## Beating the Heat with Local Music

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - The streets were alive with the sound of music Saturday, June 13, as three major local events in Marysville and Yuba City brought performers, families and music fans outdoors despite high temperatures.

The day began in downtown Marysville with the first Rock the Block event, hosted by the Institute of Rock. While owner and founder Stevie Bogan has organized similar downtown music events in the past, this was the first held under the Rock the Block name and the first fundraiser for NOTES, the music school's new nonprofit arm.

The event also marked one of the Institute of Rock's largest undertakings to date, featuring nearly a full block closure, live music, family activities, water slides and a planned water fight aimed at giving families

a free, music-centered way to spend the day.

"We had a few snags with the

generators and getting the water pumped in for the water fight," said Stevie Bogan, owner and founder of the Institute of Rock. "But things like that happen and we're making the best of it."

Crowds were slightly lower than expected because of the heat, but families still gathered in the shade at Plaza Park to watch local music acts and enjoy the afternoon. A fan favorite was Jordan Reading, the Science Wizard, who performed two free shows during the event.

"I wanted to do this for free because I think music is important, and it's just a great thing they're trying to do for the community," said Reading.

As of press time, organizers were still finalizing proceeds from the event and were unsure whether Rock the Block had broken even. Organizers noted that the event was

## Sutter County Facing Budget Pressures

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - Sutter County officials presented a balanced \$551.6 million recommended budget for the 2026-27 fiscal year on June 9, warning that rising personnel costs, staffing shortages and uncertainty in state funding continue placing pressure on county operations.

Assistant County Administrator Laura Granados told the Board of Supervisors the county began the budget process with a \$5.3 million gap between departmental requests and projected revenues. County administrators closed the gap through vacancy savings, deferred capital projects, reduced discretionary spending and updated revenue projections.

"The budget is balanced," Granados said during the presentation, while noting significant adjustments were required across multiple departments to achieve that result.

The recommended budget totals \$551.6 million in appropriations, an increase of \$16.3 million from the current fiscal year adopted budget, according to county budget documents. However, county officials noted the figure includes interfund transfers and internal service fund charges totaling approximately \$193.1 million that do not represent additional operating costs. When those amounts are removed, net appropriations total \$358.5 million, an increase of \$48.1 million, or 15.5 percent, over the prior year budget.

Granados said part of the increase reflects accounting changes tied to implementation of the Behavioral Health Funding Act, which replaced the Mental Health Services Act, rather than major new spending increases.

Personnel costs remain the county's largest expense category at just under 50 percent of the total budget. Granados said the county employs approximately 1,000 workers and continues facing rising compensation costs driven by inflation and labor market pressures.

To help balance the budget, the county included approximately \$15 million in vacancy savings across departments. Granados said the savings are based on anticipated turnover, recruitment timelines and staffing adjustments.

"This approach allows the county to maintain a balanced budget while aligning staffing expenditures with available resources," Granados said.

## Sutter FBLA Project Heads to Nationals

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - What started as a student effort to preserve overlooked pieces of Sutter County history has grown into an award-winning project that will represent California on the national stage later this month.

Garrett Fremd, Scarlett Ocheltree and Dominique Madrigal, officers of the Sutter Union High School Future Business Leaders of America chapter, presented their first-place state-winning community service project, "Landmarks of Legacy," during the June 10 Yuba City Rotary Club luncheon. The presentation served as a dress rehearsal before the team heads to the National FBLA Leadership Conference in San Antonio, Texas, June 29 through July 2.

The historic undertaking earned first place among California FBLA chapters after judges selected it as the state's top community service project. The top four finishers advanced to national competition.

The project began during

the chapter's first officer meeting of the school year, when students discussed how much local history often goes unnoticed even

by those who live in Sutter County.

"Our team realized we knew very little of Sutter County history and agreed

that it's overlooked," Fremd said.

The chapter responded by creating seven

 an expensive undertaking but said the first-year effort offered lessons for future events. "These things are always a learning curve, and I'm excited for the next one," said Delores Lucich, Bogan's wife and event volunteer. "With each street shut-down, we're learning more about how to improve things for the next one."

Mikey Pennington was among the early volunteers at Rock the Block, taking a turn in the dunk tank before heading to nearby Stassi's Fourth Ward Tavern to host his own event, Emo Nite 530. That event appeared to draw a strong crowd, with photos and video clips shared from the night showing the backyard area filled close to capacity. Many attendees called it the "best event yet" in Pennington's "Next Up" series.

Across the bridge in Yuba City, Skip's Open Mic Music

Cafe hosted the finale of its Battle of the Bands competition, the Aftermath Showdown. The finale featured five local bands described by organizers as among the most talented in the area, each competing for a \$1,000 cash prize. The lineup included Encore, Tin Man, Not the Same, Trading Firs and Gas Station Chicken.

Gas Station Chicken, a Marysville student band that recently won a similar competition in Sonoma County, saw its winning streak come to an end with a third-place finish. However, the band still took home the Audience Choice Award. First place went to Trading Firs, while Not the Same finished second.

Together, the three events highlighted the steady momentum of Yuba-Sutter's local music scene, from student bands and young performers to established community musicians. ★

# County Honors Yuba River Endowment

**YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The Yuba County Board of Supervisors has adopted a resolution recognizing the Yuba River Endowment for its contributions to agriculture, education and community programs throughout Yuba County.

The board honored the nonprofit organization for its philanthropic efforts since its founding in 2019 by local farmers who hold water rights to the Yuba River.

The Yuba River Endowment was created to direct a portion of proceeds from water transfers back into the local community. During years when

environmental conditions permit, participating farmers transfer a portion of their water resources to drought-affected areas of County Honors Yuba River Endowment California. A percentage of the revenue generated from those transfers funds the Endowment's charitable programs.

According to the organization, the Endowment has invested more than \$1.5 million in Yuba County since its formation.

Programs highlighted in the county's resolution include annual educational scholarships, support for food security efforts and funding for community-focused initiatives.

The Endowment allocates up

to \$100,000 each year in scholarships for Yuba County students pursuing higher education. It also provides funding and agricultural resource donations to the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank and supports programs benefiting veterans, youth agriculture organizations and community safety efforts.

In a statement included with the resolution, the Yuba County

Board of Supervisors praised the organization's approach to community investment.

"This resolution reflects our deep appreciation for the farmers who make up the Yuba River Endowment," the board stated. "Their ability to turn a vital natural resource into a sustainable engine for local charity is a model of community stewardship."

The Yuba River Endowment said it plans to continue its grant and scholarship programs to support future generations in Yuba County.

The nonprofit operates as a 501(c)(3) organization and describes its mission as using proceeds from water transfers to fund projects that protect, preserve and enhance quality of life in Yuba County. ★

## Sutter-Yuba Mosquito & Vector Control District



### MOSQUITOES ACCUMULATING IN TOWN AREAS

#### TOWN SPRAYING SET TO BEGIN

When mosquitoes move into town areas, it is important to reduce their numbers and lower the risk of mosquito-borne disease. For the 2026 season, the District will be using a permethrin product aerosolized and applied at a rate of 0.29 ounces per acre to control mosquito abundance. Public health insecticides formulated for application in urban and residential environments undergo rigorous safety testing before they are approved for use. All applications are predicated on mosquito abundance, disease activity and favorable weather conditions. These materials pose a low risk to human health. People can minimize exposure by staying indoors and keeping windows closed. Residents may also choose to turn off window-mounted air conditioners, evaporative coolers and whole-house fans when spraying is taking place in the immediate area. You can obtain additional information about spray operations by calling the District office at (530) 674-5456, from 7 AM to 3:30 PM Monday through Friday, or by visiting [www.sutter-yubamvcd.org](http://www.sutter-yubamvcd.org).

#### SCHEDULE

On Tuesday morning, June 30, 2026, weekly fogging routes will begin in Live Oak, Tierra Buena, Yuba City, and Sutter. On Thursday morning, July 2, 2026, weekly fogging routes will take place in Olivehurst, Linda, Plumas Lake, Wheatland, and Marysville. Routes begin as early as 3:30 am and continue until 6:30 am. On Thursday evenings Meridian and Robbins will be included in agricultural routes. The program will continue weekly, and additional town areas and mornings may be added if mosquito-borne disease activity becomes elevated. The program ends in mid-September when mosquito abundance declines.

# Sutter County Museum Wins National Award

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The Sutter County Museum has received a national Award of Excellence from the American Association for State and Local History for its permanent exhibit, "From Barbers' Row to Beale Air Force Base: Black History in Yuba-Sutter."

The award recognizes outstanding achievement in preserving and interpreting state and local history. The museum's exhibit highlights the history and contributions of Black residents throughout the Yuba-Sutter region.

Museum Director Molly Bloom said the recognition reflects a community effort.

"We were thrilled to learn that AASLH is recognizing the Black History in Yuba-Sutter exhibit with a 2026 Award of Excellence, highlighting the Sutter County Museum's work to share local history on a national scale," Bloom said. "The exhibit was truly a community effort, and we are very grateful and honored that so many individuals were willing to share their memories, stories, photographs, and objects to create an engaging and educational display."

The exhibit opened in

November 2024 and explores the history of Black pioneers in the region, the Gold Rush era, Black churches and businesses, the legacy of Black-owned barbershops, and military service connected to Beale Air Force Base and the Tuskegee Airmen.

According to the museum, the project required approximately two years of work and about 2,000 hours of research. Bloom worked alongside project advisor Gwen Ford, museum staff, volunteers, researchers and community members to develop the exhibit. What began with only 10 identified photographs and no known artifacts eventually grew into a collection featuring more than 125 photographs and objects.

Ford said the exhibit has helped expand community understanding of local history.

"Adding another piece of the Sutter/Yuba County community puzzle has helped our community to grow by gaining knowledge about a portion of our community history that was relatively unknown," Ford said.

The project received grant funding from California Humanities, a nonprofit partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Local artist Louie Lethridge also contributed original artwork featured in the exhibit.

The award carries special significance for the museum. Since the opening of its Multi-Cultural

Gallery in 2005, the museum had reserved space for a permanent exhibit dedicated to local Black history. Museum officials said the completion of the exhibit fulfilled that vision and created a resource for future generations.

The American Association for State and Local History will present the Leadership in History Awards during its annual conference in September.

To celebrate the award, the Sutter County Museum will host

a free wine and cheese reception from 5 to 7 p.m. July 10 at the museum, 1333 Butte House Road, Yuba City. Community members are invited to learn more about the exhibit and its stories.

The exhibit remains on permanent display in the museum's Multi-Cultural Gallery. The museum offers free admission and is open Wednesday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday from noon to 4 p.m. ★

**WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG)** - Congressman James Gallagher was sworn in today as the representative for California's 1st Congressional District following his victory in last week's special election.

Gallagher, a lifelong North State resident, farmer, attorney and former Assembly Republican leader, took the oath of office in Washington, D.C., officially succeeding the late Congressman Doug LaMalfa.

"I'm honored to step into the role of my friend and mentor, the late Congressman Doug LaMalfa, and excited to get to work for the North State in Congress," Gallagher said. "My pledge to the people of the First District is that I will work

tirelessly to represent them, always willing to listen, putting the people first, being a strong voice for our rural communities, and standing tall for the values we hold dear: faith, family, and freedom."

Gallagher has represented portions of the North State in the California Legislature for more than a decade. He said his priorities in Congress will include lowering taxes, reducing regulations, expanding energy production and supporting agriculture and small businesses.

He also pledged to focus on public safety, border security and protecting individual liberties.

Gallagher was joined by members of his family, Jill LaMalfa and supporters during the swearing-in ceremony. Organizers plan a district celebration next week. ★

## Freebirds Late Rally Tops Mobiles

**MARYSVILLE, CA (YSBC)** - The Yuba-Sutter Freebirds rallied late on Saturday, June 13 when they defeated the RedPocket Mobiles 12-11.

This was the fourth one-run game of the week that Yuba-Sutter and RedPocket have played in a close series.

Freebirds starting pitcher Riley Egloff was unsuccessful to make it through the first inning on the rubber as he displayed illness and was removed with one out.

Egloff surrendered four runs off two hits in the six batters he faced.

The Mobiles had scored at least four runs in three of the first five games of the series against Yuba-Sutter.

Egloff was relieved by Dylan McCall. This was the second time that McCall has been called on for an early relief appearance in the series.

McCall tossed 4 2/3 innings where he allowed four runs off four hits and three strikeouts.

YS closed the gap in the fourth as they hit three run-batted-in singles.

In the fifth, Mobiles outfielder Hector Nieves hit a two-run home run and extended the RedPocket lead 6-3.

Nieves hit for the cycle in the loss on Saturday as he had four

hits and five RBIs.

The Mobiles expanded their lead by a few more runs in the sixth for a 10-4 lead.

The Freebirds scored a couple runs in the bottom half of the inning as outfielder Andrew Bergeron jolted the YS dugout with a solo shot.

Bergeron got on base during all five of his plate appearances in the win that included three total hits and two RBIs.

Freebirds outfielder Cam Yuran cashed in on his only hit of the game with an RBI single and cut the RedPocket deficit 10-6.

After the mobiles added a run in the seventh, it was all YS at the plate for the rest of the game as outfielder Kendall Foster walked in a run with the bases loaded.

The Freebirds scored five runs in the eighth and took a one-run lead when Bergeron hit an RBI single to right for the 12-11 lead.

YS reliever Tristan Wolf came in and secured his second save of the series against RedPocket.

The game ended on a steal attempt by Mobiles outfielder Ravaughn Morgan as he was thrown out by a perfect throw from Freebirds catcher Diego Aragon.

On top of the stellar defensive play by Aragon, he also went 3-for-4 from the plate, including the game tying two-RBI double in the eighth.

YS finished off the series with a 7-1 defeat against the Mobiles and will play a three-game set at Modesto on Tuesday night with first pitch at 6:35 p.m. ★

# Sutter Library HVAC Theft Causes \$100,000 in Damages

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - A series of thefts and vandalism incidents at the Sutter County Library has caused extensive damage to the facility's HVAC system, disrupted library programming and may cost more than \$100,000 to repair, according to the Yuba City Police Department.

The Yuba City Police Department announced June 11 that it is seeking the public's help in identifying the individual or individuals responsible for damaging exterior air-conditioning units at the library, 750 Forbes Ave. in Yuba City.

According to police, officers first responded to the library May 19 after staff discovered someone had cut through a secured perimeter fence and damaged an exterior air-conditioning unit. Initial damage estimates were approximately \$8,000. Two days later, on May 21, library staff discovered significantly more damage to the facility's HVAC system. Further inspection revealed multiple air-conditioning units had been dismantled and numerous components were missing.

According to library officials, five HVAC units sustained catastrophic damage, with as much as 90% of some units reportedly removed. Police said the combined cost of theft, damage and repairs may exceed \$100,000, though the total loss remains under evaluation.

The damage has also affected library operations. The library previously advised patrons to call ahead before visiting, noting the facility anticipated operational impacts following the incident. As of June 11, at least three scheduled library programs had been canceled and one relocated because of the ongoing HVAC issues.

Canceled programs include the June 10 LEGO Club meeting, the June 11 story time and the Master Gardener Succulent Program scheduled for June 13. The Wild Things Animal Show scheduled for June 11 was relocated.

Police said investigators recovered several items near the damaged equipment believed to have been used during the crime, including cutting tools and other property. Those items were collected as evidence and are being examined as part of the ongoing investigation.

Based on evidence collected so far, investigators believe the suspect or suspects gained access to the secured HVAC enclosure by cutting through a fence on the property. Police said components from the HVAC units were removed, though the full circumstances surrounding the incidents remain under investigation.

The HVAC theft appears to be part of a broader concern over copper-related thefts in the area, with thieves targeting copper wiring and other valuable components inside air-conditioning units. Police said the crimes have significantly affected critical infrastructure serving the Sutter County Library and resulted in substantial costs associated with repairing or replacing the damaged equipment.

County officials have also indicated that security upgrades, including improved fencing and a monitored security system, are expected to be part of the larger repair and replacement plan to help prevent similar incidents in the future.

Granados warned the staffing reductions could affect county services, including longer wait times and reduced availability in some programs. Deferred maintenance and delayed capital projects could also increase future costs, she said.

Several projects were removed or delayed from the budget to help close the gap, including renovations for the clerk-recorder's office, continued work at 463 Second St. and renovations at 190 Garden Highway. Vehicle replacements funded through one-time sources remain included in the spending plan.

The budget documents also state the county is maintaining reserve levels near the Government Finance Officers Association recommendation of 16.67 percent, equal to roughly two months of general fund appropriations. The recommended budget includes a \$1.1 million contribution to the county's Internal Revenue Code Section 115 prefunding trusts, including \$1 million for pension obligations and \$100,000 for other post-employment benefits.

Granados also outlined concerns over continued uncertainty in state funding and increasing county responsibilities tied to public safety, behavioral health and homelessness programs.

She said Proposition 172 revenues are declining and state realignment growth

payments remain behind schedule, creating additional challenges for counties statewide. Granados also said trailer bills affecting county funding could continue through October, requiring departments to closely monitor budgets throughout the year.

Despite the concerns, Granados highlighted several positive developments, including a \$400,000 award for a Waterworks emergency backup generator and \$1.5 million for public safety radios. She also noted progress on the Center Point development project, where homes are expected to begin construction in spring 2027.

Supervisor Flores praised county staff for balancing the budget despite increasing financial pressures.

"When you look at it at first and see a \$5.6 million budget gap, it freaks everybody out," Supervisor Flores said. "But somehow you're able to pull it together."

Board Chairman Ziegenmeyer said counties continue facing increasing costs while the state shifts additional responsibilities to local governments.

"What you don't see is the escalator of insurance that goes up a lot more than 3 percent," Board Ziegenmeyer said.

Public budget hearings are scheduled for 10 a.m. June 16 in the board chambers. Final budget adoption is expected June 23. ★

## Marysville Advances Greening Projects, Reviews Noise Rules

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - At its June 2 meeting, the Marysville City Council considered a \$3.18 million contract with Lamson Construction Co. Inc. for pavement rehabilitation on streets north of Highway 20 and west of D Street.

The project is funded through the city's federal Community Development Block Grant award, which supports local infrastructure improvements benefiting low-income neighborhoods.

Based on current estimates, the total project cost is \$3.67 million, exceeding the available grant funding of \$3.3 million. However, estimates were conservative, and the projected \$500,929 funding gap may be reduced once work begins. Staff proposed covering any remaining shortfall with available SB 1 Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account funds.

The council approved the contract.

Council members also considered submitting concept proposals for the Urban Greening Grant Program through the California Natural Resources Agency. The statewide program supports projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions, mitigate urban heat islands, expand urban tree canopies and improve climate resilience.

The city identified two potential projects. The Downtown Urban Canopy and Climate Resilient Streetscape Initiative would replace or install trees along downtown streets, improve irrigation systems and repair sidewalk damage caused by tree roots. The Ellis Lake Greenway, Urban Canopy and Climate Resilience Project would enhance pathways and open spaces around Ellis Lake while increasing accessibility and shade coverage.

The first phase of the grant process requires submission of project concepts to determine eligibility and competitiveness. The city has a professional services agreement with Roach & Campbell Landscape Architects to prepare two concept proposals at a cost not to exceed \$5,900 from existing budget appropriations.

If selected for the next phase, the city would submit full grant applications. Potential awards range from \$3 million to \$5 million.

The council approved both concept proposals for submission.

The council also considered a Planning Commission recommendation to amend the Municipal Code and Downtown Specific Plan to allow conditional use permits for automobile-related uses in the mixed-use corridor and indoor commercial recreation facilities in mixed-use neighborhood zoning districts.

City staff said the amendments were recommended in response to business requests that do not fit current zoning allowances. Any proposed use would still require a conditional use permit and be reviewed on a case-by-case basis to ensure compatibility with surrounding areas.

The council approved the amendments.

Council members also discussed the possible creation of a noise ordinance. Staff suggested quiet hours beginning at 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Some council members expressed concern that a noise ordinance could negatively affect dining and entertainment venues, particularly downtown.

Mayor Chris Branscum said the city must consider all potential consequences, including "the impact it might have on businesses that sustain our city and sustain the character of our city. Marysville's always been a party town ... and I'd hate to create an ordinance that would dampen the spirit of the city."

Councilmember Stuart Gilchrist said, "It's a family town, and do we really want to encourage late-night parties?" He added that an ordinance could provide a tool for enforcement when needed.

Councilmember Marjory Rollins said the discussion originated from resident complaints.

"These are your constituents. They're not happy," Rollins said. She added that police currently have limited enforcement options when responding to excessive noise complaints.

City Manager Jim Schaad said similar issues exist in many communities and expressed confidence that staff could develop a balanced approach. A future report and recommendation will return to the council for consideration. ★

permanent historical markers and a self-guided tour highlighting locations that helped shape Sutter County's history. Each sign includes historical information, photographs provided through the Sutter County Museum and a QR code linking visitors to additional resources. The students also developed and distributed travel guide brochures to local businesses, libraries and the museum, creating a permanent historical tour for residents and visitors.

The tour features the Sutter Buttes at Larry Munger Vista Point, the Sutter Train Depot, Butte House Road, Sutter Cemetery, Butte Slough School in Meridian, Long Bridge in Meridian and Sunsweet Growers Inc. in Yuba City, recognizing both the area's historical landmarks and agricultural heritage.

Research conducted by the students found that fewer than 1.5 percent of county residents actively visited the Sutter County Museum, Fremd said. The

museum's outreach efforts reached only a fraction of the county's approximately 99,000 residents, convincing students there was a need to make local history more visible and accessible. Working with museum staff, local organizations and landowners, students gathered photographs, historical records and background information used throughout the project.

Landmarks of Legacy became a chapter-wide undertaking involving students from multiple programs and classes. Working with advisor Katie Zwissig, parent volunteer Laurie Gidel and Sutter County Museum Director Molly Bloom, members researched sites, designed signs, secured approvals, coordinated fabrication and installation, and conducted educational presentations. Students enrolled in metal shop classes built the sign frames while digital marketing students designed the travel guide brochures.

"We knew we wanted to leave an impact on our

chapter, school and entire community," Ocheltree said.

The effort drew participation from 287 of the chapter's 368 members, who contributed a combined 394 service hours. Students also shared local history through presentations at area K-8 schools.

According to data presented at Rotary, student confidence in their knowledge of local history increased by more than 75 percent following the presentations.

Madrigal said the project was designed to remain a lasting community resource. The signs are weather-resistant and require little maintenance, while future FBLA community service committees will continue cleaning the markers and restocking brochures.

"We didn't just open up a time capsule from 100 years ago," Madrigal said. "We brought it back to life. And now these stories aren't just remembered, they're seen, visited and experienced for decades to come." ★

### Growers use Pressure Bombs to Fine-Tune Irrigation

Using pressure chambers, commonly called pressure bombs, has been compared to taking the “blood pressure” of a plant to tell how stressed for water it is. The technique has been around since the 1970s, but it’s been slow to catch on. A survey by the California Department of Food and Agriculture in the early 2020s found pressure bombs were used on only about 16% of perennial crops. Now, as farmers face more pressure from electrical rates, the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act and overall water availability, growers said pressure bombs can help farms better steward their water. San Joaquin County walnut farmer Richard Thompson has been a longtime fan of using pressure bombs to schedule irrigations. “I won’t do too much irrigation until I know I can get a good reading with the pressure bomb,” Thompson said. Not only does the device help him avoid under- or overwatering his trees, but it also helps to time irrigations to Pacific Gas & Electric Co.’s cheaper off-peak weekend periods.

### Moth Damage Rises

#### as Growers Await New Insecticide

Broccoli and other brassica growers along California’s Central Coast are bracing for another devastating season of infestations of the diamondback moth, but state regulators appear in no hurry to approve a new federally registered insecticide that could alleviate the damage. Escalating pressure from the insect has led to rising production expenses that

can cost growers up to tens of thousands of dollars per acre, according to a recent industry report. The pest has developed increased resistance to the suite of chemical treatments available to growers. Help could be on the way in the form of isocycloseram, a novel, broad-spectrum insecticide. The product was registered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency last fall and can be used in most states. But the treatment remains under review by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation, whose spokesman, Juvenio Guerra, offered no specific timeline as to when the review will be complete.

### USDA Confirms New World Screwworm Cases in Texas

The U.S. Department of Agriculture confirmed multiple cases of New World screwworm cases in Texas this month. The flesh-eating pest was eradicated from North America decades ago but made a resurgence in Mexico beginning in November 2024. It poses a significant threat to cattle and can also affect other livestock, wildlife, pets and in rare cases people. “The re-emergence of New World screwworm in the United States after 60 years will have an immediate impact on farmers and ranchers in the affected areas,” American Farm Bureau President Zippy Duvall said in a statement. “We are confident that the longstanding coordination between the states and USDA will enable a quick response and hopefully limit the negative impacts and resulting market volatility.” ★

# Female-Led Improv Troupes Join Forces for Ménage à Prov

**GRASS VALLEY, CA (MPG)** - What happens when three women from three different improv troupes decide to bring their teams together? Ménage à Prov, of course.

hosted by Windhaus, helping spark the idea for a larger collaboration between the groups.

“Jessilee and Shamaya were so welcoming and fun while exploring NorCal improv, it felt totally natural to come together and make a show,” said Ewing.

Ewing’s Laughter Shock is the youngest of the three troupes and is celebrating its first year as a performance team. Ewing said the group was created with the goal of bringing people together across age groups and building community through comedy.

Windhaus, who recently established a home base at the historic Eagle Theatre in Old Sacramento, echoed

those sentiments, stressing the importance of keeping lines of communication and collaboration open across the art form throughout the greater Sacramento region.

“I think that women have historically been underrepresented in our art form as well, so I’m really looking forward to collaborating with two incredible local female leaders in improv,” added Windhaus.

For the June 20 show, Sutton, Ewing and Windhaus will each bring six members of their teams, including themselves, to the Un-Church for a unique three-way comedy competition featuring a variety of short-form improv games.

Laughter Shock members John Paul and Brian Coe have taken on producing duties for the event, allowing the three troupe leaders to focus on the performance and enjoy the collaboration they helped inspire.

“I can’t wait to see what sort of magic happens when three improv troupes come together on one stage for the first time,” said Coe. “Improv is always full of surprises, but this show will be especially unpredictable. In a time when we could all use a bit more laughter in our lives, I’m honored to be part of an event that can provide some levity to both the audience and everyone on stage.”

Paul said Laughter Shock has built a strong following in the Nevada City and Grass Valley area and anticipates a strong turnout for this performance.

“We are thrilled to share that joy and laughter with the Yuba-Sutter Improv and Sharks Barksley troupes,” said Paul. “We invite everyone to come on up and join us in Grass Valley for a fun evening of improv competition.”

Ménage à Prov will be performed one night only at 7 p.m. Saturday, June 20, at the Un-Church, 220 Bresee Place in Grass Valley. # Healthcare Access in Rural Counties Is Already at Risk — H.R. 1 Makes It Worse

In Colusa County, where healthcare access is already limited and we rely on a single hospital to serve an entire region, H.R. 1 (also known as One Big Beautiful Bill) will directly determine whether families can continue to get care close to home unless the state takes action.

As a Colusa County Supervisor, I see firsthand how fragile that access already is. Almost 80% of Colusa County residents rely on some form of subsidized healthcare coverage. With H.R. 1, we estimate 30% of our Medi-Cal enrollees will lose their health care coverage.

Many of those individuals would not lose coverage because they are ineligible or unwilling to work. They would lose it because of new administrative hurdles and reporting requirements embedded in the legislation. In practice, these changes risk pushing eligible people out of the healthcare system simply because navigating the bureaucracy becomes too difficult.

The impacts would be devastating. Our county’s only hospital, Colusa Medical Center, is already operating in a system where Medi-Cal reimbursements are essential to keeping its doors open. Like many rural hospitals across California, it depends heavily on that funding to sustain services and staffing. When thousands of residents lose coverage, the hospital loses critical revenue.

This is not just a Medi-Cal issue. Every resident in Colusa County could feel the consequences through longer wait times, reduced services, workforce shortages, and diminished access to care.

Left unchecked, these financial pressures threaten the long-term viability of the hospital itself, putting the community’s access to local healthcare at risk.

If our hospital were to close, residents would face a drive of up to 45 minutes to reach the nearest hospital in Marysville. For a routine appointment, that may be inconvenient. For a heart attack, stroke, or serious accident, it could be life-threatening.

This challenge extends far beyond Colusa County. Across rural California, healthcare deserts are expanding. Twelve California counties, including Colusa, no longer have labor and delivery services. Expectant mothers in some parts of the state must travel up to four hours to give birth safely. No family should have to worry about a multi-hour drive to reach maternity care while in labor.

Yet healthcare is only part of the story. When residents lose access to healthcare coverage, counties inevitably become the safety net. Under California law, counties are required to provide indigent care — the care of last resort — to residents who have no other source of coverage. This is not optional; it is a state-mandated obligation that counties must fulfill.

Counties are already grappling with significant fiscal pressures as we work to deliver a wide range of critical services on behalf of the state. When healthcare costs rise and local resources are stretched thinner, the ability to maintain all core responsibilities becomes more difficult,

and difficult choices follow. Without state action, counties may be forced to divert funding away from core priorities such as fewer deputies on the street, reduced transportation maintenance and improvements, and strained election administration in order to meet legally required indigent care obligations. That is not a sustainable path forward.

This is not a partisan issue. It is a community issue. Rural and urban counties alike will feel the effects. The question before us is whether California will continue investing in the systems that keep residents healthy, safe, and connected to care.

Counties stand ready to work with Governor Newsom and the Legislature to protect California’s healthcare safety net. Our residents depend on it, and the future of many communities may depend on it as well.

# Sutter County Streamlines Records Requests

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The Sutter County Clerk-Recorder’s Office has launched a new online identity verification system designed to make obtaining certified copies of birth, marriage and death certificates faster and less expensive for residents.

The new service uses ID.me, a digital identity verification platform that allows customers to verify their identity online when requesting vital records through the Clerk-Recorder’s website. Previously, applicants seeking certified copies were required to have their applications notarized

before certificates could be issued.

County officials said the change eliminates the need for most customers to locate and pay for a notary public. Notary services typically cost \$15 per signature, while the new online verification process carries a \$5 fee.

“This enhancement

reflects our commitment to improving customer service and making government services more accessible,” said Sutter County Clerk-Recorder Donna Johnston. “Citizens can now complete the identity verification process from the comfort of their home, making it easier than ever to obtain vital records.”

The system also supports electronic delivery of certified records. Customers who choose an electronic certified copy may receive their document within minutes after completing the verification process, according to the Clerk-Recorder’s Office. Electronic records can also be securely

stored and reused when needed.

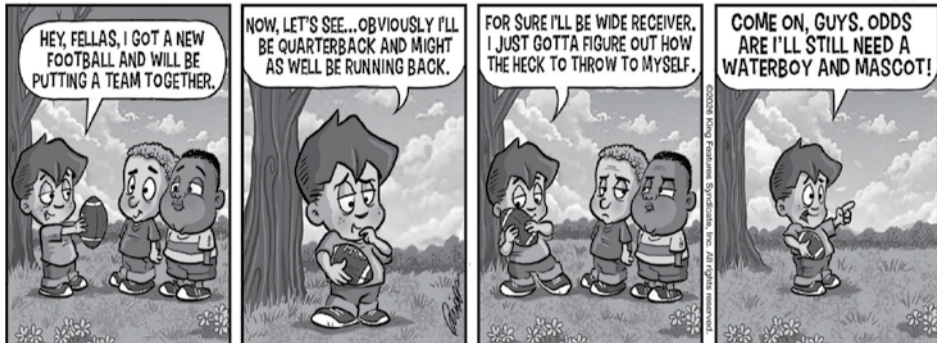

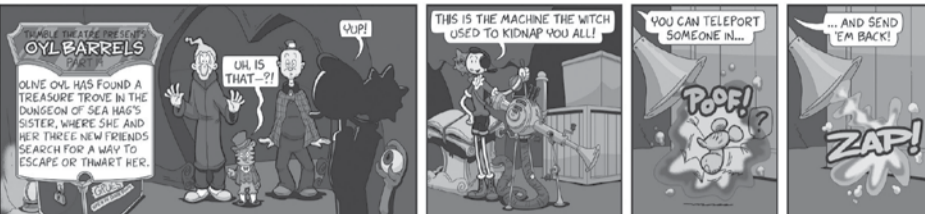

# Marysville Juneteenth Celebration Returns to Yuba Park

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - The 2026 Juneteenth Celebration in Marysville will return to Yuba Park on Saturday, June 20, bringing a full day of remembrance, unity and family-friendly activities to the community.

The event, organized by Megan Anderson and Marysville Juneteenth 530, is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. at Yuba Park. This year's celebration is centered on the message of "information, inspiration and fun," with

organizers inviting the public to enjoy a day of education, cultural celebration, entertainment and community connection.

Juneteenth marks June 19, 1865, when enslaved people in Galveston, Texas, learned they were free, more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation. Today, the holiday is recognized as a time to honor Black history, reflect on the long road toward freedom and celebrate culture, resilience and progress.

In Marysville, the celebration

also carries local significance. In previous Territorial Dispatch coverage, Anderson described Yuba Park as a historically significant gathering place connected to emancipation and Black history in Marysville. The park continues to serve as the home of the local Juneteenth celebration, where residents are invited to learn more about that history while celebrating together as a community.

This year's event will include educational opportunities focused on the history and meaning of Juneteenth, along with speakers

sharing messages of hope and unity. Cultural performances are also expected to highlight the diversity and vibrancy of the community.

Throughout the day, attendees can enjoy music from a DJ, local vendors, games and activities for all ages. Organizers describe the event as an opportunity for families, friends and neighbors to gather in a spirit of learning, laughter and love.

The celebration is intended to be more than a one-day event. Organizers say it is part of a

broader effort to honor the past while looking toward the future and creating space for Black history and culture to be recognized as part of Marysville's larger story.

Community members are encouraged to bring their families and spend the day at the park, whether they come for the history, entertainment, vendors or simply to connect with others.

# Yuba-Sutter Fair Returns June 25

*Bull Riding, Local Music and Scholarships Highlight the Fair*

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - A \$35,000 Hispanic bull riding tournament, a hometown headline performance from ONOFF and the annual Yuba-Sutter Fair Scholarship Competition are among the highlights planned for the 2026 Yuba-Sutter Fair.

The fair returns Thursday, June 25, through Sunday, June 28, at the Yuba-Sutter Fairgrounds, bringing four days of grandstand events, carnival rides, livestock attractions, live entertainment and youth competitions.

One of this year's new attractions is the Hispanic Bull Riding & Music event, scheduled for 2 p.m. Sunday, June 28. The event is included with fair admission and is promoted as a bull riding tournament featuring \$35,000 in prize money, with 15 bull ranches from across California and the western United States competing.

For fairgoers accustomed to American-style rodeo, Sunday's Hispanic Bull Riding & Music event will offer a different arena experience. Hispanic bull riding events, often connected to jaripeo-style traditions, focus primarily on bull riding paired with live music, ranch competition and a festival atmosphere. Live music from Banda Serro Mocho will also be part of the event.

The fair will close out Sunday night with two performances from local headliner ONOFF, an Irish rock band with strong ties to the Yuba-Sutter community. The trio includes drummer Stevie Bogan, who runs the Institute of Rock in Marysville; lead vocalist and guitarist Paulie Daly, who owns and operates Hooligans Bar and Bistro in Yuba City; and bassist David Hurrell. Together, the group has built a substantial local following, and the fair appearance marks one of the band's highest-profile hometown performances.

"We are working on some new songs and bringing back some golden oldies," said Bogan. "We've a new rehearsal space that we feel has given us a new, fun energy. So we are re-exploring our 20-plus-year catalogue."

According to Daly, the opportunity came after ONOFF played a large fundraiser for local fire services near the Sutter Buttes.

"The organizers for the fair were in attendance, so it was a no-brainer for them," said Daly.

The band is scheduled to perform on the main stage at 7:30 and 9:30 p.m. June 28.

Another fair tradition returning to the stage is the Yuba-Sutter Fair Scholarship Competition, which includes Miss Yuba-Sutter, Miss Teen Yuba-Sutter, Mini Miss Yuba-Sutter and Yuba-Sutter Ambassador participants.

The Miss Teen, Miss Yuba-Sutter and Ambassador competitions are scheduled for 7

p.m. Thursday, June 25. The Mini Miss Yuba-Sutter competition is scheduled for 7 p.m. Friday, June 26.

The annual scholarship competition is a two-month program focused on stage performance, community service and leadership development. While fairgoers see contestants compete on stage in areas such as communication skills, talent and impromptu questions, the program also includes off-stage judging in areas such as interviews, scholastic achievement, community service and knowledge of the fair industry.

Selected representatives serve one-year terms attending community service events and representing the Yuba-Sutter Fair and the local community. The scholarship program awards more than \$8,550 each year to local youth.

This year's talent lineup

includes dance, gymnastics and music, with jazz solos among the most popular selections. However, several contestants are stepping outside those categories. Mini Miss Yuba-Sutter contestant Preslee Teagarden Vincent, a fourth-grade student at Franklin Elementary School, will perform a comedic monologue, while Emerson Morse, a fifth-grade student at Barry Elementary School, will showcase Magna-Tiles. Miss Teen Yuba-Sutter contestant Alexzia Zamarron, a 10th-grade student at Sutter Union High School, will present a basketball routine. Miss Yuba-Sutter contestant Guadalupe Sandoval, a 12th-grade student at River Valley High School, will perform a science experiment.

The 2026 Yuba-Sutter Fair runs from 4 p.m. to midnight Thursday, June 25, and Friday, June 26; 11 a.m. to midnight Saturday, June 27; and 11 a.m.

to 11 p.m. Sunday, June 28. This year's fair theme is "Barn in the USA," with daily entertainment attractions including Smash Golf, pony rides, Clown College, bungy jumping, Zany Zoe Magic, Steve's Fun Balloons, Juggling with Jeremiah and Circus Imagination.

Live music will be featured throughout the fair, including performances by Michelle Lambert, Miss Pooja, Harlan Band, Wayside Band, The Tiki Shack, Guilty as Charged, Salsa Steel Drum, Four Barrel Band, Gotcha Covered and Nathan Owens Band.

Special admission promotions are scheduled each day. Thursday kicks off with Thrifty Thursday, offering \$5 admission for guests ages 5 and older, with children 4 and younger admitted free every day. Friday is Kids Day, with free admission for children ages 5 to 11. Saturday is Seniors Day, with free admission for seniors 65 and older. 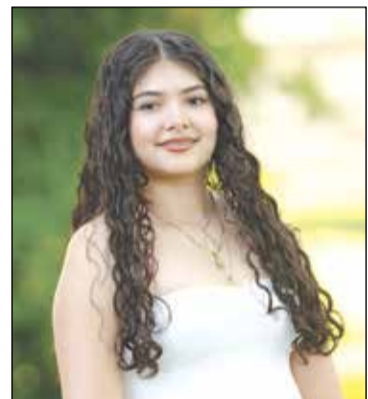

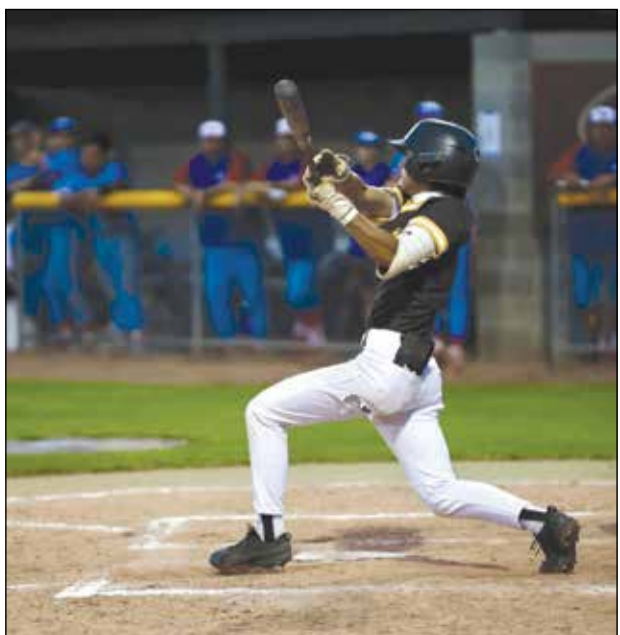

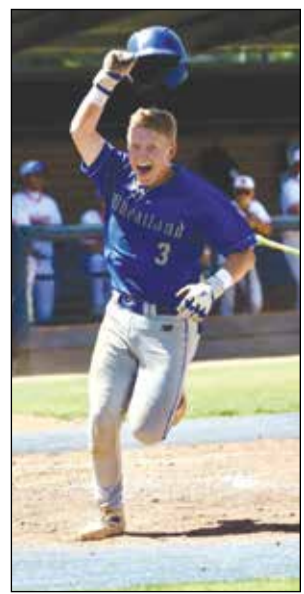

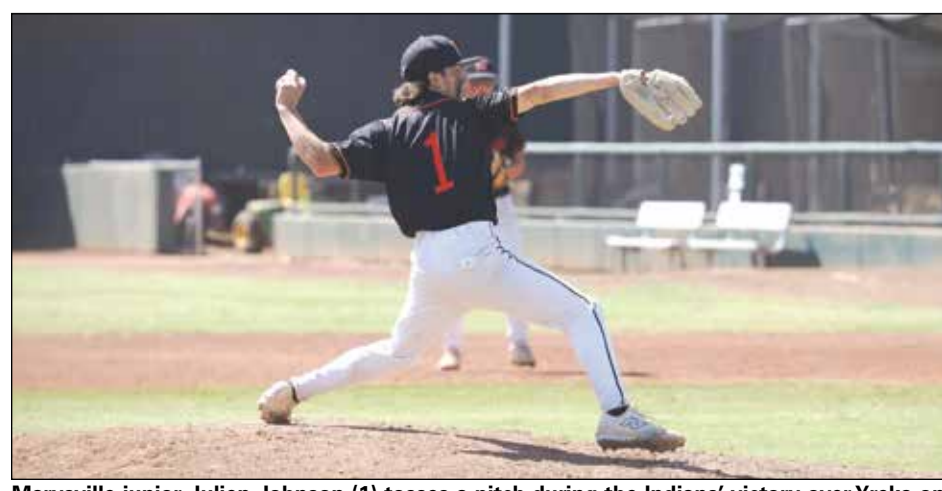
