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Goodwill Looks to Expand Ahead of SB 707

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Have you ever wondered what really happens to that trash bag of old clothes you dropped off at Goodwill? When an item is donated, it embarks on a journey alongside the thousands of other items that are donated each day. From sorting to pricing to being placed on the floor for sale, donations undergo a process that operates like a well-oiled machine and provides hundreds of employment opportunities along the way.

A 107,000-square-foot facility in West Sacramento at 3689 Industrial Blvd. functions as the distribution and processing center for the Sacramento Valley and Northern Nevada region. The site includes a warehouse, retail store and Goodwill outlet, commonly known as the “bins.” When stores across the region reach inventory capacities, overflow goods are shipped to the West Sacramento facility. At the same time, stores lacking inventory in certain departments such as books or winter clothing can put in a request to receive more inventory from West

Sacramento. “We re-allocate products to where they are needed,” said Adrian Quintero, community engagement manager for the region. Cold climate items often go up north to Truckee and Lake Tahoe. Quintero said the facility sees a steady stream of new inventory. In the past, donations followed faster-paced seasons, such as spring cleaning and college move-out, followed by slower periods. That pattern has not continued in recent years, and clothing continues to be the largest category of items donated. *Continued on page 3*

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A new beginning for one of West Sacramento’s oldest parks is finally here. The City of West Sacramento broke ground on the Bryte Park Improvements Project on Aug. 20, making way for major renovations that will expand recreation opportunities and create new spaces for residents and families. A \$64 million-plus investment will reshape the 24.5-acre park to provide more ways for residents

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Council Responds to Residents’ Complaints about Transparency, Leadership

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The City Council took the unusual step at its Aug. 19 meeting of pulling a number of items from its Consent Agenda for additional discussion — a decision that came after residents expressed frustration with a perceived lack of transparency and representation on the part of the council on community issues. While it’s not unusual for council to pull items from the Consent Agenda for further discussion and at times separate votes, what was unusual was the number of items. A total of six of the 15 items were set aside for discussion, although none were voted on separately and none recommended for tabling to a later meeting. Nine residents addressed council during the public comment period early in the meeting, with almost all vocalizing frustration about council actions affecting them in some way. Several had personal matters they were unhappy with but six took aim at what they claim are council members and city staff not listening to their concerns about city issues. Several residents of the Broderick and Bryte area in District 1 in northern West Sacramento complained about a lack of access to council leadership and that their representative, Councilwoman Norma Alcalá, has been bypassed several times for the opportunity to serve as Mayor Pro Tem. Alcalá was elected in 2020 and reelected in 2024 and has yet to serve in that function. The Mayor Pro Tem serves as the presiding officer at council meetings where the mayor cannot attend. According to the city’s Municipal Code, “the presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the city council by any member.” During Alcalá’s tenure on the council, former Councilman

new natural grass field space, all-weather sports field, three natural grass ball fields, outdoor amphitheater, shaded gathering areas and plenty of spaces for community activities.

“Bryte Park has been the heart of the northern side of West Sacramento for generations,” said Mayor Martha Guerrero. “For years, residents have asked to have their community pool restored and for Bryte Park to be retrofitted with the same modernized amenities as other parks, and we are fulfilling that long-standing request. As West Sacramento continues to grow, this investment will create more opportunities for our

children to play, families to gather, athletes to compete, and residents of all ages to enjoy a welcoming and vibrant Bryte Park for generations to come.”

The city will plant 216 new trees and more than 7,900 shrubs and ground-cover plants, along with nearly nine acres of new natural grass field space. Wood from trees removed to accommodate the new pool, fields and infrastructure will be repurposed into benches and other park features across the city, creating a connection between the park’s history and the city.

The project is supported in part by \$15 million in federal funding through the National Park Service’s

Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership Grant

Program. The nationally competitive program supports the development and renovation of public parks and outdoor recreation spaces in urban communities.

“My priority is delivering tangible federal investments where they will make a meaningful difference,” said Congresswoman Matsui. “Parks are critical pieces of a healthy, connected neighborhood. That’s why I’m proud to have worked side by side with the City of West Sacramento to secure over \$15 million from the National Park Service and an additional \$750,000 through HUD to build a gathering space families will use for years to come.”

“California State Parks is proud to provide grant funding to help transform Bryte Park into a vibrant community gathering space for West Sacramento, which is in lockstep with the Newsom administration’s Outdoors for All initiative,” said State Parks Director Armando

Quintero. “This project is a perfect example of how State Parks continues to expand recreational opportunities and improve quality of life in thousands of communities across California through our Office of Grants and Local Services.”

In addition to this grant, Yolo County contributed \$2.49 million of American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) funding for the project.

“I am grateful to the community members, local leaders, and our state and federal partners who worked together to make this project possible,” said Yolo County District 3 Supervisor Mary Vixie Sandy. “After years of planning, it is exciting to see it finally become a reality, with significant improvements residents will be able to enjoy for years to come.”

Yolo County District 1 Supervisor Oscar Villegas said, “The much-anticipated Bryte Park makeover will once again turn our park into a place that the community can be proud of for years

to come. As a kid growing up playing at Bryte Park, it’s wonderful to know that future generations will enjoy all the modern amenities that this park will offer.”

Additional funding for the project came from: \$1.5 million of General Fund Specified Grant Projects Program funding from the California Natural Resources Agency; and \$185,000 from the Buena Vista Rancheria Community Fund.

The city has also worked with Washington Unified School District to advance the project and support long-term public access to the site.

Construction is anticipated to continue through 2029. During construction, portions of the park will be closed as work progresses. The city will continue to share information about construction activities, park access and project milestones with the community online. ★

Potentially adding on to this influx of inventory is the passing of Senate Bill 707 (SB 707), or the Responsible Textile Recovery Act of 2024, which establishes stewardship programs for unsold items including clothing. Under the bill, apparel and textile producers selling in California must join an approved Producer Responsibility Organization (PRO) to manage the recycling of goods.

Landbell USA was approved by CalRecycle as the official PRO for the law, with Goodwill acting as a partner. The bill went into effect in January 2025, but regulations have been slowly rolling out across the state.

Bryan Wagner, the president and CEO of Goodwill Industries of Sacramento Valley & Northern Nevada, Inc. does not expect a significant increase in items due to the bill. However, due to an overall increase in items, the company is considering expanding its West Sacramento facility, according to Quintero. Obtaining a warehouse in the Natomas area is another option.

The influx in items has

also been fueled by the popularity of thrifting and reselling items on platforms such as Depop.

One shopper at the bins, Joseph, who asked not to share his last name, said he got into the hobby because he loved thrifting with his girlfriend.

Other resellers utilize Goodwill's e-commerce

network, ShopGoodwill.com, which sells items through an auctioning process. Items of higher value including electronics, instruments and collectibles are separated in the warehouse and listed on the site. Quintero said he recently utilized the site to purchase Pokémon trading cards

for his sons.

Also unique to the West Sacramento facility are the bulk pallets made up of miscellaneous that did not sell in the retail store or in the outlet. These pallets are sometimes purchased by individuals looking to sell items in other countries including in South America,

Quintero said. They can also be purchased on ShopGoodwill.com where they are listed for a minimum bid of \$101.

Aside from potential warehouse expansion, Goodwill Industries in the Sacramento region is looking to expand its home pickup services and veteran outreach. The nonprofit

is also working closely with the Sacramento Association of Realtors and the National Association of Hispanic Real Estate Professionals (NAHREP) to establish programs for new-home buyers and senior care facilities.

Here Comes Darius

The past five NBA drafts have witnessed the Sacramento Kings draft none other than four-point guards.

In 2024 the Kings drafted inexplicably an injured Devin Carter who managed to play a staccato half season that never allowed Sacramento to see who they had really drafted.

At the time of the 2024 draft the Kings were in sore need of front court help to support Domantas Sabonis and already had perhaps the best backup point guard in the NBA in Davion Mitchell.

The Kings had DeArron Fox coming off an all-star year and only getting better year over year, leading the team at the point guard position, so imagine the collective surprise of Sacramento fans when the Kings drafted another point guard.

When Fox went down with a hand injury during Mitchell’s rookie year, Davion not only assumed 38 minutes of work per game but scored 18.6 points per game while adding an eye popping 8.9 assists.

But regardless of what Mitchell accomplished at either end of the floor, the Sacramento Kings never bought into this 6-foot player that had a history of winning, coming off an NCAA championship with Baylor and winning the Naismith defensive player of the year. That garnished him the ninth overall pick in the NBA draft by the Kings, but the question remains if you drafted this already accomplished point guard, why didn’t you use him effectively?

In perhaps one of the worst NBA trades ever, Davion Mitchell was traded along with Sasha Vezenkov and a second-round pick to the Toronto Raptors on June 28, 2024, for Jalen McDaniels. Standing at 6-foot-nine, Jalen was acquired to shore up the front line, but never survived the preseason, playing in only a total of two games. Today Jalen is playing for the Kobe Storks of the Japanese B league.

Mitchell went on to start for the Toronto Raptors and is currently the starting point guard for the Miami Heat.

If this walk down memory lane leaves you gaping in wonder, you’re not alone. Judging talent has been perhaps the No. 1 weakness of the Sacramento franchise, and the real question

now that the Kings have hired a new GM in Scott Perry, is it going to change?

The Kings were not finished drafting point guards, and drafted Nique Clifford with the 24th overall pick. Last season Nique posted 8.6 points per game with 3.8 rebounds and a tepid 2.4 assists while playing 25 minutes per game. Whether used as a point guard or at the No. 2 position Sacramento was lauded his virtues, but fans are still waiting to see something to go with that.

Finally, welcome Darius Acuff Jr., who by all accounts appears to be the genuine article.

If I have one concern it would be his age of only 19, and the fact that Sacramento seems to be bent on starting this young player from the get-go.

Having a capable veteran player to introduce Acuff to the position of NBA point guard would be my desire, and not pursuing Russell Westbrook as soon as the season concluded was a big mistake. Westbrook, a sure-fire hall-of-famer certainly felt a level of disrespect not being courted after having a stellar 2024-25 season for the Kings and is exactly what the team needs to give young Acuff some breathing room.

If not Westbrook, is there someone that could fill the order and give Acuff a feeling that training wheels are in place as he learns the position?

Finally, can the Sacramento Kings put the point guard position in the done column? I certainly hope so and Darius has my full support.

Someone flying under the radar but needs attention is the 45th pick overall, Emmanuel Sharpe. Sharpe was by far the most impressive player in this year’s draft for the Kings and played both ends of the court like a veteran in the summer league.

I hope the Kings organization is already using their imagination as to how they can get this young rookie 20 plus minutes per game, because I believe that Sacramento has stumbled onto a diamond in the rough!

Stay tuned Kings fans, because the starting lineup is not yet set.

Let’s see what a healthy Domantas Sabonis, Zach Lavine and Keegan Murray can achieve with these young rookies!

California’s Clashes Over Business Regulation

Rage on as Legislative Session Nears End

The state Capitol’s most enduring conflict pits corporate California against four powerful interest groups over new regulations, taxes, minimum wages or other costly mandates.

The specific issues may vary from year to year, although some continue for decades, but the underlying clash of interests is perpetual.

The four groups arrayed against business — unions, personal injury lawyers, consumer advocates and environmentalists — contend their bills are needed to protect consumers, workers or the environment. Business executives see them as driving higher operational costs that threaten companies’ profitability or even existence.

As the Legislature approaches the August 31 adjournment of its two-year session, some of the bills arising from the conflict are still pending, and the contending forces are applying maximum pressure to affect the outcomes.

One example is Assembly Bill 2564, carried by Assemblymember Christopher Ward, a San Diego Democrat, on behalf of unions, consumer groups and advocates for the poor.

It would prohibit retailers from engaging in “surveillance pricing,” which is a form of algorithmic pricing

in which sellers use personal information to tailor prices to specific consumers.

Backers of the bill say it’s needed to avoid discrimination, while retailers say the measure could eliminate coupons and other forms of price discounts for loyal customers, thus raising the cost of living in an already expensive state.

The most important measure still pending in the Legislature, at least from the standpoint of California’s overall business climate, is Assembly Bill 1776, authored by Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, a Democrat from Davis.

It would broaden California’s anti-monopoly Cartwright Act, first enacted in 1907 to allow civil or criminal actions against corporations that monopolize markets.

The Cartwright Act, which has been amended several times since its enactment, resembles the federal Sherman Antitrust Act in several regards but is broader in its reach. It still is aimed at collusion between two or more corporations to stifle competition and raise prices. But AB 1776 would also sanction actions against corporations that become dominant without colluding.

The change was recommended by the California Law Revision Commission to curb monopolistic behavior framers of the original law never envisioned. It is backed by a long list of consumer advocates and unions.

Business interests led by the California Chamber of Commerce see it as opening the door to lawsuits that would penalize corporations for earning market shares honorably vis-à-vis long-established practices.

Until a few days ago, the bill also would have allowed lawyers to instigate lawsuits on their own, a provision known as “private right of action,” which opponents found particularly onerous. That provision was removed after the bill narrowly passed the Assembly and moved to the Senate floor, thus limiting its enforcement to the attorney general or local prosecutors.

The California Chamber of Commerce is still steadfastly opposed. It contends the bill still allows crack-downs on corporations that are just operating normally, penalizing them for success in gaining substantial market power.

“The author and sponsors of AB 1776 have never brought forward specific, real-world examples of the behavior they are seeking to change,” Chamber spokesperson John Myers said in a statement. “That’s why we’ve often seen this as a ‘solution in search of a problem,’ the kind of fundamental flaw that makes legislative negotiations extremely difficult, if not impossible.”

Whatever happens on these two bills, and a few others, by Aug. 31, the Capitol’s big game of high-stakes political poker will resume when the Legislature reconvenes in December with some new members and a new governor, who will be inaugurated in January.

Social Security Matters

We Were Bitten by Medicare’s IRMAA

this year; What Should I Do?

Dear Rusty: My wife and I file our taxes jointly. In 2024, I took an IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) which was significantly more than I was required to take. My Medicare premiums were not affected in 2025, and our Social Security payments were not reduced. Then, our joint filing in 2025 kept us below the IRS’ “Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) level. Yet in 2026 our Medicare payments increased and our Social Security payments were reduced.

If my MAGI is below the maximum for 2025, will my regular SS payments/Medicare reductions be restored in 2027? Is there any action I need to take to ensure this will happen, or will our Medicare payments and reduced SS payments be our new norm?

Dear Worried Retiree: FYI, your Medicare

premiums in 2026 were affected by the large RMD you took in 2024, which caused a Medicare provision known as the “Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA)” to apply for 2026. When determining the Medicare Part B premium for next year (each fall), Medicare uses the income you reported to the IRS two years prior to calculate your Medicare Part B (and Part D) premium for upcoming year.

If you exceed the base “IRMAA” income threshold two years ago, then your Medicare premiums for the next year will include a supplemental amount on top of the “standard” Medicare premium for that year. The amount of the supplement depends on how much you exceed the base IRMAA threshold by (FYI, the base IRMAA threshold for 2026 for a married couple filing jointly was \$218,000). If your 2024 income exceeded that initial IRMAA threshold, you paid a higher Medicare premium which also reduced your SS monthly payment (because Medicare is deducted from your SS benefit). IRMAA uses a sliding scale to determine how much

more than the standard Medicare premium you will pay.

However, that will all automatically correct itself going forward. In other words, when determining your premiums for 2027, Medicare will look at your 2025 income. If your 2025 MAGI is less than the base IRMAA threshold, you (and your wife) will both automatically revert to paying the standard 2027 Medicare Part B and Part D premiums. You don’t need to take any action for that to happen; it will all be automatic.

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It’s hard to believe that Kim Jong Un is really this charming. President Trump touted his fond relationship with the North Korean dictator in a Truth Social post calling for scaling back a long-running annual military exercise with the South Koreans.

“Based on my very good relationship with Kim Jong Un,” Trump wrote, “I am not happy with the fact that the United States has, long ago, agreed to participate in Joint Military Exercises with South Korea.” According to Trump, the exercises “send a signal that is totally inappropriate and hostile, to a Country that, as long as Donald J. Trump has been President, has been unthreatening and respectful.” Then he added that South Korea had recently declined to take a role in the Iran war, clearly irking Trump, as he subsequently explained to reporters at the White House.

The joint exercises have been a key element of the U.S.-South Korea military alliance for decades. They are meant to ensure that the two countries are prepared in the event of a North Korean assault, and perhaps now have an added importance given the experience North Korea has gained in high-intensity modern warfare by bolstering Russian forces in Ukraine.

Much more important than the practical effect of Trump’s fusillade, though,

is the signal it sends, yet again, that he is easily disenchanted with long-time allies whose friendship should be considered a strategic boon to the United States.

Whether musing about making Canada the 51st state, briefly campaigning to take control of Greenland, imposing tariffs on friend and foe alike or hammering NATO, Trump has been careless of the goodwill of our allies.

They need us more than we need them, which means they are willing to put up with a lot, but sowing dissension unnecessarily is a foolhardy game at a time of growing international threats.

South Korea has been a treaty ally since 1953, and is a wealthy, technologically advanced democracy that occupies strategically important ground in Northeast Asia. It is obviously both threatened by and a bulwark against potential North Korean adventurism.

Pete Hegseth visited South Korea last year and said, “Our alliance is stronger than ever before, 72 years strong.” He described the inspiring sight of U.S. and South Korean soldiers standing “shoulder to shoulder working together.” South Korea has been committed to increasing its defense spending to 3.5% of GDP. In light of this, Hegseth subsequently averred, “Model allies that step up, like Israel, South Korea, Poland ... will receive our special favor.”

Such assurances by administration officials are always subject to change, depending on Trump’s

animosities at any given time. It’s certainly true that South Korea owes its existence to us. We fought to preserve its independence at a great cost in blood and treasure during the Korean War, and we have nearly 30,000 troops on the peninsula to deter North Korea from assaulting the South again. Seoul has lent support to recent U.S. military operations, typically in noncombat roles, but it’s understandable that it wouldn’t be enthused about taking part in an Iran war that hasn’t gone as planned and that has no clear endgame.

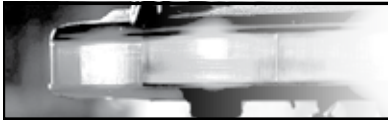
As for the North, it isn’t our friend. It is firmly within the China-Russia axis, and has been developing its nuclear and missile arsenal apace. There is no reason to believe that any blandishments from Trump will change its behavior, and Kim has been clear that the U.S. needs to abandon its “obsession” with denuclearization.

What we most need from South Korea is for it to be as strong as possible to deter North Korea, and we shouldn’t be lending any credence to its claim that U.S.-South Korean exercises are provocations, or sowing doubt about our commitment to allies.

Such diplomatic episodes, though, are an inherent part of Trump’s governance. To paraphrase the Roman writer Publilius Syrus: Prosperity makes friends, adversity tries them, and Trump distresses them -- unnecessarily.

Council Responds to Residents’ Complaints about Transparency, Leadership

Christopher Ledesma served as Mayor Pro Tem in 2021, current Councilwoman Quirina Orozco, first elected in 2016, served in 2022 and 2023 with Councilwoman Danté Early, elected in 2021, serving from March 2024 – January 2025. Current Mayor Pro Tem Councilwoman Verna Sulpizio Hull, elected in 2022, has served since January 2025.

District 1 resident Rhonda Pope Flores said she has addressed council on the absence of Alcala serving in the Pro Tem role several times, saying it is a slight to the residents of District 1. Pope Flores said the district has “had to fight for a lot” from the city over the years but has often been bypassed. “This is not acceptable anymore,” Pope Flores said. “This is not OK. It needs to stop.”

While residents have claimed at past council meetings that District 1 is often ignored for city upgrades, West Sacramento did break ground on Aug. 20 on a \$64 million renovation of Bryte Park, the city’s oldest and most

used public park. The District 1 project has been on the city’s drawing boards since inclusion in the area’s master plan in 2013, with newer parks in other parts of West Sacramento receiving upgrades the past 13 years.

Pope Flores said she was going to “force” the council to “work for us” through a petition she has launched on Change.org. She also pointed to negative comments the city receives about its transparency and relationship with residents on the city’s webpage comments section. “That’s awful,” Pope Flores said. “It should matter to you.”

After public comments finished, Mayor Martha Guerrero pulled four items on the Consent Agenda for further discussion. Other council members requested two additional items pulled.

Guerrero said some of the items needed to be returned to various commissions at least for review rather than have staff advance them directly to council. She expressed frustration with the review process, noting that of 135 meetings between the city’s various commissions,

committees and boards, 70 were cancelled for various reasons.

Guerrero acknowledged some bodies had vacancies, but pointed out their functions were not just voluntary but dealt with “real life situations” within the city and therefore carried a high degree of importance.

Guerrero asked that three of the items pulled be sent to the Transportation, Mobility and Infrastructure (TMI) Commission at least for an informational review as they were slated to be approved during the Aug. 19 meeting. The fourth item, a \$1 million contract with Schaaf & Wheeler for engineering services on the Bryte Sewer Pump Station Rehabilitation Project was forwarded to the Utilities Commission.

The project is one of several the city is funding through the water and sewer rate increases approved by council in March.

“The community needs to know where its money is going,” Guerrero said. “They need more transparency, not just a Consent Agenda item.”

One of the items forwarded

to TMI is an \$847,578 contract with WSP USA, Inc. for “technical transit planning services and preparation of the West Sacramento Forward Transit Priority Plan.” Councilwoman Early said transparency with this item was important because of the ongoing discussion and strategic planning on light rail and other modes of mass transit in the city.

“This is a huge step forward to be able to do that in which we have several forms of public transportation modes happening in West Sacramento being funded by public dollars,” she added.

A final item sent to TMI deals with the city’s grant applications for project funding through the Sacramento Area Council of Government’s (SACOG) 2026 federal funding cycle programs. Earlier during public comments, West Sacramento resident Raquel Andrade complained to council that nothing was being done to upgrade road conditions along a section of Jefferson Boulevard, a complaint Guerrero mentioned

when noting the roadway was not among projects the city is seeking grant funding for.

Transportation Division Manager Jason McCoy said the Clarksburg Branch Line Trail project was already in design, with the next “logical” step for funding being for construction, something that would score well in a grant application. The other project, the Southport to Harbor Roadway Project, consists of multiple projects.

Both projects are listed in the city’s Capital Improvement Plan.

“Cobbled together, they actually make for a very competitive application,” he said of Southport to Harbor.

City Manager Aaron Laurel acknowledged the Jefferson Boulevard issues Andrade complained about and said it was in the design process with the intent to eventually move to construction.

“Rest assured there is significant work happening on the future of Jefferson Boulevard, at least that portion,” he added.

After the discussion, council unanimously approved all items on the Consent Agenda. ★

First Human Case of West Nile Virus in Yolo County in 2026

Yolo County News Release

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) – The Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency’s (HHSa) Communicable Disease Program has confirmed the county’s first human case of West Nile virus in 2026. The individual, a Woodland resident, was hospitalized for their illness. This case is one of 18 reported statewide this year, making Yolo County the twelfth county in California to confirm a human infection. It also serves as a reminder that mosquitoes in Yolo County can carry and spread West Nile virus, and residents are urged to take precautions

to protect themselves from mosquito bites.

West Nile virus is the most common mosquito-borne disease in California. While most people infected with the virus experience mild or no symptoms, approximately 20 percent develop flu-like symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches, nausea, or vomiting. Approximately 1 in 150 people develop severe neurologic illness requiring hospitalization and can even be fatal. Older adults, people with weakened immune systems, and those with certain underlying medical conditions are at greatest risk for severe illness.

“West Nile virus can have serious health consequences, but there are simple steps everyone can take to reduce their risk,” said Brian Vaughn, Yolo County public health director. “Use an EPA-registered insect repellent whenever you are outdoors, eliminate standing water around your home where mosquitoes can breed, and wear long sleeves and pants when possible, especially during the early morning and evening hours when mosquitoes are most active.”

The Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control District continues to closely monitor West Nile virus activity throughout the region and conduct

mosquito surveillance and control efforts to help reduce mosquito populations and protect public health.

“This first human case is an important reminder that West Nile virus continues to pose a public health threat in our communities,” said Gary Goodman, district manager of the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control District. “We are entering the time of year when West Nile virus activity typically peaks, so it’s important for residents to protect themselves from mosquitoes. Our staff will continue to closely monitor virus activity and conduct mosquito control treatments where needed.”

HHSa offers a Wellness Vending Machine Program that provides free wellness products to residents, including insect repellent. For vending machine locations, visit www.YoloCounty.gov/Wellness-Vending-Machine.
