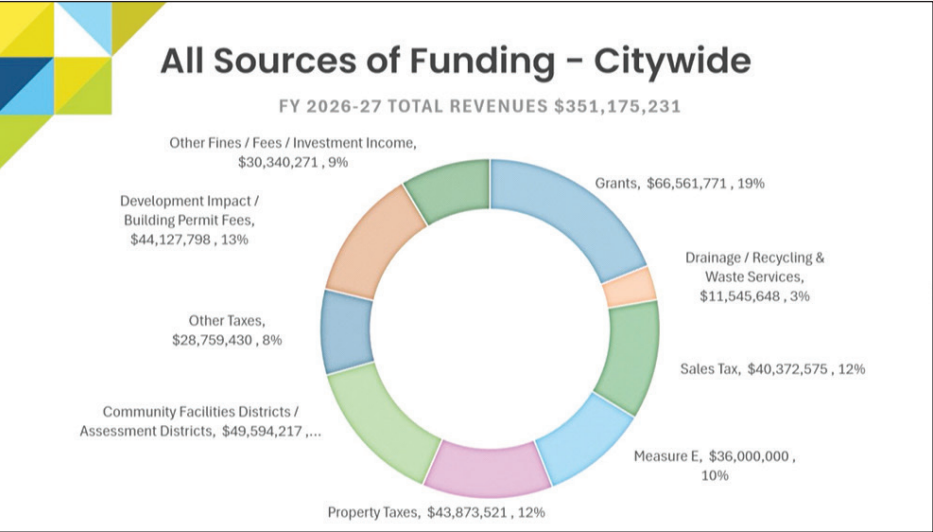
The city also expects to see \$49.59 million in community facilities districts/assessment districts revenue, \$44.12 million from building impact and development fees, \$43.87 million in property taxes and \$40.37 million in sales tax. Most of the two latter revenue sources go into the city’s General Fund, where \$117.4 million of revenue (not including \$36 million in Measure E revenue) is matched against almost \$107.57 million in expenses, the largest of which is over \$72 million in compensation, most of which goes to public safety staff.

The \$10.1 million

increase in General Fund expenses is driven by a \$4.1 million increase from the negotiated 3.5% general salary increase, Police Officers Association market adjustments, step increases, overtime needs and four new positions. The city is also increasing staff and equipment in response to public safety needs, including purchasing several new police vehicles and red-light traffic cameras at five more intersections in response to public safety’s focus on improving traffic enforcement and safety measures.

Behrman also pointed out the city has a healthy \$25.8 million reserve fund to address potential economic uncertainties, \$5.1 million in an “Opportunity Reserve” and continues to make strong investments in capital reserves, economic development and a pension trust fund that is in the top 10% of trust funds in the state. Behrmann said financial forecasts indicate a stable General Fund with revenues exceeding expenses over the next five years.

“We’re not seeing any major headwinds with our

revenue sources,” he said. “If we do, we can adjust, we can adapt and we can ride out any storm.”

The city has until the end of June to adopt the 2026-2027 budget, but staff are proposing this be done at the council’s June 10 meeting. The meeting will also include a public hearing for comment on the budget.

Earlier in the May 27 meeting, City Council and staff honored longtime city employee Kara Reddig, who is leaving her current position of deputy city manager to become the first woman city manager

for the city of Lodi. Reddig joined the Elk Grove staff almost 24 years ago and has risen through the ranks to her current position.

City Manager Jason Behrmann pointed to Reddig’s leadership in implementing Measure E, a voter-approved 1% sales tax measure passed in 2022.

She has also secured more than \$18 million in state and federal funding to support a variety of community needs including enhancing public safety and funding homelessness initiatives. ★

fellow Lion Dennis Kramer, helped launch the effort locally about a decade ago after visiting a similar event in the Bay Area.

“It’s a day that they can bring the whole family, including siblings out, and just have fun,” she said. “If they don’t have any resources that they aren’t aware of, they might be able to find some help here.”

As part of Lions Clubs International’s broader humanitarian mission of supporting accessible vision and health screenings worldwide, the event also included a mobile vision center in partnership with the Northern California Lions Sight Association (NCLSA) to offer free eye exams for all attendees.

Now in its 10th year, Kramer said Special Kids Day continues to be an important and widely supported event in the Sacramento region because it provides local youth and their families with a place where they feel welcomed and accepted.

“A lot of times when we take a kid with special needs out into the general population...there’s a tendency for people to stare at them, or other kids to ask, ‘What’s wrong with them?’” she said.

“When they come out here, everybody’s kind of the same. Somebody’s got something going on, whether it’s visible or not,” Kramer added. She noted that the event

is made possible through its volunteers and donations from the local Lions Club groups as well as its community partners, who help provide the food, activities, prizes and entertainment.

This year’s attractions included fire truck tours, a photo booth, several cosplay characters to take pictures with and bounce houses.

Kramer also highlighted a program through the Folsom Lake Lions Club called “Hooks and Needles,” in which incarcerated individuals at Folsom Prison create stuffed animals for children attending the event.

“They love doing that because they’re giving back,” Kramer said.

Among the booths participating at the May 16 event was A Touch of Understanding Inc., a nonprofit focused on building disability awareness through facilitating hands-on workshops in schools that promote empathy and inclusion.

Shanna Lowder of A Touch of Understanding said the nonprofit’s mission

is supported by volunteers with disabilities who speak to students at school sites. Volunteers were also at the Special Kids Day booth open to sharing their personal experiences with attendees.

“The idea is by providing a hands-on experience for students to have a better understanding of a variety of disabilities and be more empathetic towards their classmates,” Lowder said.

Lowder added that participating in Special Kids Day aligns with their organization’s values as it highlights the importance of embracing inclusivity. She explained that her own perspective shifted after attending the event herself for the first time a few years back.

“It really opened my eyes up to it’s OK to ask questions; It’s OK to engage, rather than to bring stigma on it,” she said. “Understanding that we might need different tools to get to the same spot.”

Two Killed, Others Injured in Early Morning Collision

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - Two people were killed and two others were transported to a local hospital after a stolen vehicle being driven by a teen fleeing from police broadsided an unrelated vehicle in an intersection early Monday, June 1.

The suspected driver, a 14-year-old male, was detained following the collision and is expected to face multiple felony charges, including vehicular manslaughter, vehicle theft and felony evasion.

Around 4 a.m., an officer was parked in the parking lot of Rau Park when he heard what sounded like a vehicle driving recklessly. The officer went to check the area and observed a silver vehicle going northbound on Elk Grove Florin Road and turning into a gas station parking lot. The officer activated his overhead lights; however, the vehicle continued through the parking lot and onto eastbound Brown Road.

The vehicle, a silver Hyundai, stopped in the westbound lane of traffic for several seconds before fleeing eastbound. The

vehicle then turned northbound onto Gurmit Court, where the driver made a U-turn by driving onto the sidewalk and around a parked vehicle.

The Hyundai accelerated out of the court and continued eastbound on Brown Road toward the dead end. As the vehicle began making another U-turn, the rear passenger, who was wearing a black balaclava mask, exited the vehicle and fled on foot. At that point, the officer observed that both the driver and front passenger were also wearing black balaclava masks covering all but their eyes.

The vehicle then took off westbound on Brown Road at a high speed. With the officer at least a quarter-mile behind, the Hyundai ran a red light at the intersection of Elk Grove Florin Road and Brown Road and broadsided a Tesla traveling southbound on Elk Grove Florin Road.

The Tesla was occupied by four individuals. The two rear passengers, a 47-year-old woman and a 54-year-old man, were pronounced deceased at the scene.

The driver, a 55-year-old woman, and the front

passenger, a 63-year-old man, were both transported to a local hospital. The driver sustained life-threatening injuries, while the front passenger sustained non-life-threatening injuries.

The driver of the silver Hyundai, a 14-year-old juvenile, and the 13-year-old passenger were detained. The driver was transported to a local hospital where he is being treated for injuries sustained during the collision.

Officers later learned the Hyundai was an unreported stolen vehicle out of the City of Sacramento.

The 13-year-old passenger was released to his parents after receiving medical treatment. The identity of the rear passenger is still unknown.

The 14-year-old driver will be charged with vehicle theft, two counts of vehicular manslaughter and felony evasion.

The identities of the deceased will be released by the Sacramento County Coroner’s Office pending notification of next of kin.

Gig Workers And Road Safety In The Sacramento Valley
The streets of Sacramento, Roseville and Elk Grove have seen a dramatic transformation over the last few years. The “gig economy” is no longer a side hustle; as of early 2026, it is a primary driver of our local traffic patterns. With over 8 million drivers nationwide on platforms like Uber and DoorDash – and California leading the nation in gig labor – the Sacramento Valley has become a hub for rideshare and delivery services. There is a dangerous correlation between the “customer rating” systems used by these platforms and a spike in local crash statistics.
The Rating Trap: Speed vs. Safety. The business model of gig work relies on a digital carrot-and-stick: the customer rating. For a driver in the Sacramento Valley, a drop in their “star rating” below a certain threshold doesn’t just mean fewer tips; it can mean immediate deactivation and loss of income.
This creates an environment of extreme time pressure. When a delivery driver is navigating the high-speed “stroads” like Watt Avenue or Sunrise Boulevard, the algorithm is tracking every second.
• The Incentive to Speed: To maintain a 5-star rating for “promptness,” drivers are incentivized to push yellow lights and exceed speed limits.
• The Distraction of the Interface: Drivers must constantly interact with their phones to accept new “batches” or navigate complex apartment complexes in North Sacramento, taking their focus off the road during critical maneuvers.
Why is the Sacramento Valley so vulnerable? As we’ve discussed previously, the Sacramento Valley is a “high-injury network” due to its mix of high-speed transit corridors and residential hubs. When you add thousands of drivers who are psychologically tethered to a ticking clock, the risks multiply.
Recent 2026 mobility reports indicate that gig couriers are working more hours than ever to compensate for stagnating per-order pay. Fatigued drivers, combined with the pressure to deliver a “hot meal” or a “quick ride,” lead to the types of high-energy collisions we see on Highway 99 and Business 80.
Rideshare and delivery companies attempt to distance themselves from liability by classifying drivers as independent contractors. If you are hit by a delivery driver, their insurance company might argue they weren’t “on the clock” if they didn’t have an active delivery in the car, even if they were speeding to get to their next pickup. Digital platforms bear responsibility for the pressure they place on drivers. If you’ve been injured in a collision with a gig worker, you are fighting a multi-billion-dollar algorithm. Don’t let a driver’s quest for a five-star rating cost you your health or your livelihood.

The New York Knicks are saying wait a minute! How about us?

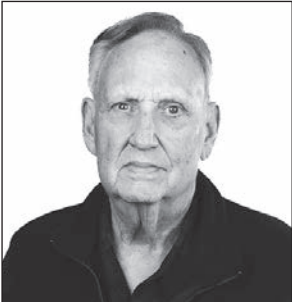
They would be right to say so, and I believe the finals may well surprise some people, but at this moment San Antonio looks like the odds-on favorite.

Gavin Newsom’s Rosy Painting of California’s Economy Leaves Out Its Darker Undertones

As Gavin Newsom makes his increasingly frequent appearances outside the state — seemingly preparing for a 2028 presidential campaign — one of his stock messages is that California’s economy is soaring.

“We dominate in every category,” Newsom bragged during a recent presentation to the Center for American Progress, a left-leaning think tank. “We are the center of the universe (and) America’s coming attraction.”

He cited the state’s \$4-trillion-plus economic output that, were it a nation, would rank 4th or 5th largest in the world, and mentioned the ranks of Nobel Prize winners and vigorous venture capital investment in the state.

Moreover, he boasted, California has used that economic vigor to finance an array of social programs and services, such as universal health care, proving, he said, that such largesse can co-exist with capitalistic gains.

Subliminally, Newsom was pitching the notion that electing him as president could bring California-like prosperity and generosity to the nation as a whole. However, since Newsom is using the economy as a major talking point, it would be fair to provide key facts he fails to mention.

Yes, California has world-class economic output, but it

is due largely to a very narrow sector, Silicon Valley’s high-tech industry, which has hugely benefited its entrepreneurs and capital investors.

However the industry is undergoing a shakeout due to the artificial intelligence phenomenon and it’s shedding thousands of jobs, thus concentrating wealth even more.

Meanwhile the state’s other world-famous sector, Southern California’s movie and TV industry, is hurting badly as production migrates to other states and nations — so badly that the state is offering subsidies in an effort to slow the hemorrhage.

Ever since the COVID-19 pandemic, California’s unemployment rate has routinely ranked among the nation’s highest, with a million members of its labor force lacking jobs.

Beacon Economics, a major consulting firm that closely charts California’s economic situation puts it this way: “On one hand, California’s economy is in good health. While the official figures for the last quarter are still being tallied, the state’s economic growth comfortably outpaced the national average of 2.5% in 2025, tracking toward an annual growth rate near 3%.

“At the same time, the job market is sagging. California now has the highest unemployment rate of all fifty states in the Union, stubbornly hovering at 5.5%, and its job market appears to be going in the wrong direction. The total number of jobs in California actually shrank by 0.6% since the beginning of this year, making it the 17th worst-performing state in the nation in terms of job creation.”

One result of these contradictory data is one of the nation’s highest levels of income disparity, as a recent report from the Public Policy Institute of California points out. Only eight other states have wider gaps.

“The gap between top and bottom incomes in California has increased substantially (by 57%) since 1980, when families at the top earned seven times more than those at the bottom,” the PPIC report says, reflecting 72% income growth for those in the top tenth in income but 19% growth for those in the bottom tenth.

The Census Bureau’s calculation of poverty that includes the state’s staggering living costs puts California’s rate at the highest, 17.7%, tied with Louisiana. A similar calculation by PPIC and the Stanford Center on Poverty and Inequality puts it at 16.9%, while another 17.9% of the population is “near-poor.”

About 15 million Californians are poor enough to qualify for healthcare under the state’s Medi-Cal program but, as Newsom failed to mention in his Center for American Progress presentation, his new budget reduces Medi-Cal eligibility for some Californians to shrink the state’s chronic budget deficit, which he also didn’t mention during his recitation of cherry-picked data.

Social Security Matters

I’m being Released from Incarceration. What Are My Social Security Options?

Dear Rusty: In a previous column, you wrote about people who filed for Social Security late in life. I am currently incarcerated and will be filing for Social Security in the fall of 2029. I will be 74 years old in the first week of January 2029. Unless I read it wrong, could I be eligible to collect the previous 6 months? If this is so, how would that work? Would I get that all at once or incrementally? According to the chart we once got in the mail, I should be collecting the maximum amount. I’ve worked all of my life and never collected Social Security before. Also, my ex-wife remarried and has since passed away. Do I qualify for part of her Social Security? **Signed, “D” in Danbury**

Dear “D” in Danbury: I’m afraid you cannot receive Social Security benefits while you are incarcerated, even if you are eligible for them prior to your release. Thus, you cannot get retroactive Social Security benefits for any period you were still incarcerated. For clarity, although most who apply at a later age (e.g., in their 70s) do have the option to

claim retroactive benefits, you cannot get any SS benefits for any month you were still incarcerated. Further, you will not get credit for delaying your application for SS benefits while you are incarcerated (you won’t earn Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) during your incarceration).

Assuming (from what you shared) that you expect to be released from incarceration in the fall of 2029, you can apply for your SS benefits to start upon your release. Be aware, however, that it usually takes several months for your application for SS benefits to be processed, and you can specify the month you wish your benefits start. Your benefit amount will be based upon your average monthly earnings for the 35 highest earning years over your lifetime. But you cannot get retroactive SS benefits for time prior to your release from incarceration. Since Social Security does not pay benefits for partial months, you can file for your SS benefits to start effective with the month following the month in which your incarceration ends. Be sure you have your official prison release documentation (parole or discharge papers) in hand when you apply for your Social Security benefits.

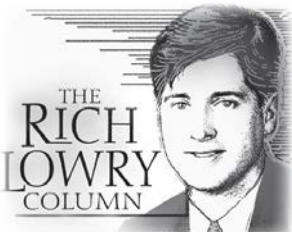
FYI, some correctional facilities have a “Prerelease Agreement” with Social Security, which may enable you to file for your SS benefits three to four months prior to your release from incarceration. Be sure to

check with your facility to see if they have such an agreement with Social Security and, if so, use it to apply for your benefits in advance of your release. This will facilitate your SS benefits starting more quickly upon your release.

You did not ask about healthcare coverage, but since you will be eligible for Social Security, you will also be eligible for Medicare upon your release. When you apply for your Social Security benefits, you can also apply for Medicare Part B (coverage for outpatient medical services), the premium for which will be deducted from your Social Security payment. FYI, Medicare Part A (coverage for inpatient hospitalization services) is free and automatic because you are also eligible for Social Security.

Finally, regarding survivor benefits from your ex-wife, you can only get a surviving ex-spouse benefit if you were married for more than 10 years and your own SS retirement amount is less than your ex-wife was receiving at her death. In other words, you can only get one SS benefit — either your own or your deceased ex-wife’s amount, whichever is higher.

The Democrats couldn’t complete their term paper, but handed it in anyway because too many people were wondering what had become of it.

Under pressure, the DNC finally released its autopsy of the 2024 election, after rampant speculation about what it contained and why it hadn’t yet been made public. Did it include references to Gaza or didn’t it? Why or why not? What explosive revelations were being kept from us?

It turns out that the autopsy is a thoroughly unimpressive, unfinished document that, in the sheer incompetence in its drafting and handling, says more about the low state of the current Democratic Party than any of its analysis.

DNC Chairman Ken Martin maintains that he delayed so long because he didn’t want to create a distraction by releasing a poorly done report, which sounds like a typical Washington excuse for hiding something. Except it wasn’t. Once everyone saw the report, they realized Martin was right about the embarrassingly poor handiwork of his own outfit.

At the start, the autopsy contains a disclaimer that “the DNC was not provided with the underlying sourcing, interviews or supporting data for many of the assertions contained herein and therefore cannot independently verify the claims presented.”

Then, throughout the document, there are hostile

annotations casting doubt on its claims. And the report doesn’t have a conclusion. The Democrats would have been better off going with ChatGPT.

That said, the report acknowledges that Democrats are out of touch and too dependent on the Republicans making poor candidate choices (something the GOP may be about to do again in its Texas Senate primary with the Trump-endorsed, scandal-plagued Attorney General Ken Paxton).

It notes how Trump’s they/them ad hitting Kamala Harris on trans issues was devastating and unanswerable.

It recognizes that Harris didn’t do enough to separate herself from Biden and make an affirmative case for herself, rather than relying on voters supposedly considering Trump unacceptable.

On the other hand, it fails to grapple with the issues of inflation and immigration (except to complain about Harris being given a role with some responsibility over the border). These were the two biggest substantive issues in the election, while the autopsy also whiffs on Biden’s age and his catastrophically poor judgment in trying to run for reelection. (It also doesn’t mention Gaza, bitterly disappointing the anti-Israel left.)

Yet, our expectations for such documents shouldn’t be very high. What was the report going to say? That Democrats disgraced themselves by pretending that Biden was fit for a second term, and only shifted course when he got exposed in the first debate,

and then had no alternative but to turn to a charmless nonentity as a last-minute substitute?

The history of party retrospectives like this isn’t good. Donald Trump won the presidency in 2016 by taking the recommendations of the GOP autopsy after its 2012 election defeat and often doing the opposite in substance and tone.

Democrats may be rulerless and increasingly extreme, but that doesn’t mean they won’t have a good election night this coming November. Usually, a party that has just lost the White House rises or falls in the midterms based on the incumbent president’s job approval rating, rather than its own political creativity or inherent appeal.

As for retaking the White House, that typically depends on nominating someone who is charismatic and fresh, who has an unexpected approach to politics, and who develops a new coalition -- think Barack Obama in 2008, or Donald Trump in 2016.

TITLE: None of this comes about by having a political strategist talk to a bunch of people about the immediate past election and write a long report about it. Needless to say, Democrats should be grateful that the stakes of their autopsy are so low -- otherwise, they would have had to endeavor to actually finish it, and grapple with truths about the 2024 election conveniently passed over in the just-released document.

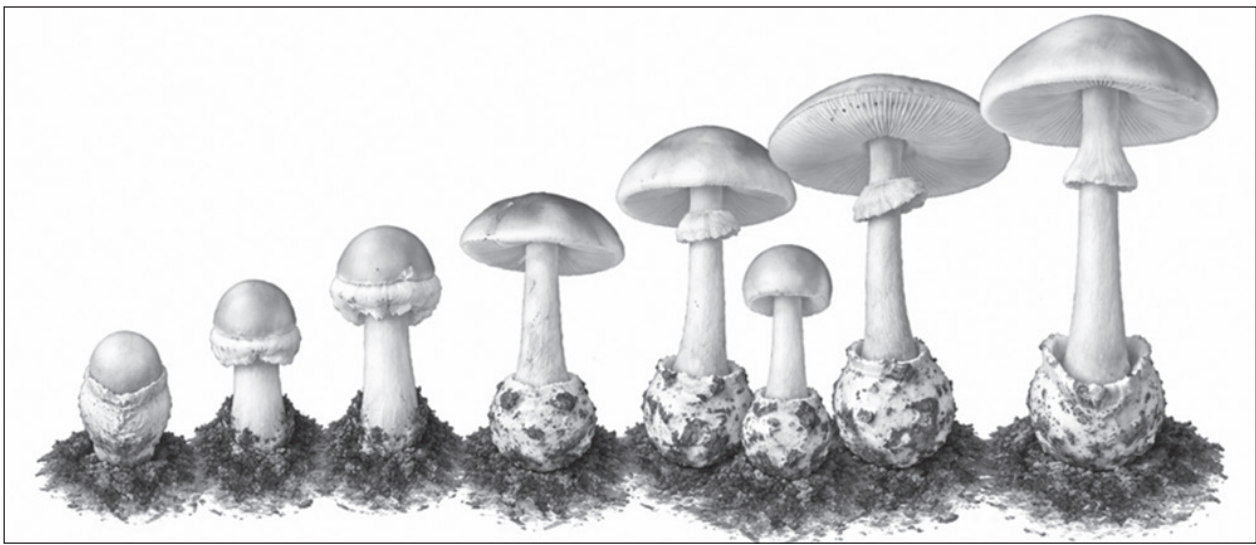

Public Health Officials Report Three Additional Cases of Mushroom Poisoning

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County Public Health (SCPH) confirms three recent cases of amatoxin poisoning in Sacramento County caused by people accidentally picking and eating Death Cap and/or Western Destroying Angel mushrooms. All three cases are hospitalized for treatment. This comes amidst a continuing statewide outbreak linked to the consumption of wild, foraged mushrooms. There's been reports of severe liver damage in both children and adults, resulting in four adult deaths and at least four liver transplants statewide to date. Between Nov. 18 and May 14, the California Poison Control System (CPCS) has identified 49 cases across Northern California and the Central Coast, spanning regions

from Sonoma to San Luis Obispo. Affected individuals range in age from 19 months to 67 years and include family groups and individual cases. SCPH and Sacramento County Regional Parks remind residents that wild mushrooms can be poisonous even if they resemble edible varieties and remain

toxic even after cooking, boiling, freezing or drying. “With poisonings continuing to increase across California, we want residents to understand that foraging wild mushrooms carries significant risk,” said Sacramento County Public Health Officer Dr. Olivia Kasirye. “Toxic mushrooms can be difficult

to distinguish from edible varieties and can cause severe illness or death. The safest choice amid this ongoing situation is to avoid wild mushroom foraging entirely.” Sacramento County Public Health is coordinating with CDPH and California Poison Control on case investigation,

tracking and public outreach. SCPH is sharing state-developed educational materials and reinforcing statewide messaging to reduce exposure during this high-risk season. Avoid picking and eating wild mushrooms during this high-risk season when Death Cap mushrooms

are abundant. Death Cap mushrooms are still poisonous even after cooking, boiling, freezing or drying. Purchase mushrooms from trusted grocery stores and retailers and exercise caution when buying mushrooms from street vendors. Keep children and pets away from wild mushrooms. Seek help immediately if you or someone you know has eaten a poisonous mushroom. Contact the CPCS hotline at 1-800-222-1222. Do not wait for symptoms to appear. Treatment is more difficult once symptoms start. Initial symptoms, such as watery diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain and dehydration can occur within 6 to 24 hours following ingestion of these toxic mushrooms and usually go away within a day. However, this brief improvement can be deceptive, as patients may still develop serious to fatal liver damage within 48 to 96 hours after eating the mushrooms. 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County’s Recommended Budget Released; Hearings Set for June

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27 has been released. The Board of Supervisors will begin hearings on the Recommended Budget at 9:30 a.m., Wednesday, June 10 in Board Chambers at the Sacramento County Administration building, located at 700 H St. in Sacramento.

The public is encouraged to attend the hearings and be heard on any items in the budget, either in-person or through written comments. Budget hearings will also be telecast live on Metro Cable 14 and the County’s website at sac-county.gov.

The hearings will continue beginning at 9:30 a.m. through June 11 and 12, if necessary.

Scheduled presentations (order is subject to change) include IHSS Public Authority Budget; Public Comment on IHSS Public Authority Budget and Deliberation and Approval of IHSS Public Authority Budget; County Executive’s Budget; District Attorney; Sheriff; Public Defender; Regional Parks; Human Assistance; Child, Family and Adult Services; Health Services; Public Comment; and the Board Deliberation/Approval of Recommended Budget and Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

billion spending plan is a decrease of 2.8% compared to the FY 2025-26 Adopted Budget. Of the total \$8.9 billion budgeted: \$3.2 billion is in Enterprise and Special Revenue Funds (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue); \$4 billion is in General Fund (funded with \$1 billion in discretionary revenue, \$1.7 billion in reimbursements from restricted funds, and \$1.3 billion in Federal, State and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes); and \$1.7 billion in Restricted Funds (amounts transferred to the General Fund to reimburse eligible expenditures in General Fund departments).

Budget Process/Challenges

The County projected a \$101 million deficit at a Board meeting in January, half of which is due to impacts from HR 1, otherwise known as the “Big Beautiful Bill.” Based on that projection, the Board directed the County Executive’s Office to ask departments to identify the impact of 2.5%

funding reductions as part of their FY 2026-27 budget submissions.

The vast majority of departments provided those reductions in a thoughtful way that minimized impacts to service levels and avoided layoffs whenever possible.

“I appreciate the leadership and creativity our departments demonstrated throughout this process,” said County Executive David Villanueva. “Across the organization, teams took a careful look at their operations, identified opportunities to streamline where possible, and eliminated vacant positions that are no longer needed to sustain current service levels. Their work helped us meet these budget targets while they committed to continuing critical services for our residents.”

General Fund Available Balance

The County’s General Fund is its discretionary revenue, which means the Board of Supervisors has flexibility when deciding how to use those funds.

Child, Family and Adult Services: \$5.7 million for 19 positions.

Child Support Services: \$1.8 million for 16 vacant positions due to frozen State funding levels.

Correctional Health Services: \$4.1 million reduction in base budget and deletion of 10 vacant positions.

District Attorney: \$4.1 million reduction in base budget and the deletion of 15 positions. (Note: The District Attorney’s Office identified that 14 of the positions were filled. However, as of May 18, 2026, vacant positions exist within the department in the classifications recommended for deletion.)

Health Services: \$5.4 million reduction to base budget.

Human Assistance: \$2 million for 38 vacant positions due largely to impacts from HR 1.

Public Defender: \$2.6 million for 11 vacant positions and contract expenditures due to the expiration of State grant funding supporting the post-conviction unit, the juvenile pre-trial support program, and the felony mental health diversion program.

Regional Parks: \$0.8 million reduction to the base budget and deletion of seven vacant positions.

Sheriff: \$13.7 million reduction in the base budget and the deletion of 48 positions. Incumbents in these positions will be moved to other vacancies in the department.

Budget Reductions

The FY 2026-27 General Fund reductions total \$57 million, which will result in the deletion of 194.5 full-time equivalent positions.

For all departments, except for the District Attorney’s Office, the recommended budget reflects position reductions that would avoid layoffs by either eliminating vacant positions or positions that have vacancies within the same classification elsewhere in the County.

Significant reductions, identified by departments and recommended by the County Executive, include:

Child, Family and Adult Services: \$5.7 million for 19 positions.

Child Support Services: \$1.8 million for 16 vacant positions due to frozen State funding levels.

Correctional Health Services: \$4.1 million reduction in base budget and deletion of 10 vacant positions.

District Attorney: \$4.1 million reduction in base budget and the deletion of 15 positions. (Note: The District Attorney’s Office identified that 14 of the positions were filled. However, as of May 18, 2026, vacant positions exist within the department in the classifications recommended for deletion.)

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Sheriff: \$13.7 million reduction in the base budget and the deletion of 48 positions. Incumbents in these positions will be moved to other vacancies in the department.

Budget Growth

General Fund growth totals \$91 million, with \$44 million of the amount funded with the County’s discretionary funds. Given the shortfall in discretionary funds relative

to funding departments’ base budget needs, budget growth (or “Net County Cost growth”) is focused on the County’s legal, financial, regulatory and policy obligations and providing mandated services.

The most significant growth includes:

Correctional Health: \$11.7 million (\$7.7 million Net County Cost) to support the County’s obligations under the Mays Consent Decree.

Health Services: \$34 million Net County Cost to provide services under the County Medically Indigent Services Program (CMISP) and provide funding for the Healthy Partners program.

Homeless Services and Housing: \$3 million total (\$1.7 million Net County Cost) to provide additional funding to align shelter operations with Board-adopted community standards and implement a pilot Safe Parking program with one-time grant funding.

Data Processing: \$0.6 million Net County Cost to initiate a Request for Proposals (RFP) process to replace the County’s outdated Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system.

The Recommended Budget is a preliminary spending plan; the Revised Recommended Budget will be presented to the Board in September for deliberation and adoption.

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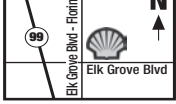
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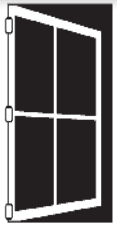

County Executive added, “Our nonprofit partners are essential to delivering critical SafetyNet services across the County. Through this initiative, we are investing in the capacity, tools and resources nonprofits need to sustain and strengthen their impact,” said Chevon Kothari, Sacramento County Health and Human Services Agency Deputy County Executive.

The ten organizations selected for the SCNPI cohort, their primary service area and major programs are as follows.

AcademySTAY (Sacramento): Transitional housing and wrap-around support for foster youth ages 18-24 pursuing college or

vocational training.

Alchemist CDC (Sacramento): Connected programs spanning food access, workforce development, entrepreneurship and community space, helping residents move from immediate crisis toward long-term stability.

Elk Grove Food Bank Services (Elk Grove): Comprehensive food access and homeless services through a client-choice warehouse, senior mobile distributions, home delivery and school-based programs.

Orangevale-Fair Oaks Community Foundation (Orangevale): Operator of the Orangevale-Fair Oaks Food Bank and HART (Homeless

Assistance Resource Team), serving residents across Orangevale, Fair Oaks, Citrus Heights and Folsom.

Rancho Cordova Food Locker (Rancho Cordova): A dignity-centered food access program currently transitioning to a community food hub model to expand services and reduce stigma around food assistance.

Rebuilding Together Sacramento (Sacramento): Homelessness prevention through critical home repairs, safety modifications and accessibility improvements for low-income homeowners, seniors, veterans and people with disabilities.

Refugee Enrichment and Development Association (REDA) Inc. (Sacramento): Culturally responsive housing, food, education and mental health services for refugee and immigrant communities across the greater Sacramento Valley.

Sacramento Cottage Housing, Inc. (Sacramento): Permanent supportive housing and wrap-around services for individuals and families, with deep, relationship-based coaching designed to break cycles of homelessness over the long term.

South County Services (Galt): Providing food distribution and homeless services for rural communities across South Sacramento County, including the isolated Delta region towns where few other services reach.

Three Sisters Gardens (Sacramento): Urban agriculture, food distribution and youth workforce development, paying young people to learn agriculture, food systems and green career pathways.

The initiative builds on the Sacramento Region Community Foundation's more than 40 years of investing in the nonprofits that serve the capital area — including through capacity-building programs like Big Day of Giving and smaller cohort-based efforts that have helped organizations strengthen their leadership and operations over time. It reflects Sacramento County’s broader commitment to building a more resilient nonprofit ecosystem across the region.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County’s Environmental Management

Department (EMD), in coordination with partner agencies, continues outreach and enforcement efforts aimed at improving food safety and helping sidewalk

food vendors operate legally and safely throughout the county.

County staff regularly conduct inspections in areas with known or reported

unpermitted food vending activity. These visits focus first on education and collaboration, providing vendors with information about permitting requirements, food safety standards and available business resources. Recent enforcement operations have included support from the Code Enforcement Division and the Department of Finance.

“People often think inspections are about closures, but our real focus is education, collaboration and helping vendors operate safely while protecting public health,” said Erica Uriarte, environmental health supervisor.

“Sacramento County Code Enforcement supports enforcement of food vendor regulations through proactive education and outreach,” said Mike Sanchez, chief of code enforcement. “Our mission is to protect the health and safety of residents in Unincorporated Sacramento County by collaborating with partner agencies to conduct routine inspections and promote compliance with applicable regulations.”

During recent inspections, county staff observed several examples of unsafe food handling and operating conditions that may pose a risk

to public health. Inspectors documented issues such as raw meat stored on the ground in trash bags; foods requiring refrigeration being held at unsafe temperatures; lack of handwashing facilities; and unsafe cooking or food storage equipment.

When food is not prepared, stored or served following approved safety standards, there is an increased risk of foodborne illness and contamination.

“Providing education and helping vendors understand how to legally operate is our primary goal,” said Erica Uriarte, environmental health supervisor. “We want vendors to succeed while protecting public health and ensuring food sold in our communities is handled safely.”

All Sacramento County permitted vendors are inspected for food safety compliance and are required to display color-coded placards showing their inspection status.

At mobile food vendors, consumers are encouraged to look for a valid Sacramento County mobile food sticker displayed on the operation.

At local restaurants, consumers are encouraged to look for a Green Placard

(Pass), Yellow Placard (Conditional Pass) and Red Placard (Closed).

Purchasing food from permitted vendors helps ensure the food has been inspected and handled under approved food safety standards.

Potential health and safety concerns associated with unpermitted food vending may include food from unapproved sources; food stored directly on the ground; no restroom access; lack of refrigeration to keep food cold; vermin and insects; no potable water; no handwashing facilities on-site; no food safety training for food handlers; poor personal hygiene; and unsafe cooking equipment.

Sacramento County’s efforts are centered on reducing barriers to compliance and increasing awareness among vendors and consumers alike. The county also provides multilingual outreach and education resources to help vendors navigate the permitting process.

Baseball’s Postseason Run Ends in WAC Title Game

MESA, AZ (MPG) - Senior Ryan Ellis capped off an unbelievable week at the plate by finishing 4-for-4 with two more extra-base hits while Luis Pimentel-Guerrero added a home run and three RBI as part of his three-hit day, but Sacramento State's offense could not keep up with top-seeded Tarleton State, falling 21-11 in the highest scoring Western Athletic Conference Tournament game in league history on the afternoon of May 23 at Hohokam Stadium.

The Hornets, who were making their first WAC Tournament championship game appearance since winning the crown in 2019, finished their season at 29-32 overall, finishing 3-2 in tournament play.

With the win, the Texans improved to 37-19 overall and clinched the conference's automatic NCAA Tournament berth, winning both the league's regular season and postseason trophies.

Ellis and Pimentel-Guerrero were two of Sacramento State's all-tournament team honorees, joined on the list by reliever Sean Cary and infielder Jace Jeremiah. The quartet were the first Hornets named to the league's all-tournament team since Jack Bollengier earned a spot in 2021, while the four honorees were the most since 2019 when Dawsen Bacho was named MVP along with all-tournament picks Travis Martizia, Matt Smith, and Ryan Walstad.

Ellis finished a home run short of the cycle on Saturday, ending the day 4-for-4 at the plate with a pair of singles, a double, and a triple

while also drawing a walk and scoring three times. The senior capped off one of the most explosive tournament performances in school history, tying the school WAC Tournament record with 12 hits — 10 of those going for extra bases — set by Ian Dawkins in 2018.

For the week, Ellis hit .632 (12-for-19) with nine runs scored, eight doubles, a triple, and a home run, driving in eight runs and slugging 1.316 for the weekend. The nine runs scored also set a school tournament record, surpassing both Dawkins and Keith Torres, who had eight in 2018 and 2019, respectively, while his .632 average topped

Buddy Morales' mark of .600 (6-for-10) in 2006.

His eight doubles broke James Outman's mark of five in 2018, his four hits on Saturday are tied for the most in a single WAC Tournament game in school history, while his eight RBI are tied for the second-most in a tournament.

Jakob Poturnak, who finished with two hits and a pair of RBI, and Pimentel-Guerrero, who added three hits and three RBI, also slugged home runs in the game, while Jeremiah drove in four thanks to an RBI single in the third and three sacrifice flies. Jeremiah's four RBI matched the school single-game

WAC Tournament record, becoming the ninth Hornet to do so.

After spotting Tarleton State a run in the first, the Hornets answered with three in the home half on Ellis' RBI triple, Jeremiah's first sac fly of the day, and Pimentel-Guerrero's blast over the right-field wall for a 3-1 lead.

The Texans punched right back with four in the second and a single run in the third, but Sacramento State responded with three in the home half to tie the game. Jeremiah's RBI single got the scoring started as Poturnak followed with another run-scoring hit and the Hornets evened things up on a

bases-loaded wild pitch to make it 6-6.

That lit the powder keg for the rest of the day. Tarleton State took the lead for good with a five run fourth, added three in the sixth and scored seven times in the final two innings. Meanwhile, Sacramento State kept clawing, scoring twice in the fourth on a Jeremiah sac fly and a Pimentel-Guerrero single, and another run-scoring hit by Pimentel-Guerrero in the sixth.

Jeremiah added a sac fly in the eighth and Poturnak led-off the ninth with his 11th home run of the year, but the game was too far out of reach. ★
