## Fireworks Enforcement Ramps Up

- As the Fourth of July approaches and fire danger rises across the region, Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District leaders used a gathering of local business and community leaders to discuss how the agency is preparing for the busy holiday season and addressing public safety challenges throughout the region.

The Citrus Heights Chamber of Commerce monthly ACCESS Luncheon took place

on June 17 at the Citrus Heights Event Center, where Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District Fire Chief Adam House outlined the agency's evolving role in public safety and Assistant Chief and Fire Marshal Amy Nygren discussed increased enforcement efforts aimed at reducing fireworks-related fires and injuries.

House, who was sworn in as the district's seventh fire chief in August 2023, told attendees he was honored to serve the

## Sacramento County Expands Residential Fee Deferral Program to Support Housing Development

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - At its June 16 meeting, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution expanding the County's Residential Development Impact Fee Deferral Program to all residential projects, including eligible mixed-use developments that incorporate housing. The change is intended to reduce upfront development costs and support the construction of new housing throughout the County.

The expansion of the fee deferral program is part of Sacramento County's broader effort to create a more predictable, efficient and competitive development environment. By shifting the timing of fee payments, developers' upfront costs are reduced and access to capital during construction is improved, which provides developers with additional tools to advance projects, attract investment, and deliver housing more quickly, while continuing to ensure that new development contributes to the infrastructure and services growing communities depend on. The action reflects Sacramento County's commitment to supporting responsible growth.

The expanded program also broadens eligibility to include certain mixed-use developments, supporting projects that combine residential housing with commercial, retail or other compatible uses that contribute to vibrant, walkable communities.

The action aligns the County's program with Senate Bill 937, a state law intended to support housing development by allowing local governments to defer certain development impact fees.

In addition to approving the resolution, the Board introduced an ordinance that would amend portions of Sacramento County Code to formally implement and support the expanded program. The ordinance would establish the necessary code changes to align County regulations with

community.

"I'm humbled, first off, to be in a room with community members that are dedicated to make all of us better," House said.

According to House, Metro Fire is the largest fire agency in Sacramento County, serving approximately 730,000 residents around the clock and nearly a million people during business hours across 359 square miles. The district is the seventh-largest fire department in California.

House said the agency's formation in 2000, which combined 16 predecessor fire agencies, allowed Metro Fire to provide services that individual departments would have struggled to offer independently.

"We're stronger together," House said.

Among those services are specialized operations, including hazardous materials response, rescue teams and air operations. Metro Fire operates four helicopters, a capability House said is uncommon for a county fire department and provides critical support during large-scale incidents, including wildfires.

In Citrus Heights, Metro Fire operates four stations, including Station 21, home to the district's heavy rescue unit, and Station 23, a truck, engine and medic house which is scheduled for a long-awaited rebuild funded through Measure O revenues, as well as Station 27 and 28.

While firefighting remains a core responsibility, House said the district's mission has expanded significantly over the years.

"We had to evolve to the community's needs," House said.

That evolution includes emergency medical services, behavioral health partnerships and the district's Mobile Integrated Health program, which pairs firefighters with nurse practitioners or physician assistants to assist residents experiencing non-emergency medical or behavioral health issues.

House said the program helps connect people with appropriate care while reducing unnecessary emergency room visits.

"We are actively working at really a simple concept, just getting the right resource on scene," he said.

House also highlighted the district's response capabilities, noting that Metro Fire's emergency response times are

faster than the national average. The agency uses advanced technology, including aerial drone programs and predictive planning tools, to identify risks and allocate resources effectively.

As Independence Day celebrations draw near, House emphasized the importance of fire prevention and introduced Nygren to discuss the district's annual fireworks safety campaign.

"Our concern is public safety," Nygren said. "It gets heightened at the Fourth of July."

Nygren said Metro Fire responded to approximately 1,600 calls between July 1 and July 5 last year. Fireworks caused 53 fires during that period, and at least one fireworks-related injury was reported.

With hot temperatures and dry conditions already present this summer, officials expect another busy holiday weekend.

"We are going to see fires occur and injuries happen," said Nygren.

Metro Fire leads a regional fireworks task force that includes fire agencies, law enforcement, code enforcement officials and public information officers. The district also conducts inspections of fireworks stands and public displays throughout the region.

In Citrus Heights, officials will inspect approximately 23 fireworks booths and oversee safety measures for the city's Stars and Stripes Celebration.

Nygren urged residents to avoid illegal fireworks, noting that Citrus Heights has strengthened penalties for violations.

"If you've got your display and you're shooting off five of those illegal fireworks, that's a \$5,000 fine," she said, explaining that fines are now assessed per device rather than per incident.

Officials encouraged residents who choose to use fireworks to purchase only state-approved "safe & sane" products, keep water nearby, properly dispose of used fireworks and remain mindful of neighbors, veterans, children and pets who may be affected by the noise.

"Leave fireworks to the professionals," Nygren said.

**CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)** - The Citrus Heights Water District (CHWD) recently announced the student winners of its 33rd annual student poster contest, featuring this year's theme, "From Ripple to River."

Elementary school students in grades four through six in the San Juan Unified School District and other participating partners used their imaginations to creatively illustrate the water cycle and the value of water as a limited natural resource.

Participating schools included Skycrest Elementary, Trajan Elementary, Mariposa Avenue Elementary, Kingswood K-8, Carriage Drive Elementary and Woodside K-8 in Citrus Heights.

The top three winning students were invited to share their posters with members of the Board of Directors of the Citrus Heights Water District where they each received individual certificates of achievement and a cash prize.

Judges were especially impressed by the creativity, effort and thoughtful interpretations of how water moves through our environment and infrastructure, said CHWD Public Affairs Manager Mary Elise Conzelmann.

This year's three winners were all students attending Trajan Elementary School in Orangevale.

Bexley Frink, a student in Mr. Alexander's fourth grade class, was chosen as the overall poster contest winner.

Her winning poster design includes a colorful rainbow and depicts the steps of the water cycle as it flows down from the surrounding mountains into the greater Sacramento valley.

Runner-up winners included Addy Macedo, a fellow student in Mr. Alexander's fourth-grade class, and Elia Sadat, a fifth-grade student in Mrs. Delzer's class at Trajan Elementary School.

In her poster, Addy Macedo, used smiling blue water droplets sitting atop white puffy clouds to represent people, "reminding each of us to save water as we needed it to survive." A turtle, her

favorite animal, is also featured in her poster design.

"I also have hearts coming out of the clouds (as drops) because people should love water," she said.

Members of the CHWD Board of Directors are Caryl F. Sheehan, David C. Wheaton and Raymond A. Riehle.

The annual student poster contest teaches students the value of water as a limited resource, the importance of conservation and the need to use it wisely.

Students were invited to explore the journey of water - from a single drop to the larger eco systems that support the community - highlighting how every ripple plays a role in sustaining reliable water supplies, explained Mary Elise Conzelmann, CHWD Public Affairs Manager.

"Thank you to all the students and teachers who participated in this year's poster contest," said Board President Caryl Sheehan.

The district also extended its sincere congratulations to the winners and appreciation to all participants for helping bring awareness to the value of water through art.

"Your creative artwork shows us that you really understand how water supports our community, from where a drop hits the ground all the way to the systems that bring it to every home and business. We are excited to share your work and show it to the public."

# Metro Fire Responds to Second-Alarm Fire in Citrus Heights

**CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)** - On June 21 at approximately 11:14 a.m., the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District was dispatched to 7640 Auburn Blvd. in the City of Citrus Heights for a reported

commercial townhome fire.

Fire crews arrived to find a fire on an exterior balcony that had extended into the interior of the building. Due to the size of the structure and the volume of fire showing on arrival, incident commanders immediately requested a second alarm, bringing additional personnel and

resources to the scene to assist with fire suppression and rescue efforts.

Firefighters quickly deployed multiple hose lines while simultaneously conducting primary searches of the affected units to ensure all occupants had safely evacuated. Crews worked aggressively to contain the fire and prevent further extension throughout the structure.

The building, which consists of 12 townhome units, sustained significant damage. All units were impacted by fire, smoke, or water damage. The American Red Cross is assisting displaced residents with temporary housing and immediate needs.

Thanks to the quick actions of residents who alerted neighbors and went door-to-door helping others evacuate, all occupants were able to exit the building safely. No injuries to residents or firefighters have been reported.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation.

The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District reminds the community that when a fire occurs in your home, get out immediately and call 911 from a safe location. Once you have safely exited, never re-enter a burning building for any reason. ★

The bustling dealership, which is owned by Pravin, Sandeep and Patricia Tandel, is wheel to wheel with an assortment of colorful new cart models on display outside and on the showroom floor.

Street-legal LSV models are equipped with headlights, brake lights, turn signals, mirrors, seat belts and vehicle identification number (VIN) numbers for registration in the state of California.

“We also offer a wide inventory selection across all price points, accept most trade-ins, provide financing, and offer a discount for cash purchases,” he said.

Today’s modern golf cart has come a long way from their post-World War II Cushman counterparts that revolutionized the industry and became an integral part of the golf course landscape across the country.

“And, yes, we still work on those older (Cushman models) from time to time,” he said.

which are imported from China and then assembled in the United States before being shipped across a national dealer network for delivery.

Pravin Tandel bought the business from its original owner, and son Sandeep and his wife Patricia oversee day-to-day business operations.

According to the owners, the Electric Golf Car Company in Citrus Heights doesn’t just sell golf carts – it helps you truly elevate the quality of your ride.

Customers are encouraged to browse store inventory online or schedule a consultation to select and customize the perfect electric golf cart to fit their specific needs.

The company specializes in “helping individuals, families and businesses find the perfect cart for neighborhoods, communities, resorts, commercial properties and recreational use,” according to company marketing materials.

Much of the strength of the overall family business is in the quality of lasting relationships which they have built with their

# Sacramento State Men's Soccer Announces New Schedule for New-Look 2026

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The Sacramento State men's soccer program announced a 17-match regular season slate for the upcoming 2026 season, which features a unique partnership for the second half of the schedule once Big West Conference play begins.

With only three soccer playing members on the men's side in the new-look Pac-12 Conference, the league entered into a scheduling agreement designed to strengthen and sustain Division I men's soccer opportunities across the region. As part of the partnership, league newcomer California Baptist, Cal Poly, UC Riverside, and UC San Diego will compete as affiliate members of the Pac-12 alongside Oregon State, San Diego State, and Gonzaga.

The Big West will feature the Hornets, newcomer Utah Valley, Cal State Bakersfield, Cal State Fullerton, CSUN, UC Irvine, and UC Santa Barbara.

Sacramento State will face each of its Big West rivals once along with crossover games against Gonzaga (Oct. 7), UC San Diego (Oct. 14), and Oregon State (Oct. 21). The crossover games will not count toward the league standings

with four schools qualifying for the Big West Championship at the end of the year.

The Hornets tune-up for the regular season grind with three exhibitions, traveling to both Santa Clara (Aug. 8) and Stanford (Aug. 12) while hosting Menlo College (Aug. 15).

Regular season play begins in earnest with back-to-back home matches, renewing the Causeway rivalry with UC Davis at home in the season opener on Aug. 20,

before hosting Grand Canyon three days later.

The Hornets then hit the road for their next four contests, making trips to Saint Mary's (Aug. 27), Utah Tech (Aug. 31), San Jose State (Sept. 6), and San Diego State (Sept. 11).

Sacramento State closes out non-conference play with home matches against Pacific (Sept. 17) and UC Riverside (Sept. 23) before opening the Big West slate against UC Santa Barbara on the

road on Sept. 30. The Big West home opener has the Hornets hosting Cal State Bakersfield on Oct. 3, with league home matches against UC Irvine (Oct. 17) and Cal State Fullerton (Oct. 31) to follow.

On the road, Sacramento State faces Utah Valley (Oct. 10) and CSUN (Oct. 24) in league play.

This year's Big West Championship begins on Nov. 7 with the semifinal round, with the championship match to follow on

Nov. 14. NCAA Tournament play begins five days later on Nov. 19.

**DAVIS, CA (MPG)** - After 12 seasons leading the UC Davis softball program and almost three decades in collegiate coaching, UC Davis Softball Head Coach Erin Thorpe has announced her retirement from coaching.

Thorpe leaves behind one of the most successful eras in program history, during which she guided the Aggies to sustained success while helping countless student-athletes grow, on and off the field.

Thorpe finishes her UC Davis tenure as the second-winningest coach in program history with 273 victories and is just the third coach in school history to surpass the 200-win mark. Across a 23-year head coaching career that included stops at UC Davis, Boise State and Whittier College, Thorpe compiled 496 career victories, including 446 at the Division I level.

"After 23 seasons in coaching, including 12 unforgettable years at UC Davis, retiring is both bittersweet and deeply meaningful," said Thorpe. "I am incredibly grateful for the opportunity to have worked with so many dedicated assistant coaches, remarkable players, and wonderful colleagues throughout my career. We experienced wins, milestones, and accomplishments that I will always be proud of, but the relationships we built, the lessons we shared, and the moments we experienced together are what will always matter to me most. Thank you to everyone who has been part of this journey. It has truly been one of the great honors of my life."

"Erin's career at UC Davis reflects a remarkable commitment to our university,

to our student-athletes and to the sport of softball," said Director of Athletics Rocko DeLuca. "She led the program with dedication and helped guide it through significant moments in its history. We appreciate all that she has contributed to UC Davis Athletics and wish Erin and her family the very best as she begins this next chapter in her journey."

Thorpe's final season at UC Davis was one of the most successful in program history as the Aggies set a new standard in the Big West Conference and positioned themselves for continued success heading into the Mountain West Conference.

The Aggies posted 17 conference victories in 2026, the program's most ever in

the Big West Conference, and earned the program's first appearance in the Big West Championship Tournament. Along the way, UC Davis recorded a signature victory over Cal State Fullerton, which was ranked No. 4 in the national mid-major poll at the time, and completed a historic road sweep of Long Beach State.

Throughout her tenure, Thorpe coached some of the most accomplished student-athletes in program history. Brooke Yanez became the program's first All-American under her leadership in 2019, while Anna Dethlefsen earned Big West Player of the Year honors in 2023. Thorpe also guided Yanez to Big West Pitcher of the Year recognition in 2019 and helped Ashley Sawai

earn Big West Freshman Pitcher of the Year honors in 2024. Since Thorpe took over the program in 2015, Aggies have earned 41 All-Big West selections and seven National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Region honors.

Several Aggies also etched their names into the record book during Thorpe's tenure. Anna Dethlefsen became the first player in program history to surpass 100 career stolen bases, finishing with 110 and ranking second in Big West Conference history.

Other Aggies established numerous UC Davis Division I-era records, including Alyse Rojas in career and single-season batting average and on-base percentage, Sarah Starks in career and single-season home runs and career RBIs, Alexa Yanez in single-season wins, ERA and strikeouts, and Kenedi Brown in career wins and strikeouts. During Thorpe's final season, the Aggies set Division I-era program records for hits, doubles and walks while posting the second-highest totals in batting average and RBIs.

The Aggies also enjoyed several landmark seasons under Thorpe's leadership, including a 39-win campaign in 2019, which marks the program's highest win total since 2003.

Prior to arriving at UC Davis, Thorpe became the winningest coach in Boise State softball history. A former All-American student-athlete herself, Thorpe coached the Broncos' Tara Glover to the program's first All-America honor, and six players earned all-region recognition and 18 received all-conference accolades during her tenure in Boise. She was the head coach at Whittier College before taking over at Boise State. ★

# 72.2 Million Americans Expected to Travel over July 4th Week Despite Higher Fuel Prices

- AAA projects 72.2 million people will travel at least 50 miles from home for Independence Day between Saturday, June 27 and Sunday, July 5. Of those, more than 8.94 million are expected to travel in California, and more than 1.59 million are expected to travel in Arizona. This year's domestic travel forecast surpasses last year's record of 71.8 million travelers, but the increase is smaller than recent year-over-year gains. The vast majority of travelers (61.4 million) are expected to drive while 5.85 million are expected to fly to their destinations. While there's been little change in those numbers compared to last year, travel by other modes, including cruises, is the category seeing the biggest increase.

Of the 61.4 million Americans traveling by car, 7.08 million will be in California and 1.2 million will be in Arizona.

From 2019 to 2023, there were 2,653 traffic crash fatalities during the Fourth of July holiday period.

More than 1,600 of those fatalities were a driver, and about 38% of those drivers were under the influence.

The 21-34 age group had the highest percentage (48%) of drunk drivers.

AAA is urging drivers to commit to 100 Days of Safe Driving this summer and to plan a safe

ride home before going out. AAA also reminds drivers to Slow Down, Move Over when approaching any stopped vehicle on the side of the road. By reducing speed and changing lanes, drivers allow roadside workers to do their jobs safely and help prevent tragedies.

### AAA Shares Best Travel Tips

Hit the road early. Thursday, July 2, Friday, July 3 and Sunday July 5 are projected to be the busiest travel days with 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. being the most congested hours. Conversely, Saturday, July 4 will see lighter traffic overall, with a spike between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. before tapering off after 3 p.m., barring any unexpected events on the road.

Be road trip ready. AAA anticipates about 350,000 roadside service calls nationwide for the holiday weekend. A pre-trip inspection at a AAA Auto Repair Center can prevent common breakdowns like dead batteries and blown tires. - Sacramento County Public Health (SCPH) and the Sacramento County Environmental Management Department (EMD) are urging residents to follow safe food handling practices as summer temperatures, activities and subsequent foodborne illnesses are on the rise.

### Food Safety Best Practices

Thoroughly cook all meats, especially poultry. Poultry should be cooked to reach a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees. If you are served undercooked poultry in a restaurant, send it back for further cooking.

Wash hands before preparing food and immediately after handling any raw poultry or meat.

Avoid cross-contamination by carefully

cleaning all cutting boards, countertops and utensils with soap and hot water after preparing raw poultry or meat and prevent juices from raw meats from dripping on other foods.

Make sure that other foods, such as fruits or vegetables, do not come into contact with cutting boards or knives that have been used with raw poultry or meat.

Always refrigerate meat products. Never leave raw meat at room temperature.

Avoid unpasteurized milk and soft cheeses and untreated (not chlorinated or boiled) surface or stream water.

Wash hands well with soap and water after using the bathroom, changing diapers or handling pets, including animals at petting zoos. Make sure children wash their hands well after going to the bathroom or handling pets.

This reminder follows a recent increase in Campylobacter infections in Sacramento County. Campylobacter is one of the most

common bacterial causes of foodborne illness in the United States. Recent monitoring data shows Campylobacter cases were 1.3 times higher than the previous month and 1.2 times higher than the three-year average.

Campylobacter infections can result from eating undercooked poultry, consuming unpasteurized dairy products, drinking contaminated water or allowing raw meat and poultry juices to contaminate ready-to-eat foods. Symptoms often include diarrhea, stomach cramps, fever, nausea and vomiting.

"Summer is a time for gathering with family and friends, whether that's around a backyard grill, at a picnic in the park or on a camping trip," said Sacramento County Public Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu. "Recent increases in Campylobacter infections serve as a reminder that food safety matters. No one wants a celebration to end with a trip to the doctor. A few simple food

safety steps can help prevent illness and keep summer memories focused on the people and moments that matter most."

SCPH monitors disease trends, investigates outbreaks and works to prevent the spread of communicable diseases. EMD protects public health through food safety inspections, environmental health programs and education for food facilities and residents. Both departments work together to identify emerging public health concerns and provide residents with information to prevent illness before it occurs.

"Food safety starts long before the first bite," said Jennea Monasterio, director of the Sacramento County Environmental Management Department. "Keeping food at safe temperatures and preventing cross-contamination are small steps that can prevent illness and help people enjoy their summer season." ★

## Local Emergency in Response to Invasive Golden Mussel Threat

- On Tuesday, June 16, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors proclaimed a local emergency in response to the growing threat posed by the invasive Golden Mussel. These freshwater species have rapidly spread throughout California waterways and threaten regional water infrastructure, the environment and the local economy. This proclamation allows the County to work more closely with regional, state and federal partners to address the threat posed by the Golden Mussel and help safeguard vital water resources.

The Golden Mussel (*Limnoperna fortunei*) was first

detected in North America in October 2024. Native to Asia, Golden Mussels are highly invasive and reproduce quickly, forming dense colonies on hard surfaces. They can spread through waterways, on boats and on water equipment, making containment

difficult once established. Large clusters of the mussels can clog pipes, pumps and conveyance systems. Golden Mussels can also damage infrastructure and disrupt aquatic ecosystems by competing with native species.

Sacramento County joins a

growing number of jurisdictions throughout California that have taken action to address the threat. Neighboring San Joaquin County also proclaimed an emergency this year. Kern County also recently declared an emergency due to the presence

of golden mussels.

Sacramento County relies on an extensive network of waterways and water infrastructure to support residents, businesses and agriculture. The County will continue working with water agencies, environmental partners and state officials to monitor the species and support efforts to prevent further spread.

You can help prevent the spread of invasive mussels by cleaning off tubes, kayaks, canoes and other watercraft between uses. Visit the Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers website to find out how to correctly clean your watercraft to help prevent the spread of all invasive species. ## Minimum Wage Hikes to Offset High Living Costs. There's a Downside

There are three immutable aspects of economic life in California today.

No. 1, Californians face the nation's highest cost of living. It is 11% higher than the national average, according to the federal Bureau of Economic Analysis, including rents 53% higher than average and utilities 63% higher. It's why California also has the nation's highest poverty rate.

No. 2, the high cost of living, especially for housing, is the most important factor in the out-migration of Californians to other states. It has led to a net loss of 900,000 people since 2015, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

No. 3, California's unemployment rate, currently 5.3% of its labor force, has been among the highest of any state for the last half-decade, with more than a million jobless workers. It rises to 10.1% when it's broadened to discouraged job seekers and those who work part-time but want full employment. This alternative measure is also the nation's highest.

The response to these economic conditions from the state's mostly Democratic politicians has been an amalgam of high concept policy changes, one-time or short-term allocations of relief money and micro-managing wages.

Gov. Gavin Newsom and the Legislature, for example, have enacted dozens of laws and administrative directives aimed at making it easier to build new housing, especially for low- and moderate-income families and, in theory, tempering housing costs.

However, the actual rate of new housing construction of all kinds has been stuck at about 100,000 units a year. Newsom's latest state budget projects only fractional gains, to about 115,000 units, through 2030.

When the budget's revenues allow — or at least appear to allow — the state has appropriated funds for direct relief to Californians mired in poverty, such as an earned income tax credit or even cash distributions.

Increasingly, state and local officials also have responded to ever-increasing costs of living by increasing minimum wages.

A new report from the Virginia-based Employment Policies Institute reveals that California is the most active state in setting new and higher wages for specific economic sectors. It has 8 of the nation's 10 largest local minimum wage increases taking in effect in July.

When California, after much political angst, decreed a \$20 minimum wage for fast food workers three years ago and created an agency to oversee that industry's employment conditions, it ignited a debate over impact that's still raging.

Proponents have ginned up studies that purport to prove that the higher wages had little or no negative effects on employment and consumer prices. Critics have countered with studies saying that \$20 wages forced fast food

operators to raise prices and reduce their staffs.

Newsom and the Legislature also set higher wages for healthcare industry employees. Local city and county officials have decreed new wage levels for particular economic segments, such as the hotel industry in Los Angeles and amusement parks in San Diego.

The Los Angeles City Council set a \$30 minimum wage for hotel and airport workers on the theory that travelers from elsewhere would bear the costs, but last month postponed implementation until after the 2028 Olympics. In return, the business community canceled a ballot measure to eliminate the city's gross receipts tax, a major city revenue source.

The tactic of raising minimum wages to offset rising living costs shows no signs of abating. Currently, for example, the Service Employees International Union is sponsoring legislation, Senate Bill 1203, that would increase the training requirements for private security guards but also empower the state Industrial Welfare Commission to set new and presumably higher minimum wages for such guards.

This may be a circular economic firing squad. Higher wages can lead to higher consumer costs, which increases pressure for higher wages and pushes those caught in the middle, trying to survive, to lower-cost states.

## Social Security Matters

Why Don't They Just Create

Individual Social Security Accounts?

**Dear Rusty:** Regarding Social Security's financial issues, three people contributing to Social Security for every one beneficiary sounds to me like a surplus. If they had given workers their own accounts, similar to a 401k, where they could manage their own money, it would have worked out more favorably for retirees. President George W Bush suggested these changes, but it was shot down by Congress.

The average worker now pays a 6.2% Social Security tax. If the government had bumped it up to say 7%, I don't believe that me or anyone else would have cried too hard. There are ways of correcting this before the SS reserves are depleted, and hopefully, Congress will address Social Security's financing soon. **Signed: Skeptical Senior**

**Dear Skeptical:** Believe it or not, putting SS contributions (from payroll taxes) into separate

individual accounts is not really a good idea. For information, most people get back all payroll taxes they contributed to Social Security within about 5 years of receiving SS benefits. Even with decent public market returns, some individual separate accounts would eventually run out of money, causing some to lose Social Security benefits before they die, meaning they would likely live in poverty. People are now collecting benefits (on average) for decades, and the current SS format means that even those who contribute only a small amount will collect benefits no matter how long they live. Remember, the primary purpose of the SS program is to reduce poverty in America.

FYI, President Bush's plan had opposition in the 2005 Congress largely because of the cost to transition to that plan, and the fear that investments in the public markets subjected individual retirement savings to unacceptable risk. In any case, few have since advocated investing Social Security funds in the public financial markets because of the risks and the political backlash. And adding a small amount to the FICA/SECA payroll tax rate only somewhat mitigates the problem - it doesn't completely solve it. I'm afraid that

Social Security's financial issues are more complex than that and can't be fully solved by a small increase in SS payroll taxes.

You are right - Congress can (and, we are confident, will) address this, and hopefully soon. For its part, AMAC (the Association of Mature American Citizens) and the AMAC Foundation have been evaluating this issue for years and have developed a Social Security reform plan for Congress to consider (see this). And we are actively promoting our reform plan in Washington, D.C. Please know that we share your concerns about the future of Social Security and will continue to work hard to ensure the program is here for many generations.

The spirit of Buchenwald lives on, we are supposed to believe, in the Israeli military operation in Gaza. It's nearly mandatory for progressive Democrats to denounce Israel for its alleged genocide, while Tucker Carlson and Hasan Piker -- radical influencers on the right and left, respectively -- say that the moral offense is the same as the Holocaust, even if the scale is less extensive.

Israel's haters surely enjoy the perversity of accusing the Jewish state of the same enormity that contributed to its creation, of comparing the Jews to heinous murderers of Jews. The charge is a grotesque libel.

If Israel wanted to kill everyone in Gaza, it could do it easily. What we have witnessed in the Hamas-controlled territory is not a genocide -- the deliberate destruction of a people -- but an urban battle.

Warfare in urban environments is almost always highly destructive. When the Iraqi army retook Mosul from ISIS in 2016-2017 with our air support, tens of thousands of buildings were damaged or destroyed and an estimated 80% of the Old City.

Vietnam gave us the famous (perhaps apocryphal) line, "We had to destroy the city in order to save it." The city in question was Ben Tre, infiltrated by the Viet Cong during the Tet Offensive in 1968. We used airstrikes, heli-

copter gunships, artillery and ground troops to extricate the communist forces, and the Mekong Delta town suffered extensive damage, even though the fighting only lasted days.

The old imperial capital of Hue suffered the same fate, but on a larger scale. Communist forces took most of the city and dug in, requiring street-to-street combat over a period of months to take it back. About half the city was damaged or destroyed.

The lesson is that cities never fare well when they are the locus of combat, whether Seoul or Pyongyang during the Korean War, Manila or Stalingrad during World War II, Vicksburg or Charleston during the Civil War.

Civilians inevitably suffer and die. This is true of even the most honored military operations. The Allied invasion of Normandy killed 20,000 French civilians as cities such as Rouen and Le Havre were pulverized by our bombardment. Why would anyone expect Gaza, one of the most densely populated places on Earth, to be different? Hamas spent years and massive resources tunneling and fortifying, making Gaza into a bristling armed camp difficult to subdue.

Sure enough, it has taken a grinding, years-long campaign to substantially reduce Hamas. Israel's detractors profess to detect "genocidal intent" in harsh things that Israeli officials have said about Gaza, but these statements have typically been aimed at Hamas.

If Israel wanted to commit genocide against the Gazans, Prime Minister

Bibi Netanyahu wouldn't have sought to accommodate Hamas for years, in the hopes that a major war could be avoided. The Oct. 7 attack exposed this as a grievous misjudgment. It's hard to believe that any society, having experienced the unspeakable crimes visited on its people that day, would have concluded, "Well, we can't do anything in response -- even recover our hostages -- because combat in Gaza will be too destructive."

Hamas intertwined its military infrastructure with civilian facilities, and made military use of hospitals, mosques and schools. Its fighters posed as medical personnel and journalists. Everything was geared to making it as difficult as possible to target Hamas without collateral damage, creating the predicate for denouncing Israel for war crimes.

As military expert John Spencer points out, Israel takes steps to avoid civilian harm: "It warns before attacks using text messages, phone calls, leaflets and broadcasts. It opens safe corridors and pauses operations so civilians can leave combat areas. It tracks civilian presence down to the building level."

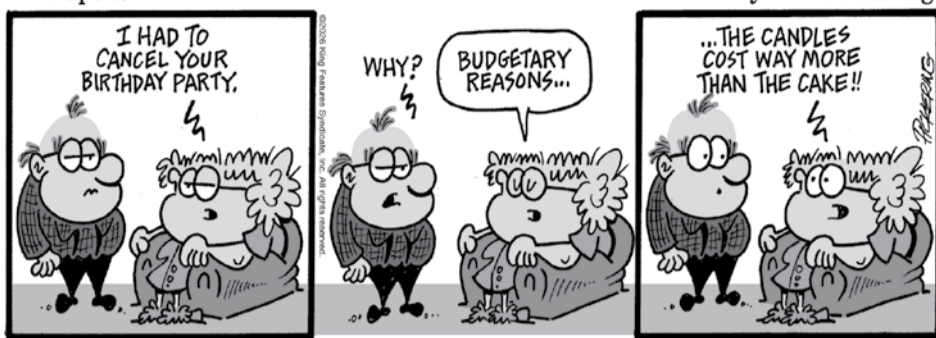

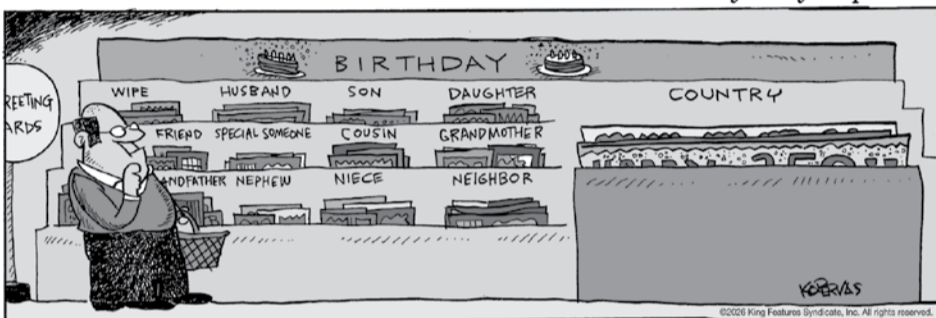

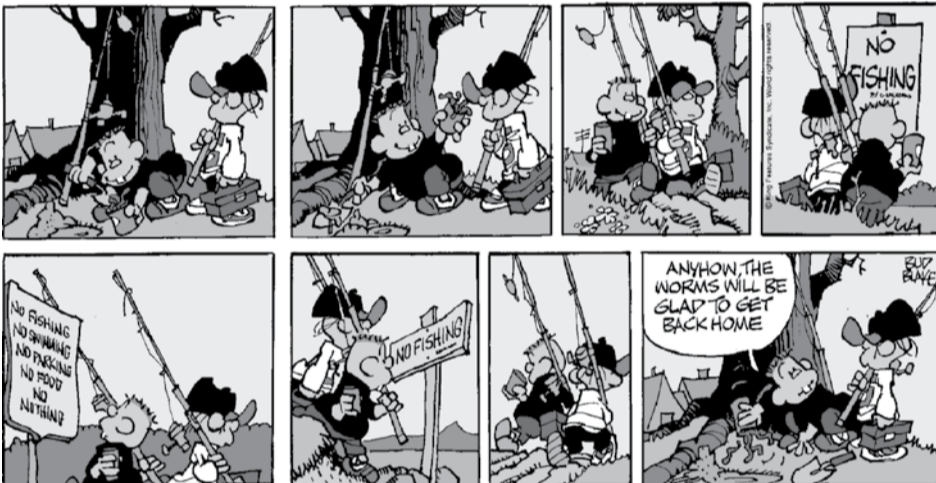

**CALIFORNIA (MPG)** - Senator Roger Niello (R-Fair Oaks) introduced Senate Resolution 112 to declare the week of June 14 through June 20, 2026, as Familial Adenomatous Polyposis Awareness Week in California. Familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP) is a hereditary condition that results in a high number of polyps developing within the colon and rectum.

“By declaring this week as FAP awareness week, we acknowledge a commitment to encouraging Californians to gather their family health history and share this information with their healthcare provider for early screening and prevention of cancers associated with these conditions,” said Niello. “Understanding your risk for FAP can help healthcare providers determine appropriate treatment and screening protocol for prevention and early detection.”

Dan Shockley, who has been an active advocate of FAP awareness, lives in Galt, CA. Shockley is a constituent of Senator Roger Niello, and said, “Genetic testing

and early detection are paramount. I'm living proof. As a 14-year attenuated FAP warrior, my mantra is a positive spin on a bleak diagnosis: Always Forge Ahead with a Purpose!”

Since 2012, Life's a Polyp Foundation has been in action raising awareness and supporting FAP patients online worldwide. Its Founder and President, Jenny Jones, stated, “FAP Awareness Week highlights the care FAP requires, ultimately helping save lives. When patients are fighting the lack of awareness in the medical field about FAP, it results in difficulty to obtain diagnostic testing upon known FAP risk, and they are unable to obtain proper surveillance after diagnosis. Then, their lives are put at risk for multiple cancers and other health issues.” Jones continued, “Recognizing this week tells medical providers there's something they need to learn more about and tells every FAP patient out there that they are seen and they are not alone. There's a whole community of us out here with welcoming arms.”

# City Accepting Applications for Home Repair Loan Program

**CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)** - The City of Citrus Heights Housing Rehabilitation Program (HRP) is currently accepting applications on a first-come, first-served basis while funds are available.

The program assists very low-, low- and moderate-income homeowners to make essential physical improvements to their homes which promote their safety and livability, said Marisa Brown, city communications officer.

The city's home repair loan program, for residents only, offers an individual deferred loan up to the maximum amount of \$60,000 per loan for necessary repairs such as windows, heating ventilation and cooling (HVAC), roofing and plumbing over a 30-year term at a simple interest of up to two percent.

Eligible Citrus Heights homeowners are encouraged to complete a brief pre-screening application to determine basic eligibility based on household income, property location and specific repair needs, according to the city.

The City of Citrus Heights Housing Division has operated its HRP program for more than 20 years, Brown said.

The program leverages a combination of funding sources — including Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, CalHome funds, Permanent Local Housing Allocation (PLHA) funds and program loan repayments

“Since its inception, the City has issued more than 100 individual rehabilitation loans ranging from approximately \$10,000 to \$60,000, with simple interest rates ranging from zero to three percent,” Brown said.

“The program operates as a revolving loan fund, meaning loan repayments are reinvested back into the program to provide assistance to additional eligible homeowners,” Brown said.

Prospective applicants must meet the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) 2026 income limits

which are updated each year.

“While the City does not waive building permit fees, eligible permit costs may be included as part of the overall rehabilitation project and financed through the loan in accordance with current program guidelines,” Brown said.

A pre-screen application determines basic eligibility based on income, property location and repair needs, according to the city. If found to be qualified, a full application is then submitted for review before repair assistance is offered.

Eligible homeowners can receive a 30-year deferred loan at a two percent simple annual interest rate. The principal and accrued interest are deferred for 30 years. The loan becomes due upon sale, title transfer, or if the home is no longer owner-occupied.

A zero-percent interest loan may be available for qualifying low-income households, seniors (62-plus), and/or permanently disabled households.

Up to \$5,000 grants for eligible persons 65 years old, and or permanently disabled, living in owner-occupied homes, including single-family, manufactured homes, condominiums and half-plexes which are separate from adjoining structure can also receive assistance to make improvements to the accessibility and safety of the home including the installation of ramps, grab bars, visual alarms and other support devices.

Homeowners who are living in a manufactured/mobile home may also be eligible for a critical home repair grant up to \$20,000 for emergency health and safety repairs, according to the city.

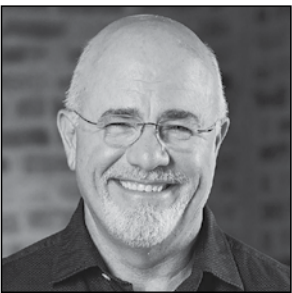

I want him to pursue his dream, but this idea scares me. What do you think about it?

band's idea. It sounds to me like he's a good man. And he obviously has drive, focus and discipline if he's been able to write that many novels in his spare time and be part of you reaching such a great financial point in your lives. But I think it would be a huge mistake for you guys to sell your home, especially when he hasn't proven he can sell anything he writes.

I understand where his head is right now, believe me. He wants to write and be a successful, full-time novelist. That's a great dream to have. It's one I sincerely hope he can achieve one day. But my advice right now would be for him to keep his day job, and continue working his tail off nights and weekends to try and make his dream a reality.

As part of that, I'd suggest drawing up a strategy to get some exposure for the books he has already written. Develop a website highlighting his work. Maybe he could self-publish a few dozen

copies, then contact local libraries and civic groups for an opportunity to speak. In the process, he might sell a few books and get his name out there.

It may take longer than he'd like, but that's honestly a much better idea than the one he has now. It will allow him to pursue his passion, work toward a goal and not run the risk of putting his family in financial danger.

As school gives way to summer, questions of time often change. Assignments fade, schedules loosen and choices become more visible.

What will hold in your hand this summer?

My recent literacy series unexpectedly intersected with school district discussions on cell phone use, prompting thoughtful questions from Bella Vista freshman Lili Boyer, a reader of this column. Her questions sparked the following reflections and gratefully reminded me that conversations across generations may be just as important as the answers they inspire.

Lili offered a perspective many adults may not expect.

"Frankly, cell phones aren't the crisis we should be navigating," she wrote. "They are only one piece of a generational dilemma we've postponed confronting for too many years."

Lili pointed me to an argument made by educator and former New York City senior education adviser Brandon Cardet-Hernandez. Writing in Education Week in 2024, he observed, "The real crisis isn't in your kid's hand. It's in their reading scores. We're allowing the cellular device to take the blame."

I hope we never have to choose between literacy and digital awareness. They are deeply connected.

The technology itself is not the crisis. Our ability to direct and sustain attention is — to read deeply, communicate well, regulate emotions and build healthy relationships. How we use the technology. Literacy remains vital to independence and success, including our ability to reason together, collaborate

and have civil discourse.

Which led to perhaps the most practical question: If less screen time creates empty space, what fills it?

When Lili asked for good alternatives for teenagers with overbearing amounts of screen time, my answer was simple: Engage with something physical, tangible or face-to-face with people.

There will be unease at first, an urge to fill the space with whatever activity our brains have learned to default to. Intentionally choosing something else when that feeling comes is important.

Walking with a friend instead of texting. A physical board game instead of a digital one. Learning a skill you love. Making something with your hands. Or, as young people say, "touching grass." Engaging physical senses through movement, touch and sound brings people into the present.

Lili suggested a brilliant connection: Can literature serve as an antidote to a society increasingly dependent on devices for stimulation?

I realized that reading books practices the very skills digital environments interfere with.

Scrolling conditions us toward rapid reward cycles, fragmented attention, constant novelty and passive consumption. Task-switching increases cognitive load and stress, making it harder to process deeply or respond thoughtfully rather than simply react emotionally.

Literature slows us down enough to encounter complexity and reflect with it. To imagine scenes. To interpret meaning. To reflect emotionally. To connect cause and effect. To tolerate ambiguity.

It becomes a form of

cognitive and emotional training.

Perhaps most importantly, literature provides solitude without loneliness. It does not fill the space with stimulation from the outside. It fills the space inside a person — productively — to think, to question, to imagine and to cultivate inner life.

Lili added another observation from her own experience.

As a child, it felt like all her books centered on fantasy — magic, dragons and fairies. Reading often felt like an obligation because she had to read for points in school.

"It wasn't until now, in high school, that reading doesn't feel required. Without the burden of reading being a chore and switching genres slightly, I have never found more joy in reading than I do now."

So, as summer begins, what will hold in your hand?

A phone? A library book? A fishing pole? A paintbrush? Or a friend's hand?

Perhaps the most important question isn't how much time we spend on our devices, but how intentionally we put them down and what else we make room for when we do.

Summer eventually ends, but the habits we practice with our attention have a way of shaping the people we become.

## Water District Approves No Rate Increase for the Remainder of 2026 and All of 2027

Citrus Heights Water District will continue monitoring these factors as part of its long-term planning efforts while remaining focused on maintaining reliable service and responsible stewardship of public resources.

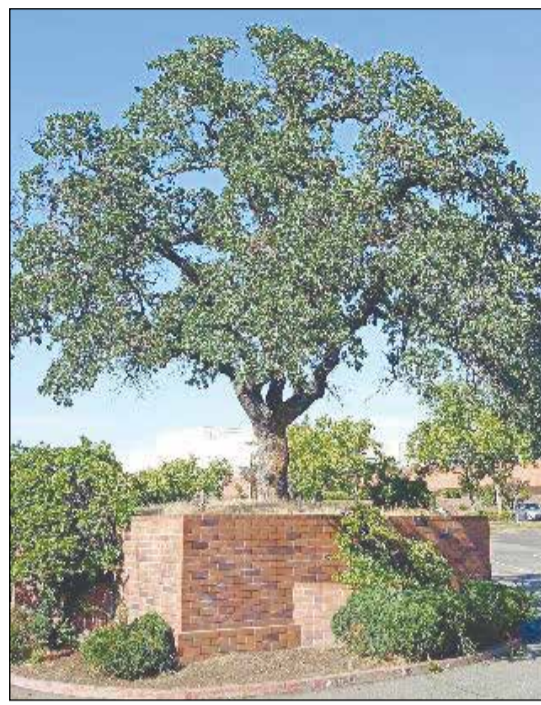
