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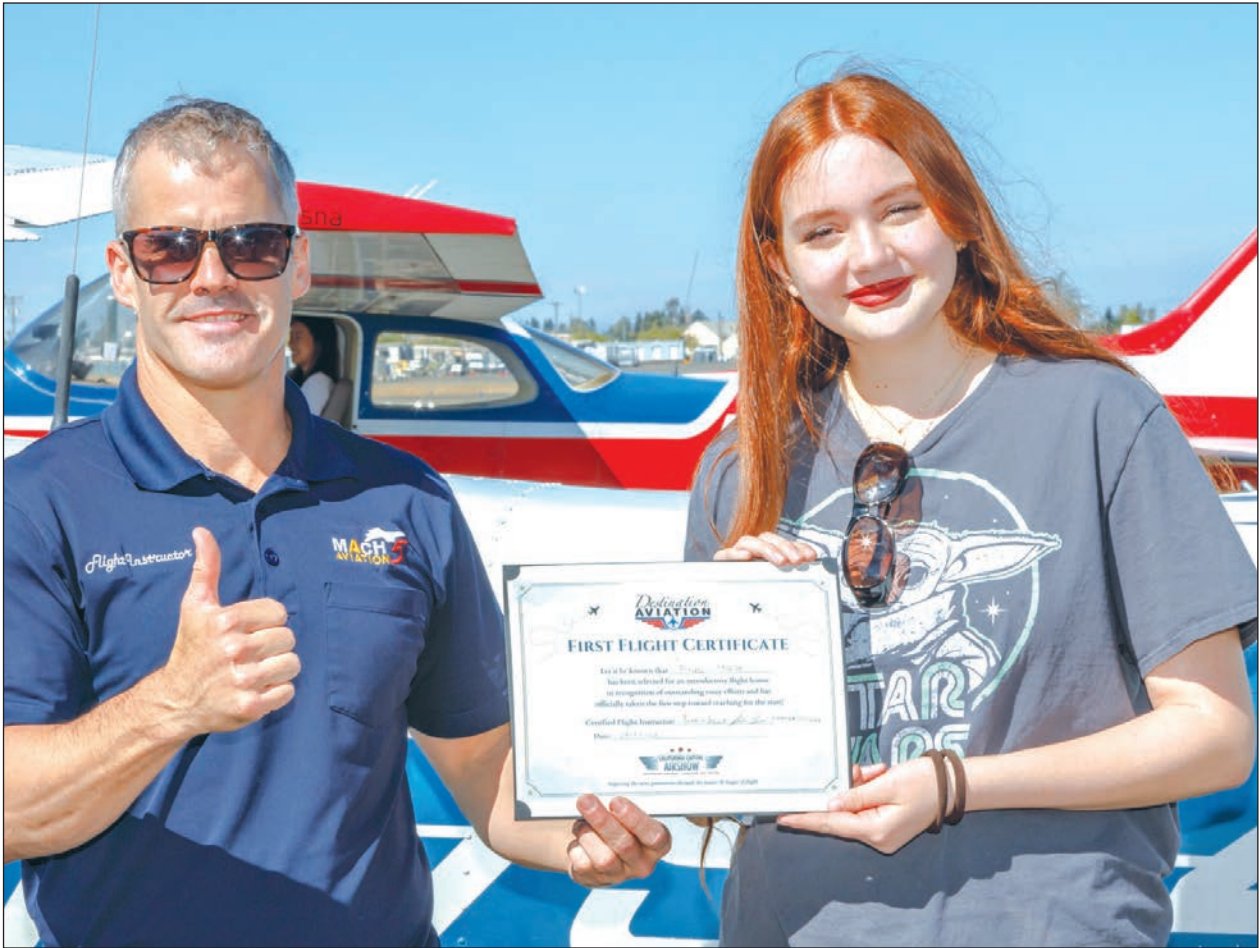
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Career Plans Soar at Mather

MATHER, CA (MPG) - Princess Stoebe had never flown an airplane before Saturday. By the time the Clarksville Charter School sophomore climbed out of the cockpit at Mather Airport, a longtime goal of becoming a U.S. Air Force fighter pilot had moved a little closer to reality.

Stoebe was one of four winners in the California Capital Airshow’s 2026 Destination Aviation essay contest, earning an introductory flight before a free event that brought over 300 middle and high school students to Hangar 6 on Aug. 22 to explore careers in aviation, aerospace and science, technology, engineering and math.

“I was delighted when I found out I had won,” Stoebe said. “It was my first time flying, so that was great. I’ve always wanted to get into aviation, but now it’s made me even more determined.”

Destination Aviation, part of the California Capital Airshow’s year-round youth outreach, gave students

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - What better way to celebrate the 250th anniversary of America than to give back to the many communities in our country?

On Tuesday, Aug. 25, an America250 truck parked at the

State Capitol Park World Peace Rose Garden on 15th Street and delivered 40,000 pounds of food to local nonprofits. The morning drop-off kicked off a larger Sacramento County distribution of over 150,000 pounds of food.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day-Saints has collaborated

with America250 to deliver 250 truckloads of food to cities in all 50 states. As a result of this compassionate effort, communities all around California will receive about 100 food trucks.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Nicole Lemaster considers herself to be more than just a therapist. She considers herself a healer.

With more than a decade of experience, Lemaster is a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist (LMFT) and a Somatic Experiencing Practitioner (SEP).

As a somatic therapist, she takes a body-centered approach in helping clients find relief from trauma stored in the body. Stored trauma might show up as chronic pain, difficulty sleeping or not being able to enjoy the present moment. Her work guides her clients to nervous system regulation and finding a state of homeostasis.

Lemaster’s journey to becoming a somatic therapist stemmed from her own lived trauma. She identifies with the wounded healer archetype, or a person whose personal trauma and pain becomes their source of helping others.

She specializes in patients with PTSD, complex PTSD and shock trauma. Anxiety and depression usually end up in the cluster with those other diagnoses, Lemaster said. However, this type of therapy can benefit clients who aren’t experiencing these disorders.

“The nervous system work is profound, and it can literally support people who haven’t had these types of shock traumas or complex traumas from their developmental years,” Lemaster said.

Working with nervous

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Haven Energy, the No. 1 SGIP developer in California, is working to connect income-qualified California homeowners with nearly \$8.7 million in remaining state funding that can provide households with home battery systems at no cost. Haven has identified the Sacramento area as a key market for the program, with a high concentration of potentially eligible households served by participating public utilities including SMUD. The funding is part of California's Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) Residential Solar and Storage Equity program, which was created to expand access to solar and battery storage for lower-income households. Haven has already deployed more than 1,000 residential batteries through SGIP, giving the company deep experience helping homeowners navigate the program from application through installation. Available to customers of participating publicly owned utilities, the program can cover the cost of a home battery

system, as well as solar, and includes installation. Eligibility is based on factors including household income – which varies according to county and household size – and utility provider. For single-family homeowners, households earning at or below 80% of Area Median Income may qualify. Homeowners do not need to already have solar panels to participate. For more information or to determine eligibility, visit havenenergy.com/sgip. Despite the available funding, awareness remains one of the biggest barriers to participation. Many households that may qualify have never heard of the program or do not know how to navigate the application process. “For qualifying Sacramento homeowners, the SGIP program can be a gamechanger, offering families access to a home battery system for zero out-of-pocket and opening the door to long-term energy savings and outage protection,” said Vinnie Campo, co-founder and CEO of Haven Energy. “We’ve helped Californians across the state navigate SGIP, and right now

we’re actively working to reach as many low-income homeowners as possible, to help them understand what they qualify for, and to submit their applications while funding is still available.” Haven manages the entire process for participating homeowners, including determining eligibility, submitting applications and program paperwork, coordinating installation and managing the energy system after it is installed. The benefits extend beyond individual homes. When electricity demand is high, networks of residential batteries can contribute stored energy to the grid, helping utilities manage peak demand and improve grid reliability for entire communities. County Superintendent Seeks Viable SCUSD Fiscal Recovery Plan

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools (County Superintendent) sent letters on Aug. 27 to Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) Superintendent Cancy McArn and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond outlining the continued Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) approach to addressing SCUSD's immediate cash needs and ongoing structural deficit. The letters follow the Aug. 10 decision by the state superintendent and the executive director of the state board of education to deny SCUSD's appeal of the SCOE-appointed fiscal advisor's rescission of the district's memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Sacramento City Teachers Association (SCTA). In its letter to SCUSD, the county superintendent states that because the MOU has been rescinded, the district is expected to cancel its request for CalPERS to transfer funds from the district's health benefit trust and return any transferred funds to the trust. It also encouraged the district to amend the MOU by removing parts which could add costs while retaining provisions that produce savings. SCUSD currently projects a \$221.8 million unrestricted general fund deficit and a negative \$283.6 million unrestricted general fund balance in the current fiscal year. In the 2027-28 fiscal year, district projections show the deficit growing to \$226.9 million and the unrestricted general fund balance falling to negative \$510.5 million. In the letter, it is emphasized that a short-term infusion of cash, without sufficient ongoing savings, would postpone rather than solve the district's financial crisis. “The issue is not simply whether the

district can get through the next few months, but whether it can remain financially healthy in the years ahead,” Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools Dave Gordon said. “We will continue working cooperatively with SCUSD and the Fiscal Crisis and Management Team (FCMAT) on any viable plan that provides sufficient cash to address the immediate crisis and ongoing savings to put the district on a sustainable financial path.” SCUSD's board of education and superintendent remain responsible for the district's fiscal condition and for making the decisions needed to return the district to fiscal health. The county superintendent's objective is to help SCUSD make the decisions necessary to restore its financial health while protecting students, families, employees and educational programs. If the district runs out of cash, it will be unable to pay its employees and vendors, which would endanger its schools and educational programs. SCOE has provided fiscal, educational program and human resources experts, as well as an executive coach, to support the district. Also, Superintendent Dave Gordon and Associate Superintendent Nick Schweizer meet biweekly, and the fiscal advisor meets more often with district leaders to monitor cash flow, provide feedback on budgets, proposed savings, and the costs and impacts of labor agreements. Homeless Services: Progress, Challenges and the Work Ahead

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, Aug. 25, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors heard a comprehensive and meaningful update on the outcomes of key homeless shelters and service programs from fiscal year 25/26. Emily Halcon, the Director of Homeless Services and Housing (DHS) for Sacramento County, provided a historical lookback at Board policy investment and direction as far back as 2016 that has set investment priorities, project focus and the strategic housing first model staff have focused on the last decade. The Board also heard from Director of Finance, Chad Rinde, on the process of a forensic audit on countywide spending on homelessness. This audit helps to determine if adequate internal controls exist to evaluate fiscal compliance with contracts and adhere to state and federal standards and ensure that departments are good stewards of public funds. With the creation of the Department of Homeless Service and Housing in 2023, the County has increased its programs serving the homeless community, increased its full-time employees managing homeless services and the number of people served annually in County-funded programs. In this coming fiscal year, DHS will contract more than \$65 million dollars into community-based organizations to operate shelters, outreach and programs that are serving the homeless community in Sacramento County. Many of those partners were in chambers – supporting the work already being done. Several stood at the lectern to provide positive feedback on the County's investment and partnerships into the community and how valuable the County's leadership on regional collaboration has been as the homelessness has

grown in the last decade. Data pulled from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) from DHS funded homeless programs and select Behavioral Health Services (BHS) and Department of Child, Family, and Adult Services (DCFAS) shelter programs shows that in Fiscal Year 2025–26, 6,662 unduplicated people were served across outreach, shelter, rehousing, prevention, and transitional housing programs. Despite significant housing barriers, 43% of participants who exited programs transitioned to permanent housing. Prevention and rehousing programs achieved particularly strong permanent housing exit rates of 77% and 78%, respectively. These outcomes are especially meaningful given the significant vulnerabilities of the people served. Among participant heads of household, 61% were identified as highly vulnerable, meaning they self-reported at least four County-identified vulnerability factors. In addition, 50% of participants reported having no income, while an additional 36% reported annual income below \$20,000 a year. The County also continued to make strong use of its shelter resources – with overall utilization for shellers running the full year at approximately 86%. Perhaps the most compelling testimony was that of the providers and provider staff. The CEOs of Community Health Works, First Step Communities, CityNet and Brilliant Corners each spoke about the meaningful work their organizations do, specifically with the County, the populations they serve and the trends and outcomes the work they do in Sacramento in experiencing. The passion they all have for the work, the people they serve and for solutions was evident in their voices and the conviction in which they stood with pride and said, “We stand with the County – we’re here as partners.” ★

Enter new GM Scott Perry who has been promising changes with regard to bad drafts and trades that don't make sense.

California's Political Hopefuls Remain Silent on State's Job Losses, Unemployment

In two months California voters will elect a governor, fill several other statewide offices and choose a new class of state legislators and members of Congress.

The aspirants for those positions are making all sorts of promises to win voters' approval. But few, if any, have mentioned a slow-motion menace affecting a fundamental facet of life: jobs.

The state has never fully recovered from the virtual shutdown of the economy during the COVID-19 pandemic. It still has more than a million unemployed workers. Its unemployment rate continues to be the highest, or nearly so, of any state. And its signature economic sectors, such as high tech and film production, have been shedding jobs for several years.

As ominous as those data points sound, a deeper dive into employment data reveals an even darker reality.

"California's labor market is holding up, but its foundations remain troublingly narrow," Justin Niakamal, research manager at Beacon Economics, said in a recent overview of the state's economy. Healthcare is the only sector with strong employment gains, he noted.

While healthcare jobs are welcome, they are highly dependent on spending by

federal and state governments, and both have been cutting back. Moreover, while healthcare is a service industry, it does not create added-value wealth the way technology, film production and agriculture do.

Back to the data. California's stubbornly high unemployment rate — 5.1% in July — was second-highest among the states, behind Connecticut and Oregon, both at 5.2%. The rate is the percentage of the labor force that is not employed, even in part-time work, during the month.

The size of the labor force, as well as the unemployment figure, are important to note. Over the previous year, California's labor force — people who are working or seeking work — declined by 286,300, according to the monthly Employment Development Department report.

To some extent, the labor force decline masks the actual decline in employment. Moreover, the widely quoted unemployment figure is simplistic: Even if someone is paid for working just a few hours in a month, he or she is counted as employed.

The federal Bureau of Labor Statistics makes several other computations of employment that are more sophisticated. One, called U-6, measures underemployment. It takes into account workers who want to work full time but can only find part-time work, as well as those who are "marginally attached" to the labor force.

California's U-6 rate is a much more realistic measure of the job picture. It was calculated at 10.3% in June, easily the highest of any state.

The bureau also calculated

U-6 for New York City and Los Angeles County because their populations are larger than many states. New York's rate was 10.2% while Los Angeles' was 12.1%.

Those are high numbers but may still understate what's happening — or not — in California's job market.

The Ludwig Institute for Shared Economic Prosperity takes the U-6 underemployment calculation even further. It discounts jobs, even full-time work, that pay less than a living wage, which it pegs at \$26,000 a year. It calls its number the "true rate of unemployment," saying it measures "functional unemployment."

As one might suspect, Ludwig's calculations for California — reported by major metropolitan area — are very high, especially in rural communities where agriculture is a primary source of jobs.

California's highest "true unemployment" rate, according to Ludwig, is in Redding (67.4%). Other rural or semi-rural communities fall into the 50%-65% range. But some urban regions see high rates as well, such as 53.8% in the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim metropolitan area.

Only a few regions are under 50%.

Given these numbers, one might expect that California's officeholders and office seekers would be telling us how they will respond. They are not.

Social Security Matters

Why change Social Security now? It's a working "Ponzi

Dear Rusty: Maybe everybody has the same reaction that I do to Social Security insolvency. I do not understand a system that has been basically run like a Ponzi Scam since its Inception; why have you decided (in 2026-2027) that now is the time to change a perfectly good Ponzi Scam. In all reality, this began with Babylon. I'm sure that if you searched the meaning of the words "Babylonian money magic," you would understand what I'm talking about. If this is as good as the Earth has, why would you mess with a perfectly rotten thing. Why would you decide to change currencies to some sort of fragile digital currency?

Dear Skeptical Senior: You touch on an item that the AMAC Foundation has dealt with many times over the years, specifically the notion that Social Security has the characteristics of a Ponzi Scheme. Our position in response to that notion is that Social Security was created and operated with full transparency, with its financial

status, formulas, and long-term deficits completely and publicly documented, and reported to the President and Congress annually. Unlike the infamous Charles Ponzi, the government has a permanent pool of contributors through mandatory FICA and SECA (self-employment) payroll taxes and is designed to remain in operation infinitely as long as there's a taxpaying workforce. Moreover, the Social Security system is overseen by Congress, specifically the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Government Accountability Office (GAO). The Social Security Administration is subject to routine hearings by these congressional overseers and maintains an independent Office of the Inspector General to ensure the integrity of its financial operations.

Contrary to Ponzi victims, all participants retiring from the workforce (and their dependents) recover their Social Security contributions via benefit payments, some more than others based on their level of participation in the system. Also, contrary to Ponzi Schemes, Social Security was designed as a social insurance system and has operated successfully in that mode for over nine decades.

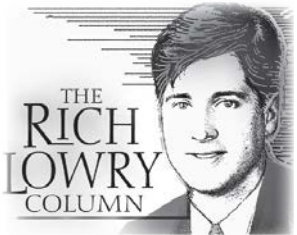
What raises the notion of a Ponzi Scheme comparison these days is the looming insolvency facing Social Security just six

years from now. This financial problem, however, has nothing to do with fraud. Rather, it is a function of workforce demographics and the fact that Congress has long deferred corrective action on a problem that has been known for the past four decades. We sometimes hear well intended (but sometimes uninformed) comments from some Washington politicians invoking the Ponzi Scheme reference, but we believe that Congress is finally waking up to the urgency. And we also believe Congress is now starting to move seriously to set a course for correction in time to ward off the impact of insolvency. AMAC is proud to be a part of the collective thinking currently surfacing, and our Social Security Guarantee is in play as a plan to be considered.

President Trump's tariffs aren't popular, but he's found a way to make them even less so -- a trade war with America's most inoffensive ally.

When one thinks of countries that deserve to be subjected to a steady stream of insults (it's Lake America now, not Lake Ontario) and a punishing regime of tariffs, Canada is far down the list.

Ottawa has been a loyal, if occasionally annoying, friend of the United States for nearly 100 years. The presence of a well-meaning country with similar values along the 5,000-mile border to our north is a gigantic geostrategic blessing, although one that is apparently lost on President Trump.

Both sides deserve blame for the breakdown in negotiations, but news reports suggest it was the U.S. that made additional demands at the 11th hour. Now both sides are imposing new duties on the other, and Trump is threatening 50% tariffs on all Canadian cars, trucks and parts beginning in the new year.

It is certainly true that we can impose more pain on the Canadians than they can on us and grind them down economically. We can also land the 101st Airborne in Nova Scotia. But why would we want to do it?

The contention with Canada is characteristic of Trump's economically

senseless, legally dubious and politically harmful push to tariff everything and everyone he can.

Trump's imposition of all these duties -- often relying on strained interpretations of U.S. statutes -- has run directly counter to his promise in the 2024 campaign to reduce prices, a pledge central to his victory. Although the administration maintains that the cost of tariffs isn't passed on to U.S. consumers -- instead borne by foreign countries and producers -- its actions implicitly concede the opposite.

The administration excluded an array of consumer electronics from new reciprocal tariffs on China to avoid unpopular price increases, and it lifted tariffs on a long list of foodstuffs late last year. Twice this year, including about a week ago, the administration widened exceptions for beef imports. If tariffs were genuinely cost-free, none of this would have been deemed necessary by the most protectionist administration since that of Herbert Hoover.

A chief argument for tariffs is that they will revive American manufacturing. Even if this is true, it's a long-term play, whereas the disruption from tariffs is experienced immediately. It's also a questionable proposition; increasing the price of imported goods used in manufacturing, which is the effect of the scattershot tariffs, doesn't do U.S. producers any favors. It is telling that the National Association of Manufacturers opposes the sweeping tariffs.

Polling consistently

finds that the duties are unpopular. Majorities oppose Trump's handling of the issue, and the public believes that the tariffs have increased prices and should be lowered. The trade war with Canada in particular fares poorly. A YouGov survey found that 62% of people oppose the imposition of 50% tariffs on many Canadian imports.

At the end of the day, Trump has chosen a long-standing ideological goal and his legacy over his short-term political standing. He has advocated for major tariffs for decades and has finally gotten them. They are likely to endure, even if they hurt now. His most probable Republican successor, J.D. Vance, presumably wouldn't roll them back, and the Democratic candidate in 2028 might be equally protectionist. Regardless, it's going to be difficult for future presidents to give up the revenue generated by the duties.

And so a president who campaigned on lowering prices has embraced a policy that, at the margins, increases them. Unless things are smoothed over with our Friendly Neighbor to the North, there will be more where that came from -- in a dispute with a country that no one considers an economic threat to the United States.

If the midterms end up sending a broad message of discontent, the tariffs will surely be a reason why.

Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints spoke about the compassionate effort of this campaign.

“This is our way of celebrating America. By working together with people who are not always like us, America is great because we have always been a country that comes together when we confront difficulties. We could have just dropped the food off at

a warehouse of a big food bank; instead, we decided to try a little harder and connect with our fellow Americans in joint service,” Cook said.

Parked on 15th Street, the America250 semitruck unloaded commodities such as rice, peanut butter, potatoes, flour, sugar, pudding, carrots, onions, pasta, tomato sauce and other staples. 27 local non-profit organizations and religious

organizations then picked up the food following a speech which praised the efforts of the campaign and volunteers.

In the speech’s well-coming remarks, Mayor Kevin McCarty addressed the American people and thanked the organizers of the event for bringing food to families in need.

“As we celebrate 250 years of this amazing country, the United States

of America, at 175 years of statehood, I wanted to thank the organizers and JustServe and the America250 Coalition for thinking about Sacramento. For thinking about our city, our Capital City. So, we appreciate the effort to help families in need here, and we reflect on how we’re all one community here in this Capital City of Sacramento,” said McCarty.

Director of Operations at the Sunrise Christian Food Ministry, April Jacek explained that this is one of the many contributions that her organization volunteers for to give back to the community.

“We were also in The Giving Machine at the Roseville Galleria. It is a beautiful ongoing relationship that we have with the community, with the LDS church, we have service missionaries that come serve at the food closet, so it’s a win all the way around,” said Jacek.

Elected officials also gathered at the event to help with the distribution and address the organizers. 10th District Assembly Member, Stephanie Nguyen, explained the immense impact the food being donated will have on families in need.

“I think any family seeing a list of the items that are being distributed would just be over the moon at how they can hold onto some of these items for a while and don’t have to use right away,” Nguyen said.

This humanitarian campaign is especially important now, not only is it the 250th anniversary of America but American families are struggling now more than ever to put food on the table. Food banks across the country

report demand far above pre-pandemic levels, with working families, children and seniors making up a large share of those seeking help.

“This is one of the most, amazing charitable undertakings you will ever witness. The scale of it is staggering, nationally 250 trucks, millions of meals, on a statewide basis, a hundred trucks here in this community in Sacramento County, 150,000 plus pounds, 40,000 just in that truck right here,” Congressman Kevin Kiley said while pointing to the semitruck being unloaded by volunteers.

Kiley explained how this campaign is also an ode to hope and reminder that we are stronger when we come together.

“The number of organizations that have come together and collaborated to make this happen is truly inspiring. I think it provides hope, not just for the individual families who are in need but for all of us, that we can solve problems in a way that makes life better,” said Kiley.

As we burst fireworks on the Fourth of July and hang American flags outside the front porch, this campaign reminds us of what it truly means to be proud to be an American. ★

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors will begin Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27 Revised Recommended Budget hearings on Tuesday, Sept. 8, at 9:30 a.m. in Board Chambers in the Sacramento County Administration building, located at 700 H Street, Sacramento, 95814. If necessary, hearings will continue on Sept. 9, 10 and 11 at the same time and location.

The hearing schedule begins with the IHSS public authority budget deliberation and approval, the presentation of the FY 2026-27 revised recommended budget, then follows with public comment and ends with the board deliberation and approval of revisions to the approved recommended budget and capital improvement plan and approval of adopted budget resolutions

The Board of Supervisors approved the FY 2026-27

recommended budget on June 10. This year’s \$9 billion spending plan consists of \$3.2 billion in enterprise and special revenue funds (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue), \$4 billion in general fund (funded with \$1 billion in discretionary revenue, \$1.7 billion in reimbursements from restricted funds, and \$1.3 billion in federal, state and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes), and \$1.7 billion in restricted funds (amounts transferred to the general fund to reimburse eligible expenditures in general fund departments).

The numbers in the budget change between June and September when the County receives new information, including the impact of the state budget and updated fund balance and revenue totals. Because of that new information, the revised recommended budget comes back to the board for review and adoption in September.

The FY 2026-27 revised recommended budget includes \$9.2 billion

in total appropriations.

Ok, that was a lot of numbers! You may be wondering, “what services does the county offer that I use and what programs do they run that I care about” – fair question! Let’s play a game of did you know?

Did you know? The County runs Sacramento International Airport (SMF) – which is growing year over year. SMF serves award winning food and beverage options, has a vast offering of non-stop flights to new and exciting destinations, and will be opening a brand-new parking garage in time for the holiday rush this year.

The County maintains 23-miles of the American River Parkway – a beautiful greenbelt full of wildlife with breathtaking views of the American River and multiple river access points, and a multi-use recreation trail that runs from Folsom to downtown.

The County maintains thousands of miles of roads, dozens of beautiful parks and four golf courses.

The County collects garbage and provides recycling and organics collection services for more than 165,000 residential customers, collects used mattresses and Christmas trees and runs the Kiefer landfill.

The County provides building permits, and information on land use and ownership, and brings new business opportunities to the region, helping to grow the economy and tax base and helping local small business to thrive.

The County is the connection to general assistance, cash assistance, mental health resources, substance use services and homeless services and manages our youth foster system, child support services and child protective services.

The County also inspects restaurants for food safety and public pools and spas for safety compliance, manages testing and containment on communicable disease and helps people exposed quarantine to limit the spread – potentially saving thousands of

people from exposure.

The County has a robust public safety and justice system – running the multifaceted jail system, including a youth correctional facility, probation, public defender unit and district attorney and law enforcement that all work together to keep our community safe.

The County runs a large, open-intake municipal animal shelter and animal regulation and enforcement operation, caring for tens of thousands of lost and neglected animals a year, facilitating adoptions for thousands of amazing animals back into the community, rescuing abused and neglected animals from abusers, and prosecuting them to the fullest extent of the law.

So – how many did you know? Members of the public may attend the hearings and be heard on any item in the budget, either publicly or through written comments. The budget hearings will also be telecast live on Metro Cable 14 and on the web. ★

State Treasurer Fiona Ma Announces Results of Bond Sale for Sutter Health

Financing will support major health care expansion projects, including new medical campuses across Northern California and refinancing of existing debt

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California State Treasurer Fiona Ma, CPA, announced the results

of a \$1.407 billion bond sale for Sutter Health providing financing to support major capital investments in health care facilities across Northern California and refinance existing debt.

“This financing will help Sutter Health make significant investments in health care capacity and facilities in communities across Northern California,” said Treasurer Ma. “These investments will support expanded access to care, modernize health care infrastructure and help ensure that Californians can receive high-quality services close to home. I am pleased that the California Health Facilities Financing Authority was able to facilitate this

financing and help Sutter move forward with projects that will serve patients for years to come.”

The bond-financed capital projects include improvements at health care facilities throughout the Bay Area and the Central Valley. Projects include expansion of intensive care and inpatient capacity; acquisition of land

and medical buildings; laboratory facilities; and improvements to neuroscience and cancer care facilities.

Project locations in the Bay Area include San Francisco, San Mateo, Castro Valley, Pleasanton and Dublin. Two of the largest planned projects include a 1.3 million square foot campus in Emeryville called Emery Yards,

and an 850,000 square foot campus in Santa Clara that will also include a 1-million-square foot additional development nearby. Project locations in the Central Valley include facilities in Sacramento, Roseville, Folsom, Elk Grove and Modesto.

Proceeds were also used to refund Sutter’s outstanding 2016B bonds, which generated approximately \$25.7 million in net present-value savings, or approximately 6.7 percent over the life of the bonds.

The original financing request approved by CHFFA authorized up to \$1.6 billion in aggregate principal amount. The final sale amount was \$1,407,070,000. ★

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A Morning Like No Other – Ground Zero at 25 years



An early morning skyline view from the Staten Island Ferry. This was the daily view of thousands of commuters to Manhattan before 9/11. Years later, I met with my friend, the captain of the ferry, in Sacramento for lunch. John had to leave New York because he just couldn’t live another day in that memory. He stopped his ship in the middle of the harbor that 9/11 morning, as he and his entire shipload of travelers and crew watched the horror unfold.

After a long night of late work well into the morning, I was in a deep sleep. The repeating ring of the telephone awakened me. I received an alarming telephone call from a close friend frantically trying to get my attention. She said “just get up and turn on the TV. You won’t believe what is happening”. She was absolutely right.

As I sat there on my white leather couch in my small rental home in Roseville, tuned in as the world was tuned in, to the disaster in New York as it unfolded live for everyone to see. We were all New Yorkers that day.

I had previously lived in Manhattan. After returning to California, I traveled to New York City often to teach classes at The Learning Exchange and spiritual training centers as a part of my ministry. I also met with many clients as a spiritual life coach each visit. Through these visits I became friends with so many great people who lived in The City. I stayed at their homes, got to know their families, learned about their lives, loves, and fears. Many of them worked in the immediate area of the Twin Towers.

As I sat there watching the towers fall along with the rest of the world, I had no idea if any of those friends or members of their families were being crushed under the weight of that destruction. It was a personal anguish and horror felt by millions

simultaneously. It was a grief embedded forever. And we as a nation vowed to never forget.

Everything changed for everyone during those hours. Terrorism had come to our shores, and those whom we had charged to protect us failed miserably. We have been paying for their failures ever since.

And for those who paid the ultimate price, giving their lives to save others inside and around the Twin Towers? And for all the First Responders who witnessed the death and destruction at the end of their fingertips and right before their own eyes? What did they get from so many after only 25 years? Many forgot.

Yes, life goes on, but as individuals we do not. Our time is limited. We are here to understand life, liberty, love, and loss. We are here to understand joy and grief. These become the web that builds our evolution, our DNA that we pass on to those who follow us. If we do not teach our emotional history to our children, good and bad, they will suffer repeating our mistakes and the feeling of betrayal from us for not forewarning them.

Enter our current day Neon Nation. Have we lost our way in one generation? Does the “Shiny thing” distract us so easily because it is too hard for us to focus on the truth and explaining it to others as our society crumbles around us?

A few months after 9/11 I traveled back to New York to offer support to any of those friends who needed it. I traveled to the site while the clean-up was still underway. I saw the scorched church and cemetery. There were still many “Missing” flyers posted to walls and lampposts. I saw the many memorials around the site. When I found one memorial that listed all of the names of those lost I read every one of them. I thank God to this day that not one of my

friends was on that list.

The history of Ground Zero is complex and still unfolding. The more the years fall away the more important it is that we reveal as much as we can about that fateful morning and all that led up to it.

When someone kills your son or daughter, husband or wife, it doesn’t matter what political party they belong to. It doesn’t matter what religion they belong to. It doesn’t matter their motive. All that matters is your loved one is gone forever. Grief takes over. And no one can ever really fill that void. It never truly heals. You just learn how to manage it in the silent times, alone with your Creator.

All those who lost loved ones during those tragic days only asked one thing from us. Never Ever Forget.

On this remembrance weekend 25 years later, take a few moments in silence to share the grief and the weight of the losses experienced by so many on September 11, 2001. If only with that simple action, love will prevail.

Career Plans Soar at Mather

ages 12 to 18 a chance to meet industry professionals, try flight simulators, examine aircraft and vehicles, and interact with working aerospace equipment and technology prototypes.

California Capital Airshow CEO Darcy Brewer said the program is designed to show students how broad aviation and aerospace careers have become and introduce them to jobs they may not yet know exist.

“If you can’t see it, you can’t be it,” Brewer said.

Brewer said the organization has expanded its youth programming as technology has changed the industry, with students now learning about fields including drones, electric vertical take-off aircraft, sustainable fuels, autonomous systems and artificial intelligence.

The event’s panel included retired Air Force Col. Merryl Tengesdal, the first and only Black woman to pilot the U-2 reconnaissance aircraft; Skye Carapetyan of Siemens; Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory research scientist Michael Zelinski; and Sacramento City College Dean of Technology and Innovation Paul Estabrook.

Throughout the discussion, panelists emphasized that technical knowledge is only part of preparing for a career in aviation or STEM.

They encouraged students to strengthen communication and interpersonal skills, maintain a positive attitude, arrive on time and build a foundation in subjects such as math and physics.

Panelists also urged students to begin building connections and gaining

experience now by joining clubs or organizations with others who share their interests, attending events such as Destination Aviation and reaching out to professionals in fields they hope to pursue. They encouraged students not to be afraid to ask questions or seek help as they work toward their goals.

Sacramento County Supervisor Rosario Rodriguez told students that seeing those careers firsthand can turn curiosity into a goal.

“It is one thing to watch an aircraft fly overhead,” Rodriguez said. “It is another to stand beside it. Meet the people who fly it and maintain it and begin to imagine yourself doing the same thing.”

Beyond the panel, students moved through exhibits featuring aircraft, simulators, equipment and technology while speaking directly with professionals about training, education and career opportunities.

For Stoebe’s father, Alexander Stoebe, watching his daughter take her first flight demonstrated the value of giving students that exposure.

“I’m very proud of her,” he said. “It gives the kids the opportunity to start, get a feeling for it.”

The California Capital Airshow has offered youth programs since 2010. Brewer said the free programs range from activities for elementary school students to internships and scholarships for older students.

The nonprofit’s annual California Capital Airshow is scheduled for Oct. 10-11, with proceeds helping support its youth programs. ★

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
