Probe of
Brushfire
is Ongoing

GALT, CA (MPG) - A fire here Sept. 5 burned a fraction of an acre along South Lincoln Way and was still under investigation Sept. 8, according to the Cosumnes Fire Department.

Firefighters responded at 4:55 p.m. to the 900 block of South Lincoln Way following a report of a motorcycle crash into a tree.

A tree and about 50 by 50 feet of brush burned near St. Christopher’s Catholic Church.

No one was injured, said Lantz Rey, fire marshal for Cosumnes Fire Department, which serves Galt and Elk Grove.

And no arrests have been made, Rey said. The investigation was expected to be completed Sept. 9, he said.

Four bikes, including a new e-bike, were destroyed by the fire, according to a GoFundMe page set up to raise money to replace the bikes.

More than \$1,600 has been raised so far. The bikes were the property of four Galt teenagers, who chained them together before heading to a nearby creek, the GoFundMe page says.

The new e-bike was owned by the son of the fundraiser’s organizer, Bryan Causar. Donations will replace locks and helmets, too, according to the GoFundMe page.

Bill Clarifies How Schools Spend Arts Money

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A bill to clarify how schools should spend California’s \$1 billion annual investment in arts education is headed for Gov. Gavin Newsom’s desk after legislators reached a compromise with a champion of the original initiative.

“I’m delighted to come to an agreement that will further arts education for kids in California,” said Austin Beutner, former superintendent of Los Angeles Unified and

chief architect behind Proposition 28, California’s ambitious vision for music, theater, drama and fine art in K-12 schools.

The bill, AB 2440, seeks to streamline and clarify some of the finer points of Prop. 28, which voters overwhelmingly passed in 2022. Prop. 28 requires schools to use their new arts funding to supplement – not replace – existing programs. But schools’ confusion over Prop. 28 rules had led dozens of districts to return their arts money to the state, for fear of spending it incorrectly and

getting sued.

That was the case with Los Angeles Unified, which Beutner sued in 2025, claiming the district cut existing arts programs and replaced them using Prop. 28 money – an allegation the district denies. That case is pending in Los Angeles Superior Court.

Clarifying Proposition 28

AB 2440, by Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi, a Democrat from Torrance, aims to allay schools’ apprehensions about

hension about spending their arts money. Among other things, the bill more closely aligns Prop. 28 with the state’s existing arts framework, so schools would have an exact definition of what constitutes an arts class.

The bill also makes clear that schools can pool their Prop. 28 money and share arts teachers and other resources. And it addresses murky issues such as whether arts funding from outside groups, such as band boosters or nonprofits, counts as part of schools’ existing arts budgets.

Beutner originally balked at the bill when he learned of it, saying it “gutted” the intent of Prop. 28 by giving schools too much leeway in how they spent their money. He feared that more districts would use Prop. 28 money to backfill cuts to existing programs, rather than add to the overall arts offerings.

His opposition threatened to derail the bill, but he and the bill’s supporters reached a compromise after news coverage in CalMatters and other outlets. The new version of the bill contains the line: “The local education agency shall certify that all provisions of (Proposition 28) have been implemented at each of its school sites.”

‘This will mean more art’

That amended language was enough to satisfy Beutner, who withdrew his opposition in mid-August.

“My hope is that this causes districts to further reflect on whether they’re in compliance with Prop. 28,” Beutner said. “I’m delighted we were able to collaborate on this.”

The bill passed unanimously.

Kyle Holmes, director of statewide arts initiatives for California County Superintendents, a prominent supporter of Muratsuchi’s bill, said he’s

thrilled it appears headed for passage.

“For kids, this will mean more art,” Holmes said. “That’s the heart of this bill, making sure schools have better access to Prop. 28 funds, giving schools the clarity they need to get funding to students.”

Prop. 28 still has a few obstacles, though. A big one is finding arts teachers. Some districts have had arts teacher vacancies for six months or more, as the existing supply hasn’t met the demand. A recent Stanford Research Institute study found a shortfall of 5,000 arts teachers in California.

“We’re seeing more and more colleges offering credential programs for the arts,” Holmes said. “But more young people need to know that if you’re interested in teaching the arts there’s a clear pathway to a high-paying career.”

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A Morning Like No Other – Ground Zero at 25 years



An early morning skyline view from the Staten Island Ferry. This was the daily view of thousands of commuters to Manhattan before 9/11. Years later, I met with my friend, the captain of the ferry, in Sacramento for lunch. John had to leave New York because he just couldn't live another day in that memory. He stopped his ship in the middle of the harbor that 9/11 morning, as he and his entire shipload of travelers and crew watched the horror unfold.

After a long night of late work well into the morning, I was in a deep sleep. The repeating ring of the telephone awakened me. I received an alarming telephone call from a close friend frantically trying to get my attention. She said “just get up and turn on the TV. You won’t believe what is happening”. She was absolutely right.

As I sat there on my white leather couch in my small rental home in Roseville, tuned in as the world was tuned in, to the disaster in New York as it unfolded live for everyone to see. We were all New Yorkers that day.

I had previously lived in Manhattan. After returning to California, I traveled to New York City often to teach classes at The Learning Exchange and spiritual training centers as a part of my ministry. I also met with many clients as a spiritual life coach each visit. Through these visits I became friends with so many great people who lived in The City. I stayed at their homes, got to know their families, learned about their lives, loves, and fears. Many of them worked in the immediate area of the Twin Towers.

As I sat there watching the towers fall along with the rest of the world, I had no idea if any of those friends or members of their families were being crushed under the weight of that destruction. It was a personal anguish and horror felt by millions

simultaneously. It was a grief embedded forever. And we as a nation vowed to never forget.

Everything changed for everyone during those hours. Terrorism had come to our shores, and those whom we had charged to protect us failed miserably. We have been paying for their failures ever since.

And for those who paid the ultimate price, giving their lives to save others inside and around the Twin Towers? And for all the First Responders who witnessed the death and destruction at the end of their fingertips and right before their own eyes? What did they get from so many after only 25 years? Many forgot.

Yes, life goes on, but as individuals we do not. Our time is limited. We are here to understand life, liberty, love, and loss. We are here to understand joy and grief. These become the web that builds our evolution, our DNA that we pass on to those who follow us. If we do not teach our emotional history to our children, good and bad, they will suffer repeating our mistakes and the feeling of betrayal from us for not forewarning them.

Enter our current day Neon Nation. Have we lost our way in one generation? Does the “Shiny thing” distract us so easily because it is too hard for us to focus on the truth and explaining it to others as our society crumbles around us?

A few months after 9/11 I traveled back to New York to offer support to any of those friends who needed it. I traveled to the site while the clean-up was still underway. I saw the scorched church and cemetery. There were still many “Missing” flyers posted to walls and lampposts. I saw the many memorials around the site. When I found one memorial that listed all of the names of those lost I read every one of them. I thank God to this day that not one of my

friends was on that list.

The history of Ground Zero is complex and still unfolding. The more the years fall away the more important it is that we reveal as much as we can about that fateful morning and all that led up to it.

When someone kills your son or daughter, husband or wife, it doesn’t matter what political party they belong to. It doesn’t matter what religion they belong to. It doesn’t matter their motive. All that matters is your loved one is gone forever. Grief takes over. And no one can ever really fill that void. It never truly heals. You just learn how to manage it in the silent times, alone with your Creator.

All those who lost loved ones during those tragic days only asked one thing from us. Never Ever Forget.

On this remembrance weekend 25 years later, take a few moments in silence to share the grief and the weight of the losses experienced by so many on September 11, 2001. If only with that simple action, love will prevail.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors will begin Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27 Revised Recommended Budget hearings on Tuesday, Sept. 8, at 9:30 a.m. in Board Chambers in the Sacramento County Administration building, located at 700 H Street, Sacramento, 95814. If necessary, hearings will continue on Sept. 9, 10 and 11 at the same time and location.

The hearing schedule begins with the IHSS public authority budget deliberation and approval, the presentation of the FY 2026-27 revised recommended budget, then follows with public comment and ends with the board deliberation and approval of revisions to the approved recommended budget and capital improvement plan and approval of adopted budget resolutions

The Board of Supervisors approved the FY 2026-27

recommended budget on June 10. This year's \$9 billion spending plan consists of \$3.2 billion in enterprise and special revenue funds (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue), \$4 billion in general fund (funded with \$1 billion in discretionary revenue, \$1.7 billion in reimbursements from restricted funds, and \$1.3 billion in federal, state and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes), and \$1.7 billion in restricted funds (amounts transferred to the general fund to reimburse eligible expenditures in general fund departments).

The numbers in the budget change between June and September when the County receives new information, including the impact of the state budget and updated fund balance and revenue totals. Because of that new information, the revised recommended budget comes back to the board for review and adoption in September.

The FY 2026-27 revised recommended budget includes \$9.2 billion

in total appropriations.

Ok, that was a lot of numbers! You may be wondering, "what services does the county offer that I use and what programs do they run that I care about" – fair question! Let's play a game of did you know?

Did you know? The County runs Sacramento International Airport (SMF) – which is growing year over year. SMF serves award winning food and beverage options, has a vast offering of non-stop flights to new and exciting destinations, and will be opening a brand-new parking garage in time for the holiday rush this year.

The County maintains 23-miles of the American River Parkway – a beautiful greenbelt full of wild-life with breathtaking views of the American River and multiple river access points, and a multi-use recreation trail that runs from Folsom to downtown.

The County maintains thousands of miles of roads, dozens of beautiful parks and four golf courses.

The County collects garbage and provides recycling and organics collection services for more than 165,000 residential customers, collects used mattresses and Christmas trees and runs the Kiefer landfill.

The County provides building permits, and information on land use and ownership, and brings new business opportunities to the region, helping to grow the economy and tax base and helping local small business to thrive.

The County is the connection to general assistance, cash assistance, mental health resources, substance use services and homeless services and manages our youth foster system, child support services and child protective services.

The County also inspects restaurants for food safety and public pools and spas for safety compliance, manages testing and containment on communicable disease and helps people exposed quarantine to limit the spread – potentially saving thousands of

people from exposure.

The County has a robust public safety and justice system – running the multifaceted jail system, including a youth correctional facility, probation, public defender unit and district attorney and law enforcement that all work together to keep our community safe.

The County runs a large, open-intake municipal animal shelter and animal regulation and enforcement operation, caring for tens of thousands of lost and neglected animals a year, facilitating adoptions for thousands of amazing animals back into the community, rescuing abused and neglected animals from abusers, and prosecuting them to the fullest extent of the law.

So – how many did you know? Members of the public may attend the hearings and be heard on any item in the budget, either publicly or through written comments. The budget hearings will also be telecast live on Metro Cable 14 and on the web. ★

State Treasurer Fiona Ma Announces Results of Bond Sale for Sutter Health

Financing will support major health care expansion projects, including new medical campuses across Northern California and refinancing of existing debt

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California State Treasurer Fiona Ma, CPA, announced the results

of a \$1.407 billion bond sale for Sutter Health providing financing to support major capital investments in health care facilities across Northern California and refinance existing debt.

"This financing will help Sutter Health make significant investments in health care capacity and facilities in communities across Northern California," said Treasurer Ma. "These investments will support expanded access to care, modernize health care infrastructure and help ensure that Californians can receive high-quality services close to home. I am pleased that the California Health Facilities Financing Authority was able to facilitate this

financing and help Sutter move forward with projects that will serve patients for years to come."

The bond-financed capital projects include improvements at health care facilities throughout the Bay Area and the Central Valley. Projects include expansion of intensive care and inpatient capacity; acquisition of land

and medical buildings; laboratory facilities; and improvements to neuroscience and cancer care facilities.

Project locations in the Bay Area include San Francisco, San Mateo, Castro Valley, Pleasanton and Dublin. Two of the largest planned projects include a 1.3 million square foot campus in Emeryville called Emery Yards,

and an 850,000 square foot campus in Santa Clara that will also include a 1-million-square foot additional development nearby. Project locations in the Central Valley include facilities in Sacramento, Roseville, Folsom, Elk Grove and Modesto.

Proceeds were also used to refund Sutter's outstanding 2016B bonds, which generated approximately \$25.7 million in net present-value savings, or approximately 6.7 percent over the life of the bonds.

The original financing request approved by CHFFA authorized up to \$1.6 billion in aggregate principal amount. The final sale amount was \$1,407,070,000. ★

Today is Patriot Day, in Remembrance of 9-11

According to the daysoftheyear.com website, Patriot Day falls on the 11th of September (also known as “Nine-Eleven”) and is remembered globally as the anniversary of the catastrophic terrorist attacks on United States of America.

Do you remember where you were and what you were doing on Sept. 11, 2001? Fortunately, you get to think back to that fateful day.

I can’t imagine the wife whose husband will never return and walk back through the door. Did she remember to say, “I love you?” or was a child waiting to be picked up from day care at the end of the day and no one showed up? Or the lights going dark and the dust doesn’t settle and the air is thick with clouds of smoke and eerie sounds of people yelling and running away to where?

The smoke and dust are everywhere; there is no escape.

Embedded in the memories of everyone who lived through it, this was the day four jet planes were hijacked and crashed into the New Your World Trade Center and the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia, causing



the deaths of 2,977 people.

The fourth plane (United Airlines Flight 93) was directed at Washington, D.C., but its passengers bravely attempted to take back control, and it crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania. There is a film that focuses on the fourth flight. Called “United 93,” it aims to take you through the events of what happened on the plane, focusing on the passengers responding to the hijackers in order to direct the plane away from Washington, D.C. The film received critical acclaim, winning a number of awards. The film shows how the passengers came together to revolt against the hijackers, despite knowing that their lives were at very high risk. While they ultimately lost their lives in the end, they stopped the terrorists from

reaching their intended target, saving many more lives in the process.

The large majority of those lost after the attacks on the Twin Towers were working at or above the points of collision; thousands of people who had gone to work that morning, like every other day, found themselves suddenly stranded at the top of a burning skyscraper. A number of them made the choice to jump from the flaming buildings rather than wait to be caught by the flames or for the building to collapse.

No one could forget the terrifying and heartbreaking stories and images captured by the news footage of the day in the wake of the World Trade Center collisions. Many brave men and women from the emergency services risked their lives to try to help rescue victims of the attacks, and of them, 411 lost their own lives attempting to fight fires and rescue people.

Patriot Day is recognized by United States law as the official day of remembrance for these tragic events and has been observed every year since. Each year on this day, American flags are flown at half-staff to honor and commemorate

those lives lost. The United States president asked fellow Americans to observe a moment of silence at 8:46 a.m. (Eastern Daylight Time), the time of the first plane collision into the North Tower of the World Trade Center.

While the events took place within the United States of America, the shock and grief experienced in response to the attack was shared across the globe, and for this reason Patriot Day will be observed not only in America, but all over the world.

Canada and the United Kingdom held memorials. In London, people gathered at St. Paul’s Cathedral to honor the victims and Queen Elizabeth ordered the United States nation anthem to be played during the Changing of Guard at Buckingham palace: a rare gesture of solidarity.

Please join me and the rest of our nation in silent moment at 8:46 a.m. (Eastern Daylight Time). Let us not forget.

One last note, this Sunday, Sept. 13, is Grandparents’ Day. A great day to make a memory.

Until next week – be strong, be courageous, make a memory. ★



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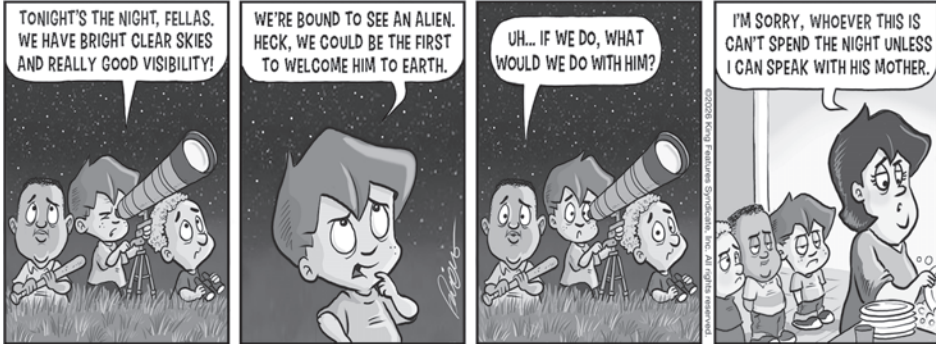
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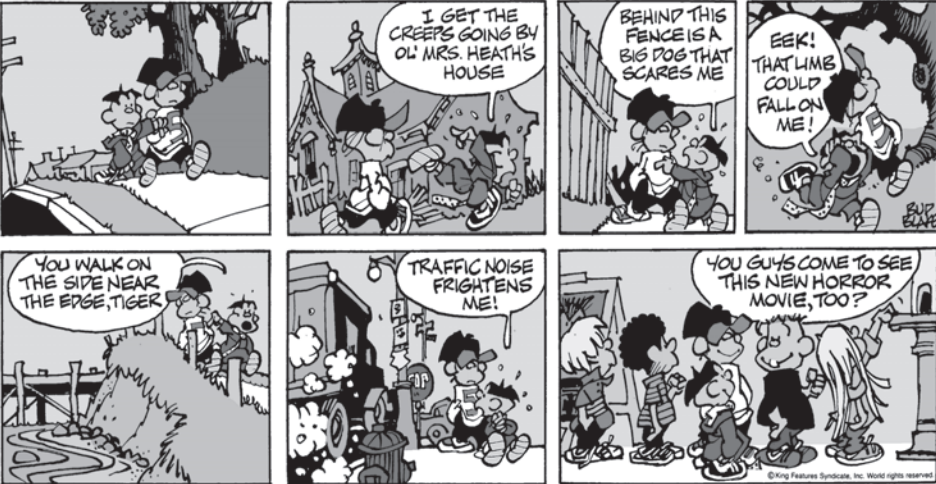

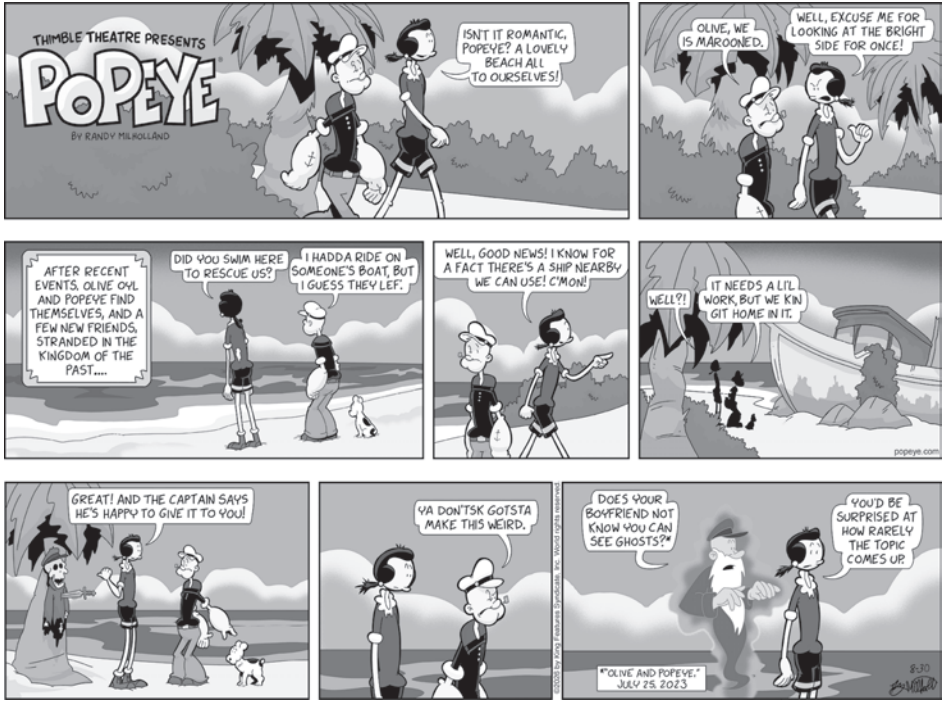

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Hawks Ground Huskies 44-14 in Elk Grove Rout

Quinn, Lara power 315-yard rushing attack as Liberty Ranch defense pitches first-half shutout in Elk Grove

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - Liberty Ranch didn't need long to make a statement Friday night.

The Hawks scored 44 unanswered points over the first two quarters and rode a dominant ground game and a swarming defense to a 44-14 win over the Sheldon Huskies at Sheldon High School on Friday, Sept. 4.

Liberty Ranch put up 21 points in the first quarter and 23 more in the second, taking a 44-0 lead into halftime before the Huskies scored twice in the third quarter to avoid the shutout. Neither team scored in the fourth.

"Our team executed well on both sides of the ball and we feel like we made some progress," Hawks Head Coach Warren Schroeder said. "Now we have to prepare for a tough opponent in Lodi for our home opener next Friday."

The Hawks racked up 384 yards of total offense, 315 of them on the ground on 27 carries: an average of 11.7 yards per attempt.

Senior running back Andrew Quinn led the way, needing just five carries to reach 134 yards. His 62-yard run was the longest play of the night for either team, and he added a rushing touchdown while averaging 26.8 yards every time he touched the ball.

Senior Joe Lara was the

Hawks' most productive scorer, finding the end zone three times: twice on the ground and once through the air. Lara ran five times for 80 yards, including a 33-yard burst, and caught three passes for 24 yards, finishing with a team-high 104 all-purpose yards.

Senior quarterback Ryan Ogas was flawless when he put the ball in the air, completing all five of his passes for 58 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions, good for a 173.3 passer rating. His longest completion was a 23-yard strike to senior Enzo Diaz. Ogas also carried once for 20 yards.

Senior Hunter Owen did a little of everything. He completed his lone pass attempt for 11 yards to junior Jack Rowe, rushed four times for 37 yards with a long of 24 and a touchdown, and went a perfect 6-for-6 on point-after kicks to finish with 12 points.

Owen also handled kick-off duties, booming seven kicks for 272 yards, an average of 38.9 yards with a long of 51.

As a team, Liberty Ranch completed all six of its pass attempts for 69 yards and two scores. Senior lineman Soni Takafua got in on the fun, hauling in an 11-yard touchdown reception for one of the two passing scores.

Rowe added five carries for 27 yards with a long of 15. Junior Mason Emslie ran twice for eight yards, and senior Wyatt Correia carried five times for nine yards.

Up front, the Hawks' offensive line recorded 15 pancake blocks. Seniors Cutler Perez and Deshaun Jackson each had four, senior Daniel Swearingen added three, junior Jesus Posada had two, and Quinn and senior Jayden Sedlacek each chipped in one.

The lone blemish on the

offensive night was ball security. The Hawks fumbled three times and lost two.

The Liberty Ranch defense was every bit as sharp, holding Sheldon scoreless through the first half while piling up 38 total tackles, 11 tackles for loss, four sacks and 20 quarterback hurries.

Corriea was a one-man wrecking crew from his linebacker spot, recording seven solo tackles and eight assists for a team-high 15 total stops, along with four tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks for five yards.

Takafua turned in one of the most complete individual performances of the night. In addition to his touchdown catch, he recorded three tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, a sack, two hurries and a six-yard fumble recovery, and he was credited with a safety, giving him eight points on the evening.

Quinn matched his offensive production with a strong night on defense: two solo tackles, two tackles for loss, a sack for five yards and a forced fumble.

Rowe was relentless in the backfield with two solo tackles, two tackles

for loss and a team-high five quarterback hurries. Perez added a half-sack, a half tackle for loss and four hurries, while Posada had three solo tackles and four hurries. Swearingen contributed three tackles, a half tackle for loss and a hurry, and Jackson had two hurries.

Junior Rex Machado recorded three tackles, a half tackle for loss and two hurries. Junior Liam Trosko had two solo tackles and a pass deflection, Owen added two assisted tackles and a pass breakup, Diaz had a solo tackle and junior Tanner Swafford recorded an assist.

The Hawks broke up seven passes on the night, led by junior Izayah Vera with three. Lara, Owen, Trosko and junior Ezekiel Baltazar each had one.

Corriea also handled kickoff returns, bringing back three kicks for 50 yards with a long of 23. Diaz returned the Hawks' lone punt seven yards. Liberty Ranch never had to punt.

All told, the Hawks finished with 441 all-purpose yards.

Liberty Ranch 2-0 opens its home schedule next Friday against Lodi. ★

Early Momentum Fades as Warriors Fall to Golden Sierra

GALT, CA (MPG) - The Galt Warriors came out with a plan and, for a stretch of the first half, made it work. But a string of turn-overs and a Golden Sierra offense that capitalized on every mistake turned a competitive game into a 47-7 non-conference loss Thursday night at Galt, one that ended under the mercy rule and dropped the Warriors to 0-2 on the season.

Galt received the opening kickoff and marched to the 30-yard line before the drive stalled and the Warriors turned the ball over on downs with seven minutes left in the first quarter. Golden Sierra needed less than a minute to make them pay, mixing a couple of strong runs with passes before scoring at the 6:09 mark for a 7-0 lead.

The Warriors brought the ensuing kickoff out to the 25 but could not convert a first down and punted with 3:42 remaining in the quarter. Galt's defense answered, forcing a Golden Sierra punt, but the Warriors turned the ball over on downs a second time, and Golden Sierra scored again to go up 14-0 with three minutes left in the opening period.

Galt found its footing early in the second quarter.

With the ball to start the period, the Warriors put together their best drive of the night and finished it in the end zone, cutting the deficit to 14-7 and swinging the momentum to the home sideline.

It did not last. Golden Sierra answered immediately after the kickoff, scoring with 7:16 left in the half to push the lead back to two touchdowns. The Warriors punted with 6:30 remaining, and the defense once again forced Golden Sierra to punt. But the kick inadvertently bounced off a Galt player, Golden Sierra recovered, and one play later they ran around the edge for a score. The gaffe turned a possession the Warriors should have had into a 27-7 deficit with 2:01 left in the half. Galt punted with 35 seconds

left, and the teams went to the break with Golden Sierra ahead 27-7.

Golden Sierra extended the lead to 33-7 with 11 minutes left in the third quarter. The Warriors punted on their next possession, but the defense stiffened and forced another Golden Sierra punt with 5:56 remaining in the period.

The highlight of the night for Galt came with 2:15 left in the third

quarter, when sophomore Rick Akers stepped in front of a pass and returned a long interception, giving the Warriors their best field position in some time. The offense, however, could not capitalize and punted the ball away again.

Golden Sierra scored with 9:31 left in the game to make it 40-7. On Galt's next possession, a pass was intercepted and returned for a touchdown, pushing the score to 47-7 and

putting the game under the mercy rule with roughly three minutes to play.

Golden Sierra recovered an onside kick and took over with 1:55 left, but the Galt defense fought to the final whistle and kept them out of the end zone.

The Warriors managed just 97 yards of total offense, 85 of them on the ground on 19 carries. Senior Anthony Trejo led the way with 36 yards on three carries, including a 33-yard run that was Galt's longest play of the night. Senior Arthur Cordova added 29 yards on four carries with a long of 15, and sophomore Sean Mace carried seven times for 14 yards. Junior Richard Geier (three carries, four yards) and senior Carlos Sterni (one carry, two yards) rounded out the rushing attack. Akers, in addition to his interception, hauled in Galt's only completion of the night, a 12-yard catch. Up front, senior lineman Axel Olmos Virgen was credited with three pancake blocks.

Head Coach JJ

Woodward did not shy away from the result afterward.

"We were in the football game early," Woodward said. "We cut it to 14-7 in the second quarter and had some momentum, but when things started going against us, we didn't respond the way we needed to. We let one bad play turn into another, and eventually the game got away from us.

"Now we find out what kind of football team we want to become. We can make excuses, or we can come together, show up every day, work for each other and get better. Changing a culture doesn't happen when things are easy. It happens in moments like this.

"The scoreboard was 47-7, and we own it. I expect our guys to come back together, practice with purpose and start becoming the football team we know we can be."

Golden Sierra improved to 1-1. The Warriors return to action Friday against Natomas.

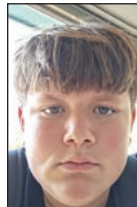
Allie Schmidt (No. 10) was the top target in the passing game, hauling in three catches for 44 yards
