Ready for the Fourth?

A guide to Rancho Cordova's biggest celebration

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - For two days each summer, Rancho Cordova becomes the center of one of the region's largest Independence Day celebrations, drawing thousands of residents and visitors for a packed lineup of fireworks, live music, carnival rides, family activities and the longest Fourth of July parade in Sacramento County.

The 41st Annual Rancho Cordova Fourth of July Celebration returns July 3-4, transforming Hagan Community Park and Coloma Road into the backdrop for what organizers call the

community's signature event. The all-volunteer celebration honors both the nation's independence and Rancho Cordova's community spirit with activities

Hagan Community Park on both July 3 and July 4. Park gates open at 4 p.m. each day, followed by carnival rides, midway games, food vendors and beer gardens from 4-11 p.m. Nightly entertainment includes performances by "It's Showtime Circus" at 6 and 7 p.m., followed by concerts at 8 p.m. and fireworks immediately afterward. The park closes at 11 p.m. both nights. Friday night's concert will feature "Thunder Cover," a Sacramento-based cover band performing popular rock, pop and dance hits from the past six decades. On

Sacramento County Expands Residential Fee Deferral Program to Support Housing Development

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At its June 16 meeting, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution expanding the County's Residential Development Impact Fee Deferral Program to all residential projects, including eligible mixed-use developments that incorporate housing. The change is intended to reduce upfront development costs and support the construction of new housing throughout the County.

The expansion of the fee deferral program is part of Sacramento County's broader effort to create a more predictable, efficient and competitive development environment. By shifting the timing of fee payments, developers' upfront costs are reduced and access to capital during construction is improved, which provides developers with additional tools to advance projects, attract investment, and deliver housing more quickly, while continuing to ensure that new development contributes to the infrastructure and services growing communities depend on. The action reflects Sacramento County's commitment to supporting responsible growth.

The expanded program also broadens eligibility to include certain mixed-use developments, supporting projects that combine residential housing with commercial, retail or other compatible uses that contribute to vibrant, walkable communities.

The action aligns the County's program with Senate Bill 937, a state law intended to support housing development by allowing local governments to defer certain development impact fees.

In addition to approving the resolution, the Board introduced an ordinance that would amend portions of Sacramento County Code to formally implement and support the expanded program. The ordinance would establish the necessary code changes to align County regulations with the updated fee deferral program and state law requirements.

The ordinance is

Micro Masterpieces Break Records Again

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The 2026 Micro Masterpieces auction, presented by the Rancho Cordova Arts Organization, included 640 pieces of art, over a hundred more than last year. The results of the fundraiser have increased each year since its inception in 2018. Micro Masterpieces were sold this year by silent auction from June 8 through June 13.

The proceeds from this year's 6x6 artworks came to more than \$23,500, bringing the total raised from Micro Masterpieces by RC Arts in the last five years to over \$114,000. The proceeds are used for art supplies for kids attending schools in the City of Rancho Cordova. "We know the program is working," said Art Director and Curator

of Mills Station Arts & Culture Center (The MACC), and President of RC Arts, Cheryl Gleason. "This year we had 1,005 pieces of art in the student show. Each year, we assist more teachers in bringing visual arts into the classrooms of Rancho Cordova

Schools. Most people do not know visual arts are part of the required curriculum in California public schools," said Gleason. In California's Arts Standards for Public Schools, pre-kindergarten through grade twelve require instruction in four

arts disciplines: dance, music, theatre and visual arts. Two hundred and thirty local and regional artists donated pieces. There were 2,595 bids placed and 58,828 page views on the auction site. This

Making Every Beat Count

Metro Fire strengthens the chain of survival with HeartSafe Community initiative

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - When every second counts, Sacramento Metro Fire wants more neighbors ready to answer the call.

A 19-year-old heard an alert on his phone, jumped on his e-bike and raced to a nearby park. Someone was in cardiac arrest. Before paramedics arrived, he began CPR.

For Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District officials, that response represents exactly what they hope to build across the region: a community where ordinary residents are prepared to help save a life.

Through its HeartSafe Community initiative and Citizen Responders Project, Sacramento Metro Fire is working to improve survival rates from sudden cardiac arrest by expanding access to automated external defibrillators, or AEDs, increasing CPR training and encouraging residents to use the PulsePoint AED app.

“Before any professional is actually helping, that is when the majority of people are dying,” said Capt. James Ellis, who helps lead the initiative. “The biggest bang for our buck, the thing that you can do to save most lives, is that time period from the incident until we get on scene.”

The effort officially launched in 2025, but Ellis said the idea began years earlier after his cousin survived a cardiac arrest

while working as a white-water rafting guide on the American River.

“He recognized something was wrong, grabbed an AED from his raft and collapsed moments later. Crew members performed CPR and used the device to restart his heart,” said Ellis.

The experience led Ellis to explore why AEDs were often locked inside buildings and unavailable when parks and public spaces were closed. As he researched solutions, he discovered the national HeartSafe Community model and realized Sacramento could benefit from a coordinated approach.

At the same time, Metro Fire data showed cardiac arrest survival rates in the greater Sacramento region were below the national average.

Metro Fire formed a working group that includes Ellis, Community Relations Specialist April West and Director of Government

Affairs Kyle Macdonald. The team presented the concept to the district's board last fall and received strong support.

“We really do view this as an agency priority,” Macdonald said. “This is something that we're excited to keep working on.”

One major focus is expanding public access to AEDs. In November, the Cordova Recreation & Park District and Sacramento Metro Fire celebrated the installation of the district's first publicly accessible AED cabinet at Hagan Community Park. In May, members of Leadership Citrus Heights class also unveiled an AED at Rusch Park as part of their class project. Additional devices have since been installed at parks throughout the region.

Metro Fire currently knows of nine publicly accessible AED locations, most of them in parks, and expects that number to

continue growing.

The district is also building an AED registry through the PulsePoint app. Residents can use the app to locate nearby AEDs, while trained users can receive alerts when a cardiac arrest occurs nearby.

“If we can drastically increase the number of people using the app,

we're going to increase the chance that people are going to survive,” Ellis said.

Education is another key component.

Without CPR, survival chances decrease by roughly 10% every minute after a cardiac arrest. Metro

Fire officials say bystander CPR can significantly

improve outcomes, and combining CPR with an AED can improve survival rates even more.

Since October, Metro Fire has trained nearly 1,600 people in hands-only CPR, compared with about 100 people annually in previous years.

“We can train anybody to do hands-only CPR in 10 minutes or less,” Ellis said. Fear is often the biggest barrier, officials said.

“People are not afraid to act. They've never been in that situation. They don't know how they're going to act,” Ellis said.

His message to hesitant bystanders is simple: do something.

“If somebody doesn't make that call, that person doesn't have a chance,” he said. “Think about it if it's your loved one or yourself. What would you want?”

Looking ahead, Metro Fire hopes to train more residents, expand AED access in schools and neighborhoods, and eventually help communities throughout the district earn HeartSafe Community recognition.

“We know we can't do this alone,” Macdonald said. “The more we can create awareness and demystify CPR and AEDs for folks, the better. This is really about helping create a safer community.”

is the eighth annual Micro Masterpieces auction, and the fifth year that Rancho Cordova Arts will give art supplies to teachers in Rancho Cordova for their classrooms.

The Creative Art League of Sacramento, a nonprofit arts organization which puts on the Crocker Holiday Market and much more, gave a generous \$5,000 donation to Rancho Cordova Arts to support this Arts in Schools fundraiser. Other contributors and philanthropic sponsors such as artist Marge Gorman pushed the total to the new record.

“We cannot do it without the support of the creative community in the greater Sacramento Metro area,” Gleason said. “Without the amazing artists and

their variety of art mediums, the auction wouldn't be as successful.”

Rancho Cordova Cracks Down on Illegal Fireworks

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - As Fourth of July celebrations approach, Rancho Cordova officials are sending a clear message: launching illegal fireworks could cost far more than a night of entertainment.

City leaders, law enforcement and fire officials gathered June 18 to outline an expanded enforcement plan aimed at reducing illegal fireworks activity ahead of Independence Day, including steeper fines, increased drone surveillance and a stronger focus on public reporting.

Under updated city regulations, residents caught using illegal fireworks in neighborhoods can face fines of \$1,000 per firework and/or up to six months in jail. On school property and in parks, the penalty increases to \$10,000 per firework and/or up to six months in jail.

“The main thing that we changed is instead of per incident, it’s \$1,000 per illegal firework that’s launched,” said Russell Ducharme, Rancho Cordova’s neighborhood services director. “People were treating the \$1,000 fine as a cost of doing business versus really taking it seriously.”

Ducharme said the change was made to deter repeat offenders and align Rancho Cordova’s enforcement efforts with neighboring jurisdictions.

The city issued 47 fireworks-related citations in 2025 and has expanded its public outreach campaign ahead of the holiday. Officials said informational mailers were sent to approximately 35,000 households, while safety messages have also been shared through social media and billboards along Highway 50.

RCPD Police Chief Shaun Hampton said enforcement efforts will be at their highest level from June 30 through July 4.

“We’ll be doing maximum enforcement throughout the city,” Hampton said. “We’ve doubled our drones that we have available

this year, and also the fines have increased significantly.”

Hampton said deputies, code enforcement officers and neighborhood services staff will work together to identify and address illegal fireworks activity. He encouraged residents to report violations through the Rancho Cordova Connect app, which allows complaints to be geolocated and sent directly to officers in the field.

Residents can also report illegal fireworks by calling the Rancho Cordova Police Department’s non-emergency line at 916-362-5115. Officials asked residents not to call 911 unless there is an immediate threat to life, serious injury or significant property damage.

The increased enforcement comes as public safety officials continue to respond to fireworks-related injuries and fires throughout the region each year.

“Last year, we had a young man lose part of his hand up in the North area of Sacramento and we have fires every year,” Hampton said.

Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District Deputy Fire Marshal Dana Freeman urged residents to purchase fireworks only from licensed nonprofit-operated Safe and Sane fireworks booths and to follow all safety regulations.

Safe and Sane fireworks are legal in Rancho Cordova only from June 28 through July 4 between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m. Officials stressed that using them outside those dates and times makes them subject to the same penalties as illegal fireworks.

“Please do not save your fireworks to use on New Year’s, because it becomes illegal,” Freeman said.

Freeman also said improperly disposed fireworks remain one of the leading causes of residential

fires during the holiday and warned residents to properly dispose of used fireworks by placing them in metal buckets and soaking them in water overnight before discarding them.

“Unfortunately, every year, we tragically lose at least one home to the bad disposal of Safe and Sane fireworks,” she said. “When people think they’re fireworks are cool enough they put them in their plastic garbage can, which is right next to their house. After several hours, that garbage can catches fire and spreads.”

Officials noted that evening winds common in the Sacramento region can quickly spread fires caused by fireworks into dry vegetation, rooftops and nearby structures.

In addition to enforcement, the city is encouraging residents to attend professional fireworks displays instead of using illegal fireworks.

Communications and Public Affairs Director, Maria Kniestedt suggested community members celebrate at Hagan Community Park, where public fireworks shows are scheduled for July 3 and July 4 as part of the city’s annual Independence Day festivities.

“We will have a fire inspector on site from the moment the public display fireworks arrive at Hagan Park,” Freeman said. “We’ll be inspecting the event area and perimeter to ensure spectators remain at a safe distance, and we’ll be there throughout the show and afterward to make sure everything runs safely and smoothly.”

The city said its goal is not only enforcement, but also helping residents celebrate the holiday responsibly and safely.

“We really care about our constituents within the community and want them to know that they should feel safe in their homes,” Hampton said. ★

Sacramento State Men's Soccer Announces New Schedule for New-Look 2026

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento State men's soccer program announced a 17-match regular season slate for the upcoming 2026 season, which features a unique partnership for the second half of the schedule once Big West Conference play begins.

With only three soccer playing members on the men's side in the new-look Pac-12 Conference, the league entered into a scheduling agreement designed to strengthen and sustain Division I men's soccer opportunities across the region. As part of the partnership, league newcomer California Baptist, Cal Poly, UC Riverside, and UC San Diego will compete as affiliate members of the Pac-12 alongside Oregon State, San Diego State, and Gonzaga.

The Big West will feature the Hornets, newcomer Utah Valley, Cal State Bakersfield, Cal State Fullerton, CSUN, UC Irvine, and UC Santa Barbara.

Sacramento State will face each of its Big West rivals once along with crossover games against Gonzaga (Oct. 7), UC San Diego (Oct. 14), and Oregon State (Oct. 21). The crossover games will not count toward the league standings

with four schools qualifying for the Big West Championship at the end of the year.

The Hornets tune-up for the regular season grind with three exhibitions, traveling to both Santa Clara (Aug. 8) and Stanford (Aug. 12) while hosting Menlo College (Aug. 15).

Regular season play begins in earnest with back-to-back home matches, renewing the Causeway rivalry with UC Davis at home in the season opener on Aug. 20,

before hosting Grand Canyon three days later.

The Hornets then hit the road for their next four contests, making trips to Saint Mary's (Aug. 27), Utah Tech (Aug. 31), San Jose State (Sept. 6), and San Diego State (Sept. 11).

Sacramento State closes out non-conference play with home matches against Pacific (Sept. 17) and UC Riverside (Sept. 23) before opening the Big West slate against UC Santa Barbara on the

road on Sept. 30. The Big West home opener has the Hornets hosting Cal State Bakersfield on Oct. 3, with league home matches against UC Irvine (Oct. 17) and Cal State Fullerton (Oct. 31) to follow.

On the road, Sacramento State faces Utah Valley (Oct. 10) and CSUN (Oct. 24) in league play.

This year's Big West Championship begins on Nov. 7 with the semifinal round, with the championship match to follow on

Nov. 14. NCAA Tournament play begins five days later on Nov. 19.

UC Davis Softball Head Coach Erin Thorpe Announces Retirement

DAVIS, CA (MPG) - After 12 seasons leading the UC Davis softball program and almost three decades in collegiate coaching, UC Davis Softball Head Coach Erin Thorpe has announced her retirement from coaching.

Thorpe leaves behind one of the most successful eras in program history, during which she guided the Aggies to sustained success while helping countless student-athletes grow, on and off the field.

Thorpe finishes her UC Davis tenure as the second-winningest coach in program history with 273 victories and is just the third coach in school history to surpass the 200-win mark. Across a 23-year head coaching career that included stops at UC Davis, Boise State and Whittier College, Thorpe compiled 496 career victories, including 446 at the Division I level.

"After 23 seasons in coaching, including 12 unforgettable years at UC Davis, retiring is both bittersweet and deeply meaningful," said Thorpe. "I am incredibly grateful for the opportunity to have worked with so many dedicated assistant coaches, remarkable players, and wonderful colleagues throughout my career. We experienced wins, milestones, and accomplishments that I will always be proud of, but the relationships we built, the lessons we shared, and the moments we experienced together are what will always matter to me most. Thank you to everyone who has been part of this journey. It has truly been one of the great honors of my life."

to our student-athletes and to the sport of softball," said Director of Athletics Rocko DeLuca. "She led the program with dedication and helped guide it through significant moments in its history. We appreciate all that she has contributed to UC Davis Athletics and wish Erin and her family the very best as she begins this next chapter in her journey."

Thorpe's final season at UC Davis was one of the most successful in program history as the Aggies set a new standard in the Big West Conference and positioned themselves for continued success heading into the Mountain West Conference.

The Aggies posted 17 conference victories in 2026, the program's most ever in

the Big West Conference, and earned the program's first appearance in the Big West Championship Tournament. Along the way, UC Davis recorded a signature victory over Cal State Fullerton, which was ranked No. 4 in the national mid-major poll at the time, and completed a historic road sweep of Long Beach State.

Throughout her tenure, Thorpe coached some of the most accomplished student-athletes in program history. Brooke Yanez became the program's first All-American under her leadership in 2019, while Anna Dethlefsen earned Big West Player of the Year honors in 2023. Thorpe also guided Yanez to Big West Pitcher of the Year recognition in 2019 and helped Ashley Sawai

earn Big West Freshman Pitcher of the Year honors in 2024. Since Thorpe took over the program in 2015, Aggies have earned 41 All-Big West selections and seven National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Region honors.

Several Aggies also etched their names into the record book during Thorpe's tenure. Anna Dethlefsen became the first player in program history to surpass 100 career stolen bases, finishing with 110 and ranking second in Big West Conference history.

Other Aggies established numerous UC Davis Division I-era records, including Alyse Rojas in career and single-season batting average and on-base percentage, Sarah Starks in career and single-season home runs and career RBIs, Alexa Yanez in single-season wins, ERA and strikeouts, and Kenedi Brown in career wins and strikeouts. During Thorpe's final season, the Aggies set Division I-era program records for hits, doubles and walks while posting the second-highest totals in batting average and RBIs.

The Aggies also enjoyed several landmark seasons under Thorpe's leadership, including a 39-win campaign in 2019, which marks the program's highest win total since 2003.

Prior to arriving at UC Davis, Thorpe became the winningest coach in Boise State softball history. A former All-American student-athlete herself, Thorpe coached the Broncos' Tara Glover to the program's first All-America honor, and six players earned all-region recognition and 18 received all-conference accolades during her tenure in Boise. She was the head coach at Whittier College before taking over at Boise State. ★

72.2 Million Americans Expected to Travel over July 4th Week Despite Higher Fuel Prices

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - AAA projects 72.2 million people will travel at least 50 miles from home for Independence Day between Saturday, June 27 and Sunday, July 5. Of those, more than 8.94 million are expected to travel in California, and more than 1.59 million are expected to travel in Arizona. This year's domestic travel forecast surpasses last year's record of 71.8 million travelers, but the increase is smaller than recent year-over-year gains. The vast majority of travelers (61.4 million) are expected to drive while 5.85 million are expected to fly to their destinations. While there's been little change in those numbers compared to last year, travel by other modes, including cruises, is the category seeing the biggest increase.

More than 1,600 of those fatalities were a driver, and about 38% of those drivers were under the influence.

The 21-34 age group had the highest percentage (48%) of drunk drivers.

AAA is urging drivers to commit to 100 Days of Safe Driving this summer and to plan a safe

ride home before going out. AAA also reminds drivers to Slow Down, Move Over when approaching any stopped vehicle on the side of the road. By reducing speed and changing lanes, drivers allow roadside workers to do their jobs safely and help prevent tragedies.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County Public Health (SCPH) and the Sacramento County Environmental Management Department (EMD) are urging residents to follow safe food handling practices as summer temperatures, activities and subsequent foodborne illnesses are on the rise.

Food Safety Best Practices

Thoroughly cook all meats, especially poultry. Poultry should be cooked to reach a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees. If you are served undercooked poultry in a restaurant, send it back for further cooking.

Wash hands before preparing food and immediately after handling any raw poultry or meat.

Avoid cross-contamination by carefully

cleaning all cutting boards, countertops and utensils with soap and hot water after preparing raw poultry or meat and prevent juices from raw meats from dripping on other foods.

Make sure that other foods, such as fruits or vegetables, do not come into contact with cutting boards or knives that have been used with raw poultry or meat.

Always refrigerate meat products. Never leave raw meat at room temperature.

Avoid unpasteurized milk and soft cheeses and untreated (not chlorinated or boiled) surface or stream water.

Wash hands well with soap and water after using the bathroom, changing diapers or handling pets, including animals at petting zoos. Make sure children wash their hands well after going to the bathroom or handling pets.

This reminder follows a recent increase in Campylobacter infections in Sacramento County. Campylobacter is one of the most

common bacterial causes of foodborne illness in the United States. Recent monitoring data shows Campylobacter cases were 1.3 times higher than the previous month and 1.2 times higher than the three-year average.

Campylobacter infections can result from eating undercooked poultry, consuming unpasteurized dairy products, drinking contaminated water or allowing raw meat and poultry juices to contaminate ready-to-eat foods. Symptoms often include diarrhea, stomach cramps, fever, nausea and vomiting.

"Summer is a time for gathering with family and friends, whether that's around a backyard grill, at a picnic in the park or on a camping trip," said Sacramento County Public Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu. "Recent increases in Campylobacter infections serve as a reminder that food safety matters. No one wants a celebration to end with a trip to the doctor. A few simple food

safety steps can help prevent illness and keep summer memories focused on the people and moments that matter most."

SCPH monitors disease trends, investigates outbreaks and works to prevent the spread of communicable diseases. EMD protects public health through food safety inspections, environmental health programs and education for food facilities and residents. Both departments work together to identify emerging public health concerns and provide residents with information to prevent illness before it occurs.

"Food safety starts long before the first bite," said Jennea Monasterio, director of the Sacramento County Environmental Management Department. "Keeping food at safe temperatures and preventing cross-contamination are small steps that can prevent illness and help people enjoy their summer season." ★

Local Emergency in Response to Invasive Golden Mussel Threat

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, June 16, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors proclaimed a local emergency in response to the growing threat posed by the invasive Golden Mussel. These freshwater species have rapidly spread throughout California waterways and threaten regional water infrastructure, the environment and the local economy. This proclamation allows the County to work more closely with regional, state and federal partners to address the threat posed by the Golden Mussel and help safeguard vital water resources.

The Golden Mussel (*Limnoperna fortunei*) was first

detected in North America in October 2024. Native to Asia, Golden Mussels are highly invasive and reproduce quickly, forming dense colonies on hard surfaces. They can spread through waterways, on boats and on water equipment, making containment

difficult once established. Large clusters of the mussels can clog pipes, pumps and conveyance systems. Golden Mussels can also damage infrastructure and disrupt aquatic ecosystems by competing with native species.

Sacramento County joins a

growing number of jurisdictions throughout California that have taken action to address the threat. Neighboring San Joaquin County also proclaimed an emergency this year. Kern County also recently declared an emergency due to the presence

of golden mussels.

Sacramento County relies on an extensive network of waterways and water infrastructure to support residents, businesses and agriculture. The County will continue working with water agencies, environmental partners and state officials to monitor the species and support efforts to prevent further spread.

You can help prevent the spread of invasive mussels by cleaning off tubes, kayaks, canoes and other watercraft between uses. Visit the Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers website to find out how to correctly clean your watercraft to help prevent the spread of all invasive species. If you believe you have sighted golden mussels, you can report it to Invasives@wildlife.ca.gov. ★

Minimum Wage Hikes to Offset High Living Costs. There's a Downside

There are three immutable aspects of economic life in California today.

No. 1, Californians face the nation's highest cost of living. It is 11% higher than the national average, according to the federal Bureau of Economic Analysis, including rents 53% higher than average and utilities 63% higher. It's why California also has the nation's highest poverty rate.

No. 2, the high cost of living, especially for housing, is the most important factor in the out-migration of Californians to other states. It has led to a net loss of 900,000 people since 2015, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

No. 3, California's unemployment rate, currently 5.3% of its labor force, has been among the highest of any state for the last half-decade, with more than a million jobless workers. It rises to 10.1% when it's broadened to discouraged job seekers and those who work part-time but want full employment. This alternative measure is also the nation's highest.

The response to these economic conditions from the state's mostly Democratic politicians has been an amalgam of high concept policy changes, one-time or short-term allocations of relief money and micro-managing wages.

Gov. Gavin Newsom and the Legislature, for example, have enacted dozens of laws and administrative directives aimed at making it easier to build new housing, especially for low- and moderate-income families and, in theory, tempering housing costs.

However, the actual rate of new housing construction of all kinds has been stuck at about 100,000 units a year. Newsom's latest state budget projects only fractional gains, to about 115,000 units, through 2030.

When the budget's revenues allow — or at least appear to allow — the state has appropriated funds for direct relief to Californians mired in poverty, such as an earned income tax credit or even cash distributions.

Increasingly, state and local officials also have responded to ever-increasing costs of living by increasing minimum wages.

A new report from the Virginia-based Employment Policies Institute reveals that California is the most active state in setting new and higher wages for specific economic sectors. It has 8 of the nation's 10 largest local minimum wage increases taking in effect in July.

When California, after much political angst, decreed a \$20 minimum wage for fast food workers three years ago and created an agency to oversee that industry's employment conditions, it ignited a debate over impact that's still raging.

Proponents have ginned up studies that purport to prove that the higher wages had little or no negative effects on employment and consumer prices. Critics have countered with studies saying that \$20 wages forced fast food

operators to raise prices and reduce their staffs.

Newsom and the Legislature also set higher wages for healthcare industry employees. Local city and county officials have decreed new wage levels for particular economic segments, such as the hotel industry in Los Angeles and amusement parks in San Diego.

The Los Angeles City Council set a \$30 minimum wage for hotel and airport workers on the theory that travelers from elsewhere would bear the costs, but last month postponed implementation until after the 2028 Olympics. In return, the business community canceled a ballot measure to eliminate the city's gross receipts tax, a major city revenue source.

The tactic of raising minimum wages to offset rising living costs shows no signs of abating. Currently, for example, the Service Employees International Union is sponsoring legislation, Senate Bill 1203, that would increase the training requirements for private security guards but also empower the state Industrial Welfare Commission to set new and presumably higher minimum wages for such guards.

This may be a circular economic firing squad. Higher wages can lead to higher consumer costs, which increases pressure for higher wages and pushes those caught in the middle, trying to survive, to lower-cost states.

Social Security Matters

Why Don't They Just Create Individual Social Security Accounts?

Dear Rusty: Regarding Social Security's financial issues, three people contributing to Social Security for every one beneficiary sounds to me like a surplus. If they had given workers their own accounts, similar to a 401k, where they could manage their own money, it would have worked out more favorably for retirees. President George W Bush suggested these changes, but it was shot down by Congress.

The average worker now pays a 6.2% Social Security tax. If the government had bumped it up to say 7%, I don't believe that me or anyone else would have cried too hard. There are ways of correcting this before the SS reserves are depleted, and hopefully, Congress will address Social Security's financing soon. **Signed: Skeptical Senior**

Dear Skeptical: Believe it or not, putting SS contributions (from payroll taxes) into separate

individual accounts is not really a good idea. For information, most people get back all payroll taxes they contributed to Social Security within about 5 years of receiving SS benefits. Even with decent public market returns, some individual separate accounts would eventually run out of money, causing some to lose Social Security benefits before they die, meaning they would likely live in poverty. People are now collecting benefits (on average) for decades, and the current SS format means that even those who contribute only a small amount will collect benefits no matter how long they live. Remember, the primary purpose of the SS program is to reduce poverty in America.

FYI, President Bush's plan had opposition in the 2005 Congress largely because of the cost to transition to that plan, and the fear that investments in the public markets subjected individual retirement savings to unacceptable risk. In any case, few have since advocated investing Social Security funds in the public financial markets because of the risks and the political backlash. And adding a small amount to the FICA/SECA payroll tax rate only somewhat mitigates the problem - it doesn't completely solve it. I'm afraid that

Social Security's financial issues are more complex than that and can't be fully solved by a small increase in SS payroll taxes.

You are right - Congress can (and, we are confident, will) address this, and hopefully soon. For its part, AMAC (the Association of Mature American Citizens) and the AMAC Foundation have been evaluating this issue for years and have developed a Social Security reform plan for Congress to consider (see this). And we are actively promoting our reform plan in Washington, D.C. Please know that we share your concerns about the future of Social Security and will continue to work hard to ensure the program is here for many generations.

The spirit of Buchenwald lives on, we are supposed to believe, in the Israeli military operation in Gaza. It's nearly mandatory for progressive Democrats to denounce Israel for its alleged genocide, while Tucker Carlson and Hasan Piker -- radical influencers on the right and left, respectively -- say that the moral offense is the same as the Holocaust, even if the scale is less extensive.

Israel's haters surely enjoy the perversity of accusing the Jewish state of the same enormity that contributed to its creation, of comparing the Jews to heinous murderers of Jews. The charge is a grotesque libel.

If Israel wanted to kill everyone in Gaza, it could do it easily. What we have witnessed in the Hamas-controlled territory is not a genocide -- the deliberate destruction of a people -- but an urban battle.

Warfare in urban environments is almost always highly destructive. When the Iraqi army retook Mosul from ISIS in 2016-2017 with our air support, tens of thousands of buildings were damaged or destroyed and an estimated 80% of the Old City.

Vietnam gave us the famous (perhaps apocryphal) line, "We had to destroy the city in order to save it." The city in question was Ben Tre, infiltrated by the Viet Cong during the Tet Offensive in 1968. We used airstrikes, heli-

copter gunships, artillery and ground troops to extricate the communist forces, and the Mekong Delta town suffered extensive damage, even though the fighting only lasted days.

The old imperial capital of Hue suffered the same fate, but on a larger scale. Communist forces took most of the city and dug in, requiring street-to-street combat over a period of months to take it back. About half the city was damaged or destroyed.

The lesson is that cities never fare well when they are the locus of combat, whether Seoul or Pyongyang during the Korean War, Manila or Stalingrad during World War II, Vicksburg or Charleston during the Civil War.

Civilians inevitably suffer and die. This is true of even the most honored military operations. The Allied invasion of Normandy killed 20,000 French civilians as cities such as Rouen and Le Havre were pulverized by our bombardment. Why would anyone expect Gaza, one of the most densely populated places on Earth, to be different? Hamas spent years and massive resources tunneling and fortifying, making Gaza into a bristling armed camp difficult to subdue.

Sure enough, it has taken a grinding, years-long campaign to substantially reduce Hamas. Israel's detractors profess to detect "genocidal intent" in harsh things that Israeli officials have said about Gaza, but these statements have typically been aimed at Hamas.

If Israel wanted to commit genocide against the Gazans, Prime Minister

Bibi Netanyahu wouldn't have sought to accommodate Hamas for years, in the hopes that a major war could be avoided. The Oct. 7 attack exposed this as a grievous misjudgment. It's hard to believe that any society, having experienced the unspeakable crimes visited on its people that day, would have concluded, "Well, we can't do anything in response -- even recover our hostages -- because combat in Gaza will be too destructive."

Hamas intertwined its military infrastructure with civilian facilities, and made military use of hospitals, mosques and schools. Its fighters posed as medical personnel and journalists. Everything was geared to making it as difficult as possible to target Hamas without collateral damage, creating the predicate for denouncing Israel for war crimes.

As military expert John Spencer points out, Israel takes steps to avoid civilian harm: "It warns before attacks using text messages, phone calls, leaflets and broadcasts. It opens safe corridors and pauses operations so civilians can leave combat areas. It tracks civilian presence down to the building level."

TITLE: None of this matters, though. The ultimate perversity is that Hamas has genocidal intent against the Jews. Yet, it is the war against this cruel terror group that is being used to associate the Jewish state with one of history's worst crimes.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CORDOVA RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT RESOLUTION OF THE INTENTION TO LEVY ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2026/27, PRELIMINARILY APPROVING ENGINEER'S REPORT, AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF HEARING FOR THE INDEPENDENCE AT MATHER LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Cordova Recreation and Park District (the "District"), acting as the legislative body of the Independence at Mather Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District, has previously ordered through Resolution 00-8 the formation of an assessment district pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, known as the Independence at Mather Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District, for the purpose of financing certain park and recreational improvements, and for the purpose of funding maintenance operations of the District; and

WHEREAS, *Streets and Highways Code* sections 22622, 22623 and 22661 authorize the preparation of an Engineer's Report on an annual basis which shall describe any proposed new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, set forth an estimate of the costs of any improvements and/or annual maintenance costs for the park and recreational improvements specified in the Engineer's Report, specify a diagram for the assessment district and specify the amount to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2026/27 as authorized by the Board of Directors has been presented to the Board of Directors for its consideration and approval, which Engineer's Report generally describes the general nature, location, and extent of the new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, provides an estimate of the costs of any proposed new improvements or substantial changes in existing improvements and refurbishments, specifies the costs of maintenance of park and recreational improvements within the district, and sets forth a diagram for the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has adopted a Resolution approving and filing an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2026/27 as required by *Streets and Highways Code* section 22623, which Engineer's Report sets forth plans and specifications for the improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, an estimate of the costs of these improvements, an estimate of the cost of maintenance with respect to such improvements, a diagram of the assessment district, and a description of the net amount to be assessed upon assessable lands within the assessment district which Engineer's Report is incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors hereby declares its intention to levy and collect assessments pursuant to *Streets and Highways Code* section 22624 as follows:

a. The Board of Directors of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, acting as the Board of Directors of the Independence at Mather Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District, hereby adopts the Preliminary Engineer's Report dated June 17, 2026, and files said Engineer's Report with the Clerk of this Board as approved pursuant to the requirements of *California Streets and Highways Code* section 22623.

b. Said assessments will be levied and collected within the boundaries of the Independence at Mather Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District, the boundaries of which are specifically described in the Engineer's Report. A full and detailed description of the boundaries of the Assessment

District and the parcels of land within the district is contained within the approved Engineer's Report.

c. The Board of Directors declares its intent to levy and collect assessments for the Fiscal Year 2026/27 within said district at an assessment rate of \$220.83 per year per single family residential parcel as set forth in the Engineer's Report. These assessments are based on the same formula as those levied in fiscal years 2000/01 through 2025/26. The total number of parcels projected to be assessed and an estimate of total annual assessment revenue are contained within the Engineer's Report.

d. Ongoing maintenance, improvements and/or refurbishments within said assessment district to be funded by said assessments are detailed within the Engineer's Report which is incorporated herein by this reference.

e. Reference is hereby made to the Engineer's Report which is on file with the Clerk of the Board for a complete description of the proposed improvements and maintenance to be undertaken in Fiscal Year 2026/27 and the cost thereof, and the proposed assessments upon assessable lots and parcels of land within the proposed assessment district.

f. The Board hereby declares that this Resolution of Intention constitutes a Notice of Hearing regarding its intent to levy and collect assessments within the Independence at Mather Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District for Fiscal Year 2026/27. This Public Hearing shall be held at a Regular meeting of the Board of Directors on July 15, 2026, at 6:30 p.m. at the Meeting Chambers of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, 11070 White Rock Road, Suite 130, Rancho Cordova, California 95670. The Clerk is hereby directed to publish this notice as a Notice of Hearing in a newspaper of general circulation pursuant to the requirements of *Government Code* section 6061.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that prior to the conclusion of the Public Hearing, any interested person may file a written protest with the Clerk of the Board, or, having previously filed a protest, may file a written withdrawal of that protest. A written protest shall state all grounds of objection. A protest by a property owner shall contain a description sufficient to identify the property owned by such owner. Such protest or withdrawal of protest should be mailed to the attention of the Clerk of the Board of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, 11070 White Rock Road, Suite 130, Rancho Cordova, California 95670 or may be hand delivered to the Clerk prior to the conclusion of the public hearing.

RESOLUTION OF THE INTENTION TO LEVY ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2026/27, PRELIMINARILY APPROVING
ENGINEER'S REPORT, AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF HEARING FOR
THE PARK MAINTENANCE AND RECREATION IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Cordova Recreation and Park District (the "District"), acting as the legislative body of the Park Maintenance and Recreation Improvement District, has previously ordered through Resolution 06/07-1 the formation of an assessment district pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, known as the Park Maintenance and Recreation Improvement District, for the purpose of financing certain park and recreational improvements, and for the purpose of funding maintenance operations of the District; and

WHEREAS, *Streets and Highways Code* sections 22622, 22623 and 22661 authorize the preparation of an Engineer's Report on an annual basis which shall describe any proposed new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, set forth an estimate of the costs of any improvements and/or annual maintenance costs for the park and recreational improvements specified in the Engineer's Report, specify a diagram for the assessment district and specify the amount to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2026/27 as authorized by the Board of Directors has been presented to the Board of Directors for its consideration and approval, which Engineer's Report generally describes the general nature, location, and extent of the new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, provides an estimate of the costs of any proposed new improvements or substantial changes in existing improvements and refurbishments, specifies the costs of maintenance of park and recreational improvements within the district, and sets forth a diagram for the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has adopted a Resolution approving and filing an Engineer's Report for Fiscal Year 2026/27 as required by *Streets and Highways Code* Section 22623, which Engineer's Report sets forth plans and specifications for the improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, an estimate of the costs of these improvements, an estimate of the cost of maintenance with respect to such improvements, a diagram of the assessment district, and a description of the net amount to be assessed upon assessable lands within the assessment district which Engineer's Report is incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors hereby declares its intention to levy and collect assessments pursuant to *Streets and Highways Code* Section 22624 as follows:

a. The Board of Directors of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, acting as the Board of Directors of the Park Maintenance and Recreation Improvement District, hereby adopts the Preliminary Engineer's Report dated June 17, 2026, and files said Engineer's Report with the Clerk of this Board as approved pursuant to the requirements of *California Streets and Highways Code* section 22623.

b. Said assessments will be levied and collected within the boundaries of the Park Maintenance and Recreation Improvement District, the boundaries of which are specifically described in the Engineer's Report. A full and detailed description of the boundaries of the Assessment District and the parcels of land within the district is contained within the approved Engineer's Report.

c. The Board of Directors declares its intent to levy and collect assessments for the Fiscal Year 2026/27 within said district at an assessment rate of \$33.99 per year per Single-Family Equivalent, as set forth in the Engineer's Report. These assessments are based on the same formula as those levied in Fiscal Years 2006/07 through 2025/26. The total number of parcels projected to be assessed and an estimate of total annual assessment revenue are contained within the Engineer's Report.

d. Ongoing maintenance, improvements and/or refurbishments within said assessment district to be funded by said assessments are detailed within the Engineer's Report which is incorporated herein by this reference.

e. Reference is hereby made to the Engineer's Report which is on file with the Clerk of the Board for a complete description of the proposed improvements and maintenance to be undertaken in Fiscal Year 2026/27 and the cost thereof, and the proposed assessments upon assessable lots and parcels of land within the proposed assessment district.

f. The Board hereby declares that this Resolution of Intention constitutes a Notice of Hearing regarding its intent to levy and collect assessments within the Park Maintenance and Recreation Improvement District for Fiscal Year 2026/27. This Public Hearing shall be held at a Regular meeting of the Board of Directors on July 15, 2026, at 6:30 p.m. at the Meeting Chambers of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, 11070 White Rock Road, Suite 130, Rancho Cordova, California 95670. The Clerk is hereby directed to publish this notice as a Notice of Hearing in a newspaper of general circulation pursuant to the requirements of *Government Code* section 6061.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that prior to the conclusion of the Public Hearing, any interested person may file a written protest with the Clerk of the Board, or, having previously filed a protest, may file a written withdrawal of that protest. A written protest shall state all grounds of objection. A protest by a property owner shall contain a description sufficient to identify the property owned by such owner. Such protest or withdrawal of protest should be mailed to the attention of the Clerk of the Board of the Cordova Recreation and Park District, 11070 White Rock Road, Suite 130, Rancho Cordova, California 95670 or may be hand delivered to the Clerk prior to the conclusion of the public hearing.

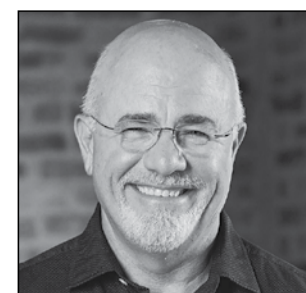

Dave Ramsey Says Pursue Your Dreams, But Do It Wisely

Dear Dave,

My husband and I are debt-free, including our home. My husband is a great guy, and a talented man, but he's also a bit of a dreamer sometimes. He has written three or four novels that haven't been accepted by publishers. He feels he's close to a breakthrough, and he asked me the other day about my thoughts on selling our home and living on the money we make so he can really concentrate, and work on the new book full-time. I want him to pursue his dream, but this idea scares me. What do you think about it?

Dear Emily,

First of all, congratulations on being completely debt-free! That's a huge accomplishment, and I'm really happy for you two.

Now, about your hus-

band's idea. It sounds to me like he's a good man. And he obviously has drive, focus and discipline if he's been able to write that many novels in his spare time and be part of you reaching such a great financial point in your lives. But I think it would be a huge mistake for you guys to sell your home, especially when he hasn't proven he can sell anything he writes.

I understand where his head is right now, believe me. He wants to write and be a successful, full-time novelist. That's a great dream to have. It's one I sincerely hope he can achieve one day. But my advice right now would be for him to keep his day job, and continue working his tail off nights and weekends to try and make his dream a reality.

As part of that, I'd suggest drawing up a strategy to get some exposure for the books he has already written. Develop a website highlighting his work. Maybe he could self-publish a few dozen

copies, then contact local libraries and civic groups for an opportunity to speak. In the process, he might sell a few books and get his name out there.

It may take longer than he'd like, but that's honestly a much better idea than the one he has now. It will allow him to pursue his passion, work toward a goal and not run the risk of putting his family in financial danger.

World Big Bang

Wow! Can you believe it's 250 years ago that the Declaration of Independence was signed, sealed and delivered and our country was born? I always love to hear the stories with fascinating facts that you didn't know...me too! So, here's my "Did You Know" top ten.

1. **The declaration was actually approved on July 2nd.** The Continental Congress voted on July 2nd, 1776, when twelve of the thirteen colonies approved Richard Henry Lee's resolution for independence.

2. **Thomas Jefferson wrote the first draft in just 17 days.** He crafted the initial draft in his Philadelphia boarding house with some input from John Adams and Benjamin Franklin. And Timothy Matlack, a clerk at the Continental Congress actually wrote the beautiful handwritten version displayed at the National Archives. Why? Because he had exceptional penmanship. And, he used the Iron Gall Ink Recipe made from oak tree galls, iron sulfate, gum Arabic, and water which started light brown but darkened to deep purple-black as it oxidized. That created the beautiful rich text that appeared almost magical as the letters darkened after being written. And the parchment was made from animal skin specifically sheepskin or calfskin.

3. **John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, signed it BIG AND BOLD.** He declared he signed his name so large so "King George can read it without his spectacles."

4. **Benjamin Franklin made a crucial edit.** He suggested changing Jefferson's phrase about "sacred and undeniable truths" to "self-evident" truths emphasizing reason and logic rather than religious authority as the basis for natural rights, reflecting Enlightenment thinking that would influence democratic philosophy for centuries.

5. **The Declaration nearly included a Condemnation of Slavery.** Jefferson's original draft contained a passionate condemnation of the slave trade. However, Southern delegates, particularly from South Carolina and Georgia demanded removal of the passage, arguing it would alienate potential allies and complicate their economic interests.

6 **Edward Rutledge was only 26 when he signed. He was from South Carolina and the youngest to sign his name.** Benjamin Franklin was the oldest delegate to sign at age 70.

7. **The Declaration of Independence was hidden in Fort Knox during World War II.** So were the Constitution and Bill of Rights.

8. **There's actually writing on the back of the Declaration.** And no, not a map like was depicted in the movie "National Treasure" but just the date 4 July 1776, likely as a filing label.

9. **Nine signers died before Independence was won.**

10. **Actress Reese Witherspoon descended from a signer.** It was John Witherspoon, the only clergyman to sign.

The importance of the Declaration influenced revolutions around the world like the French Declaration of Rights of Man, Latin American independence movements and democratic revolutions throughout the 19th and 20th centuries! As you celebrate, PLEASE remember how important this day really is, and bless those who fought and died for us to enjoy our freedoms!

The Float Master of Rancho Cordova Is Back

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - After a two-year hiatus Wayne Harmer, Rancho Cordova's official Float Master of 16 years, with more than 21 floats (including Christmas) in multiple parades, has returned for the 250 Year Anniversary of America, with a 22 foot, Drag Racing car.

He calls it, "Patriot Power." Hidden inside, is an actual Go Kart which will power the float through two parades: The Historic Folsom Hometown Parade on Sutter Street on Wednesday, July 1 at 7 p.m. and the Rancho Cordova July 4th parade beginning at 10 a.m.

As is tradition with Harmer and his floats, the go-kart contains lots of bells and whistles, flashing lights and to top it off, the car has big 4-foot rotating wheels in the back, and small rotating wheels in the front. According to Harmer, "the best viewing will be at Coloma and Chase Drive."

Harmer said that after more than 500 hours of work on the project since January, including 250 hours on the wheels alone, "it is ready to go." On Wednesday July

1 drivers between Rancho and Folsom can watch for Patriot Power as it is being safely towed on its way to Sutter Street, Folsom by a hidden tow coupler in front.

"To finish the day, there is a concert, carnival, and lots of fireworks, at Hagan Park which opens at 4 p.m.," said Harmer.

Harmer would like to give a special shout out, to the "hard working Cordova Community Council, who does a lot of hard work, for a whole week, setting up the Rancho Cordova Celebration."

One tradition sadly missing this year is explained in Harmer's own words: "Things changed two years ago when I lost my best friend, my sister Sherie who was very instrumental when the family was building our animated parade floats. She checked and rechecked every aspect of every float before allowing them to go out into the parade. She is sorely missed."

CA Loves to Fight Trump

The State Water Project Can't Move Without FED Help

The relicensing of the Oroville Dam hydroelectric facilities has been underway for more than two decades. The Oroville Dam is the cornerstone of the State Water Project, delivering water to 27 million Southern Californians and irrigating 750,000 acres of farmland in the Central Valley. The dam generates about 2.2 billion kilowatt-hours of hydroelectric power annually, enough to power hundreds of thousands of homes.

Although the California Department of Water Resources and many local stakeholders reached a settlement estimated to provide roughly \$1 billion in environmental, recreational, cultural, and other community impact benefits, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) has yet to issue a new license, and the project continues to operate under annual extensions.

One big new issue: not all California tribes with cultural and historical rights to the Feather River have signed onto the relicensing process. They were consulted, but then left out of the process, the money, the changes in water allocations, and the signing ceremony.

Mooretwon Rancheria, Berry Creek Rancheria, and Enterprise Rancheria Maidus all have lands in the FERC boundary; indeed, the Enterprise Tribe has original village sites at the very bottom of Lake Oroville. Hard for CA to say the Indians have not experienced impacts from the project. Across the country, tribes have had a non-stop series of wins in FERC relicensing agreements and community impact settlements.

The Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe participated in a \$325 million restoration project, while the Yurok Tribe, Karuk Tribe,

Hoopa Valley Tribe, and Klamath Tribes were part of a \$250-\$400 million Klamath settlement. The Skokomish Indian Tribe secured more than \$15 million, and tribes participating in the Columbia River Basin agreements—including the Yakama Nation, Nez Perce Tribe, and Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs—received more than \$1 billion in new federal funding for restoration and fish passage improvements.

Meanwhile, Butte County has stood up a website quantifying the costs to the community by a project that exports billions in water and power far beyond county boundaries. The website, ourwatertheirpower.org, shows specific promises the State made to get the FERC license 70 years ago and how often the State has not followed through and, worse, added costs to the community as locals watch millions of dollars go downstream to meet the needs of urban areas and farmers that compete with them in the global ag market.

The County has complained about the State's failures for years. This time, the County has quantified the costs; the tribes can legally compel the Federal government to address them. The last time the State applied for a FERC license, the local tribes were too poor and lacked the capacity to speak out on environmental, fisheries, and economic issues.

As the numbers above indicate, Tribes have been successful when they stand up for their communities. As California plans for a water future in which Central Valley interests cannot pump unlimited groundwater, and droughts are more frequent, cooperation with the Federal Government; the EPA, the Bureau of Reclamation, the National Marine Fisheries Service, and other agencies will be essential. How that moves forward is a policy issue that will affect all Californians. ★

Parade and All America Mile kick off July 4

The Fourth of July begins with two of Rancho Cordova's most popular traditions.

The All America Mile starts at 9:05 a.m. on July 4, offering a flat, one-mile course designed for participants of all ages and fitness levels. The run follows the parade route and serves as a prelude to the day's main event.

Participants can check in beginning at 8 a.m. at W.H. Williamson Park, 10551 Coloma Road. Check-in closes at 9 a.m., and Coloma Road will be closed to traffic beginning at 8 a.m.

At 10 a.m., the annual Fourth of July Parade steps off from Coloma Road and Cordova Lane. The parade proceeds west on Coloma Road to Chase Drive before turning onto Rinda Drive. Covering approximately 1.5 miles, it is recognized as the longest Fourth of July parade in Sacramento County.

This year's parade will feature community organizations, local groups and youth marching bands competing for cash prizes and community bragging rights.

Organizers remind parade participants and spectators that the parade will not enter Hagan Community Park and that parents should plan to pick up children participating in the parade at the Cordova High School Performing Arts Center parking lot.

Families looking for activities beyond the parade will find plenty to do at Hagan Community Park.

Discounted all-day ride wristbands are available online through July 2 for \$30. Wristbands will cost \$40 at the gate. For cash payments residents can visit KP International Market during regular business hours through July 2.

Guests planning to attend both days must purchase separate admission for each date.

A limited number of VIP tickets are also available. VIP admission includes event entry, covered seating, two complimentary beverage tickets, upgraded restroom access and premium views of the concerts and fireworks. Only 250 VIP tickets are available each day.

Parking costs \$10 cash only.

Organizers encourage attendees to arrive early. Parking lots

close at 9 p.m., and entry gates close at 9:45 p.m. No late entry will be permitted.

Drivers should access Hagan Park from Coloma Road. Community side streets are restricted to residents, and illegally parked or double-parked vehicles will be subject to towing.

Attendees should note that no personal fireworks, including sparklers, are allowed inside Hagan Community Park. Personal barbecues are also prohibited.

All guests will pass through

metal detection screening, and bags, coolers and other personal items are subject to search. Clear bags are recommended to speed entry.

Additional reminders include that no ATMs will be available on site, though food and beverage vendors will accept debit and credit cards. A free bicycle valet service will be available near the park entrance. Pets are not permitted, with the exception of certified service animals. General admission does not include seating, so attendees are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets. ★

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Cordova Lancers 1978-79 boys varsity basketball team is held in high regard as one of the most talented groups in school history. The '78-'79 Lancers were the top ranked team in the area for the majority

Standouts that season included Larry Connors and Mike McCullough, who each earned All-City honors. According to Morphew however, it was the experience and leadership of upperclassmen Fred Clayton and Tyrone Lewis that helped
