MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - This year’s Marysville Stampede festivities brought the Old West back to life across Yuba-Sutter, as residents were treated to a week of hoof-pounding events that mixed rodeo tradition with community support.

Festivities kicked off Tuesday, Sept. 8, with the inaugural Golden Circle of Champions fundraiser, where donors lined up at Geweke Ford in Yuba City to receive barbecue dinners courtesy of Cool Hand Luke’s while wishing 4-year-old David Harvey well as he continues his fight against cancer.

Harvey appeared in good spirits, waving to the crowd, riding a mule

D Street Fire Displaces Marysville Residents

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Thursday, Sept. 10, at around 2:30 p.m., a fire broke out in downtown Marysville in the upper apartment complex at 423 D St. The historic mixed-use building was quickly engulfed in flames, with damage heavily concentrated on the upper-right-side units facing D Street.

The following morning, Friday, Sept. 11, residents could be seen along the sidewalk as firefighters allowed them back inside portions of the building to try to salvage their belongings.

“They called me into the office and asked about my mom’s address,” said Michelle Lockhart, a student at Lindhurst High School. “I was really confused, and then they told me what was happening and I just started bawling.”

Lockhart, who also serves as secretary for her local FFA chapter, said the

sudden loss of their home has been disruptive for both her and her mother, Jennifer Lockhart, who works full time. Still, the two said they are trying to look on the bright side and are grateful everyone made it out safely. Because their apartment was located on a lower level, some of their

belongings were spared from the flames and could still be recovered.

“I wish we had got renters insurance, but I’m just happy everyone is OK,” Jennifer Lockhart said.

No residents were injured in the fire, according to Marysville police and residents at the scene.

However, a few residents reported that a cat belonging to one of the tenants was found deceased.

Brad Palm, who serves as the apartment manager and also lived in the building, was home when the fire broke out. Palm recalled hearing a loud

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Measure G Revenue Split Takes Shape

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sutter County has approved revenue-sharing agreements outlining how millions of dollars generated by a proposed 1% countywide sales tax could be divided with the cities of Yuba City and Live Oak if voters approve Measure G in November.

Under the agreements approved by the Sutter County Board of Supervisors on Sept. 8, the county would receive an estimated \$9.2 million annually, while Yuba City would receive about \$12.5 million. Live Oak would keep all Measure G revenue generated within its city limits, with a guaranteed minimum of \$750,000 a year during the first two years, officials said.

The arrangement reflects negotiations begun after supervisors placed Measure G on the Nov. 3 ballot earlier this summer. County officials said the framework recognizes that much of the taxable retail activity occurs inside the cities while Sutter County continues to provide services throughout the area.

County Administrative Officer Steve Smith said Sutter County would keep all revenue generated in unincorporated communities along with 22.5% of collections generated inside Yuba City.

Yuba City would retain the remaining 77.5% generated within the city, officials said.

The Yuba City agreement is also tied to a significant change in law enforcement responsibilities.

No later than July 1, 2028, the Yuba City Police Department would assume responsibility for law enforcement in the South Walton area now served by the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office under a tax-sharing arrangement dating to 2000, officials said. When that transfer occurs, an existing sales tax payment from Yuba City to Sutter County associated with those services would end.

Officials said if Yuba City is not prepared to take over the area by the deadline, the Sheriff’s Office would continue providing law enforcement and bill the city quarterly for the actual cost until the transition is completed.

Yuba City Mayor Marc Boomgaarden pointed to the cooperation among Sutter County and its two cities in developing the plan.

“We have walked hand in hand trying to structure an agreement that’s good for everyone and the 99-plus thousand people in Sutter County,” Boomgaarden said. “I

and dressed in his finest cowboy attire. Prior to his appearance, Stampede organizers arranged a proper cowboy shopping spree at Cotton's Cowboy Corral to help Harvey look and feel his best for his big week.

"This was about more than just clothes; it was about showering David with the strength, love, and community spirit of the rodeo world," Marysville Stampede organizers said in a statement.

Harvey was named the Marysville Stampede's 2026 Golden Circle Champion as part of the newly launched local Golden Circle of Champions program, which supports children and families facing pediatric cancer. Organizers said funds raised through the local program remain in the community to help families with expenses associated with treatment.

Two days later, on Sept. 10, the annual cattle drive encountered a slight detour. Instead of following its traditional route

through downtown Marysville, the procession traveled down F Street toward Biz Johnson Drive to avoid road closures associated with a structure fire on D Street.

While the roads were different, the feeling remained the same, with residents lining the streets to welcome a procession of longhorn cattle, cowboys and cowgirls, Stampede royalty and other participants as they made their way toward Riverfront Park.

By the weekend, attention turned toward the Cotton Rosser Arena for the 92nd annual Marysville Stampede, held Sept. 12 and 13. The Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association-sanctioned competition brought riders and ropers to Marysville for two days of steer wrestling, roping, barrel racing and rough-stock events.

Several competitors from the surrounding region made their presence known. Wheatland's Hayden Webb delivered one of the weekend's most commanding performances, taking first place

in steer wrestling with a time of 6.0 seconds. The run put Webb well ahead of the rest of the field and gave the Yuba-Sutter area a hometown victory.

Lincoln's Hunter Morgan added another nearby win, taking the barrel racing title in 15.97 seconds. Morgan finished a full half-second ahead of second-place Kaillee Hamre at 16.47 seconds, while Jennifer Haile finished third at 16.75 seconds. Morgan entered the weekend ranked among the California Circuit's top barrel racers.

Tie-down roping produced one of the more unusual finishes of the Stampede, with three competitors ending the rodeo tied for first place. The Frost family of Browns Valley also returned to the Marysville arena. Jasper Frost finished seventh in the rough-stock competition, while his brother, Jacek Frost, was disqualified from his ride this year. The result marked a change of fortune from last year's Stampede, when Jacek Frost thrilled his

hometown crowd with an 84-point winning bareback ride. That victory became one of several key performances that helped propel the Browns Valley cowboy into the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association's Top 15 and ultimately to his first Wrangler National Finals Rodeo

appearance in Las Vegas. For Yuba-Sutter, the week offered another reminder that the Marysville Stampede remains as much about community and Western tradition as it is about who walks away with the fastest time or highest score. ★

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Sutter County Ends Fire Brownouts

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sutter County has reopened all of its fire stations after nearly three weeks of intermittent closures caused by a staffing shortage.

The Sutter County Fire Department returned all stations to service at 7 a.m. Sept. 10 after hiring three extra-help firefighters and seeing firefighters who had been on leave return to work.

The department began rotating station brownouts Aug. 25 as staffing fell to 50% of normal levels. At the time, the department had four fire engineer vacancies across its three stations and five additional employees on leave.

The county rotated the closures every 48 hours between Oswald Station 8, 1280 Barry Road in Yuba City, and Sutter Station 6, 2340 California St. in Sutter.

County officials said the rotation sought to maintain emergency response coverage in rural areas despite the staffing shortage.

During the brownouts, the county recruited and interviewed additional personnel while accelerating its hiring process. Three extra-help firefighters have since joined the department.

"We appreciate the public's patience and understanding as we worked through this staffing challenge," Sutter County Fire Chief Kyle Long said. "Our priority throughout this process has been to maintain safe staffing for our firefighters while providing the best possible emergency response coverage to the community."

The department does not anticipate additional station brownouts unless unforeseen circumstances affect staffing. Fire officials said they will continue monitoring staffing and operational needs. ★



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Yuba City Marks 25 Years Since 9/11

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Metal hooks on loose halyards clanged lightly against the flagpole in the morning wind, making a somber, bell-like sound as people gathered outside Yuba City Firehouse No. 1 Friday for the city’s annual Sept. 11 remembrance ceremony.

Promptly at 10 a.m., Yuba City Mayor and retired Fire Chief Marc Boomgaarden made his way to the podium.

“I had some prepared notes, but I thought that I’d probably just speak from the heart a bit today,” Boomgaarden said. “On September 10th, of 2001, the City Fire Department merged with the Walton Fire Protection District and that was a pretty momentous day for this department. But boy, was that going to be overshadowed by the next day, which was September 11th.”

Boomgaarden recalled waking the following morning to the realization that something tragic was unfolding across the country. As part of the state and federal emergency response system, Yuba City firefighters were placed on standby, prepared to deploy if needed.

“We were on standby for several weeks,” Boomgaarden said.

While the department was never called to Ground Zero, he said the loss was felt deeply throughout the fire service.

Twenty-five years later, firefighters, first responders and community members gathered again to remember those lost and those who responded. Following an invocation, moment of silence and bagpipe tribute, Yuba City Fire Chief Josh Hubbard took the podium.

“We gather because we made a promise, and that promise must be upheld: the promise that we would never forget,” Hubbard said. “But never forget means more than two words spoken in September. It’s a responsibility.”

Hubbard remembered the 2,977 people killed in the attacks, including passengers and crews aboard the four hijacked planes, those killed at the World Trade Center and Pentagon, and first responders. For firefighters, Hubbard said, one number carries particular weight: 343, the number of FDNY firefighters who died on Sept. 11.

“I don’t want us to think of 343 simply as a number, because numbers are far too easy for us to say,” Hubbard said. “These were 343 individual lives, stories and families.”

He described firefighters climbing stairwells opposite people trying to escape, carrying tools, hose and rescue equipment toward those trapped above.

“They continued because somewhere above them, someone they had never met needed their

help,” he said.

Rather than speak only in numbers, Hubbard shared the stories of seven FDNY members: Capt. Patrick Brown, Firefighter Andrew Frederick, Deputy Chief Raymond Downey, Chief of Department Peter Ganci, Firefighter Joseph Angelini Sr., Capt. Terry Hatton and Firefighter Sean Hanley. He used their legacies to illustrate courage, mentorship, preparation, leadership and service.

“There are 343 stories I wish I had time to tell you today,” Hubbard said. “But I believe one of our obligations to never forget is to occasionally stop looking at numbers and to start learning names.”

Of the seven, Hanley, of Ladder Company 20, appeared especially personal. Hubbard paused to regain his composure before explaining that he had the honor of carrying Hanley’s name during a memorial ceremony several years ago. Wanting to know more about the man behind the name, Hubbard began researching his life.

Hanley came from a firefighter family. Both grandfathers, his father and his brother were firefighters. On Sept. 11, Hanley had already finished his shift and could have gone home. Instead, after learning the World Trade Center was burning, he returned, grabbed his gear and went to the towers.

“He went back, and he did not come home,” Hubbard said.

Just months ago, Hubbard visited Ladder 20 in New York, where he saw Hanley’s name and photographs and met firefighters who continue to honor his memory. Seeing how much Hanley still means to a crew that never worked with him, Hubbard said, was “one of the coolest experiences of my life.”

The ceremony also included the posting of colors and a traditional fire service bell tribute. Yuba City Fire Capt. Martin Zavala explained that before modern dispatch systems, firehouses used coded bell signals to communicate alarms. The signal 5-5-5-5, Zavala said, was sounded when a firefighter died in the line of duty. A bell was then sounded in honor of the 343 FDNY firefighters killed on Sept. 11.

Closing the ceremony, Boomgaarden thanked first responders, organizers and community members, saying the turnout was the largest he had seen in more than two decades of the annual remembrance.

“For those who are serving as first responders, no matter what the profession, please stay safe,” Boomgaarden said. “Please know that we honor and we respect and we certainly value your service to your communities.”

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think this measure is fair.”

Boomgaarden said local governments are struggling to keep pace with rising costs.

“We’re trying to provide a level of service that the public demands with diminishing resources,” Boomgaarden said. “And so we’re at that point where we need to ask the public again.”

From July 1, 2027, through June 30, 2029, Live Oak would receive the guaranteed minimum. If sales tax collections from Measure G exceed \$750,000, the city would receive the larger total, officials said.

Live Oak City Manager Ben Moody said the additional revenue is important for a city currently operating with an approximately \$800,000 structural deficit.

“This is critical public safety, roads, response times,” Moody said.

Sutter County Supervisor Dan Flores said Measure G goes beyond a tax-sharing formula.

“It’s about public safety, it’s about the roads. It’s about all the issues that are facing the citizens right now,” Flores said.

But the proposal has also drawn opposition from residents who question whether the county should seek additional tax revenue before addressing concerns about spending and financial accountability.

During public comment earlier in the meeting, Sutter County resident Ramona Maloney urged greater scrutiny of county finances before voters are asked to approve another tax.

“I think we need to audit Sutter County before the taxpayers have to pay any more taxes because it seems to me my taxes aren’t going for the things that I need,” Maloney said.

Other speakers questioned county spending and whether the additional general fund revenue would be directed toward the priorities county officials have emphasized while promoting Measure G.

“While you pay out a huge number of bloated six-figure salaries, you now want to burden the regular taxpayer with higher costs who make substantially less and are struggling to pay for groceries, gas and housing,” resident Richard Dixon said. “This is the epitome of the county wanting to have its cake and eat it too entirely on the backs of the taxpayers.”

Liz Cervantes agreed that residents deserve greater accountability from county leaders.

“Sutter County residents work hard for their money,” Cervantes said. “They deserve to know that every dollar taken from them is necessary, justified, and spent wisely. They deserve safe communities. They deserve essential services. They deserve open government. And most importantly, they deserve elected officials who remember that government works for the people, not the other way around.”

The Board of Supervisors approved the tax share agreements following the presentation and public comment. Yuba City and Live Oak considered the agreements separately.

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Life Advancement Center Opens in Yuba City

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - When the Salvation Army’s Depot Family Crisis Center in Marysville announced its closure this past January, many were concerned about what the loss would mean for unhoused residents throughout the region.

The closure marked the loss of one of Yuba-Sutter’s largest and longest-running family shelters, leaving many to ask: What now? The Depot had operated for more than three decades and served roughly 150 households, or about 400 individuals, in a typical year. Less than eight months later, that question is beginning to be answered.

On Sept. 10, Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter formally unveiled its new Life Advancement Center, located at 916 Plumas St. in Yuba City, during a ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house. The center is envisioned as a comprehensive campus designed to help individuals and families move from crisis to stability and, ultimately, permanent housing. Services include emergency shelter, family accommodations, recuperative care, behavioral health and recovery support,

transitional housing, young adult services, case management and housing navigation.

“The idea is, it’s a stepping stone,” said Joseph Hale, chief executive officer of Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter. “The goal is we don’t want to be your revolving door of people continuing homelessness. We want to see a shift out of it in an upward path into something better.”

That goal is particularly significant for families. The center includes private family accommodations intended to allow parents

and children to remain together while receiving services, helping restore some of the capacity lost when the Depot closed.

The center also substantially expands the region’s shelter and recovery capacity. Habitat lists up to 20 beds for recuperative care, intended for people who are medically stable enough to leave the hospital but still need a safe place to recover, an option Hale and staff said has been greatly lacking in the Yuba-Sutter region.

“This is absolutely low barrier to entry,” said

Karen Gheorma, Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter’s director of Supportive Outreach Services. “Just give us a call and we can help coordinate.”

Representatives from Peach Tree Health touring the facility during the Sept. 10 open house were particularly interested in the recuperative care program as well as the center’s emergency shelter capacity.

“It’s just hard to get them in because beds are always full,” said Kelly M., a senior case manager with Peach Tree Health. “One thing that I’m noticing is

that I have some patients who are saying that now police are picking them up even if they’re sleeping at all on the street ... resulting in court dates and fines.”

Hale said having shelter services available 24 hours a day could help address some of those situations by giving law enforcement and service providers another place to connect people with shelter rather than leaving them without an immediate option.

The Life Advancement Center occupies the former First Baptist Church at 916 Plumas St. The property

previously operated as a nearly 20,000-square-foot church facility before Habitat converted it for its new use. Hale said renovation costs totaled about \$3 million and included extensive work to the building’s plumbing, air conditioning, fire sprinkler system and interior walls.

“We really gutted it,” Hale said. “Technically, it’s a brand-new building, even though it looks the same.”

Habitat is also continuing to raise support for the center through its Spaces of Hope campaign, which allows businesses, organizations, foundations, families and individuals to sponsor specific rooms, program areas, furnishings and other portions of the facility. Sponsorship opportunities range from individual beds and lockers to family rooms, recuperative care rooms and larger program areas.

For Habitat, however, the larger goal is for the center to be a temporary stop rather than a destination. The organization says its housing navigation services will help participants pursue permanent housing through rental assistance, landlord engagement, move-in coordination, supportive housing and other pathways toward long-term independence. ★

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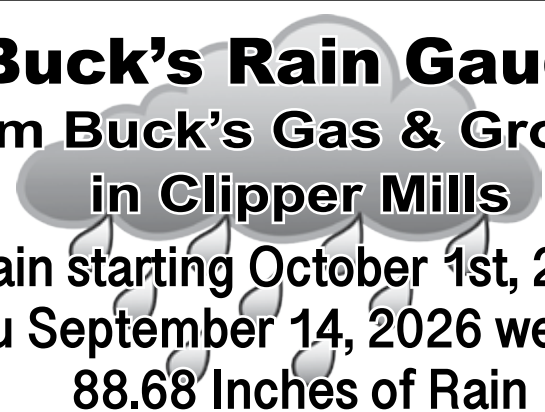
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It isn't the Earnings

Last week I was watching my usual business channel, and they were discussing the recent hammering of the clothing manufacturer Lululemon's stock. The analysts were blaming the drop in their stock by anemic marketing, unexciting products and better execution by their competitors like Nike and others in the sports clothing space. The discussion centered around which of their competitor's stock would they buy instead of the foundering stock of Lululemon.

Sorry kids. I couldn't disagree more. The problem is not with Lululemon per se and the investing solution is not in the buying of some other upper tier clothing company's stock.

Let's just back up a bit shall we and open up our ECON 101 books once again. It's surprising that many of the commentators featured on business channels keep missing the basics when it comes to macro-economic analysis.

Lululemon, Nike and some of the other sports clothing lines exist in what I would call the highly discretionary apparel space. This means the price is higher than some of the other retailers that supply athletic clothing.

Puma, Nike, Under Armour and Adidas have all had their stocks drop in price in the last year or so and it isn't because one company or another has been doing a better job of it.

The fact of the matter is that all these companies sell high-end apparel, and people just can't afford to spend \$80 on a yoga mat or \$160 on a pair of sneakers when there are cheaper options available.

As the TV analysts argued over which high end clothing stock they would buy instead of Lululemon, I sat screaming at the screen saying, "None of them!"

Sure, Lululemon might be making some mistakes as compared to its competitors, but that's not the issue. The whole high end clothing space, indeed, many of the high-end retailers, no matter what they're selling are finding fewer and fewer customers that can afford higher priced items when cheaper alternatives are plentiful.

It doesn't take a rocket scientist to know why these companies are struggling. It's because of the persistent and aggressive inflation that has been ongoing since the end of the CoVid shutdowns.

I am sure most of you reading this knew that answer already, right?

Massive amounts of Covid bailout money combined with the end of the shutdown demand met with the constricted supply lines of the very same shutdowns which has spawned the worst inflation since the 1980's. Add to that the ongoing tariffs and the spike in oil prices and it makes for an inflationary fire that continues to rage on seemingly without let up.

Adding insult to inflationary injury, I read a new wrinkle in the prognostication of inflation centering around Artificial Intelligence (AI). There have been several articles by Reuters, CNBC and even the Federal Reserve citing that the cost in AI will force up overall prices even further.

The basic premise came about by observing the humongous run up in AI stock prices. The investment by many companies to incorporate AI in their services has been huge, close to a trillion dollars this year alone. Estimates on future spending reaches into the multitrillions.

Since this massive spending adds to the cost of production of almost all goods and services, those costs will be passed onto the consumer in the way of higher prices.

I keep saying inflation will not be going away anytime soon, or anytime later either.

I also keep saying, "You ain't seen nuthin' yet".

And you ain't.

boom before realizing something was wrong. He immediately called 911 and began helping evacuate residents from the seven-unit building. The official cause of the fire had not yet been announced.

"I've been a manager here for seven weeks. I did it to get a better apartment,"

Palm said, half-joking. "Guess that didn't work out."

Residents said the building owners believe it could take up to a year before all of the damage is repaired and the building is safe to rent again, leaving many of the former residents displaced and working out what comes next.

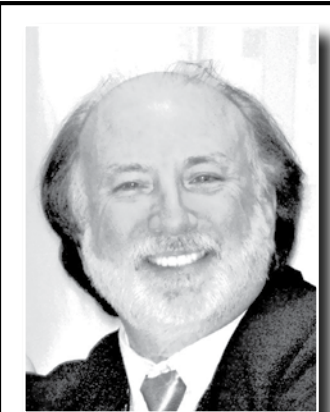

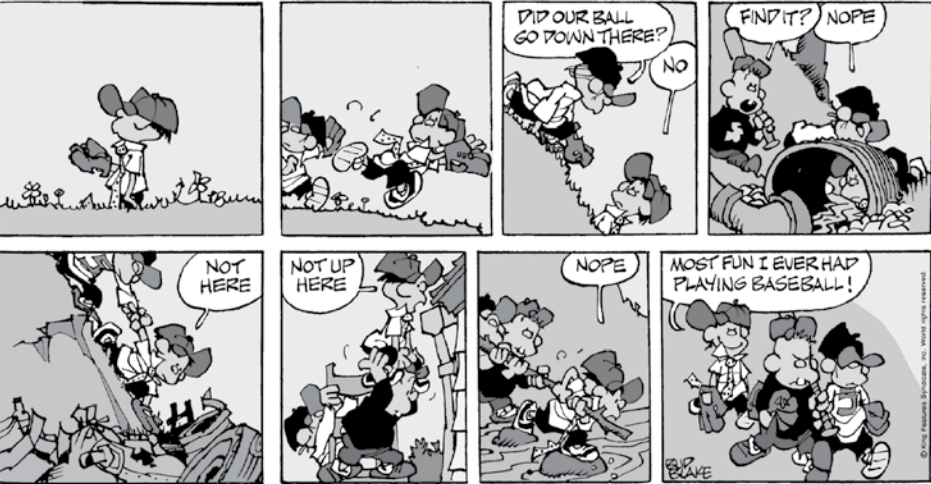

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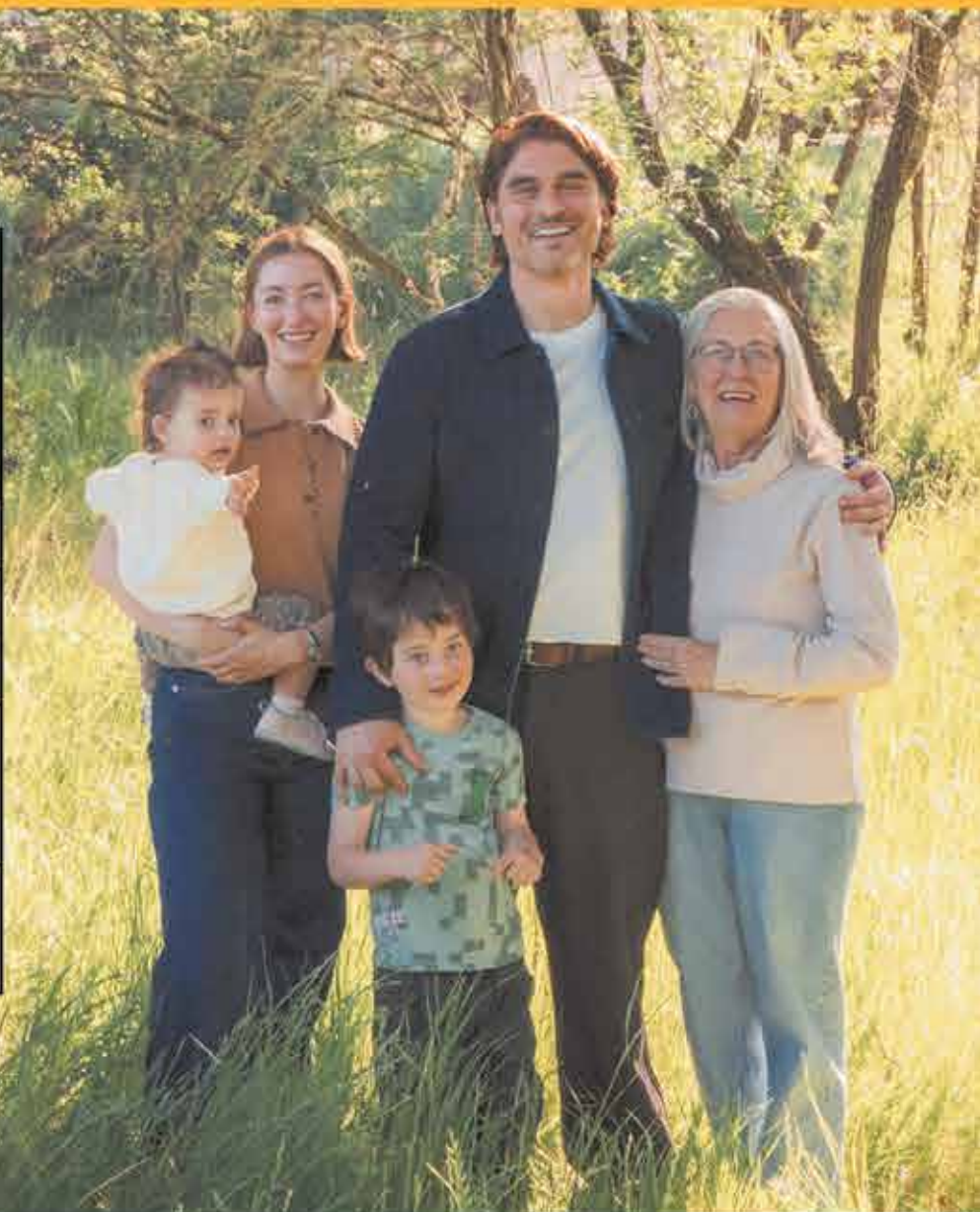
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
