Ribs and Relics Appraises Family Treasures

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - What's your treasure worth? That was the question local residents hoped to answer Saturday during Ribs and Relics, the Sutter County Museum's newest event and fundraiser.

Reminiscent of PBS's Antiques Roadshow, the Aug. 8 event gave attendees an opportunity to bring in treasured family heirlooms, collectibles and curiosities to learn more about their history — and what they might be worth on today's market.

Professional appraiser Erin Dewell spent the afternoon examining items brought in by guests. Dewell, who is based in Paradise, has more than 15 years of experience appraising personal and business property and provides services throughout the

greater Northern Valley.

For \$5 per item, or \$20 for five items, guests could receive an informal appraisal while learning more about the objects they had brought with them. Dewell said knowing the value of certain belongings can be important for reasons beyond simple curiosity, particularly when it comes to insurance coverage. She noted that many standard homeowners insurance policies place limits on categories such as jewelry, fine art, firearms, coins, stamps and other collectibles, meaning particularly valuable possessions may need to be separately documented or itemized.

"It's always a great thing to reach out and talk with your insurance provider," Dewell said. "If you have jewelry or fine art, it's not unreasonable to talk to your insurance

Sam Brannan Park to Close Amid Safety Concerns

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sam Brannan Park is expected to temporarily close beginning Sept. 1 as Yuba City officials move to address escalating public safety, drug use and homelessness-related concerns at the city's largest community park.

The Yuba City City Council considered the closure during a special meeting Aug. 12, with city staff recommending the temporary shutdown along with up to \$265,000 for environmental remediation, security improvements and other work at the 8.51-acre park on Gray Avenue.

According to a city staff report, conditions at Sam Brannan Park have deteriorated in recent years, with officials citing the prolonged presence of transients and drug users as a primary contributing

factor. City officials said the conditions have affected safety, cleanliness and public perception of the park, leading some families to seek recreational opportunities elsewhere.

The concerns have also generated a significant response from local law enforcement. Between Jan. 1 and May 31, the Yuba City Police Department responded to 139 incidents at or near Sam Brannan Park, according to information included in the staff report. The majority involved traffic stops,

Yuba County Confirms First West Nile Case

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County has confirmed its first human case of West Nile virus this year as mosquito control officials warn of a high risk of infection across Yuba and Sutter counties. Yuba County Public Health announced Aug. 14 that the patient was briefly hospitalized and has since recovered.

The case comes as neighboring Butte County deals with increased West Nile activity, including its first virus-related death of the year. Butte County Public Health announced Aug. 13 that a person between 80 and 90 years old died from complications related to West Nile virus.

Mosquito control officials said surveillance in Yuba and Sutter counties shows increased virus activity and detections.

"We continue to see increased virus activity and detections in our surveillance system. The risk for human infection is high," Sutter-Yuba Mosquito and Vector Control District Manager Stephen Abshier said. "Residents need to remain vigilant in protecting themselves from being bitten by mosquitoes."

West Nile virus activity typically occurs from June through October. Mosquitoes become infected after feeding on infected birds and can transmit the virus to people and animals through their bites.

"The best way to prevent West Nile virus infection is to avoid mosquito bites," Yuba County interim Public Health Officer Dr. Jarett Beaudoin said. "We want to remind everyone to stay protected by wearing long pants and long sleeves, especially at dawn and dusk when mosquito activity is high, and by wearing an effective mosquito repellent."

Most people infected with West Nile virus do not develop symptoms. About one in five develop mild to moderate illness that can include fever, fatigue and body aches. Fewer than one in 150 develop severe neurological illness such as encephalitis or meningitis. Severe cases can result in lasting disability or death.

Officials recommend residents follow the "Three Ds" to reduce their risk: use an EPA-registered mosquito repellent such as one containing DEET, take precautions during dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active and drain standing water where mosquitoes can breed.

Residents should regularly check flowerpots,

agent about whether or not you're covered."

Organizers said approximately 140 people attended the event, with 101 items appraised throughout the afternoon. Ribs and Relics raised approximately \$1,700 for the Sutter County Museum, with organizers hoping to build on the event in future years.

"This was like a mini fundraiser," Museum Director Molly Bloom said. "Its been fun and there definitely seems to be an interest. Every time we hold an event we get the opportunity to learn what works and how to improve future programs."

Bloom was not only one of the event's organizers but also a participant, bringing in several heirlooms from her husband's family for Dewell to examine. Among them was a painting depicting a sailboat at night by an unknown artist. Although the piece ultimately did not turn out to have significant monetary value, Dewell praised its composition and detail.

"It's a very nice scene," Dewell said. "You've got this great foreground where you're pulled in with the boat, but then it projects you way out past and beyond with the moon. There's a lot of detail in there."

For others, the afternoon was less about discovering a hidden fortune and more about learning about pieces of their family history. Barbara Hankins brought in several items connected to her husband's

great-grandfather, a Meridian-area doctor, including an antique medical diploma and medical tools that had remained in

the family for generations.

"I'm really glad we were able to get some clarity on some of our items. A very neat event," Hankins said. ★

Fifth Street Train Tressel Raises Safety Questions

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The death of a 13-year-old girl who fell from the railroad trestle near the Fifth Street Bridge on Aug. 9 has raised questions among community members about access to the structure and its future.

Marysville police confirmed the death of the 13-year-old following the Sunday evening incident. Emergency crews were dispatched to the area shortly after 9 p.m., according to scanner traffic, after receiving reports that a girl had fallen from the railroad trestle to the ground below. Police did not publicly release the girl's name. In the days following the accident, however, family members, friends and public fundraising efforts identified her as Alina Lynn.

In the aftermath of the accident, discussion surrounding the railroad trestle has emerged among

local residents, with some questioning whether additional barriers or other measures could be used to discourage people from accessing the structure.

The trestle runs adjacent to the Fifth Street Bridge corridor between Marysville and Yuba City and has been identified in previous reporting as Union Pacific Railroad property. The Territorial Dispatch reached out to Union Pacific seeking

confirmation of ownership, information about access to the structure and whether any additional safety measures are being considered following the fatality. Union Pacific was not available for comment as of press time Friday, Aug. 14.

Yuba College Theatre to Hold Auditions for ‘The Hypocrite/Tartuffe’

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba College Theatre is looking for actors to take on one of theatre’s most notorious hyp-ocrites this fall, as auditions open later this month for Molière’s “The Hypocrite/Tartuffe.” Auditions for the classic comedy will be held at 6 p.m. Aug. 25 and 26 at Yuba College Theatre, with callbacks scheduled for 6 p.m. Aug. 27.

The production will also mark a first for director Conrad Cecil, a Yuba College theatre faculty member who has previously worked with productions at the college as an acting and vocal coach and in associate and co-directing roles. “The Hypocrite” will be his first time taking the helm of a full Yuba College Theatre production.

Using Christopher Hampton’s translation of Molière’s “Tartuffe,” the comedy follows Orgon, a successful businessman in the grip of a midlife crisis who falls under the influence of Tartuffe, a charismatic grifter masquerading as a deeply religious man. Before long, Tartuffe has maneuvered his way into Orgon’s home, secured his daughter’s hand in marriage and gained control of the family property — all while attempting to seduce Orgon’s wife, Elmire. Elmire, however, is no fool. With the help of the sharp-eyed Dorine, the women begin working to expose Tartuffe before he can completely dismantle the family.

Cecil has described the comedy as “a play about outwitting the boogeyman,” with the production leaning into the story’s themes of deception, hypocrisy and misplaced trust. For the Yuba College production, Cecil is transporting the 17th-century French comedy to the 1980s — an era of televangelism, conspicuous wealth and, naturally, plenty of shoulder pads.

Though this will be Cecil’s first full directing assignment at Yuba College Theatre, he brings a lengthy professional career in acting and directing to the production. Born and raised in England,

Cecil is a classically trained actor who studied at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and King’s College London and trained as an actor at East 15 Acting School. He later lived in Paris, where he ran a theatre company and performed in both French and

English. His film credits include “Female Agents,” alongside Sophie Marceau; “The Silence of Joan,” with Liam Cunningham and Clémence Poésy; and “Requiem for a Killer.” His stage work includes Shakespearean roles such as Richard II, Benedick in “Much Ado About Nothing” and Prince Hal in “Henry IV, Part I.” Cecil has also directed at Sutter Street Theatre in Folsom and currently teaches acting at Yuba College.

Auditions are open to both Yuba College students and members of the surrounding community, and actors do not need to currently be enrolled at the college to try out. The theatre is seeking performers with playing ages ranging from approximately 18 to 50 and older. Some roles have already been precast.

Roles currently being sought include Madame Pernelle, Orgon’s mother; Elmire, Orgon’s wife; Damis and Mariane, Orgon’s children; Cleante, Orgon’s brother-in-law; Dorine, Mariane’s outspoken maid; M. Loyal, a bailiff; a police officer; Flipotte, Madame Pernelle’s servant; and additional ensemble performers. The production is also looking for backstage participants, including a stage manager, assistant stage manager and stage crew. Those cast in the production will be required to enroll in the appropriate Yuba College theatre production course.

security checks, transient-related incidents, illegal camping, suspicious persons, disturbances and narcotics-related activity. Approximately 18 incidents resulted in arrests, while two resulted in formal crime reports.

From January through July, officers also responded to four overdose-related calls at the park, including one that resulted in a death inside a park bathroom. During a focused enforcement operation June 20, the department’s Special Investigations Unit and Homeless Liaison Officer conducted 20 traffic stops and field contacts, made eight arrests, conducted seven searches and issued two citations.

Concerns have extended to nearby Gray Avenue Middle School. Information provided by the Yuba City Unified School District cited ongoing illegal drug use and paraphernalia found throughout the park, including needles and pipes. The district also reported that students have encountered people using drugs before and after school and have been exposed to suspected drug transactions, aggressive behavior, fights and other concerning activity.

City parks staff have also reported routinely removing abandoned property, litter, human and animal waste, needles and drug paraphernalia, while responding to vandalism and maintaining park restrooms. The additional work has strained a Parks Maintenance division already reduced by three positions, leaving nine employees responsible for maintaining 17 city parks in addition to other landscaping duties. According to the report, reservations at Sam Brannan Park have declined by approximately 50% as conditions at the park have changed.

As part of the proposed remediation plan, the city intends to install security cameras, electronic gate access and fencing around the park. Preliminary plans included in the council packet show an 8-foot-tall steel security fence with pedestrian and vehicle gates. The estimated project cost is approximately \$230,000 to \$265,000. A preliminary cost breakdown estimates about \$132,000 for fencing, \$40,000 for a powered sliding gate, \$25,000 for an additional sliding gate along Gray Avenue and \$25,000 for lighting repairs and installation, along with cameras, card readers, signage and other equipment.

The temporary closure would apply to the general public, with limited exceptions, and would be reevaluated every 90 days. Before enforcement of the closure begins, the city’s Homeless Outreach Team and local service providers are expected to conduct outreach to individuals at the park, offering resources including shelter options, mental health services, substance abuse counseling and transitional housing placement.

Once remediation work is completed and the park reopens, city staff are proposing greater restrictions on access. General park use would remain reservation-based, while individuals using amenities including the pickleball and bocce ball courts and skate park would be required to obtain an access card through the city’s Recreation Department. City officials said the goal of the closure and improvements is to restore Sam Brannan Park as a safe and welcoming recreational space for residents while addressing conditions that have increasingly strained police, fire and parks resources. ★

Watermelon Festival Kicks-off Aug. 28

Farm-fresh watermelons will also be available for purchase for \$5 each. Parking and admission are free throughout the festival. Saturday and Sunday activities will include live music, line dancing

Plumas Lake Artist Earns Fellowship

PLUMAS LAKE, CA (MPG) - Plumas Lake artist Seon-Young Jeong has been selected for an Upstate Individual Artists Fellowship for her work preserving and teaching Minhwa, a traditional form of Korean art.

One of 15 artists selected from 243 applicants across Northern California for the 2026 fellowship, Jeong received the fellowship in the program’s Emerging tier, which includes a \$5,000 unrestricted award for her work in visual arts.

“For years, I have dedicated my practice to preserving and teaching the intricate beauty and symbolism of traditional Korean Minhwa art, while connecting with our Northern California community,” Jeong said.

Her work focuses on maintaining traditional techniques and materials while bringing elements of Minhwa into contemporary art. Jeong also shares the Korean art form locally through workshops, classes and exhibitions.

“Receiving this fellowship provides vital support that allows me to deepen my creative practice, expand my series of works, and continue sharing this rich cultural heritage through local workshops, classes, and exhibitions,” Jeong said.

The Upstate Individual Artists Fellowship supports artists and culture bearers working throughout a 19-county region of Northern California. Nevada County Arts & Culture administers the program in partnership with the California Arts Council.

Recipients work in visual, performing, literary, media, traditional and Indigenous arts. Organizers selected this year’s recipients through a multi-round peer review process.

Sofia Vivanco Airaghi, grants manager for the fellowship, said the 243 applications demonstrated the range of artists working throughout Northern California.

“Evaluating these applications through a rigorous peer review process revealed the sheer depth, diversity, and resilience of Northern California’s artistic

workforce,” Airaghi said.

For Jeong, the fellowship also provides an opportunity to continue exploring how a traditional Korean art form can find a place in contemporary work and within the local community.

“I am deeply honored to be recognized alongside such a talented group of regional creators,” Jeong said. “This support allows me to bridge traditional and contemporary art by bringing the techniques, materials, and rich symbolism of traditional Minhwa into a modern context.”

Jeong said she plans to continue researching traditional methods and materials while developing her own work and introducing Minhwa to others in the area.

“Through continued research into these traditional methods and materials, I look forward to furthering my personal artistic growth while introducing the beauty of Minhwa to our local community,” she said.

Study: Napa Wine Compliance Costs Near 18% of Production

Regulatory compliance costs add nearly \$24 to every case of wine produced and sold by a small Napa County winery, accounting for about 17.5% of production costs, according to a new study examining the cumulative impact of federal, state and local regulations on the wine industry. The report, released in July by Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, is the second installment of a broader study commissioned by the Napa County Farm Bureau. Part 1, released earlier this year, found regulatory compliance costs accounted for about 8% of production costs for a small Napa County vineyard and nearly 12.5% for a large vineyard. The new report, authored by Cal Poly agribusiness professors Lynn Hamilton and Michael McCullough, shifts the focus from vineyards to wineries. “This study is the first of its kind to document regulatory costs of a Napa County winery as well as any type of alcoholic beverage production,” the authors wrote.

Feds Release Colorado River Framework for Next 10 years

After their big crop in 2025, California growers of processing tomatoes are harvesting fewer acres this season. Higher inventories of tomato products and decreased sales led California tomato processors to cut how many acres they want growers to plant this year, with contracted acres at their lowest in more than 30 years. The hope is that the reduced acreage will allow inventory levels to come into balance with market demands, said

Mike Montna, president and CEO of the California Tomato Growers Association. “It’s going to take a couple of years,” he said, adding that the industry has “turned the corner” on slower sales. Unusually warm weather in March accelerated plant growth, leading to an earlier start to harvest this year. Growers with later plantings expect to finish harvest by the end of October. Fresno County grower Don Cameron described the quality of his crop as good, with yields exceeding his contracted amount. But with months of harvest left, Montna said weather could still impact the crop.

Tomato Variety Key to Controlling Fusarium Stem Rot

Fusarium stem rot and decline, commonly known as FRD, affects the water- and nutrient-carrying vascular portions of processing tomato plant stems and canopies. Eventually, vines begin to decline, collapsing and exposing the fruit to the sun, leading to potential sunburn. As experts learn more about the relatively new fungal disease, they say variety selection is key to reducing potential yield losses. Crop rotation and equipment sanitation also are important in managing fusarium stem rot and decline, though to lesser extents. “I think the variety and sanitation would be my top priorities,” said Brenna Aegerter, University of California Cooperative Extension vegetable crops farm adviser who serves San Joaquin County. Rotating to a nonhost crop can help reduce the pathogen in the soil, but she said it’s not too popular because many of the alternatives are unprofitable. ★

tires, rain gutters, pet bowls and other containers that can collect water. For water that cannot be drained, including fountains and ponds, officials recommend mosquito-to-control products or mosquitofish that feed on mosquito larvae.

The Sutter-Yuba Mosquito and Vector Control District plans to continue trapping and testing mosquitoes, conducting disease surveillance and treating areas with high West Nile activity using truck-mounted foggers. Residents can find planned spray areas and a surveillance map showing West Nile-positive dead birds, mosquito collections and sentinel chickens at <http://sutter-yubamvcd.org>.

Gay Bar Data Harvesting Cameras Mark Turning Sentiment

The last few weeks have seen some amazing instances of a growing policy problem that you face, whether you want to face it or not, just because you have a face.

The most interesting episode was the Gay tracking feature discovered at a group of San Francisco Gay bars that installed PatronScan Guard+ systems (ID scanners + cameras that photograph patrons and collect personal data like names, addresses, genders, and behavior notes).

The customers revolted. The data could be retained and shared across a network of venues using the system for blacklisting problem patrons.

In Chico, the Police Chief apologized that the Flock Camera Data had been shared with other agencies because one of the privacy settings was off.

It’s not just the government. Private businesses that take pictures of your face, record what you say and where you go, all claim that the data is not shared, protected, or “encrypted.” The fundamental problem is they all lie, and the data miners are getting what they want every time.

One Gay privacy advocate noted that PatronScan does allow you to have your personal information removed from their system... if you go to their website and fill out a form, and the website, yep, it tracks who visits there. It is as if no one has ever heard about what happened to

the Jews in Europe, the Native Americans, and Blacks in the 1940s when Eugenacists would run for County Clerk or Commissioner of Health to add “non-white” information to their list of families that were of “mixed race”. Like Christians in Iraq and Lebanon, who were put on “the list” before their houses were bulldozed.

Driving by Rear View Mirror

A friend came to me last week and asked me for some retirement advice. He had inherited a substantial sum of money a few years back and had invested it in Treasury bills (T-bills). He told me he avoided putting money in the stock market as he didn’t want to risk losing any of it. Seeing the stock market climb the proverbial wall of worry and missing out, he now was considering investing some of it in the S&P 500 stock market. I do not know how he came to pick the S&P, but the jest of the consideration was that he could have made more money in the market versus the 3 plus annual percent he had made in the T-bills.

Hindsight is perfect vision of course. Mr. Market relishes sucking in the people experiencing FOMO (fear of missing out) and then reversing direction, taking investors’ money with it. Not that it is a foregone the market will correct at any particular moment, but many investors tell the story of having invested in an ongoing stock market rally only to see the market reverse seemingly in response to their investing.

Obviously, the market is not some evil being, with cognitive intelligence, that moves down on purpose in response to you putting your money in it. But to more than a few investors, it may seem that way.

There is a reason, however, some investors fall victim to the painful whiplash of having just put money in stocks only to see the market crash soon after.

The casual investor knows little about how the markets work as it relates to the historical patterns and causations of stock market rallies and corrections.

Professional investors are aware of certain tendencies that increase or decrease the odds of severe market corrections.

In contrast, the mom and pop investor often arrives at the familiar “gut feeling” as to where the market might go by looking in the proverbial rear-view mirror.

For example, they may see a market run for several months or even years and become convinced that conditions are favorable for a continuation. Or they may see rampant fear and negative sentiment about the market or the world in general on the evening news and conclude they should sell all their stocks and go to cash.

That feeling they have may be completely opposite of what is really happening in the investing environment. What may actually be occurring is that the investor is looking at what *HAS ALREADY HAPPENED* and not what might happen.

Markets tend to move in anticipation of

what will happen and not what just happened. Perhaps what just happened was an economic slowdown and the mood of society is downtrodden and depressed. An investor may look around and see this negativity in the general public and conclude the market will continue down and avoid investing in stocks. The reality could be the economy WAS in a recession but is now ready to recover and reignite a boom both in the economy and the market. Although the general public’s mood is depressed at this point in time, the market at that moment could be reflecting that fact but *may be ready to move* up as the economy recovers.

Market professionals know that markets can anticipate a recovery although the current public mood might be depressed. The mom-and-pop investor reacts to what they see at that moment and cannot imagine anything will change in the near future.

Whereas the professional looks at what happened and then what might happen, the mom and pop see what is happening and concludes it will continue to happen.

In the case of my friend, he only sees a market that continues up and concludes it will not change. The truth might be the market has run so far, it may be overextended or “tired”, as market professionals say. Tired markets are thought to have sucked in all the buyers (and their money) and therefore there may be few investors left to buy.

In conclusion, I did make recommendations to my friend but those recommendations took into consideration the markets previous movement and the possibility that the current trend may be exhausting itself based on historical precedents, the current macro conditions as I see them and yes, a sprig of gut feeling of not only what has happened, but based on my being in the market close to 50 years, what also may happen in the days and weeks to come.

Sutter County Rejects Part of Grand Jury Recommendation

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sutter County will not adopt a Grand Jury proposal seeking more documentation of how the Agricultural Commissioner determines pesticide fines.

The Sutter County Board of Supervisors approved its response to the 2025-26 Grand Jury report Aug. 11, accepting one proposed change involving pesticide penalties while rejecting another as unnecessary.

The Grand Jury called on the Agricultural Department to establish a clear standard for assessing fines and document how the specific penalty is selected on each Notice of Proposed Action, or NOPA. The changes were recommended for completion by Jan. 31, 2027.

County Administrator Steven Smith said the department already meets the first requirement. Each notice identifies the facts supporting the classification of the violation and the penalty imposed, including the severity of actual or potential effects and the respondent's compliance history.

The county drew the line at creating an additional process for documenting how a specific penalty is chosen.

“The second part of the recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted,” Smith said. “It’s not that we disregard the intent or the recommendation of the grand jury.”

Smith said pesticide laws and regulations do not require the additional step because each violation is unique and several factors can affect the penalty, including the seriousness of the actual or potential effects and the violator’s compliance history.

The issue also comes as California considers changes to pesticide enforcement rules. Smith said Agricultural Commissioner Lisa Herbert noted that the California Department of Pesticide Regulation issued proposed regulatory changes June 12 that would revise enforcement responses used by county agricultural commissioners when violations occur. The state proposal is intended

to improve the effectiveness and clarity of those regulations.

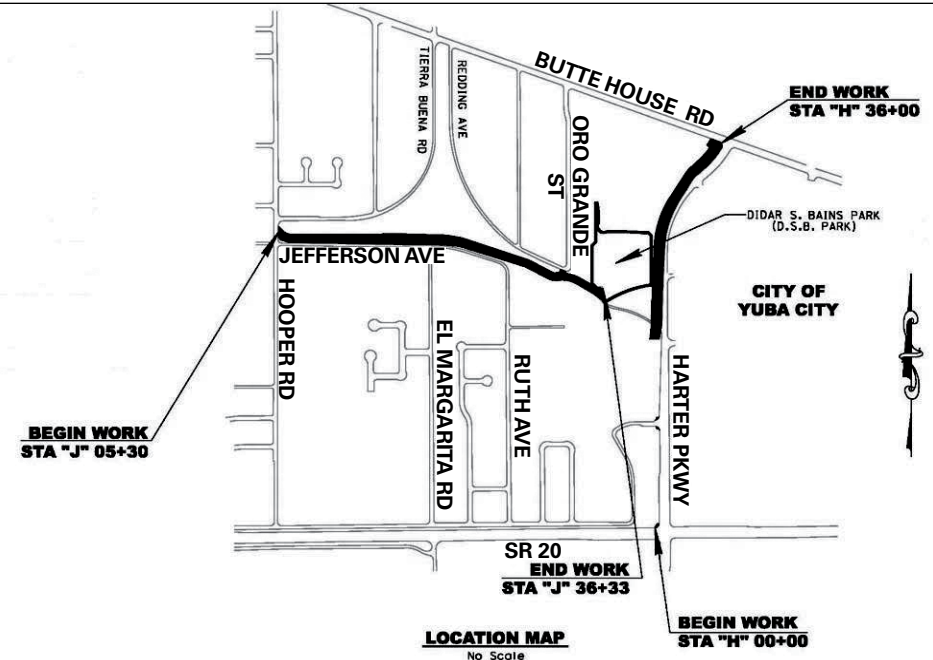
A separate Grand Jury finding concerned how work is assigned within the Agricultural Department. Jurors called on department leaders to follow existing office policies and written duty statements when assigning responsibilities.

Smith said department management reviewed its procedures, employee functions, organizational chart and job descriptions and consulted with Human Resources. The review found existing procedures were being followed and appropriately communicated to employees. He also noted that the Grand Jury did not provide specific examples of duties being improperly assigned.

The annual review also included the Sutter County Jail, where jurors recommended no changes.

Supervisors approved the county’s response without opposition. Board members thanked the Grand Jury for its work and encouraged residents to consider serving on future panels. ★

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Construction is underway on the Sutter Bike Path Gap Connection Project, which will extend the existing bike and pedestrian route toward Harter Parkway and Didar S. Bains Park.

The existing Sutter Bike Path currently ends at Hooper Road. The new segment will continue along the north side of Jefferson Avenue to Harter Parkway, improving connections for pedestrians and cyclists in the area.

Planned improvements include an 8-foot-wide paved bike and pedestrian path, drainage work, new trees and

landscaping, and solar-powered pathway lighting. The project will also complete a 10-foot-wide shared-use sidewalk and ADA-compliant curb ramps along the west side of Harter Parkway between Butte House Road and State Route 20.

According to the City of Yuba City, the project is being funded primarily through the state’s Active Transportation Program and the federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Program, with the city contributing less than 15% of the total project cost.

Yuba County Defends Use of Flock Cameras

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County sheriff's officials are defending their use of automated license plate readers as a valuable crime-fighting tool, pointing to cases ranging from an Olivehurst homicide to narcotics investigations while responding to growing concerns over privacy and oversight.

Yuba County Undersheriff Nick Morawcznski last week gave the Board of Supervisors a detailed presentation on the county's Flock Safety camera network, explaining how it operates, what information it collects and changes the Sheriff's Office has made as concerns about the technology grow nationally.

The county has used Flock since 2022 and currently has 33 cameras positioned along public roadways in unincorporated Yuba County. Other Flock equipment brings the countywide total to 40 cameras, including live-feed cameras used for election security and at the Sycamore Ranch recreation area, with two cameras currently not functioning.

The Flock cameras take still photographs rather than video and use optical character recognition to convert plate numbers into searchable data. The information can be checked against law enforcement databases for stolen vehicles, wanted people and missing or endangered people, but any alert must be verified by dispatchers and deputies before action is taken.

Morawcznski pointed to a 2026 Olivehurst homicide investigation as an example of the system's value. After witnesses provided descriptions of a vehicle leaving the area, a Flock search helped investigators identify the vehicle, its license plate and registered owner within six minutes. The information helped develop suspects in the homicide, including one who was later apprehended at the San Ysidro border crossing while attempting to flee to Mexico.

Morawcznski also described a robbery in which a suspect removed his license plates before committing the crime. Investigators had a description of the vehicle and searched earlier Flock images, finding the same vehicle photographed hours earlier while the plates were still attached. The information helped investigators identify the suspect, who was later apprehended by another agency.

In another case, home surveillance captured the vehicle used in the theft of a child's BMX bicycle but did not provide a readable license plate. A deputy searched Flock images, obtained the plate number and traced the vehicle to a local address, where the bicycle was recovered and returned to its owner.

The system has also been used in narcotics investigations. Morawcznski reported that investigations aided by Flock in 2026 contributed to seizures of more than a kilogram of cocaine, 115 pounds of methamphetamine,

a half-kilogram of heroin and 35,000 fentanyl tablets.

However, the technology has become increasingly controversial. The American Civil Liberties Union has mounted a national campaign against Flock and similar camera networks, arguing that collecting vehicle movements creates a mass-surveillance system capable of revealing where people live, work, worship, obtain medical care or participate in political activity.

California law restricts how Flock information can be used and shared. Under Senate Bill 34, state and local law enforcement agencies may not share information collected by the cameras with federal or out-of-state law enforcement agencies. Morawcznski said Yuba County complies with those restrictions and prohibits searches related to immigration enforcement or reproductive care as outlined in the law. He said the department does share information with participating California law enforcement agencies because suspects and vehicles frequently move between jurisdictions.

Morawcznski said each user must identify a law enforcement purpose before conducting a search and select an offense classification. The Sheriff's Office also requires personnel to identify how the vehicle is connected to an investigation, such as a suspect vehicle, victim vehicle, missing or endangered person, investigative lead or another agency's investigation.

Searchable vehicle data

has been retained for 30 days, Morawcznski said. After that period, investigators can no longer search the captured vehicle information, although records showing that searches were conducted are retained for auditing.

Public scrutiny has already resulted in changes locally.

Morawcznski said public records requests from Yuba County resident Thomas Hammack raised questions about information missing from the Sheriff's Office Flock transparency portal. A subsequent review found that reasons for some searches and offense types were recorded internally but were not appearing publicly.

The Sheriff's Office worked with Flock to change its settings, and the portal now displays a search reason and offense type for each entry.

The review uncovered another problem. Morawcznski said the department found shortcomings in documentation of earlier audits required under its policy. The Sheriff's Office has since reviewed all of its 2025 and 2026 records and plans to continue working backward to the program's 2022 inception.

Hammack remained unconvinced. During public comment at the Aug. 11 meeting, he argued that missing training and audit records exposed the county to potential liability under SB 34 and urged the Board of Supervisors to discontinue the surveillance program rather than attempt to correct its shortcomings.

County counsel disputed Hammack's interpretation of the law, saying the Sheriff's Office is complying with SB 34. Counsel said the department has the required written privacy policy and conducted required public outreach before beginning the program. Counsel also said the law requires training but does not require every training record sought through a Public Records Act request to be maintained.

Morawcznski said the department is also implementing Flock's Audit Assist feature, which can flag unusual search activity for administrators to review, including searches outside normal parameters or activity involving multiple case numbers.

He acknowledged that the technology, like other law enforcement tools, could be abused and said safeguards are necessary.

"Proper checks and balances need to be in place to ensure that those responsibilities are carried out in accordance with the oath that every one of us took to support and defend the Constitution of the United States," Morawcznski said.

Two days after Morawcznski's presentation, Flock announced changes to its nationwide system, including reducing its default data-retention period from 30 days to seven days. The company also announced mandatory automated auditing designed to flag potentially improper searches and plans to require searches to be tied to case information. ★

New Bus Route Connects Williams, Sacramento

WILLIAMS, CA (MPG) - Travelers now have a new direct bus connection to Sacramento International Airport and downtown Sacramento with the launch of an Interstate 5 express route serving communities between Redding and the state capital.

The new Route 5 Gold Runner Thruway service includes two daily round trips with stops in Redding, Red Bluff, Orland, Williams, Sacramento International Airport and Sacramento Valley Station in downtown Sacramento. The Williams stop is at McDonald's, 475 4th St., providing a pickup and drop-off point along Interstate 5.

The service gives Williams passengers another option for reaching Sacramento while also providing connections to Gold Runner and Capitol Corridor trains and Sacramento Regional Transit. Bus-only tickets are available between cities along the route, meaning passengers do not need to purchase a train ticket to use the service.

"Route 5 delivers on a long-standing goal of connecting the North State to the Sacramento region," San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority CEO Chris Orlando said. "This service gives North State residents a direct, reliable connection to Sacramento and the broader passenger rail network."

The San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority and Redding Area Bus Authority launched the route as an alternative to the existing Route 3 service, which travels along the Highway 99 corridor.

For Williams and other communities along Interstate 5, the new route provides direct access to Sacramento International Airport without requiring travelers to first connect through communities along Highway 99.

Passengers traveling north from Williams can reach Orland, Red Bluff and Redding. The Orland stop also connects with Glenn Ride service to Chico.

"Route 5 is the result of years of collaboration and a shared vision to improve regional mobility," Redding Area Bus Authority Interim Transit Manager Zachary Bonnin said. "This new service gives North State residents a faster, more convenient connection to Sacramento, Sacramento International Airport, and California's passenger rail network, expanding access to jobs, education, healthcare, and travel opportunities."

Planning for an Interstate 5 express bus dates to 2017, when the Shasta Regional

Transportation Agency and San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority began developing the service as part of the North State Intercity Bus System.

The agencies took another step toward the service in January 2024, when Route 3 was shortened in Chico and bus-only ticketing became available between Redding and Red Bluff. Redding Area Bus Authority began operating the Redding-to-Chico segment in August 2024 while preparing for the eventual Sacramento connection.

The Shasta Regional Transportation Agency board adopted the North State Intercity Bus to Rail Plan in April 2025, helping clear the way for the Route 5 service.

"Route 5 delivers community-requested connections to larger urban destinations from the north state," SRTA Senior Transportation Planner Jennifer Pollom said.

The organization also offers monthly meetings, rockhounding field trips, classes and access to its rock shop, where members can learn lapidary techniques and create their own jewelry.

Yuba Water Launches Watershed Curriculum

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County students can study chemistry through local waterways and learn about flooding through the county's 1986 and 1997 floods under a new K-12 science curriculum developed by local teachers.

Yuba Water Agency introduced its Yuba River Watershed Curriculum as the new school year begins. The free program includes hundreds of lessons from kindergarten through high school centered on the Yuba River watershed and local water issues.

Dozens of Yuba County teachers developed the curriculum, which Yuba Water funded and coordinated. The lessons cover subjects including water chemistry, flooding, erosion, hydraulic mining and human impacts on water systems.

"It's incredible to see this come together after years of hard work by our teachers, and to be able to give this gift to the community," Yuba Water General Manager Willie Whittlesey said.

Teachers began developing the curriculum in 2020 after

receiving training on creating lessons that align with Next Generation Science Standards. Working in small groups by grade level, they developed units using local watershed topics to teach science concepts.

Over the following two years, teachers refined the lessons, tested them in their classrooms and made changes based on their experiences.

Yuba Water later contracted with Arroyo Research Services, an education consulting firm, to independently review the curriculum and determine whether the units meet or exceed Next Generation Science Standards.

"One of my favorite things about this project is that year after year, the curriculum will build on itself, so that by the time these kids graduate from high school, they will not only have a really solid science education, but also, a deep appreciation of the Yuba River and the benefits that our natural resources bring to this community," said DeDe Cordell, Yuba Water's communications manager and project manager for the curriculum.

An advisory group overseeing

the project included superintendents from all five Yuba County school districts along with representatives from the Yuba County Office of Education, Yuba Community College District, South Yuba River Citizens League and Yuba River Endowment.

The curriculum arrives as Yuba Water reduces some spending following an incident involving its penstock that took much of the agency's hydropower generation offline earlier this year. Whittlesey said the curriculum had already received funding before those financial pressures emerged.

"Given the financial impacts of our penstock incident that took much of our hydropower generation offline earlier this year, we're having to cut back on non-mission critical expenses," Whittlesey said. "But this program was funded before the crisis, so it's especially meaningful to be able to give this gift to the community right now."

Sutter County Continues Foster Youth Crisis Services

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sutter County will continue providing around-the-clock crisis support for foster youth and their caregivers through a \$342,220 agreement with Youth for Change.

The Board of Supervisors approved the contract Aug. 11, maintaining the Family Urgent Response System for foster children and youth, former foster youth and caregivers in Sutter and Butte counties through June 30, 2027.

Available 24 hours a day, the program provides immediate assistance when behavioral or emotional problems threaten the stability of a placement. Help begins by telephone, with trained personnel dispatched when an in-person intervention is needed, officials said.

The system is designed to give foster youth and caregivers an alternative to calling law enforcement or going to a hospital emergency department when a crisis develops. Response teams work with families to address the immediate problem while helping identify services that may reduce

the likelihood of another crisis.

During the most recent reporting period, the regional effort handled 14 calls, eight requiring an in-person response. Officials said all 14 situations were stabilized.

The new contract also reflects a change in the regional partnership. Yuba County, which previously participated with Sutter and Butte counties, is now operating independently. Youth for Change will continue serving the remaining two counties.

California established the Family Urgent Response System to provide current and former foster youth and their caregivers with immediate, trauma-informed assistance. The statewide initiative is intended to help families resolve urgent problems and reduce disruptions that can result in children being moved from one placement to another.

Officials said the \$342,220 contract is supported by state funding designated for the service and carries no additional cost to Sutter County's General Fund.

Supervisors approved the contract as part of the consent calendar without separate discussion.
