CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Monday night bingo at the Carmichael Elks Lodge is fundraising for local charities.

With a jubilant cry of "Bingo!" The Elks recently donated \$1,000 to San Juan Unified School District's Special Education Advocacy PTA (SEPTA).

The new non-profit supports families of more than 7000 disabled students in SJUSD schools. Its volunteers work to provide advocacy, inclusion and resources for members whose children receive special education services.

On Aug. 31, organization president Ryan Digman and 20 SEPTA volunteers joined 120 bingo fans at the Cypress Avenue lodge.

"I'd played bingo before," said

Digman. "This time, it was an exciting occasion. A couple of our group won some money. Some bingo regulars donated to us from their winnings."

Outreach was a major perk. "We met lots of people and told them about what our group was doing," Digman continued. "Many bingo players had connections to children with special needs. San Juan is the seventh-largest school district in California, with more than 7000 young people in Special Education programs. We're a brand-new organization and we cover the entire district.

"Students and their families truly need our support. We encourage them to be a voice. Any funds we raise help us to grow and help children to succeed."

"We're appreciative that the Elks quickly got us on their calendar as

bingo beneficiaries," said Digman. "They were super-welcoming."

The SJUSD charity is among many causes aided by Lodge 2013's bingo nights. Almost 90 per cent of proceeds go to charitable groups. Exalted Ruler Theresa Goldsmith said the weekly event continued a long tradition of giving back by the lodge.

"Our bingo has supported hundreds of local non-profits," reported Goldsmith. "Helping community is the heart of Elkdom. It's heartwarming to know a game of bingo can do so much good."

Carmichael Elks Monday night bingo is open to the public. Games begin at 6:45 p.m. Anyone over 18 can participate. For information, call the lodge at 916-489-2103.

In 2025, Sacramento Blankets for Sacramento Kids gave out over 3,300 blankets and Beanie Babies in their Kindergarten Project, reaching 58 schools! SBSK is always looking for new volunteers to make blankets all year round for children in need. Like to knit, crochet, sew, quilt, make no-sew blankets and have run out of people to make things for? We're looking for you!

Arroyave will lead the public agency responsible for providing water to Carmichael residents and oversee its operations, workforce, finances and customer service.

Arroyave brings more than 25 years of experience in water resources, public agency leadership, operations and infrastructure. His career has focused on managing complex water systems, leading multi-disciplinary teams and

since 2019. In that role, he has led operations and maintenance activities for major Central Valley Project facilities, managed approximately 70 employees working in engineering, operations and maintenance, safety, information technology, and system monitoring and control. He also oversaw annual operations, extraordinary maintenance and capital improvement budgets totaling more than \$95 million.

Arroyave previously held senior leadership positions with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, including acting regional director and deputy regional director for the Mid-Pacific Region. His work has spanned major water infrastructure and delivery systems, drought and flood response, water rights and regulatory issues, environmental compliance, long-range planning and partnerships with local, state and federal agencies and water partners.

Arroyave steps into the role as the district continues to invest in water supply reliability and critical infrastructure while maintaining a strong financial foundation and commitment to providing high-quality, reliable water service for the Carmichael community. Current priorities include expanding the District’s Aquifer Storage and Recovery program, rehabilitating its Ranney Collector system, advancing

long-range financial planning and continuing strategic infrastructure investments.

As general manager, Arroyave will oversee CWD’s daily operations and workforce and carry out the policies and direction established by the board of directors. He will also represent the district in its work with customers, community organizations, neighboring water agencies and government partners.

“I am honored to join Carmichael Water District and work alongside its dedicated employees, board members, customers and regional partners,” Arroyave said. “CWD has valuable water resources, a strong financial foundation and a proud history of serving the Carmichael community. I look forward to listening, learning and working together to provide high-quality, reliable water for generations to come.”

About Carmichael Water District
Established in 1916 as Sacramento County’s first irrigation district, Carmichael Water District provides water service to approximately 41,200 residents across an eight-square-mile service area. The district maintains a diverse water supply portfolio that includes American River surface water rights and groundwater from the North American Subbasin. CWD is governed by a five-member elected Board of Directors and employs 27 full-time staff. ★

Mama, Art Your Heart Out

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Ana Zuloaga-Walker is the founder and program director for Mama, Art Your Heart Out, affectionately called MAYHO, a local social support group for moms with autistic children.

The group supports fellow autistic mamas in a social setting “by sharing experiences, offering support to one another and to help create community through art,” Zuloaga-Walker said.

MAYHO seeks to “provide supportive and creative spaces where mothers of autistic children can practice self-care, express themselves freely, form genuine connections and find strength in community.”

Autism is a developmental disorder with symptoms that appear within the first three years of life. Its formal diagnostic name is autism spectrum disorder. The word “spectrum” indicates that autism appears in different forms with varying levels of severity. That means that each individual with autism experiences their own unique strengths, symptoms and challenges.

“I envisioned a space where mothers could come together without judgment and transform the grief, guilt, uncertainty, fear, and challenges they carried into connection, healing and art,” she said.

“Mama, Art Your Heart Out itself helps mothers with the joys, challenges, questions and emotions that come with raising and advocating for their children,” she said.

“Many parents who are struggling to find real-world solutions to their child’s autism challenges need to know that they are not alone,” she said. “And each person with autism has their own strengths, likes, dislikes, interests, challenges

and skills, just like you do,” she said.

At the recent MAYHO meeting, Zuloaga-Walker introduced me to several other moms who were about to begin a journaling art project. Active membership is over 300 mothers with children ranging in age from two months to age 26.

Zuloaga-Walker is originally from Southern California. She moved with her mother to Sausalito at age 11 where she was surrounded by the creative spirit of the Bay Area, and where she said she developed a deep appreciation for art and self-expression at an early age. She has since earned a bachelor of arts degree in creative writing.

She remained in the Bay Area for most of her adult life before getting married, becoming the mother of two boys, both diagnosed with autism, and eventually moving to the Sacramento area. Her two boys are now young adults.

The informal setting provided a much-needed moment of respite for each participating mom who had their own heart-felt story to tell of endless love and tireless advocacy for their autistic children. Some have

been with the group from the beginning, watching their children grow and overcome new challenges.

MAYHO could easily grow its membership in the greater Citrus Heights, Fair Oaks and Carmichael area as many more moms learn about the group and what it offers, she said.

All moms of autistic children are welcome to join the group, she said.

“The population of young autistic children in our area is very substantial, and many mothers just don’t know that our group exists,” she said.

The recent evening art project focused on using words and images to express the feelings experienced while navigating the bureaucratic maze of finding available resources, identifying suitable day programs, and working with teachers and school districts to develop an Individualized Education Program (IEP) that may or may not adequately address a child’s

unique needs. “As a mother, artist, writer and autism advocate, I believe creativity has the power to help us process our experiences, rediscover ourselves and remind us that we were never meant to do this alone,” she said.

Before founding “Mama, Art Your Heart Out,” Zuloaga-Walker created “Baby, Art Your Heart Out,” a community arts program supported by a grant from First 5 Sacramento. The program brought autistic children and their families together through sensory exploration and process art.

“After both of my sons were diagnosed with autism, I decided to become a full-time mother and advocate,” she said. “I quickly realized that if I wanted a community of people who truly understood what I was experiencing, I would have to help create one.”

MAYHO also offers a resource list of community and state resources and agencies for parents of autistic children. These include the ALTA Regional Center, FEAT - Families for Early Autism Treatment, and the Center for Autism and Related Disorders.

Upcoming MAYHO meetings are 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 25 and Friday, Oct. 16 in the community room of the Fair Oaks Library, 11601 Fair Oaks Blvd.

The group also has an active book club which meets twice a month and hosts occasional “Mamas Night Outs,” dinners, family gatherings and other events that support its vision.

The community group is also in need of donated art supplies and a permanent physical location with available storage.

New Preserves Held by Land Trust Protect Open Space

Sacramento Valley Conservancy News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento Valley Conservancy (SVC) added two new open space preserves to the system of protected lands in Sacramento County this summer, one protecting blue oak woodlands and the other open grasslands for Swainson’s Hawk foraging.

Hardwood forests and grasslands are among the least-protected landscapes in California, and these new preserves are a small step toward addressing this gap as the state seeks to reach 30X30 biodiversity goals. Westervelt Ecological Services established the preserves as habitat mitigation for a development project in the City of Folsom.

The Crevis Creek Oak Woodland Preserve connects to the 4,600-acre Deer Creek Hills Preserve and adds 125 acres of protected oak woodland in Eastern Sacramento County, where SVC has a goal of

protecting 10,000 acres of blue oak woodlands south of Folsom.

Found only in California, blue oak woodlands are iconic landscapes inhabiting the lower foothills of the Sierra Nevada and Coast Ranges. Blue oak woodland habitat supports exceptional biodiversity, providing food, nesting sites, shelter, and movement corridors for more than 300 vertebrate species and thousands of invertebrates, including

birds, mammals, reptiles, pollinators, and amphibians. The preserve remains privately owned and will be grazed for vegetation management and agricultural values.

The Golden Hills Preserve provides foraging land for Swainson’s Hawk, which is a California threatened species losing habitat to outward urban expansion. The 118 acres of open grasslands will help connect other large

preserves with Van Vleck Ranch to the northeast and the CDFW Cosumnes and Gill Ranch preserves to the southwest.

Connected protected areas are critical for wildlife corridors to function and wildlife to successfully migrate between different habitat zones. Westervelt will own and manage the property, continuing to manage the grasslands with grazing to manage fire risk and vegetation growth.

Sacramento Valley Conservancy holds permanent conservation easements on the properties, ensuring they remain protected for habitat conservation. Together, Sacramento Valley Conservancy and Westervelt have permanently protected more than 1,500 acres within Sacramento County. The partners remain committed to acquiring additional priority properties to

expand protected lands and strengthen the ecological integrity and connectivity of the preserves.

Executive Director of the Sacramento Valley Conservancy Kelly Hopkins said, “These two preserves help expand open space and protect important oak woodland in the Cosumnes River Watershed, and near Deer Creek Hills Preserve. These acquisitions represent another important step in our effort to connect and protect contiguous preserves in Sacramento County, and we’re excited to continue working with Westervelt.”

President of Westervelt Ecological Services Travis Hemmen said, “We value our partnership with the Sacramento Valley Conservancy and share their commitment to connecting important natural landscapes throughout Sacramento County. These preserves help preserve some of the character and natural habitat of the region for future generations to enjoy.” ★

California Small Businesses One Step Closer to Relief from Abusive CIPA Lawsuits

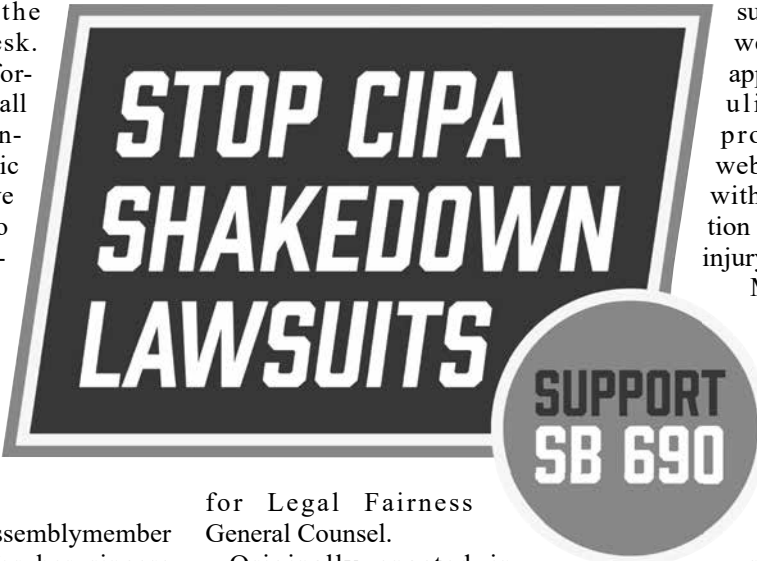
Stop CIPA Shakedown Lawsuits News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Stop CIPA Shakedown Lawsuits coalition has expressed its support for SB 690 following its passage through the California State Legislature and advancement to Governor Gavin Newsom’s desk. Authored by Senator Anna Caballero, SB 690 represents a first step toward addressing the growing wave of abusive lawsuits brought under the California Invasion of Privacy Act (CIPA).

The coalition is encouraged to see lawmakers take action to address CIPA’s pen register and trap and trace provision, providing needed relief to small businesses, nonprofits, and public agencies that have been targeted by lawsuits over common website tools, often without any allegation of actual harm or injury.

“We are pleased to see California lawmakers recognize the urgent need for CIPA reform and advance SB 690 to the Governor’s desk. This is a step forward for the small businesses, nonprofits, and public agencies that have been forced to spend valuable resources defending themselves against abusive lawsuits. We thank Senator Caballero for her leadership and we thank Assemblymember Bauer-Kahan for her sincere engagement in moving this issue through the Legislature. We urge Governor Newsom to sign SB 690 into law and deliver this

needed relief to businesses and organizations across California,” said Andrew Kingman, Alliance



for Legal Fairness General Counsel.

Originally enacted in 1967, CIPA was intended to protect Californians from unlawful wiretapping and eavesdropping. But the

decades-old law, written long before the internet existed, has increasingly been exploited to bring abusive lawsuits over common website tools like appointment scheduling, payment processing, and website chat, often without any allegation of actual harm or injury.

More than 4,000 CIPA lawsuits have been filed in just the last four years, in addition to tens of thousands of demand letters shaking down businesses and organizations across California. Plumbers, solar installers, restaurants, rural healthcare

providers, local news outlets, food banks, public schools, and others have been targeted because it is cheaper to settle these claims than to fight them in court – even when no actual harm has been alleged.

Notably, SB 690 does not address Section 631, CIPA’s wiretapping provision. Throughout the legislative process, the coalition advocated for a comprehensive solution addressing both provisions being used to bring lawsuits and demand letters against businesses and organizations over common website tools. Without changes to Section 631, the coalition is concerned that many California small businesses, nonprofits and public agencies will remain vulnerable to these claims.

The Simmons Factor

Ben Simmons has stolen the preseason show thus far and understandably so. 2018 rookie of the year in the NBA and a three-time all-star, brings with it a lot of optimism and certainly fan excitement.

After sitting out the entirety of the 2025-26 season recovering from back problems, Simmons says he is 100 percent healthy and ready to prove his naysayers wrong.

Many have questioned his toughness, but two back surgeries are nothing to scoff at, and as many people can attest to, back injuries can be hard to overcome.

At 6-foot-10, Simmons represents a skyscraper of a point guard and is even taller than hall-of-famer Magic Johnson.

The apparent plan is for Simmons to back up Darius Acurr Jr., and if so, it could pay dividends.

Without question a point guard of his size represents problems for opposing teams, so what remains to be seen is how he fits in with Scott Perry’s new look Kings, and does he have the motor to be a game changer.

shooting guard and Simmons plays the point. Just possible that times are changing for the better.

Trade talks continue to swirl as it relates to Domantas Sabonis, and that should not come as welcome news.

I see Sabonis as the anchor of this team, and if anyone comes with a pedigree it is most certainly Domantas.

The Kings need this big man to have a comeback season after being limited to a career low 19 games last year due to injuries. This stalwart has proven himself not just to the Kings organization, but to the league as well, and Sabonis has earned the respect of players throughout.

Alex Karaban, drafted 29th overall, comes to the Kings with four seasons of college ball, and an NCAA title under his belt. Used to winning, Karaban should be a consistent player off the bench, and if coach Christie develops a consistent flow with minutes, Karaban can become a valuable commodity for Sacramento this season.

Much depends on how Christie develops what has now become a young team, and effective use of players like Achiuwa, Cardwell, Karaban and Sharpe will make a big difference in the win/loss record of the Kings this season.

It is hard to measure Doug Christie after a season where his team was largely on the disabled list, but make no mistake about it, this year marks the litmus test in his young coaching career.

If the 20-25 wins that the pundits have expressed are what the Kings have to look forward to is in any way correct, look for a complete shake-up of the coaching staff.

There is way too much talent for this team to be on the south side of 30 wins, and even one more tweak could represent an acceleration of Scott Perry’s rebuilding program.

California’s Future Water Supplies Depend on the Outcomes of Four Intertwined Battles

Since the earliest years of its history, California has been a political battlefield over divvying up the state’s water. The intensity of the multisided conflict, like water itself, ebbs and flows.

By happenstance this is one of the more intense and climactic periods in the eternal competition over water. It’s driven by uncertainty over the effects of climate change on precipitation and by looming decisions on how to cope with those effects.

What happens on four intertwined fronts in the near future will determine how water will be managed and allocated in the coming decades. In no particular order:

Colorado River

Decades of conflict over allocating Colorado River water, involving not only California but other Western states, are coming to a head. Runoff from snow in the Rocky Mountains has been declining, and the two major reservoirs on the Colorado, Lakes Mead and Powell, have been shrinking and rapidly approaching operational failure. Federal authorities have been pressing the states involved to agree on how the shortages should be managed, but it’s been a stalemate.

California is less dependent than Nevada and Arizona, which rely on

the Colorado to serve their fast-growing urban centers. When the Bureau of Reclamation imposed some temporary operational rules recently, Nevada sued and Arizona is threatening to follow.

Sites Reservoir Project

An off-stream reservoir on the west side of the Sacramento Valley to capture and store water during years of high precipitation has been proposed for decades. But with projections of decreased snowpacks due to climate change, the project, called Sites, has gained momentum in recent years.

Gov. Gavin Newsom wants to nail down the project before leaving office in four months. Last week, the administration’s Water Resources Control Board issued a draft water rights decision for Sites. The project needs permission to draw water from the Sacramento River before it can secure financing for the 1.5-million-acre-foot reservoir.

Delta Tunnel Project

Newsom also wants to pin down another major project — a tunnel that would carry Sacramento River water around the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to improve deliveries to Southern California via the California Aqueduct. A conveyance of some kind has been proposed for more than 60 years but has never been able to clear political, legal and financial hurdles.

Advocates say the project would take pressure off the Delta, but it faces stiff opposition from environmental groups who contend it would worsen the Delta’s environmental problems. Putting together a package of regulatory permission and financing from water

agencies that would benefit has been a daunting, and so far elusive, goal.

San Joaquin River Diversions

While proposing the 45-mile-long tunnel to divert some Sacramento River water from flowing through the Delta, state water officials are simultaneously pressuring San Joaquin Valley farmers to reduce San Joaquin River diversions to increase flows into the Delta.

Supposedly reductions would be voluntary, but the state is also working on mandatory cutbacks if not enough water is voluntarily offered. Last week, Westlands, the largest water district in the valley, pulled out of the voluntary negotiations, saying the state was moving toward coercion. If the state issues mandatory cutbacks, it would probably become a legal battle over whether the state can interfere with long-standing water rights.

The conflict is exacerbated by reductions in water farmers can draw from underground aquifers with wells. There are projections that reductions in water supply, could take as many as 900,000 acres of farmland out of production.

That possibility drove major agricultural interests to successfully press the Legislature last week to make it easier to remove farmland from open space preserves, to replace crops with solar power arrays.

Social Security Matters

Must I Enroll in Medicare at Age 65?

Dear Rusty: I will be turning 65 next month, I am currently retired and I am not on Social Security. My question is; Is there anything I have to do, if I don’t want Medicare? I am on my wife’s employer plan, and she works for the Postal Service as a Rural Carrier. She doesn’t plan on retiring for another 8 yrs. Also, I would like to wait till my full retirement age (FRA) before I draw Social Security at 67. Do I have to draw Medicare at that point? Signed: *Retired but Curious*

Dear Retired but Curious: As long as you are covered by a “creditable” healthcare plan (such as that from your wife’s US Postal Service employer), you can defer enrolling in Medicare

until your Postal Service Health Benefit (PSHB) coverage from your wife’s employer ends. When that happens, you (and your wife) will enter a Medicare “Special Enrollment Period” (SEP) during which you can enroll in Medicare without incurring a Late Enrollment Penalty. Thus, in your specific circumstances, you don’t need to do anything about enrolling in Medicare when you turn 65.

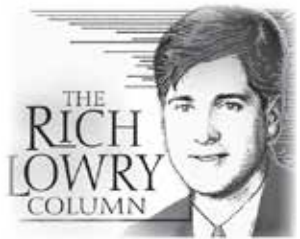
That is still true, regardless of when you claim your Social Security benefits. If you claim Social Security at age 67 and before your wife retires from the USPS, you will be required to take Medicare Part A (coverage for inpatient hospitalization services), but Medicare Part A is premium-free for those also eligible for Social Security.

However, enrollment in Medicare Part B (coverage for outpatient healthcare services) is always optional because there is a premium associated with it, and you can continue to defer enrollment in Medicare Part B as long as you

have “creditable” healthcare coverage from your wife’s employer (even while you are collecting Social Security).

When you apply for Social Security, you can inform SS that you are declining Medicare Part B because you are still covered by your wife’s USPS employer healthcare plan. Then, when your wife retires and you lose your USPS healthcare coverage, you can enroll in Medicare Part B at that time without a late enrollment penalty.

A decade later, Colin Kaepernick is as tiresome as ever. To mark the 10-year anniversary of his kneeling during the National Anthem, the former San Francisco 49ers quarterback is out with a new memoir, “The Perilous Fight.” (Get it?)

In an interview with NBC News in advance of the book’s release, which he clearly imagines as part of a vindication tour, he proved himself as committed to woke racial politics as ever.

He told NBC that his protests were about fighting “police killing black folks” and “systemic oppression.” He added that he was thinking -- not very modestly -- about the Montgomery bus boycotts, Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King while he took a knee.

It’s certainly true that Kaepernick sacrificed his career to his protests, although he was a marginal player by the end. In his prime, Kaepernick was a top-notch athlete and electric performer. No one can take his exemplary 2012 and 2013 seasons away from him. In one playoff game in 2012, he ran for 263 yards and passed for 181, a single-game record for rushing by an NFL quarterback.

He couldn’t maintain this level of performance, though. In 2015, he lost his starting job to journeyman Blaine Gabbert. He won it back for a time in 2016, although he got benched during one game

after throwing for all of 4 yards. The 49ers went 1-10 when he started, and by one metric, he ranked 23rd out of 30 qualifying quarterbacks. So he was hardly the GOAT, instead once-very-good, now-mediocre. Then there was the issue that his style of play didn’t necessarily fit in most offensive schemes.

Layer on top of this the circus he’d bring to town with his kneeling and it’s understandable that teams didn’t find him an alluring proposition in 2017 when he was a free agent. There were myriad options available as backup quarterbacks who weren’t notorious for disrespecting the national anthem immediately prior to games.

TITLE: None of this would have mattered if Kaepernick had maintained his 2012 level of play; in that hypothetical, teams would have signed him even if he started to do the black power salute during huddles.

Kaepernick has now worked himself into a position where he’s compared NFL players to enslaved people (in an absurd Netflix documentary), and he’s bitter that he isn’t numbered among them as a 38-year-old who hasn’t played in 10 years.

Then there’s the substance of his advocacy. The high-water mark for Kaepernick’s anti-police worldview came in the aftermath of the killing of George Floyd, when the NFL basically apologized for not listening to his supposed wisdom and the police were put on their back foot in many cities

around the country.

The result was an increase in violent crime that, of course, disproportionately victimized black people. The country has now recovered from this idiocy -- based on the lie that the police indiscriminately kill black people -- and the country is much safer for the people who Kaepernick purports to care most about. If we ever go anywhere near his preferred policy of abolishing the police and prisons, we’d instantly create the worst crime wave in the country’s history.

Kaepernick is sometimes compared to Muhammad Ali. The legendary boxer sacrificed part of his career by claiming conscientious objector status during the Vietnam War. Ali was hated for a time, but his true greatness as a boxer, his incandescent charisma and his outsized place in the culture allowed him to transcend that political controversy and become a beloved American figure.

That is not going to happen to Colin Kaepernick, whose claim to fame is kneeling on the sidelines during some NFL games. He’s very dismissive of the enduring change wrought in the NFL by his protests and the tumult after 2020. The league has painted the words “End Racism” in end zones. Kaepernick rightly considers these pointless messages performative, but so was his scorn for the anthem of his own country a decade ago.

Three workshops will guide development of a new strategic plan

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Carmichael Water District (CWD) is working to shape its new strategic plan during three public workshops beginning Sept. 28.

Strategic Plan 2029+ is envisioned as a three-year plan that will guide the district's priorities through 2029 and beyond. It will define CWD's mission, vision and core values and establish strategic goals and priority objectives in areas such as water reliability, infrastructure, financial stewardship, workforce development,

customer service, environmental stewardship and other priorities identified through the workshops.

"A strategic plan provides a roadmap for the decisions and investments that affect our customers and community," said CWD Board President Mark Emmerson. "These workshops give the public an opportunity to follow the process, hear the Board's discussions, and share input as the district considers its priorities for the years ahead."

The three special Board workshops are scheduled from 3 to 5:30 p.m. Workshop 1 on Monday, Sept. 28 will focus on developing the draft mission,

vision and core values. Workshop 2 on Wednesday, Sept. 30 will focus on developing strategic goals. Workshop 3 on Wednesday, Oct. 14 will focus on developing priority objectives.

The workshops will build on research conducted in August by an independent strategic planning firm, including a survey of and interviews with CWD employees and board members. That input identified perspectives on the district's mission, vision and values; goals and objectives; opportunities and challenges; and desired outcomes. Findings from the research and public workshops will be integrated into the draft

strategic plan.

Members of the public are invited to attend the workshops and provide comments. All three workshops will be held at Carmichael Water District Board Room, 7837 Fair Oaks Blvd., Carmichael.

Following the workshops, CWD will integrate the findings and input into a draft strategic plan for Board consideration. The Board expects to consider the

Protecting Yosemite for Future Generations

There are some places in California that belong to all of us. Yosemite is one of them.

More than 160 years ago, in the middle of the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Yosemite Grant Act of 1864. That law transferred Yosemite Valley and the Mariposa Grove of giant sequoias to California for public use, recreation and preservation. Among its most important provisions was a simple but powerful promise: the land would be “inalienable for all time.” That promise is worth remembering now.

Unfortunately, a proposed land exchange at Yosemite National Park would give a private developer access across federal park land to connect an adjacent property to a road inside the park. Kingsbarn Realty Capital owns an 83-acre parcel outside Yosemite's western boundary and is seeking that access to facilitate development. The Department of the Interior has said no final decision has been made and that any exchange

would have to comply with federal law and environmental review. Those assurances do not settle the larger question: whether Yosemite land should be on the table at all.

I do not believe it should. Earlier this month 61 members of the California Legislature — more than half of the state's 118 lawmakers — sent a bipartisan letter to Interior Secretary Doug Burgum urging him to halt and reject the proposal. I was proud to sign it. Our message was straightforward: Yosemite belongs to no one and to everyone. It is held in trust for generations yet to come and this deal would break that promise.

The idea is not new. A previous owner sought private road access through park land beginning in the 2000s. The National Park Service refused. The owner sued. In 2012, a federal appeals court upheld the rejection. That should have ended the matter. Instead, after the current developer purchased the adjacent parcels in 2024, the same underlying request returned — not through the courts this time, but through a land exchange negotiated with federal officials.

We are also concerned by reports that the Department has considered using the Land and Water Conservation Fund in connection with the exchange. That fund

exists to acquire and protect public land, not to underwrite its handoff to a private developer. Earlier this year, the Legislature adopted AJR 9 urging full funding and staffing for the National Park Service and opposing the transfer of federal park lands. We write in that same spirit.

The existence of a land-exchange mechanism does not make this appropriate use of it. Protecting Yosemite requires no creative reading of federal law. It requires the judgment to say no.

Californians disagree on many things. Protecting the places that belong to all Americans should not be one of them. Our national parks are not ordinary parcels of government property. They are part of the nation's heritage. When Lincoln signed the Yosemite Grant, he was not thinking about the next news cycle. He was thinking about a future he would never see. It is now our responsibility to protect Yosemite for future generations.
