On June 30, students from the local community, participating in a club begun by a Hopkinton student called Advocacy for the Unhoused, spent a day in Boston supporting people experiencing homelessness. Three teams of students worked together. One team handed out care packages directly to individuals experiencing homelessness, one team worked a meal shift in the kitchen at Rosie's Place,

kinton, delivered \$3,352.77 in supplies, and the effort is still growing.

The student-led 501(c)(3) now runs in four towns — Hopkinton, Westford, Holliston, and Medway — with 56 volunteers.

“I’m always doing volunteer projects on the side,” says Madhav Saxena, now a UMass Amherst freshman, who created the nonprofit club and was particularly inspired by his experience volunteering for Project Just Because. “I feel the people in (our) communities are more fortunate, to have a home and have food, and it’s our responsibility to help out.” He found, when he and his fellow volunteer students canvassed their neighborhoods door-to-door, many were willing to help.

“Once they see the problem is getting worse, they’re super willing to donate,” he says.

Saxena, at first, built his volunteer group with friends, but soon, they reached out to students at other schools, in particular those who had been very active in other clubs.

One such student is Holliston High School rising sophomore Diya Simhadri, who will lead the club at her school this year.

“After hearing more about the mission of the club — improving homelessness rates — I was immediately on board,” says Diya, adding, “As a firm believer in affordable housing, the non-profit really stuck out to me, and I was grateful for the opportunity to help the community. Being the child of immigrants, I know how hard people work just to live a sustainable lifestyle.” She was able to get the program going in Holliston in March of this year, with her first fundraiser a bake sale, which raised \$457.

“I was truly in awe to see how many people contributed to the cause. It has really taught me that small actions such as a bake sale can really make an impact and bring the community together,” says Simhadri, “I’m constantly eager and determined to plan the next fundraiser or event.” The Holliston branch’s second fundraiser, a door-to-door candle sale, earned \$339.

The Holliston students, on the day of the Boston trip, worked

as volunteers at Rosie’s Place, processing food such as onions and potatoes.

“We spent three hours processing so much food,” says Madhav.

All of the students took the train into Boston, and so the teams with deliveries to the shelters carried 30 boxes or so to the shelters by foot.

“Pretty much, our philosophy is to not spend anything that’s not directly helping unhoused people,” says Saxena, “Every single dollar we get, we’re going to donate directly, and any cost assumed, we just came up with ourselves.”

Similarly, the third team carried backpacks, filled with such items as water, electrolytes, food, socks, wet wipes, shampoo and other toiletries, throughout Boston, distributing them to folks living on the streets who could use them.

“We’re actually looking for people to donate more backpacks,” says Saxena, noting that Hopkinton High School is a collection spot, as is Holliston Public Library. Toiletries are needed, as are women’s hygiene products and in particular, socks.

Saxena is particularly proud of a custom web app the students have built, which allows donors to see exactly how each contribution was used. On their website, www.hauhelps.org, they also publish detailed breakdowns of funds raised and supplies distributed.

Transparency is important, says Saxena, who, in fact, will study finance in the fall. “I want people to know how we used their money, all that kind of stuff,” he says.

Diya says that as HHS lead this year, she will focus on expanding the club.

“I would really love to involve upperclassmen or the new freshman with the club, as it is all sophomores at the moment,” she says, “Diversity in the club is something I think would help bring new ideas. I would also aim to host at least one fundraiser a month, likely at sports games.” She adds she would like to build stronger connections with local organizations and shelters.

“Working with organizations would allow us to truly understand the needs of the people and ensure our initiatives are consistent and impactful,” she says.

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A conversation with Kimo Carter, Holliston Superintendent of Schools

Kimo Carter had been looking for a superintendent seat that was the right fit. The former Assistant Superintendent of Weston, who grew up in Hawaii and whose first name means “James” in Hawaiian, feels thrilled to have found in Holliston a “close knit and connected,” district that is “really highly supportive of schools.”

“My first month has been tremendous,” said Carter, who was looking forward to teachers coming back at Local Town Pages’ deadline. “I’m really grateful for the warm welcomes I’ve been receiving here,” he added, noting the only downside is his commute from Belmont.

Carter was drawn to a small-town environment such as Holliston in part for the sense of security and responsiveness to needs it can offer students. “(Students) feel safe, they feel known, they feel belonged in this school system. The relationship between educators and students is a strength point we can leverage. If kids feel happy, safe, valued and known in schools, you can bring your whole self to your learning,” he noted, adding, “No matter how good a teacher I put in front of students, or how great the curriculum is, if the student is not thinking about learning and only thinking about why they’re upset, they’re not going to learn. Holliston has come

a long way and done some really intentional work, and I think that’s a launching pad (on which) we can enhance and build.”

Carter aims to “learn first. Hit the ground learning, instead of hit the ground running, along with a brand new administrative team,” he said. Joining the Holliston team this year is Howard Barber, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Operation, Karen Bourn, Director of Teaching and Learning, and coming back in a new position, Jessica Beattie as Assistant Superintendent of Student Services.

The four new members of the team, Carter explained, are going to embark on a collaborative entry plan, a listening tour, which includes learning “about the strengths of the district, the traditions of the community, to get to know the stakeholders and the people who are invested in the schools, the huge tapestry of interests that make these schools run. It gives us an opportunity to see classrooms in action, see how school climates feel. We’re listening to people, seeing what’s happening and also analyzing data.” That data might include district growth, how many students participate in athletics or music, who students are, what financials look like and opportunities for growth, he explained. “All of that information needs to be synthesized before we can

collectively chart the course together,” said Carter.

Information gathered from Carter’s summertime pre-entry work, coupled with the team entry plan in late summer and this fall, will equip Carter to address the first School Committee meeting in January. “That becomes the basis of our new strategic plan,” he said. Currently, Holliston Public Schools are in year five of a 5-year strategic plan.

The new strategic process will also include community forums and surveys, said Carter.

“This is a really exciting time for Holliston,” said the superintendent, referring to the potential new high school. He has experience working with the MSBA in major repairs while he was Principal of Watertown Middle School as well as doing a lot of the MSBA pre-work for a new high school when he was Assistant Superintendent in Weston. “We need to know the direction we’re going, because that’s going to form the kind of high school we have,” said Carter, “There’s lots of hope and looking toward the future, but it’s really important to be deliberate and thoughtful as we move forward. We have one chance to move in the right way and doing it all together as a community is the right process.”

Carter, who attended Wesleyan University as an undergraduate majoring in



government, didn’t realize he wanted to teach until he landed a job as an after-school aide at the Perkins School. Carter would go on to earn his MAT at Boston College, eventually teaching 7th grade Social Studies in Billerica for seven years before heading to Harvard for his Masters in Administration. He’d go on to become Assistant Principal of North Middlesex Regional School District before heading to Watertown and Weston.

On a personal note, Carter is the married father of two grown sons who enjoys playing trombone in the Belmont Community Band. A sports fan, he cycles for fitness, loves to read and cook, and travels whenever he has the opportunity.

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Navigating college admissions with financial planning

If you have a high school junior or senior, the college admissions process can quickly turn into an overwhelming blur of deadlines, application choices, and financial decisions. From understanding application timing to navigating shifting loan rules, every choice you make now directly impacts your family's broader financial plan.

Early Action vs. Early Decision

Let's start with the early application process with various October deadlines, and how choosing between Early Action and Early Decision carries financial implications.

Early Action gives your student an early decision without a binding commitment, letting them apply to several schools and compare actual financial aid offers.

Early Decision is a binding agreement. While it can give an admissions edge at certain selective institutions, it strips away your leverage to negotiate financial aid later. If your family chooses the binding route, merit aid conversations must happen prior, not after the application.

Build Merit-Based Relationships

When targeting merit-based aid, looking beyond "trophy" schools is often where the real money is hiding. Highly competitive universities rarely offer deep merit scholarships because their applicant pools are overflowing.

Instead, consider specialized or regional colleges where your student's academic profile places them in the top 20% of applicants. Encourage your teenager to lead conversations, build relationships with local recruiters, and express genuine interest. Admissions teams want

to hear an authentic student voice—not a sales pitch polished by Mom or Dad.

Manage Your 529 Plan

For families who have spent years funding a 529 plan, junior year in high school is the time to start protecting that growth. Consider shifting a portion of those funds into money market instruments so market dips do not force a bad exit right when tuition bills arrive.

Tax-free withdrawals must go toward qualified education expenses like tuition, mandatory fees, and room and board. If you end up overfunding the account, SECURE 2.0 rules allow families to roll up to \$35,000 of leftover 529 funds directly into a Roth IRA for the student, provided the account has been open for at least 15 years. It serves as a great safety valve that turns unused college money into a head start on retirement.

Fast Track The FAFSA

Make sure to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as early as possible once it opens in the fall. Prioritizing early completion gives your family first-come,

first-served access to state-level grants, institutional aid, and federal work-study funds that frequently run out before general admissions deadlines.

Sequencing Your Loans

The biggest shift comes from last year's student loan reform, when open-ended federal parent borrowing officially ended. Congress placed a hard annual limit of \$20,000 and a lifetime cumulative cap of \$65,000 per dependent child on Parent PLUS loans. Direct undergraduate student loan limits remain capped at \$5,500 to \$12,500 annually.

Because a four-year university can easily exceed that \$65,000 federal ceiling, families need a proactive borrowing plan:

- Pace the \$65,000 Parent PLUS cap evenly across all four years (\$16,250 annually) rather than borrowing \$20,000 upfront and hitting a wall by senior year.
- Combine lower-interest Direct student loans first, ensuring your teenager maxes out their federal loan eligibility before parents assume debt.
- Target colleges with generous institutional grants, prioritiz-

ing schools whose net price calculators reveal strong aid packages that minimize reliance on parent debt.

Aligning your child's educational goals with a realistic, well-paced funding strategy ensures they get a great degree without compromising your own retirement.

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Five questions that could change how you see retirement

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Saving for retirement is important, but it's only part of the picture. Medicare doesn't start until age 65, and penalty-free withdrawals from retirement accounts generally aren't allowed until age 59½. For couples, timing gets even more complicated. Staggering

retirement dates can sometimes maximize benefits; in other cases, retiring at the same time works better. A financial advisor can help you sort through these decisions and find the approach that makes the most sense for your situation.

How do you want to spend your time in retirement?
Many new retirees are surprised to find that having unlimited free time feels disorienting rather than freeing. Thinking ahead about how to fill the days with meaningful activity — whether that's travel, volunteering, pursuing hobbies or spending more time with family — can make the transition smoother. 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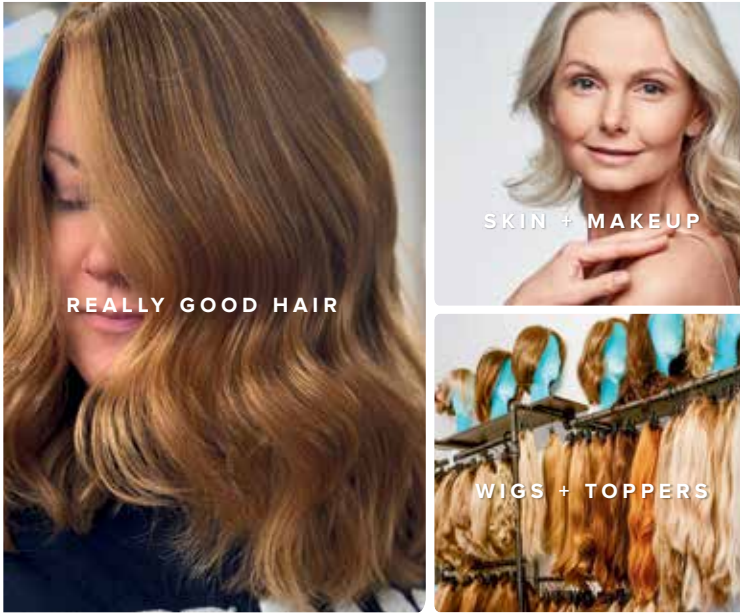
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Why multi-generational homes are becoming more valuable in Massachusetts

The spare bedroom on the main floor. The finished basement with a kitchenette and private entrance. The bonus room that has become a convenient storage area.

To a homeowner, these spaces may simply feel like extra room. But to today’s buyers, they could represent something much more valuable: flexibility.

As multi-generational living continues to grow, homes designed, or easily adapted, to accommodate multiple generations are becoming increasingly attractive. For Massachusetts homeowners considering a move, those features could help a property stand out in a competitive market.

Multi-generational households are those in which three or more generations live under the same roof. According to Realtor.com, the number of these households increased from approximately

3.2 million in 2014 to nearly 4 million in 2024.

Housing affordability remains a challenge, while families are also looking for practical ways to care for aging parents, accommodate adult children, and share household expenses.

For many buyers, a home that provides separate or semi-private living areas can offer the best of both worlds: proximity to family without sacrificing privacy.

Features such as first-floor bedrooms, finished lower levels, in-law suites, second kitchens, private entrances, and additional living spaces are increasingly appealing.

The demand for multi-generational housing can also translate into a premium for homes that offer these features.

Realtor.com reported that in 2025, the median asking price for a multi-generational home

was approximately \$709,000, compared with \$429,900 for a standard home. Even among homes with similar square footage, multi-generational properties commanded a higher price per square foot.

Price differences are influenced by many factors, including location, condition, size, and amenities. In Massachusetts and throughout the Northeast, limited housing supply continues to shape the market. Realtor.com’s 2026 data shows the Northeast remains well below typical pre-pandemic inventory levels, even as the number of available homes has improved. That combination means buyers have more choices than they did a few years ago, but genuinely flexible homes can still command attention.

Massachusetts remains one of the region’s higher-priced markets. Realtor.com reported a statewide median listing price of \$759,500 in June 2026. In communities across MetroWest, the South Shore, and Greater Boston, where housing costs can be significant, a home that provides multiple living arrangements can offer an important advantage by giving buyers more functionality from the space they are purchasing.

A flexible floor plan may appeal to a broader range of buyers, not just families currently living with multiple generations, but also buyers planning for future needs.

The appeal isn’t necessarily about having a home specifically

labeled as “multi-generational.” It’s about having options.

A finished basement with its own entrance could work well for an adult child, an aging parent, or extended family. A first-floor bedroom and full bathroom can provide convenient accommodations, while a bonus room could serve as a home office, guest room, playroom, or private living area.

That flexibility can make a home more compelling when buyers are comparing properties.

That is especially relevant in the Boston-area market and surrounding suburbs. Boston buyers have gained more choices, but pricing still matters and well-positioned homes can attract strong interest. For sellers throughout MetroWest and southeastern Massachusetts, this reinforces the importance of showing buyers exactly how a home’s space can solve their needs.

When inventory is limited, or when buyers are comparing more choices, a home that checks several boxes at once can stand out from the competition.

What This Means for Massachusetts Homeowners

If your home has spaces that could support multi-generational living, don’t overlook them when preparing to sell.

The way those spaces are presented can make a significant difference. Rather than simply calling a finished basement “additional living space,” highlight

its potential uses, such as a private guest suite, space for an adult child, or accommodations for extended family.

The same applies to spare bedrooms, separate entrances, additional kitchens, flexible bonus rooms, and first-floor living arrangements.

Your home may offer more than you realize. The key is helping buyers see how those features can fit into their lives.

A new treatment option for dry macular degeneration

For decades, telling a patient they had dry macular degeneration meant delivering some of the most difficult news in eye care. I would sit across from patients worried about losing their ability to read, drive, or enjoy time with family, and explain that we had very few treatment options.

The advice was always the same: take appropriate vitamins, don't smoke, maintain a healthy lifestyle, monitor your vision, and come in for regular exams. Beyond that, our approach was largely one of careful observation. We were managing the disease as best we could, but we had little to offer in terms of active treatment.

Today, that paradigm is changing.

generation, affecting millions of Americans. Unlike wet AMD, for which effective injectable treatments have been available for nearly two decades, patients with earlier stages of dry AMD historically had no treatment specifically designed to address the disease itself. While the AREDS2 vitamin formulation can reduce the risk of progression in certain patients, active treatment options remained severely limited.

However, in November 2024, the FDA authorized the Valeda® Light Delivery System for the treatment of dry AMD. Valeda utilizes a technology called **photobiomodulation (PBM)**, offering a noninvasive approach for appropriately selected patients with intermediate dry AMD before the development of advanced geographic atrophy.

other medical fields for wound healing and inflammation, its application in ophthalmology is a major milestone.

PBM uses carefully controlled wavelengths of red and near-infrared light delivered to the retina during a series of brief, painless office treatments. The light is absorbed by mitochondria—the energy-producing structures within cells. Researchers believe this process supports cellular metabolism while reducing the oxidative stress and inflammation that drive the progression of macular degeneration.

The standard treatment protocol consists of nine short sessions performed over approximately three to five weeks. Based on clinical trials, additional treatment series may be recommended periodically.

The LIGHTSITE III clinical trial evaluated photobiomodu-



lation in patients with intermediate dry AMD over two years. The results were highly encouraging:

- **Improved vision:** Patients receiving PBM experienced an average improvement in visual acuity compared to those who received a sham treatment.
- **Measurable gains:** More than 60% of treated eyes gained at least five letters on the standard ETDRS visual acuity chart.
- **Slower progression:** The study suggested that treated patients may experience lower rates of progression to advanced geographic atrophy.
- **Safety:** The treatment was well tolerated with no significant safety concerns identified.

A note of caution: Photobiomodulation is not a cure, and it does not guarantee improved vision for every patient. As an ophthalmologist, I believe in balancing optimism with reality. Patients deserve accurate information and realistic expectations, not exaggerated promises.

Who is a candidate?

Patient selection is critical. Current evidence and FDA authorization focus specifically on patients with **intermediate dry AMD**. Determining whether this treatment is appropriate requires a comprehensive eye examination, detailed retinal imaging, and an individualized evaluation by an ophthalmolo-

gist or retina specialist.

PBM does not replace the fundamentals of care—patients must still take vitamins, avoid smoking, and undergo regular monitoring—but it offers a powerful new tool in our arsenal.

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Former The Voice contestant to perform at Holliston Jimmy Fund Fundraiser

Holliston resident Bob McKee is turning his cancer journey into an afternoon of music, community and giving back. On Sunday, Sept. 13, McKee will host a fundraiser at Rushford & Sons Brewhouse for his BBC23 Underdogs Jimmy Fund Walk team, featuring live music from Worcester native singer-songwriter Sam James, a former contestant on NBC’s The Voice. The event will bring neighbors together to enjoy an afternoon of music and community while helping McKee raise money for cancer research and support the mission that has become deeply personal to him.

In the summer of 2023, McKee experienced unexplained bouts of extreme fatigue, brain fog and uncharacteristic lapses in judgment. His wife jokingly suggested that he “get his head checked,” and what began as a passing remark soon became a sobering reality.

When the imaging results came back, McKee’s wife, a nurse practitioner, immediately recognized that something was seriously wrong. The scans revealed three lesions on his brain.

With a five-year-old son at home and no guarantee of how much time he had left, McKee faced life’s greatest challenge: to survive and make that time count. Nearly three years later, he is still here, and he’s turning his experience into a mission of hope, community and giving back.

In 2024, he delivered the keynote speech at an Expect Miracles Foundation (EMF) gala, helping raise \$80,000 for the organization, which has awarded more than \$25 million in grants supporting cancer research and financial assistance for families.

That same year, McKee began participating in the Jimmy Fund Walk with members of his family. Together, they have raised more than \$14,000. And, on Oct. 4, 2026, he will captain the BBC23 Underdogs for his third Jimmy Fund Walk, with a goal of raising at least another \$10,000 for

cancer research.

For McKee, organizations such as the Jimmy Fund and EMF represent more than fundraising totals. They demonstrate what is possible when communities come together to support patients, advance research and create hope.

“I wouldn’t be here if it wasn’t for these organizations. They are the largest donors to Dana-Farber,” says McKee.

His own experience inspired him to pay it forward. In June, McKee launched BBC23.com. He calls it his “passion project” rooted in his cancer journey and his desire to turn a difficult experience into a source of hope for others.

When he was diagnosed, McKee recalls, “I didn’t know where to go. I was lost. I did this because it is cathartic for me; let’s see if it’s cathartic for others.”

Through the site, he shares his story, connects with fellow cancer fighters, recognizes those who have supported him and provides resources, encouragement and opportunities to support cancer research.

“It’s unfortunate that this happened, but I am happy to be here. I wouldn’t be if it wasn’t for organizations like The Jimmy Fund. It shouldn’t be the big C-word,” says McKee.

During treatment, McKee found strength in music, which helped motivate him to get out of bed and walk the hospital floor when even that required tremendous effort. Today, music remains a source of inspiration, making acclaimed Worcester native singer-songwriter Sam James a fitting choice to perform at McKee’s Sept. 13 fundraiser.

James gained national recognition as a contestant on Season 3 of The Voice, where he performed as a member of Team Adam. Known for his soulful vocals and engaging covers, James has also earned co-writing credits with major artists including Dolly Parton and Bebe Rexha.

The fundraiser will take place Sunday, Sept. 13, from 4-8 p.m. with music starting at 5:30 p.m. at Rushford & Sons Brewhouse,

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Holliston to receive Green Communities Grant of over \$80K

BOSTON, MA – Holliston is among 57 communities that will collectively receive over \$8 million in Green Communities Grants from the Healey-Driscoll Administration to fund energy efficiency and clean energy projects. Holliston will receive \$80,104.

To date, DOER will have awarded more than \$208 million to Green Communities in Designation and Competitive Grants since 2010. These funds

have helped reduce municipal energy costs by over \$30 million annually and have reduced pollution.

The latest round of projects are expected to save about \$701,411 each year in energy costs and leverage \$3.2 million in utility incentives. Annual energy savings of 28,141 MMBtus is equivalent to the energy use of 320 Massachusetts households. These projects also reduce greenhouse gas

emissions by 1,634 metric tons annually, roughly equivalent to 3,783 barrels of oil consumed.

Eligible projects include installing high-efficiency lighting and building weatherization, upgrading to energy management systems, insulating pipes and attic spaces, and transitioning HVAC systems away from fossil fuels by installing air- or ground-source heat pumps.

Under the Green Communities Act, DOER's Green Communities Designation and Grant Program can make available up to \$20 million annually to qualified cities and towns.

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School Building Committee begins its work

The Holliston School Building Committee held its first meeting in July, soon after electing Barbara Agen Ryan as its Chair. "After being appointed by the Select Board, our first meeting with me as chair took place August 12," explains Ryan, a veteran with a background in healthcare, including public health and experience managing large health care construction projects. "The voting and non-voting members bring different expertise and responsibilities, but we are one committee serving Holliston. People should understand what we are doing, why we are doing it, and where we are in the process. Trust is built through openness, consistency, listening and accessible information."

Ryan explains one of the biggest tasks is for the committee to meet Massachusetts School Building Association (MSBA) deadlines. At press time, the next deadline was August 31, by which time they needed to complete the Educational Profile Questionnaire as well as provide Open Enrollment projections to the MSBA.

In this MSBA process, the committee is tasked with planning. Ryan said, "We are considering a public investment that could serve Holliston for 50-75 years or longer. Our responsibility is to think beyond today's needs: how learning may evolve, how the community may change, and how we make a healthy, adaptable and fiscally responsible investment for generations."

Ryan also added, "We have no predetermined outcomes," and that building transparency and trust in the community is a top priority.

"It's really on us not only to think about today's needs but the potential needs in the future," she says, "How do we think about an adaptable and fiscally responsible (design) while working within the MSBA guidelines? And we certainly answer to the community in all of this work." she points out, adding that for her, "the biggest takeaway is transparency and public trust. There's not always going to be big news, and that's ok. Right now, the work is foundational. We know this process is iterative, and two-way dialogue with the community and all of the stakeholders is very important to the committee."

The Committee is in a learning and information-gathering phase - understanding MSBA requirements, enrollment projections, educational needs and the questions Holliston needs to be asking. The school building process must consider how to support student learning, the health and well-being of students and staff, and the sustainability of a building. Ryan stated, "Together with our whole community, the desire is to create welcoming spaces that help students thrive and bring the community together. At the end of the day, it is about our students, their education, and the structure that supports their learning. Is this space going to inspire curiosity, creativity, and discernment in

a safe, engaging, equitable and flexible working space?"

The School Building Committee's next meeting is September 9, and its meetings, she says, "are always public, hybrid according to the Massachusetts statute." The public can voice their input and thoughts to a new email address, school-building@holliston.k12.ma.us, as well as find information on the town webpage.

Coming up, the School Building Committee must meet another deadline, November 27, in two areas, Enrollment, and Maintenance and Capitol Planning.

"The committee is working on these key components right now, gathering information to bring it to the committee to vote and meet the deadline," says Ryan, noting that the committee wants to explain the milestones and why they matter to the community, while at the same time listening to the community to determine its needs and concerns.

"We're asking for people to participate," she says, "Please come to meetings. Be part of the process. We want to hear what constituents have to say and (tell them) what we're working on. We hope, in the spirit of good governance and good communication, that people will bring their thoughts and concerns to the table. We are there to listen and do our best by our students and our community with the best possible intentions and best possible information on what may matter for generations."

Holliston urged to adopt master plan continuity by-law

Holliston leaders and community advocates are pushing for a new Master Plan Continuity By-law intended to ensure the town’s long-range planning is timely, accountable, and data-driven. Proponents argue the by-law would create mandatory review timelines and stronger legislative oversight to prevent planning gaps that have left Holliston with an outdated document.

Holliston’s current Master Plan dates to 1999, making it the oldest among the 177 MBTA 3A communities. Most peer towns have modernized their plans since 2015, and about 75% now have plans reflecting recent data and policy needs. Without a Home Rule Charter that obligates regular reviews, Holliston relies on the discretion of town administrators and various committees to

initiate updates. That arrangement, advocates say, allows critical updates to lapse amid frequent turnover: local leadership has changed by roughly 92% over the past decade, eroding institutional memory and continuity.

Holliston’s 2024 Strategic Plan lays out a community vision and strategic priorities. The Master Plan should align with that vision and provide a blueprint for achieving it. Under Massachusetts law, a Master Plan should address goals and policies, land use, housing, economic development, natural and cultural resources, open space and recreation, municipal services and facilities, circulation, implementation, census-based projections, and alignment with zoning. The proposed by-law draws on Dedham’s Chapter 65 as a model and would require a comprehensive plan led by the Planning

Board in concert with other Boards and Committees in alignment with Holliston’s Strategic Plan. Key provisions mandate a full review every 10 years with five-year interim updates, use of the latest census data, and consistency checks between the Master Plan and town zoning and regulations. Updates and formal proposals would be publicly posted and brought to Town Meeting when changes are needed.

Supporters note financial and governance benefits: a roughly \$200,000 update would represent a small fraction of the town’s projected billion-dollar decade of spending, yet provide a living document to guide investments, reduce siloed decision-making, onboard volunteers. The group is doing a “listening tour” to build consensus and present unified support at Town Meeting.

Cross Street Update:
The Massachusetts Land Court has issued final judgment on the 20 Cross Street property, awarding ownership to the Town of Holliston. The Town has for the time being elected to retain the property for municipal use. The Town offers its sincere appreciation to our partners at the state and federal level for their support during this process.

This initial step is many years in the making, and the Town is pleased to announce that Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and federal Environmental Protection Administration will be side by side with us as we enter this next phase. The EPA has confirmed to the Town that they will be performing the Phase II Environmental Site Assessment on our behalf. This will not only save the Town a considerable amount of resources, but also confirm if, how, and when the Town will be able to build upon the site. This assessment is expected to begin in the coming weeks.

The town has entered into an engagement with a long-tenured Town Accountant (from a different community) to conduct an analysis and audit of the Capital Expenditure Fund reporting error. Updated analysis performed by the Town suggests that while the fund is not overcommitted, the present balance is roughly \$830K below where our financial policy dictates the balance should be. The Select Board will keep this matter as a standing agenda item at their meetings to report out updates to the community; other channels will be used as well. I recently recorded an episode of "Just Thinking" with HCAT on this topic, which provides a more in depth look at the issue, and I would encourage members of the community to watch.

Parks and Recreation Commission Vacancy:
A reminder to the community that the Town of Holliston is seeking applicants to fill a vacancy on the Parks Commission through May 2027. Residents interested in serving are encouraged to submit a Letter of Interest to the Town Manager's Office by Wednesday, September 9th at 12:00 PM. The appointment will be made jointly by the Parks Commission and Select Board at a meeting tentatively scheduled for September 14th. Additional details, qualifications, and submission information are available on the town website homepage.

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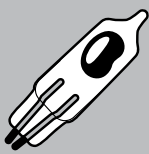

of opportunities to connect with local organizations, businesses and community groups.

One of the biggest changes this year is the addition of two stages, allowing organizers to spread out the day’s activities. The front field will feature the main stage and traditional Celebrate Holliston programming, while the back field will offer a new food-and-entertainment area called Hollyrock Cafe.

Hollyrock Cafe will feature approximately nine food vendors, along with picnic tables and seating where visitors can enjoy lunch and relax. A small acoustic stage will provide music throughout the day, including a performance by Holliston’s own Ricardo Barazza and two other performers. The back field will also feature sponsored tents and antique cars, creating a more relaxed setting for visitors to eat, listen to music and explore.

The new layout builds on lessons learned from last year, when Celebrate Holliston moved to Damigella Field.

“Last year was scary because it was all new,” said Celebrate Holliston President Gina Stucchi. “I was a new president, and it was a new field, a new location. The field layout was difficult. But now that we’ve done it, it’s way easier this year.”

Celebrate Holliston is a non-profit organization that was founded in 1991 with the goal of bringing residents together and strengthening community spirit, during a time in which it was much needed. More than three decades later, that mission remains central to the celebration.

“It has always been the point

of it,” Stucchi said. “It’s become a staple in our town.”

The event also provides an important opportunity for local businesses, particularly Holliston’s growing number of small businesses and microbakeries. Vendors can showcase their products and connect with residents, while established local businesses support the event through sponsorships.

Children will have plenty to do, including inflatables and activities at vendor booths. Wristbands providing unlimited access to the inflatables throughout the day, will be available for \$10 for children ages 2 to 5 and \$15 for those over 5. Proceeds benefit Celebrate Holliston.

Longtime traditions will also return, including the ever-popular chili contest. Families can explore booths hosted by local school clubs, sports organizations, nonprofits and community groups while discovering new ways to get involved.

“There is so much of an opportunity to find your people here because there are so many interest groups and ways to get involved. There is something for everybody,” says Stucchi.

The Celebrate Holliston Parade and Field Day is powered by a significant volunteer effort, typically requiring 60 to 80 volunteers to make the day happen. The organization currently has 11 board members and is looking for additional people to join, as it hopes to expand its community impact in the years ahead. Celebrate Holliston previously offered grants and scholarships, and organizers are considering returning to a grant program in 2027, with the possibility of presenting grants at Field Day next year.

The event also comes as Celebrate Holliston prepares for

a transition involving another beloved community tradition. Beginning in 2027, the organization will no longer manage the Holiday Stroll, and they are hoping community members will step forward to continue the tradition.

For now, the focus is on Sept. 19 and another day of celebrating Holliston.

A special part of the weekend will be the announcement of the Citizen of the Year, which will be selected Sept. 1. The award

will be presented on the 19th, following the parade, with an acknowledgment and citation for the honoree. A reception for the Citizen of the Year and previous recipients is scheduled for Sept. 17 at Upper Town Hall.

After months of preparation, Stucchi knows there will inevitably be stress leading up to the celebration. But when the day arrives, she said, that stress tends to disappear.

“You walk around and just feel the joy,” she said.

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Ask the Assessor

Question:

I think my property's valuation is too high and I want to contest it, but someone told me I have to wait until January. Why?

Answer:

It is very important that property owners understand that they can question their assessments at any time during the year. We are always willing to come out, inspect your property, and see if our data is incorrect. That said, state law dictates when the Assessors' Office can actually do something about an over-assessment.

Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 59, Section 59 through Section 69 spell out the processes for requesting an abatement. These sections specifically state that property owners have from the time they receive their third quarter property tax bill – usually in late December or early January – until the first business day in February to file an abatement application with the Assessors' Office. The Board of Assessors then has 90 days from the date we received your abatement application to act on your request.

Once that first business day in February passes and you have

not submitted an abatement application, the Assessors' Office has no legal way to change your assessment for that fiscal year. Nor can we go back months later to reduce it.

If you question the amount of your assessment outside of this admittedly tight time period, our office can inspect your property and see if an adjustment needs to be made. We can then make it for the following fiscal year's assessment.

So, the best advice we can offer is this: Each new calendar year, when you get your new property tax bills, look at them carefully. The new valuation is in the boxes labelled "Land Value," "Building Value" and "Total Value." Look online and compare it with the previous year's bills. If you think you are over-assessed, call the Assessors' Office to discuss it.

If your property taxes are paid by an insurance or mortgage company and you are not sure of the previous year's assessment, go to: <https://townofhollistoncitizens.munisservice.com/citizens/default.aspx>

And look up what you were assessed and what you paid for the prior fiscal year. (Remember, the fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30. The current fiscal year 2027 ends on June 30, 2027.)

MA Press Shield Law to protect journalists' sources

BOSTON, Mass – On July 30, the Massachusetts Senate made history by passing a press shield law, filed by Senator Becca Rausch, on a unanimous 40-0 vote. This legislation prohibits government bodies from compelling journalists to reveal their sources, except in certain limited circumstances and only with clear and convincing evidence

that the source disclosure is necessary and there is an overriding public interest in the disclosure. Massachusetts was one of just nine states in the

nation without a press shield law on our books.

Federal disaster relief for MA Farmers, secured by McGovern, finally on way

WORCESTER, Mass. – Congressman Jim McGovern (D-MA) announced in August that over \$42 million in federal disaster relief he secured in December 2024, is finally heading to Massachusetts farmers.

The money comes from a \$220 million New England disaster block grant program written by McGovern and Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro (D-CT), enacted into law by President Biden in late 2024. Designed specifically to support small and mid-sized producers—particularly those in states like Massachusetts who are often shut out of traditional U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) programs—the program

compensates farmers for crop losses and storm-related damage to on-farm infrastructure sustained during severe weather events in 2023 and 2024.

McGovern and DeLauro, top Democrats on the Rules and Appropriations Committees, repeatedly pushed top USDA officials in letters, phone calls, and meetings to comply with the law and release the funds—ultimately forcing the Trump Administration to do so. Massachusetts recently executed its contract with USDA, and this week is announcing a process for impacted farmers to apply for funding to support their continued farming operations.

Massachusetts is home to nearly 7,100 farms—roughly 2,000 of which lie in Hampshire, Hampden, and Franklin Counties, areas devastated by 2023 flooding of the Connecticut River and battered by multiple severe weather events. Many small farms in the region are ineligible for crop insurance or find USDA aid programs too cumbersome to access, putting them at higher risk of closure following natural disasters.

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Immigrant Rights' Coalition celebrates enactment of PROTECT ACT

BOSTON, Mass. — On August 5, 2026, Gov. Maura Healey signed the PROTECT Act, which seeks to curtail the federal government's brutal immigration enforcement activities, protect due process, and limit local agencies' cooperation with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

The Protecting Massachusetts Communities Coalition has been advocating for this bill for more than a year and celebrates its passage as an important step in supporting and improving public safety for all residents of the Commonwealth, regardless of immigration status.

The Protecting Massachusetts Communities Coalition offers its deepest thanks to House and Senate leadership for their support of the bill, and to the six-member conference committee for carefully

reconciling the two versions. The coalition also extends special thanks to the Black and Latino Legislative Caucus for their work on the bill, and to Governor Maura Healey for her support and signing this bill into law.

According to the Massachusetts Municipal Association:

"The final accord adopts the broader scope of protected areas offered in the Senate's version of the bill, restricting warrantless arrests by immigration enforcement officers in courthouses, schools, childcare centers and healthcare centers. Each of these groups will need to create guidance and model policies on interactions related to law enforcement agents, with each school district ensuring it has a written emergency response plan related to these interactions by Sept. 1, 2026, or the first day of school,

whichever is earlier.

The law also codifies the Supreme Judicial Court's "Lunn" decision by reinforcing the idea that local officers cannot arrest or detain a person based on an Immigration and Customs Enforcement detainer alone. It also prohibits any new 287(g) agreements for civil immigration enforcement. The state's only current 287(g) agreement between the Department of Correction and ICE is allowed to remain intact.

The final compromise also prevents officers from inquiring about immigration status during routine policing and creates new civil liability for ICE agents by allowing victims of unjustified actions to sue them in state court."

Holden to take her game to the next level

Holliston's Hanna Holden tried playing basketball and taking part in gymnastics, but neither sport was to her liking. Thankfully, Holden's older sister, Anya, was playing soccer, and the younger athlete wanted to be like her sister, so she decided to give the sport a shot finding it was truly something that she enjoyed playing. At six years old, Holden would join the FC Stars, a local club team that she would play on for some time before advancing to New England Futbol Club (NEFC).

The Holliston native never imagined soccer would bring her to committing to a college to play. Holden will be taking her skills to Bryan University in Smithfield, RI next fall.

"I was originally on the fence about college soccer. I was not sure that I'd be able to compete on that level," she said. "Eventually, I started looking at a bunch of schools, mostly in the New York area, but decided that I wanted my family to be able to enjoy it as much as me while showing their support."

Holden took her time before she committed Bryant, about 45 minutes away from her home in Holliston, in January of this year.

"I had attended a camp there last summer while I kept all other options still opened," Holden said. "During my visit with the school, things just clicked; the girls on the team made me feel like I was part of the team right away. The atmosphere was home-like, and the coaching staff made things personalized."

Although she had played soccer for a long time, when it was time to try out for the high school team as a freshman, Holden was unsure of if she would make the varsity squad.

"I had played with some of the girls on the team as an eighth grader and was hoping that I could make it, but I was not fully sure," she said. "If I did, it would be awesome, as my sister was on the team and I had heard all the stories of high school soccer and really

wanted to be a part of that environment, getting to play for your town as well as with your friends."

While Hanna and Anya had both played club soccer, they never got the opportunity to play with one another due to their ages, so when she made the varsity high school team, Hanna was over the moon.

"My first game playing with Anya, I was very excited but also very nervous," she said. "As an incoming freshman, I looked up to her and wanted to be like her without disappointing her. Over the next two years, she guided me, and there no experience like playing with your sister."

During her sophomore season, Holliston put together a 12-3-3 season to earn the five seed in the Division 2 State Tournament. The Panthers would defeat both Billerica and Westwood to make it to the Round of 8, where Mansfield would send them home.

"That game against Mansfield was on a cold November day, and we gave them a good fight only to lose 3-1," Holden said. "It would become my final game with my sister, so it was definitely disappointing to have the season come to an end. There were some tears shed after that game for sure with her leaving."

Last fall, with her older sister gone, Holden stepped up as a team captain. With her appointment, the junior not only found her voice on the field, but she applied the leadership skills that her sister had taught her. While the team did not have the best of years (8-9-1), they did get to the tournament, where they would be successful in the preliminary game but fell to Hingham in the second round. Despite the rather quick exit from the tournament, Holden found that she learned a lot about herself and her game that year.

"Hanna will be a four-year starter for us and can play pretty much anywhere on the field that we ask of her, but she is primarily suited for center-mid," Norwood Coach Brielle

Chadsey said. "Center-mid is probably the most underrated position on the field; you do a lot of the dirty work, and it doesn't show up on the score sheet. She is the heart to our team and dictates the tempo."

Chadsey went on to say that Holden was the team's leader in assists last year. One of her specialties is her corner kicks, where she is able to continuously get the ball right where it needs to be.

As she gets ready to enter her final season with Holliston, Holden is hoping to increase her goal scoring skills. Over the past three seasons, her top season was four goals, and she would like at least five this year, if not more.

"I had always played defense with my club teams, and when I came to high school, I was moved to the midfield. I am a selfless player and would rather pass the ball and let my teammates score, it gives me pleasure in doing so, but this year, I want to score more goals than I ever have," the senior said. "Playing in the midfield, my mindset is still focused on defense, but this year, I just have to trust my teammates on the

back line and try to work more on my offense."

Coach Chadsey has seen Holden grow as a leader over the four years, while using her soccer knowledge for the benefit of the team.

"She is a very talented girl and doesn't have to do everything out there, although we do

ask a lot of her," the Holliston Coach said.

Holden is going to try and go out and have as much fun as she possibly can with her final season with her Panther teammates. She believes that they have a talented lineup that could do something special this fall.

Sheriff Koutoujian applauds MA Senate move to ban cryptocurrency kiosks

BILLERICA, Mass. – Middlesex Sheriff Peter J. Koutoujian applauded members of the Massachusetts State Senate for their move to ban cryptocurrency kiosks. Sheriff Koutoujian testified in support of legislation restricting cryptocurrency kiosks in October of last year and garnered the support of all 14 Massachusetts Sheriffs to ban the machines statewide. “I am proud to have collaborated closely over the last several months with AARP Massachusetts, my fellow sheriffs and public safety partners, and legislators like Senator

John Cronin to push this ban forward because we need to protect residents now and into the future,” said Sheriff Koutoujian. “For far too long, criminals have taken advantage of the unregulated world of cryptocurrency ATMs – or kiosks – to scam people out of their hard-earned savings. We applaud the Massachusetts Senate for supporting a statewide ban on these kiosks to provide much-needed protection to our friends, neighbors and loved ones. We will keep working to see this matter of public policy and public safety become law.” The language banning the ki-

osks was included as an amendment on the Senate’s version of the new economic development bill (S3178). The bill is next expected to head to a conference committee to be finalized. The move to ban the kiosks comes as Massachusetts public safety agencies have repeatedly issued public warnings about the ability of scammers to utilize the machines to defraud unsuspecting residents. The Middlesex Sheriff’s Office has included warnings in news releases, public service announcements and through community-based presentations over the last two years.



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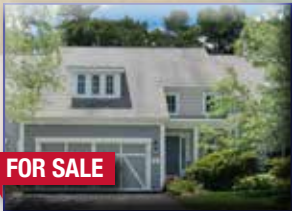
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Holliston to commemorate 25th anniversary of 9/11
