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Creativity Fills the Park

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Music drifted across Lincoln Village Community Park as children painted at art stations, neighbors sang karaoke and local artists showcased their work during the fourth annual Art in the Park celebration.

The free event, presented by RicoLayer Events on June 6, drew about 250 attendees for an afternoon of art, entertainment, food and community connection. The gathering also marked It Takes a Lincoln Village Community Group's 67th birthday with cupcakes and stories shared by long-term residents.

"I think our success this year was thanks to word of mouth, social media and online ticket promotions," said Rebeka Jones, founder, creative director and lead event coordinator for RicoLayer Events and a member of the It Takes a Lincoln Village Community Group. "I truly appreciate everyone who helped spread the word about Art in the Park."

The event began as an indoor Artist Showcase focused on supporting small businesses. Last year, organizers reimagined it as Art in the Park, moving

Board Approves 2026-27 Recommended Budget

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted on June 10 to approve the \$9 billion Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27.

This year's \$9 billion spending plan consists of \$3.2 billion in Enterprise and Special Revenue Funds (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue), \$4 billion in General Fund (funded with \$1 billion in discretionary revenue, \$1.7 billion in reimbursements from restricted funds, and \$1.3 billion in Federal, State and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes), and \$1.7 billion in Restricted Funds (amounts transferred to the General Fund to reimburse eligible expenditures in General Fund departments).

"Putting together this year's budget required difficult decisions, and I appreciate the thoughtful and strategic approach our department heads took in identifying reductions," said David Villanueva, county executive. "I am also grateful to the Board of Supervisors for their thoughtful discussions, careful consideration and leadership in making the tough choices necessary to adopt a balanced budget."

"Throughout this process, County leaders at every level demonstrated professionalism, responsibility and a commitment to serving our residents. Their dedication is something I'm incredibly proud of and reflects the very best of our County organization."

The Board of Supervisors revised the Recommended Budget by restoring \$9,916,137 in funding. This included \$7,894,989 for the Sheriff's Office, restoring funding for the Homeless Outreach Team (\$2,517,073), Marine Patrol Unit (\$1,092,248), Department of Boating and Waterways funding (\$119,000), Gangs-South Unit (\$1,669,302), Gangs-North Unit (\$1,654,490), and the ID Theft Unit (\$842,876). The Board also restored \$1,372,072 for Community Prosecution positions in the District Attorney's Office and \$649,076 for the Public Defender's Misdemeanor Mental Health Diversion program.

The County's total budget is \$9 billion, including a \$4 billion General Fund, \$3.2 billion in Enterprise and Special Revenue Funds, and \$1.7 billion in Restricted Funds. The budget supports 12,897 employees countywide. ★

the celebration outdoors and expanding its focus to include community engagement, family activities and live entertainment.

“Over the years, the event has grown not just in attendance, but also in what we celebrate,” Jones said. “More diverse vendors and artists are gaining exposure and building confidence.”

This year’s lineup included fine artists, crafters, food vendors, beauty and skincare businesses, nonprofits and government agencies. Families enjoyed face painting, raffle prizes, water balloon games, giant Jenga and children’s art activities throughout the afternoon.

One of the day’s biggest surprises was an impromptu karaoke session that quickly drew participants of all ages.

“A highlight was the spontaneous karaoke session that kids loved,” Jones said. “We saw even more participation, with some people performing more than just singing and sharing their talents in front of everyone. It was truly special to see people of all ages expressing themselves authentically through music. And I can’t forget the inspiring performance by a young poet named Flower Calhoun, who bravely shared her original work.”

Jones said the event’s continued growth reflects strong support from volunteers, sponsors and community partners. Sponsors included the City of Rancho Cordova’s Community Enhancement Fund, SMUD, S.H.E. B.U.I.L.D.S., Quick Quack Car Wash, the Cordova Recreation and Park District and volunteers from the It Takes a Lincoln Village Community Group.

“I’m so grateful for the vendors, community members, supporters and the City of Rancho Cordova who’ve been part of this journey,” Jones said. “Their support isn’t just financial. It’s the sense that it really takes a village to plan, host and make this event meaningful.”

“The most meaningful goal for me is to keep growing Art in the Park into an event that families, friends and community members look forward to year after year,” Jones said.

Now in its fourth year, Art in the Park has become more than an art showcase. Organizers say it has evolved into a community tradition that brings together creativity, local talent and

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Capital Airshow (CCA) brought the wonder of flight and the excitement of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) to hundreds of young people on May 30, through its annual Positive Altitude event at Mather Airport. Families from across the Sacramento region gathered for the half-day program, which introduced youth of all ages to careers and opportunities in aviation and aerospace.

The event opened with a lunchtime conversation and keynote address by Darby Dustman, Director of Strategy & Programs at VELA and a rocket propulsion leader with more than a decade in aerospace and defense. Dustman has worked on hypersonic systems, boosters for NASA's Artemis program and next-generation missile technology and brought that real-world experience to life for a room full of curious kids.

"Every person you admire has a failure story," said Dustman. "You just usually only see the launch."

Her remarks set the tone for an afternoon of exploration and discovery.

Following the keynote, attendees fanned out across dozens of interactive exhibits showcasing the breadth of aviation and aerospace careers. Young visitors got up close with aircraft and equipment from REACH Air Medical Systems, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department Air Unit and Drone team, UPS, FedEx, the U.S. Coast Guard and many more, seeing firsthand the wide range of professionals who keep the equipment and technology in the skies running. Interactive science and STEM demonstrations, including exhibits from Mad Science, rounded out an afternoon designed to spark curiosity across every discipline.

"We want every kid who comes through this event to see someone who looks like them, doing a job they never knew existed," said Darcy Brewer, CEO of the California Capital Airshow. "Aviation is air traffic

controllers, medics, engineers, package delivery, law enforcement, and so much more. Events like this help inspire the future of our industry, so we want these kids to be exposed to the tremendous opportunities ahead of them."

Aviation events also happening this summer. All are free for participants and designed to reach youth who may not otherwise have access to aviation experiences.

them, to really get their needs addressed and make them know that they're heard," Mayor Garrett Gatewood said. "This is a way for us to connect with them, so we never become disconnected from all our communities."

One of the most active areas of the event was a soccer skills course hosted by the San Juan Soccer Club. Teen club members volunteered alongside parents, helping younger children participate in drills and challenges.

"We just like to be out here to try to get everyone involved and let people know who we are and have them come check us out and just have some fun today," said Nicole Carol, a Rancho Cordova resident whose children participate in the club. "It's a great organization."

This year's event incorporated a soccer theme tied to the 2026 FIFA World Cup, which Gatewood said has helped generate excitement around the sport locally.

"The World Cup is just a fun way to celebrate soccer," Gatewood said. "We're trying to get more and more into soccer as a community because we really care about it."

Several nonprofit organizations used the event to introduce residents to programs available throughout the year.

Bike Lab, a local nonprofit, provided free bicycle repairs while sharing information about its community programs. Mechanics worked on bikes throughout the evening, helping residents get their bicycles back into riding condition.

"We bring the whole shop to the community," said Chris Aguirre, founder of Bike Lab. "We fix people's bikes for free."

Aguirre said the organization works closely with Rancho Cordova and local partners to

encourage outdoor recreation, particularly among young people.

"We just want to get people rolling on bikes and get them outdoors," Aguirre said. "The American River Parkway is an amazing resource right here in their backyards."

The event also served as the starting point for a community bike ride organized by Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates (SABA). Riders departed from the park and traveled to local trails while learning about safe cycling practices.

"We're here with Good Neighbor Day to promote safe riding habits," said Barbara, a ride leader with the group. "There are a lot of different ways to get where you want to go safely without having to ride on busy streets."

Organizations throughout the park highlighted low-cost and free activities available to local families.

"Today we're out here for Good Neighbor Day to share all the different events that we have going on throughout the year," said Madelaine Sanderson, an event specialist with the Cordova Community Council. "It's really

important for families to know that there are things that they can do with their families that are low-cost or free."

Cordova Recreation and Park District representatives also spoke with residents about parks, recreation programs and community resources.

Gatewood said the event's

Newsom's Financial Ties to Pentagon-Blacklisted Chinese Military Company

Gavin Newsom's China connection goes back to when he was Mayor of San Francisco

California Governor Gavin Newsom received \$50,000 in campaign contributions from a top executive at a Chinese electric vehicle company (BYD) that Newsom fawned over during his 2023 visit to China. BYD is now on a Pentagon blacklist due to its ties to the Chinese military, the Washington Free Beacon reports.

If BYD rings a bell for *California Globe* readers, it should. In 2020, we reported that Gov. Gavin Newsom spent over \$1 billion in taxpayer funds to buy masks from the Chinese electric vehicle maker BYD at the start of the COVID pandemic.

An electric car company suddenly pivots to making masks — and Newsom chooses them over American suppliers?

Then he went back for more. Newsom signed a second deal worth another \$315 million.

The *Globe* broke the story. RedState amplified it. Even some mainstream outlets in California covered it.

A handful of unhappy Democrat lawmakers in the Legislature demanded an audit of the unauthorized purchases, but they fell silent after a single demand letter to the governor.

And then — POOF — the media lost interest. At least the mainstream media did.

In 2023, the *California Globe* covered Newsom's trip to China and reminded readers exactly who BYD was, and how the governor's corrupt \$1.4 billion mask deal went down.

While the mainstream media chased the next shiny object, the *Globe* kept digging. What we uncovered was a \$1.4 billion contract that smelled like well-connected insider dealing at the highest levels of the governor's office.

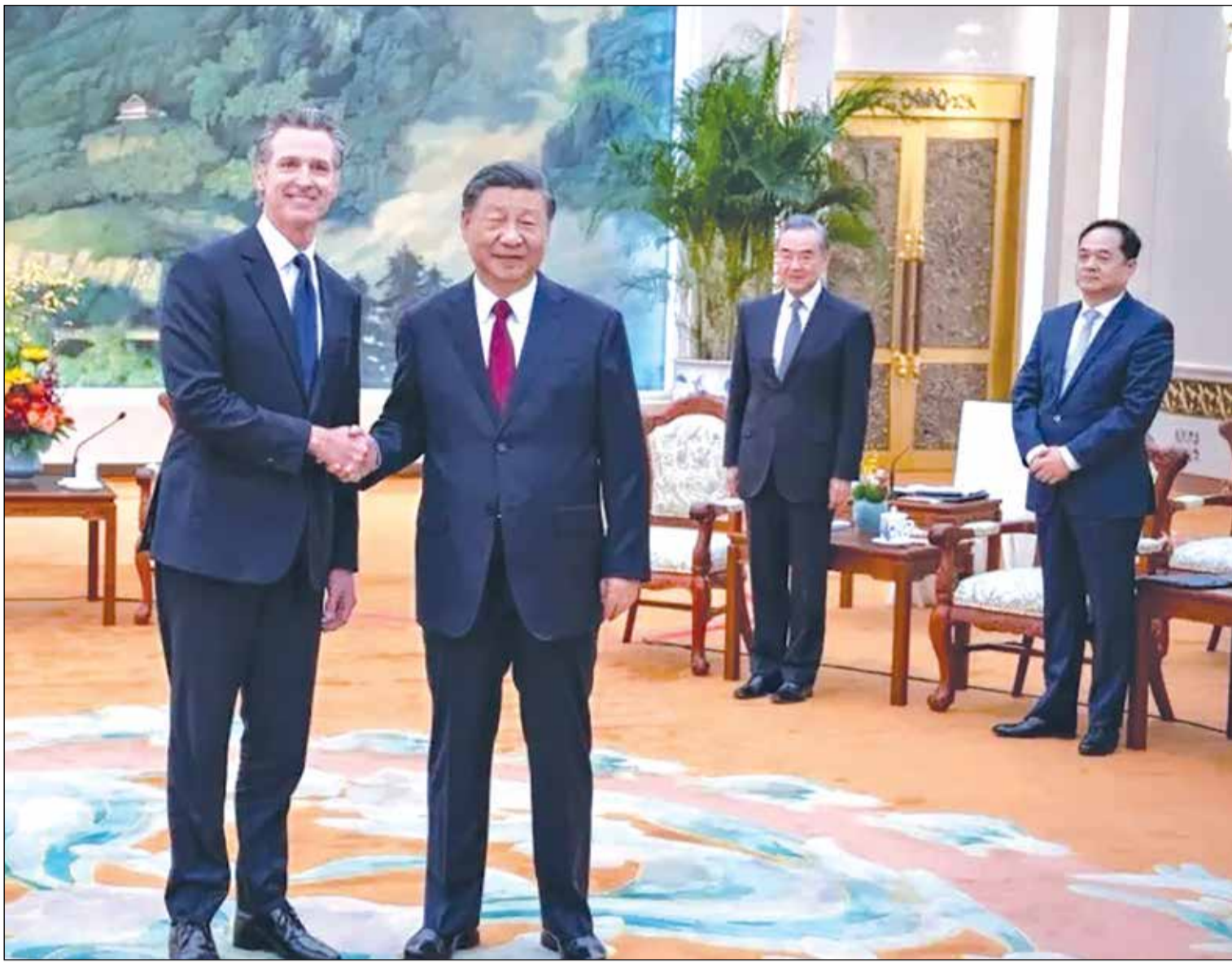
Here's what we found:

BYD — “Build Your Dreams” — is a Chinese electric vehicle and battery giant headquartered in Shenzhen. The company operates a California subsidiary in Lancaster that employs roughly 1,000 people.

Our reporting exposed a web of influential players tied to the unusual mask contract, with connections reaching directly into Governor Newsom's inner circle.

The prominent lobbyist representing BYD is Mark Weideman of The Weideman Group. Newsom's campaign received \$40,000 in contributions from BYD's automotive division.

Weideman also lobbies for Bloom Energy, a San Jose fuel-cell manufacturer that retrofitted its operations to refurbish ventilators during the pandemic. He additionally represents NextGen America, owned by Tom Steyer — the same Tom Steyer who chaired Newsom's economic recovery committee after his own failed presidential bid.

When the *Globe* contacted Weideman for comment, neither a phone call to his office on May 19, 2020, at 1:07 p.m., nor a follow-up email sent on May 25 received any response.

Adding another layer of insider access: Weideman's wife, Jennifer Wada, runs her own government relations firm, Wada Government Relations Group. Few Sacramento insiders realize the two are married. Wada previously partnered in the law firm Wada Williams Law Group with Anthony Williams — the same Anthony Williams who now serves as Gov. Newsom's Legislative Affairs Secretary and was once described in news reports as the governor's “chief lobbyist.”

Newsom's 2023 trip to China raised more questions than answers. The governor never clearly explained its purpose beyond setting up yet another round of sweetheart deals with Beijing.

The most memorable (and telling) moment came when Newsom was filmed behind the wheel of a sleek new BYD electric vehicle. A California Fox News anchor traveling with him apparently never connected the dots, we reported.

The itinerary included stops in Hong Kong, Beijing, and Shanghai. Newsom billed the visit as a “climate-focused tour,” complete with a wind farm and Tesla's Shanghai Gigafactory. Critics saw something else entirely: a governor willfully

ignoring China's industrial espionage, human rights abuses, and military ambitions.

As the Washington Free Beacon reported:

“Ke Li — a Chinese national who serves as BYD's executive vice president and is reportedly married to the company's billionaire founder and CEO, Wang Chuanfu, a Chinese Communist Party member and close ally of Xi Jinping — donated \$20,000 to Newsom's 2018 gubernatorial campaign and another \$30,000 to his 2022 reelection bid.”

That's more money than Li has given to all other California candidates combined.

Newsom's cozy relationship with BYD has only deepened. He has showered the company with state contracts and, during his 2023 visit to its Shenzhen headquarters, test-drove a BYD model that floats on water. “Who needs a car when you can have a car and a boat?” Newsom quipped.

Three years later, that relationship is apparently on a crash course. This week, the Pentagon formally classified BYD as a Chinese military company, adding it to a list of entities that help Beijing fuse private industry with its military buildup.

Newsom's ties to China go back decades to his time as mayor of San Francisco. Just this week, Peter W. Wood at *American Greatness* published a powerful new piece titled “How China Captured California,” detailing exactly how deep that entanglement has become:

In 2005, the mayor of San Francisco paid a visit to Shanghai, where he worked out some agreements that furthered city-to-city cooperation. Mayor Gavin Newsom was at the beginning of a career that married environmental alarmism to close cooperation with the Chinese state. The memorandum he signed with Shanghai Mayor Han Zheng brought Chinese police officers, attorneys, and judges to the Fog City. Newsom in turn brought bottles of PlumpJack from his Napa Valley winery.

Wood, president of the National Association of Scholars, continues:

My organization, the National Association of Scholars (NAS), has spent a year attempting to trace the connections, the political favors, and the interweaving of Chinese state interests with California's political establishment. We don't have subpoena power or deep connections to the regime. We are, instead, specialists in higher education, so we naturally learned more about that side of the picture than anything else. But the political side was unavoidable.

My assessment: California's energy policy is made in China, and California is in many respects a vassal of China. Best of all, from China's perspective, few Californians realize it. They live in a dream world where high-price energy is just the cost they pay for a really clean environment. NAS's report, *Behind the Climate Curtain: China's*

Hidden Role in California's Energy Mandates and University Partnerships, presents our evidence to back these audacious claims. I can't say we have the kind of proof that will lead to future perp-walks of politicians by the FBI. But we have wind farms, solar plantations, and tankers full of the kinds of details that investigators might want to examine.

Gavin Newsom's relationship with BYD isn't a series of unfortunate coincidences. It is a damning pattern of favoritism that has funneled billions in California taxpayer dollars to a Chinese company now officially designated by the Pentagon as a military asset of the Chinese Communist Party. From no-bid mask contracts worth \$1.4 billion to campaign donations routed through a BYD executive married to the firm's CCP-connected founder, Newsom has repeatedly chosen Beijing over American interests and California taxpayers.

While he grins behind the wheel of floating BYD vehicles in Shenzhen, the Golden State grows more economically dependent and strategically compromised. As Peter W. Wood exposed this week in *American Greatness*, California hasn't merely been influenced by China, it has been captured. And no one has held the door open wider, or longer, than Gavin Newsom.

DOJ's Fraud Crackdown Hits New Milestone with Bank Fraud Arrest

U.S. Attorney Bill Essayli warns that the fraud in California could exceed billions of dollars

First Assistant United States Attorney Bill Essayli announced today the arrest of Mahender Makhijani on federal charges of defrauding a bank out of nearly \$100 million through a sophisticated scheme involving falsified title policies and forged documents. Makhijani is a 44-year-old lawful permanent resident from India living in the exclusive enclave of Spyglass Hill in Corona del Mar, owning neighboring mansions for him and his in-laws on Montecito Dr.

Makhijani, who controlled Cantor Group V LLC, a Newport Beach-based lending company, allegedly manipulated first-lien real estate loan collateral requirements between September 2024 and April 2025.

According to the criminal complaint, he and a subordinate forged title policies in Adobe, altered metadata, and submitted false records to the victim bank while providing misleading explanations during calls and in spreadsheets. If convicted, Makhijani faces up to 30 years in federal

prison. He is expected to make his initial appearance this afternoon in U.S. District Court in Santa Ana.

In a statement accompanying the announcement, Essayli emphasized the broader impact of such fraud: “Our nation's economy and welfare depend on a healthy banking system. When lenders are deceived, it has downstream effects on consumers and businesses.” All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

This latest arrest comes as part of Essayli's aggressive push against fraud in California, which has already uncovered more than \$200 million in taxpayer losses through arrests and indictments across multiple schemes since he launched targeted task forces. Key cases include:

Homelessness Fraud and Corruption Task Force (launched April 2025): Early arrests in October 2025 targeted Cody Holmes and Steven Taylor, involving tens of millions in embezzled affordable housing funds (including over \$20 million in direct damages sought in one civil suit) and bank fraud tied to properties sold to

homeless housing developers. Essayli called these cases “just the tip of the iceberg,” with ongoing probes into billions in misused homelessness spending.

Operation Never Say Die (April 2026 health care fraud takedown): Eight defendants arrested (with 11 charged total) in a \$50+ million Medicare scam involving sham hospice facilities that billed taxpayers for non-terminal patients. Essayli stated, “We are enforcing a zero-tolerance policy for criminals who defraud American taxpayers. The defendants arrested this morning who are charged with stealing millions of dollars of health care benefits got caught and now face years in federal prison.”

Identity Theft Ring (March 2026): 10 arrested for stealing approximately \$17 million from elderly California homeowners through fraudulent loans.

Additional probes into election fraud, voter rolls, and other white-collar schemes are underway, with Essayli's office coordinating with the FBI and IRS.

In a recent Fox News appearance, Essayli noted that just three

homelessness-related cases had already exceeded \$100 million in exposed fraud, warning the total could reach billions. This latest arrest marks the continuation of Essayli's zero-tolerance approach.

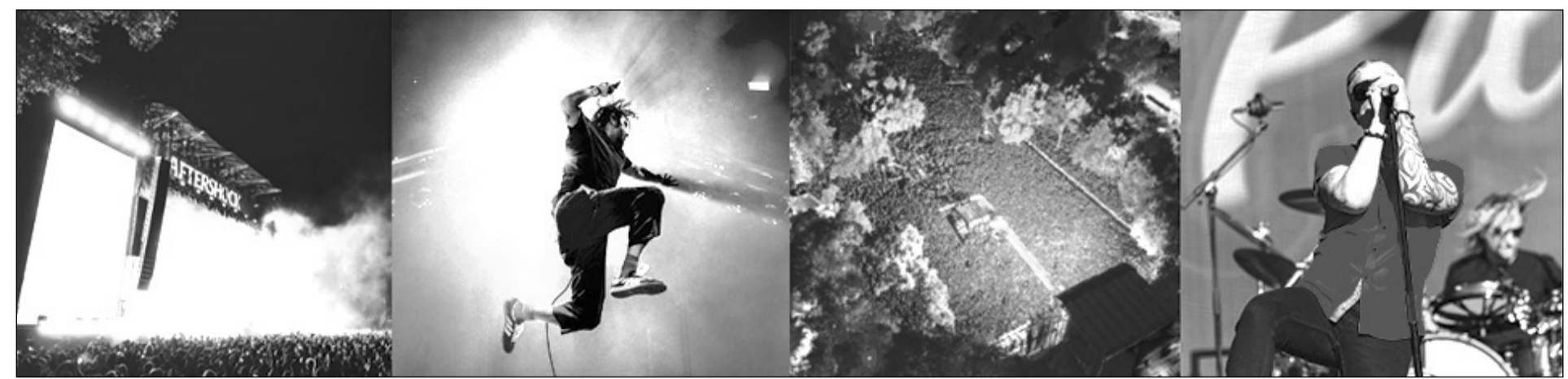
As reported previously in the *California Globe*, that initiative targeted waste, abuse, and corruption in funds meant to address California's homelessness crisis, a problem that has consumed billions in taxpayer dollars with little visible results.

Essayli, who leads the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Central District of California, has repeatedly vowed to hold fraudsters accountable regardless of status. “Fraud arrests are underway,” he has stated. “California leads the nation in fraud, and we will hold those responsible accountable.”

- On June 9, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors approved a 10-year agreement between Sacramento County and Danny Wimmer Presents (DWP), authorizing the company to host up to three multi-day festivals annually at Discovery Park through 2035. The agreement keeps long-standing beloved festivals at Discovery Park and supports continued economic growth and future park improvements.

"Discovery Park sits at the confluence of two rivers, but it's also a place where community, culture and art come together," said Sacramento County First District Supervisor Phil Serna. "These festivals showcase Sacramento County and our broader region to a global audience. They create opportunities for local businesses and workers and generate resources that can be reinvested back into one of our most cherished public spaces – the American River Parkway. It's a powerful example of how thoughtful stewardship and creative public-private partnership creates lasting benefit for both

people and place."

Founded by music industry entrepreneur Danny Wimmer, Danny Wimmer Presents produces some of the country's largest destination music festivals, attracting attendees from across the United States and around the world. The company has hosted Aftershock at Discovery Park since 2012 and launched GoldenSky at the venue in 2022.

"As Aftershock enters its 15th year, we're grateful for the continued partnership with Sacramento County, Visit Sacramento and the local community," said Danny Wimmer, founder of Danny Wimmer Presents. "This long-term commitment allows DWP to continue investing in Sacramento, strengthening its position as a premier music destination and creating experiences that draw fans from around the world to Discovery Park. We're excited to continue growing the region's music and cultural landscape through 2035 and beyond."

Aftershock and GoldenSky attract hundreds of thousands of visitors to Sacramento County each year. Aftershock generated an estimated \$35 million in local

economic impact in 2025 and drew more than 164,000 attendees from all 50 states and more than 30 countries. GoldenSky delivered an estimated \$14.1 million in economic impact and brought in roughly 75,000 attendees in 2024.

This agreement comes on the heels of the recent announcement by Danny Wimmer Presents and Visit Sacramento that GoldenSky will return to Discovery Park beginning in 2027 under a separate three-year commitment. Combined, these efforts reflect the strong collaboration between Sacramento County, Visit Sacramento, Danny Wimmer Presents and regional partners to retain and grow major destination events that generate significant economic and community benefits throughout the region.

The Sacramento County Office of Economic Development led negotiations on the agreement to maximize the economic and community benefits generated by these festivals, which range from supporting local businesses to investing in Discovery Park.

Under the agreement, Sacramento County will receive attendance-based permit revenue, reimbursement for all

event-related County costs and funding that will be reinvested into Discovery Park, the American River Parkway and community programs. The agreement includes a commitment to prioritize Sacramento County-based vendors, service providers and local food and beverage businesses.

"When thousands of people come to Sacramento County for these festivals, they stay in our hotels, eat at our restaurants, shop at local businesses and experience everything our community has to offer," said Director of the Sacramento County Office of Economic Development Crystal Bethke. "Behind every festival is a network of local vendors, food providers, service businesses and workers who help make these events possible. This agreement helps create opportunities for those businesses and residents and turns visitor spending into benefits that continue long after the stages come down."

The agreement also includes up to \$300,000 in Sacramento County Economic Development Targeted Support funding for initial site improvements, including upgrades to the parking area beneath Interstate 5 and

enhancements to park open space.

Sacramento County Regional Parks will oversee and steward projects funded through the agreement to align investments with long-term plans for Discovery Park and the American River Parkway while protecting the County's natural and recreational resources.

"Discovery Park is one of those places that people remember," said Director of Sacramento County Regional Parks Liz Bellas. "Whether you're spending the day on the river, attending a festival with friends or simply enjoying the outdoors, the park is part of what makes Sacramento County unique. This agreement helps us share that experience with visitors from around the world and it allows us to reinvesting in a park our community takes great pride in."

The festivals at Discovery Park have brought people together to experience the music, culture, natural beauty and hospitality that define Sacramento County. This agreement celebrates that success and lays the foundation to share the best of what the region has to offer for years to come. ★

As temperatures climb, here are some important ways to help keep your pets safe and comfortable all summer long.

Never Leave Pets in a Parked Vehicle

Even on a day that feels relatively mild, temperatures inside a parked car can become deadly within minutes. Cracking the windows does little to reduce the heat. If you're running errands, leave your pets safely at home where they can stay cool.

Walk Early or Walk Late

Plan walks during the early morning or

later evening hours when temperatures are cooler. Before heading out, place the back of your hand on the pavement for seven seconds. If it's too hot for your hand, it's too hot for your pet's paws.

Make Water Available at All Times

Pets need constant access to fresh, clean water, especially during hot weather. Bringing a portable water bowl on walks, hikes or outings can help prevent dehydration.

Provide Shade and Cool Places to Rest

If pets are outside, they should always have access to adequate shade and fresh water. Fans, air conditioning, cooling mats and damp towels can help pets stay comfortable.

Know the Signs of Heatstroke

Watch for excessive panting, heavy drooling, vomiting, weakness, lethargy, stumbling or collapse. Move pets to a

cool area and seek veterinary care immediately if heatstroke is suspected.

Be Careful Around Water

Always supervise pets around pools, lakes and rivers. Consider a pet life jacket and never assume your pet can safely swim without assistance.

Protect Pets from Sunburn

Pets with light-colored fur, pink noses or exposed skin can get sunburned. Ask your veterinarian about pet-safe sunscreen options.

Check on Outdoor Pets

On extreme heat days, bringing pets indoors is often the safest option.

Regional Measles Outbreak Ends Following Coordinated Public Health Response

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County and Placer County public health officials announced June 9 that the regional measles outbreak has officially ended. The determination is based on the date of the last case's symptom onset and two full incubation periods, with no new cases identified in over 42 days. All individuals who became ill during the outbreak have fully recovered.

Health officials with the two counties credited quick community response, robust immunization coverage and cooperation with isolation and quarantine guidance as key factors in ending the outbreak.

"This outbreak may be over, but the conditions that allowed it to occur have

not disappeared," said Sacramento County Public Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu. "Containing the spread required extensive coordination among public health agencies, healthcare providers, schools, community partners and affected families. The lesson from this outbreak is not that measles is harmless. The lesson is that vaccines work, community immunity works and maintaining high vaccination coverage remains essential to protecting those at risk."

"Community members really stepped up," said Placer County Health Officer and Director of Health and Human Services Dr. Rob Oldham. "The organizations associated with exposures worked with

us to help educate people in their networks, and thankfully we were able to break the chain of transmission to bring this outbreak to a close."

The outbreak started with an unvaccinated traveler returning to the area from South Carolina, where a much larger outbreak was underway. South Carolina's outbreak ended in late April, yet measles outbreaks are ongoing in other states. Residents are encouraged to confirm their vaccination status, particularly before traveling to other states or countries, or before visiting crowded destinations such as airports, large events or theme parks.

The measles-mumps-rubella (MMR)

vaccine offers the best protection against measles. It is 93% effective with a single dose and 97% effective with two doses.

Public health officials encourage residents to verify they and their family members are protected against measles by reviewing their vaccination records and speaking with a healthcare provider. Residents who are uninsured or on Medicaid and need assistance with checking their status or accessing vaccinations can refer to the Sacramento County Immunization Assistance Program for resources.

Sacramento and Placer Counties will stop posting weekly measles case count updates to their respective Public Health websites at this time. ★

California Has a Top-Ranked Economy. It's Also One of the Nation's Most Unequal

California's next governor — most likely former Attorney General Xavier Becerra — will inherit a raft of knotty, unresolved issues.

Some, such as the high rate of homelessness and very high cost of living, predate current Gov. Gavin Newsom. Others, such as the chronic multibillion-dollar budget deficit and stubbornly high unemployment rate, arose more recently.

A perennial question about such issues is whether they are unique to or more pronounced in California than other states. Comparisons are difficult because definitions vary and comparable data are difficult to track down.

By coincidence, however, two recent academic studies shed light on how California stands vis-a-vis the nation's 49 other states.

One is called "State of the States," an offshoot of a "State of the Nation" research project sponsored by Tulane University's Murphy Institute that aims to cut through partisan chatter and define the nation's most cogent issues.

The study found "California ranks higher, on average, on the topics of Economy (1), Trust (3), Mental Health (3), and Children and Families (3), but lower on Work and Labor Force (48), Inequality

(49), and Environment (50). California also outperforms its West neighbors in 3 of the 14 topics and is improving over time on 9 of the 31 measures."

Although California's political figures, most notably Newsom, like to depict the state as a leader on socioeconomic equity and environmental protection, it's at or near the bottom on both issues. It's also close to the bottom on educational achievement, volunteerism and freedom of the press.

Texas, one of the states often compared to California, generally does better on the issues where California has fallen behind, such as freedom of the press. However, it too, has some glaring deficiencies, such as environment and voter participation.

The second study comes from the Berkeley Economy & Society Initiative, a project at UC Berkeley backed by the Hewlett Foundation. It issued two in a series of reports on California's high cost of living.

The first report declares "California is less affordable and poorer than it should be given the strength of our economy," and "is systematically more expensive" than other places with similar median incomes.

"Unaffordability doesn't just create and worsen poverty," it noted. "People are voting against California's high costs with their feet. Throughout its history, California has been a magnet for migrants from other states chasing opportunity. Not any longer.

"Since the 2008 recession, California has experienced sustained domestic out-migration. The trend has accelerated in more recent

years. Between 2020 and 2024, California had the second-lowest net migration to/from other states, as a percentage of the population, following only New York. We present evidence indicating that unaffordability is a primary cause of California's migration inversion."

The project's second report delves into the causes of unaffordability, declaring, "In our analysis, the foremost driver of high costs in California is a policy regime that makes it difficult to build the physical infrastructure we need to deliver housing, energy, water, and other essentials.

"Growth restrictions drive unaffordability primarily by reducing housing supply and increasing housing costs. They also contribute to high energy and transportation costs by increasing the price tag on critical public infrastructure — creating downstream costs for consumers."

The report also lists a series of steps California could take to attack unaffordability, including embracing factory-built housing and innovative financing models to spur affordable housing the state needs.

This is just a brief overview of what the two research projects have to say about California's issues compared to other states. If the next governor and legislators are serious about improving the state's standing, they should dive into the details.

Social Security Matters

Why Don't We Have a Minimum Social Security Benefit?

Dear Rusty: I think we should have a Social Security baseline of \$2,500 for each person. When I retire, my Social Security benefit will not be enough to survive. There are many of us who worked low paying jobs all our lives because we raised families and only started saving later in life. Considering all the money our government wastes on other countries and welfare programs for people who have not worked, it seems unfair that they will not reward those of us who contributed to society all our lives. **Signed: Needs More Social Security.**

Dear Needs More: For information, the concept of a "minimum" Social Security benefit is not new and, indeed, already exists - but it is one which few beneficiaries qualify for. The so-called "special minimum benefit" was meant to lift low-earning workers above the poverty line, but less than 32,000 SS beneficiaries (out of about 59 million retirees) currently qualify. That's because Social Security's benefit formula turns out to be more generous because it is based on lifetime earnings (wages), while the "special

minimum benefit" program is based on consumer prices. That causes the SS benefit formula to provide a higher SS benefit than is provided by the "special minimum benefit" option. In other words, people get a higher benefit because their SS benefit is based upon their actual lifetime earnings vs. an artificially created special minimum benefit. In short, the existing SS benefit formula usually provides more than the established "special minimum benefit."

The SS benefit program is based on each person's average monthly income over their lifetime. However, it is very important to understand that the program is also designed to provide a higher monthly benefit to those with a lower lifetime income. Thus, the percentage of "replacement income" for those with lower lifetime earnings is more than it is for those with higher lifetime earnings. Typically, a lower-lifetime income person will get about 40% of their average pre-retirement monthly income as their Social Security benefit, whereas a higher-income person will get about 20% or less of their pre-retirement monthly average income. In this way, Social Security is already a "progressive" program. But it's important to understand also that Social Security, from its beginning, was never meant to provide 100% of a person's income needs in retirement. Thus, each beneficiary should plan to supplement their retirement income in other ways (such as retirement savings,

investment income, working longer, working part-time, etc.).

Having said that, it is also important to know that Social Security is a completely self-sustaining program and not dependent on general public funding, which would make it more susceptible to political shenanigans (imagine giving re-election seeking politicians easy access to Social Security's separately held resources). While it is certainly true that the government spends freely on "welfare programs" for those who have not worked, Social Security is not a program which is dependent on government largesse. Rather, it is a benefit which is earned by working and contributing to the program, which provides retirement benefits based upon each person's average lifetime work income.

In 2016, the conservative writer Mike Anton made a galvanizing case for Donald Trump in his famous "Flight 93" essay, arguing that the stakes in the contest between Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton were existential.

Endorsing some version of court-packing, or "court reform," as Democrats insist on calling it, is becoming orthodoxy among mainstream Democrats.

Several weeks ago, James Carville said that Democrats should pack the Court and add the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico as states in 2028 if they get unified control of Washington.

The immediate past Democratic presidential nominee, who has some chance of winning the 2028 Democratic nomination, Kamala Harris, associated herself with the same ideas. She added abolishing the Electoral College to the list.

House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries, who eas-

ily could be the Speaker of the House next year, has said: "In the new Congress, we're going to have to do something about this Supreme Court, and let me be very clear: Everything is on the table."

The top Democrat on the House Judiciary Committee, Jamie Raskin, has fashioned a reason why the Supreme Court needs to be expanded by four justices (supposedly, the number of justices should match the number of federal circuits at 13).

If all these ideas were to become consensus Democratic agenda items in 2028, they would constitute one of the most radical political platforms of a major political party in American history.

Court-packing alone would be a seismic, system-changing event, as would abolishing the Electoral College, which has been foundational to our presidential elections from the beginning.

The common theme of all of this would be guaranteeing outcomes -- four new progressive justices, four new Democratic senators -- in blatant power grabs undermining the legitimacy of the institutions in question.

What would a world look like where a substantial portion of the country thinks the Supreme Court is a sham, and not because the court is issuing unwelcome opinions, but because the court has been arbitrarily changed to produce a predetermined ideological result through a grotesque end-run around the rules?

Democrats will say Republicans have already done this, even though the GOP operated within standard procedures to forge the cur-

rent conservative majority. Did Republicans play hardball? Sure. But their influence on the composition of the court depended on winning presidential and senate elections, and taking advantage of fortuitous timing to confirm justices the way they've always been confirmed.

Manufacturing new seats out of nothing, or forcing the retirements of conservative justices by fiat, would be a blatant rigging of the court. If a portion of the country thinks that it no longer needs to abide by the Court's decisions, that obviously creates the predicate for serious civil strife. The same is true if Congress is no longer seen as legitimate after it is packed with newly minted Democratic senators.

Democrats feel justified in embracing any means to match and exceed Trump's comprehensive aggressiveness. Trump's provocations -- the lawfare, the executive overreach, the wars without congressional authorization, the gerrymandering -- all have ample precedent among prior Democratic presidents. Democrats, of course, don't see it that way, and they fear and loathe Donald Trump more than they have any other Republican president.

In reaction, should they sweep in 2028, they may try to push the American constitutional order past an event horizon from which it will never return. In other words, 12 years after the GOP was told to charge the cockpit or die, the stakes for our system really could be existential.

Rancho Cordova Arts, A Giant Community

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The 8th annual Members Show of the Rancho Cordova Arts Organization opened on June 11 at the Mills Station Arts and Culture Center (MACC). Artist Leslie McCarron was the juror for this show, which included many different subjects and mediums. There were 109 artworks in the show contributed by 108 artists.

Cheryl Gleason, Art Director and Curator of the MACC, and President of RC Arts, aided by Gallery Assistant Leon Phillips, announced the award-winning artists at the reception on June 12. Best of Show was earned by Jennifer Coulter, first place went to Polly LaPorte, second place to Carolyn Markis, third place to Cheryl Gleason (who tried unsuccessfully to decline the prize) and three Honorable Mentions: Dave Monousos, Lucille van Ommering and Nick Buchberger.

Coulter described her artwork as, "Toy animals arranged upon a mirrored surface create a reflection on collective behavior and perception. The piece recalls the innocence of childhood play while inviting viewers to consider how instinct, identity, and social patterns continue into adulthood and society as a whole."

LaPorte said that her winning oil painting is part of a series she is working on.

"I call it the dream series, and it's basically figurative young women in a resting pose . . . nonactive, sort of like caught in between, sitting there thinking, or imagining," said LaPorte.



Polly LaPorte won first place for her oil painting titled, "Blue Jumper." "I really, really like to work with color combinations," LaPorte said.



Jennifer Coulter received Best of Show for her artwork titled "Herd Mentality," which features toy plastic animals. "I was very excited when it all came together, and sometimes you just wonder – how do you know when it's done?" Coulter said.

Carolyn Markis won second place with "Gains, Losses, and Hindsight." "Find a community if you can," Markis advised starting artists. "Find a community that will help you and be generous with their information."



Juror Leslie McCarron said about Cheryl Gleason's third place winner, "After the Division," "This is a painting that I just kept coming back to over and over, seeing something new each time."

She said that she pictures the viewer figuring out on their own what (the woman is) thinking or experiencing at the time.

Markis's clay sculpture is of a pig standing, looking forward with a calm expression: "Engraved into one side of the pig is a traditional butcher's cut map, with carefully incised lines dividing the body into sections such as the shoulder, loin, belly, ham and jowl. Perched at the base of the pig's back is a small mouse . . . The two animals face in opposite directions . . . The pig gazes forward with its snout slightly raised, while the mouse looks behind the pig, as though watching the path they have traveled."

McCarron's description of Gleason's work said, "The serene matte blue and green colors create a peaceful and soothing feel to the piece, while the organic curves and mark-making add dimension and intrigue carrying the viewer's eyes from one end of the painting to the other. Bits of stationary hints of landscape and swirling circles create movement

and excitement in the piece."

Gleason gave special thanks to her helpers: Leon, Anu and Yannah.

"One thing that Rancho is about, is about pulling together," Gleason said. "When the chips are down or somebody needs help, we're a giant community who loves to help one another."

The whole show can be seen at the MACC, 10191 Mills Station Road, Rancho Cordova, through June 27. Open hours are Thursdays and Fridays from 2 to 7 p.m., and Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. ★

Soroptimists Help Move Domestic Violence Survivors Forward

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The vision of the Soroptimist organization is to help provide women and girls with the resources and opportunities they need to reach their full potential and live their dreams. One way the Soroptimist International of Rancho Cordova & Gold River club achieves this is by offering domestic violence survivors receiving assistance from the Sacramento Regional Family Justice Center (SFJC), goal setting and career planning workshops.

The first workshop, held in April, focused on identifying long-term goals by creating a Dream Collage. Participants were asked to write positive affirmations and words of encouragement on the border of each Dream Collage, so each participant could look at their Collage daily and know that there are people who love and support them.

The next workshop, held in May, focused on identifying short-term goals. Participants were first introduced to Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs and asked to identify their own unique needs within the framework. Soroptimist workshop leaders then explained the SMARTER goal-setting method (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, Time-Bound, Evaluate, and Revise). Participants selected one of their identified needs and transformed it into a SMARTER goal. To make these goals feel more manageable, workshop leaders helped participants break them down into smaller, achievable "Action" goals.

The final workshop, held in June, was led by Marie Denis of MCDE Elite Services, a career development/advancement expert and valued member of the Rancho Cordova/Gold River Soroptimist club. The June workshop was about growing confidence and defining next steps to obtaining a job or a better job through

understanding one's strengths and interests and identifying life skills that can be translated into skills employers need (e.g. a single mom knows how to multi-task, coordinate, schedule, maintain quality control, manage and be an educator/trainer).

Although there were benefits to attending the previous

workshops, as one topic was built on the previous topic, the curriculum was still easy to follow and valuable, even if someone could only attend one or two workshops.

We asked participants to complete a pre- and post-workshop survey so we could quantify the impact our workshops had on them. Across the three workshops, the score totals indicate that the women who attended were 23% more confident that they would achieve their goals. Nearly every participant scored our workshop quality as "Exceeding Expectations" stating that our worksheets and interactive group discussions really helped their thought processes.

Rancho Cordova/Gold River Soroptimists also recently stuffed 500 Comfort Kits during the May 16 City of Rancho Cordova Spring Service Day for domestic violence and trafficking survivors helped by SFJC, where these workshops were taught and SFJC clients benefited.

Rancho Cordova/Gold River Soroptimists intend to start up new workshops in August or September at SFJC. Now that our club members have completed these three workshops and identified areas of improvement, we hope to begin working with the newly opened Cordova Community Food Hub in the fall to offer these workshops to their clients to help empower them to a self-reliant life.

Soroptimist is an international 501(c)3 non-profit organization who seeks to improve the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment. May New Home Sales Remain Steady

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - New home sales in the greater Sacramento region remained steady during May despite continued affordability challenges and slightly higher mortgage rates, as members of the North State Building Industry Association reported 474 sales during the month.

Sales were down 14% from April and up 4% from May 2025, though both comparisons were affected by differing reporting calendars. On a weekly basis, builders averaged 119 sales per week in May, compared with 111 in April and 91 in May 2025. During an average May in the region, builders have reported 466 sales during the month since records began in 1997.

BIA President and CEO Tim Murphy said despite economic uncertainties and slightly higher mortgage interest rates, 2026 is shaping up to be a fairly normal year for the region's homebuilders.

"Despite affordability challenges and economic uncertainty, the Sacramento region's new home market continues to show steady underlying demand," Murphy said. "Builders are adjusting to a market where mortgage rates in the 6% range may be the new normal, and incentives continue to help many buyers move forward. Builders also continue to benefit from limited existing-home inventory in many parts of the region."

He added that affordability remains the biggest challenge, which is why reducing government fees and speeding up approvals remain critical priorities.

In May, Rancho Cordova regained the top spot with 77 sales, with Roseville edging down to second place with 71 sales. Sacramento remained in third place with 55 sales, followed by Elk Grove with 53 and Natomas rounding out the top five at 41.

Sales were reported for 203 communities in Amador, El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties. ★

The Last Safe Field

With the World Cup being played across North America, including matches in American cities, an old question has resurfaced.

Should Iranian players be welcomed into the United States to compete? Reports indicate that Iranian players were cleared to participate, while some team officials and support personnel faced visa denials amid allegations of political or security concerns. The arguments came quickly — national security, diplomacy, protest, propaganda, and fairness.

Those are real conversations. But sports have always carried another conversation beneath the noise. A more human one.

History reminds us that competition has sometimes done what politics could not.

Consider South Africa. In 1995, after decades of apartheid, Nelson Mandela walked onto the Rugby World Cup stage wearing the Springbok jersey — a symbol many Black South Africans had once viewed with pain and suspicion. For one brief, unforgettable moment, the jersey became bigger than the past. A divided nation glimpsed itself as one people.

Consider the Miracle on Ice. In 1980, at the height of the Cold War, a group of young American hockey players defeated the Soviet Union. It did not end the Cold War. It did not change nuclear policy. But for one night, the battlefield was ice, the weapons were skates, and the final score spoke louder than fear.

Consider Escape to Victory. Yes, it was Hollywood. Allied prisoners facing their Nazi captors in a soccer match. But the movie worked because the idea was true, even if the story was polished for the screen: there is some-

thing deeply human about refusing to let hatred have the final word.

And then history gives us the exclamation point. The Christmas Truce of 1914.

British and German soldiers climbed out of the trenches, exchanged greetings, sang songs, buried their dead, and, according to many accounts, kicked soccer balls across No Man's Land.

Imagine that. Frozen mud. Smoke in the air. Young men ordered to kill each other suddenly remembered how to play. For one impossible moment, humanity interrupted war. That is the part of sports worth protecting. Not because sports are pure. They are not. Not because politics never enter the stadium. They do. But because athletics may be one of the last remaining places where enemies can meet without becoming less human. America should understand that.

We have had nearly 250 years to practice the idea that people do not have to agree to share a country.

In Rancho Cordova, one of the most diverse communities in the nation, that idea is not a theory. It shows up at parks, schools, gyms, and fields. *A Russian soccer player can pass the ball to a Ukrainian teammate.*

A Pakistani setter can loft a perfect assist to an Indian hitter.

A Muslim coach can high-five a Christian kid.

An immigrant family can cheer beside a military veteran.

And, like a New York subway car after a Knicks playoff win, strangers who disagree on everything can still find one chant, one rhythm, one shared burst of joy before the doors open and everyone disappears back into the city.

That is not naive. That is civilization. So, what if Americans decided to be truly American?

What if we allowed differing ideologies to breathe without demanding that every field become another front line?

What if, while some groups planned their taunts, their turned backs, and their cruel signs, a section of good old boys from middle Missouri stood up and cheered for Iranian players — not because they support Iran's regime, but because they recognize human beings trapped beneath it?

What would that say to the Iranian teenager watching from Tehran? What would it say to the mother who has been told America is the boogeyman? Would it change geopolitics overnight? No.

But it might plant a seed. And history suggests seeds matter.

A handshake matters. A cheer matters. A jersey matters.

A ball rolling across No Man's Land matters.

Sports will not save the world.

But sometimes, for one match, one whistle, one impossible moment, sports can remind the world what peace is supposed to look like. ★

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Carter to Receive Hall of Fame Recognition

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - This September, the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame will be hosting its 11th annual induction ceremony where it will recognize a select few whose athletic excellence has earned them a spot in the history books.

While every selected candidate is deserving of entry, there is one whose impact athletically and locally has earned this year's Community Award, reserved for the person or group that has made their mark in the world of sports and within in the area. Enter Elmer Carter, who is being posthumously recognized after passing away at the age of 100 in 2011.

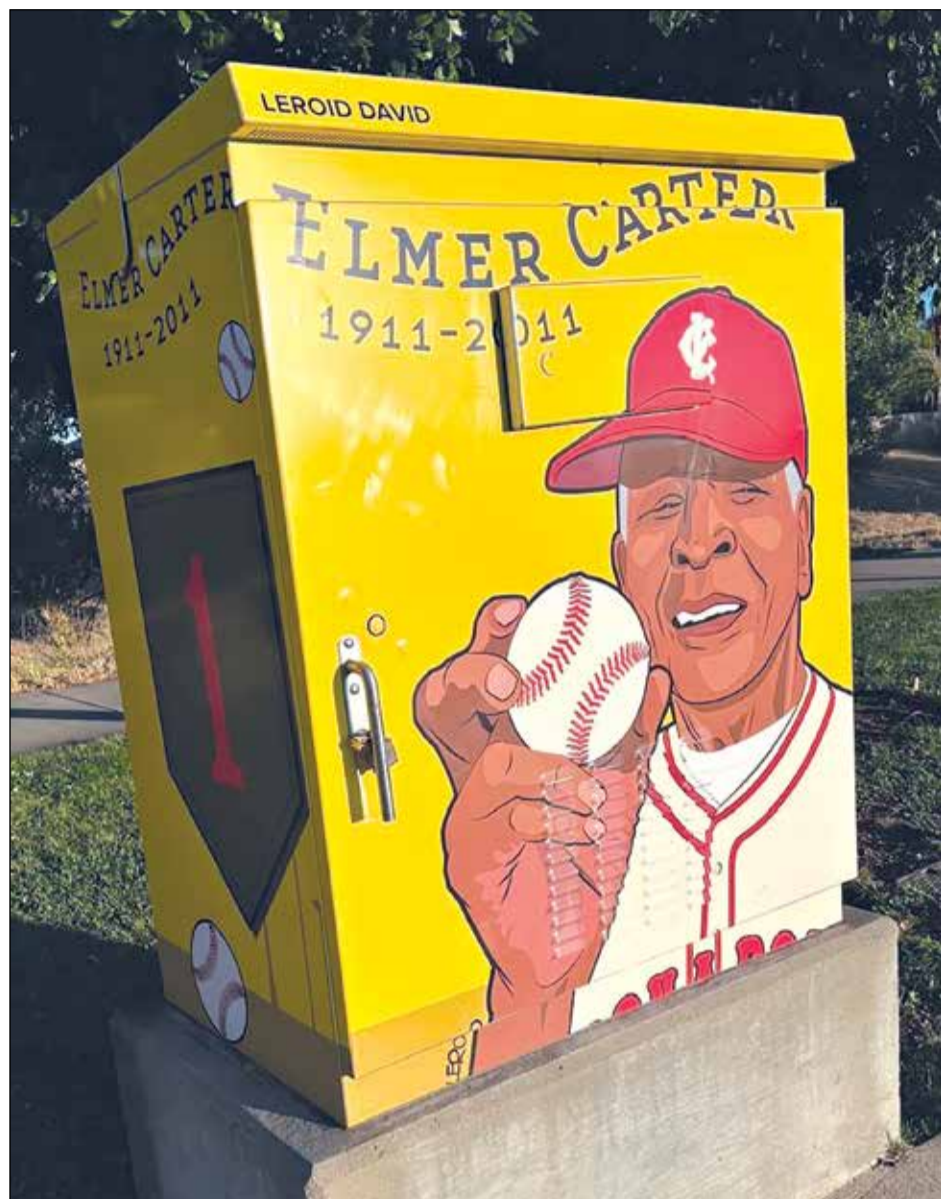
Carter, who was born in Dalton, MO on April 12, 1911, was a standout in the Negro League for eight seasons in the 1930s while playing for the Kansas City Monarchs, Birmingham Black Barons and St. Louis Stars. In 1937 while splitting time between the Black Barons and Stars, Carter led the league with a .390 batting average. Perhaps his top accolade came during one individual game in 1932, when he had the honor of playing catcher for legendary pitcher Satchel Paige, who is regarded as arguably the greatest pitcher of all time.

In addition to his baseball career, Carter would go on to enlist in the U.S.

Army's 1st Infantry Division during World War II. He would then move into the Greater Sacramento area, where he encountered a situation that would eventually change the region altogether. While trying to buy a house, Carter had trouble obtaining a loan to purchase a home despite being financially capable. That would lead Carter to eventually open the first Black-owned bank in Oak Park, where he would go on to give loans to Black families facing a similar struggle. He lived in Rancho Cordova for several years prior to his passing.

In 2024, the City of Rancho Cordova honored Carter with a tribute as part of its Utility Box Art Wrap program. Renowned local artist Leroid David was selected to paint a utility box at the corner of Zinfandel Drive and Spoto Drive in Rancho Cordova, illustrating both Carter and the legacy of Negro League baseball.

The 11th annual Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame induction ceremony takes place at 6 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 12 at Rancho Cordova City Hall. Muldrow Continues to Make His Mark

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Former Cordova Lancers' running back and Cordova High School Class of 2007 graduate Lamond Muldrow is no stranger to making a difference.

On the football field, Muldrow is remembered as a tough-running, physical player who is regarded as one of the most accomplished running backs in school history. He rushed for 2,303 yards and 30 touchdowns during his senior season in the fall of 2006 and went on to be named as the Sacramento Bee's 2006 Offensive Player of the Year.

He followed in the footsteps of his former teammate and Lancers legend James Montgomery, who graduated the year prior. Muldrow would continue his success at Sierra College where he led all California junior colleges in rushing with 1,963 yards in 2007, including a single-game performance where he recorded 253 yards and six touchdowns.

He went on to finish his college career at San Jose State. Now 15 years later, Muldrow finds himself joining a new team as he was selected for induction into the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame Class of 2006.

"It means a lot to me," Muldrow said when asked about what it means to be recognized as one of the greats to come from Rancho Cordova. "There's been a lot of guys before me that put up good numbers. For me to make it, it's a hell of a feeling."

Muldrow dreamed of playing in the NFL after college, but those dreams effectively ended in the fall of 2010 when he tore the ACL in his right knee during his senior

year at San Jose State. Due to his injury and the ensuing NFL lockout in 2011, Muldrow was unable to display his talent to NFL scouts until 2012 when he took part in San Jose State's Pro Day, where he showed well in front of NFL scouts. He would then attempt to attend the local Pro Days of both the San Francisco 49ers and then-Oakland Raiders where area athletes showcase their talent to NFL scouts but was told he was too old to participate. He later earned a tryout with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League, but that is where his football journey ended.

Off the football field, Muldrow has gone on to accomplish great things. From being a personal trainer who helps individuals reach their weight loss goals, to working with disadvantaged youth within group homes in San Jose, Muldrow has made an impact in the lives of others. This year he began two mentorship programs within his community of San Jose, the first being called Iron Path, which is a life and fitness program for children residing in group homes. He also started up 1 Special Fit Nation, which helps those with special needs achieve their fitness goals.

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Alumni from Cordova High School will participate in the city's annual Fourth of July parade with a dedicated float celebrating the school's history and community impact.

The float is the brainchild of Dennis Trainor, a 1965 graduate, who organized the effort to honor 62 graduating classes since the school first opened in the fall of 1963. Trainor said the idea is to highlight both the legacy of Cordova high School and its connection to the city's continued growth.

The parade will begin at 10 a.m. on July 4 along Coloma Road and is scheduled to conclude at Cordova High School around 11:30 a.m.
