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Rotary Donates \$10,000 to Sutter Track

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Sutter Union High School's track and field program will soon have new equipment after receiving a \$10,000 donation from the Rotary Club of Yuba City.

Rotary members presented the check to Sutter Union High School representatives, coaches and student-athletes during the club's weekly meeting Wednesday, Sept. 16, at the Harvest Room inside New Earth Market in Yuba City.

The contribution is expected to fund equipment used across several track and field events, including plyometric boxes, a takeoff board and adjustable hurdles for jumping drills; starting blocks and batons for sprinters and relay teams; and shot puts for throwing events.

Among the largest planned purchases is a high jump pad, which will allow Sutter athletes to practice the high jump at their own school. If money remains after the equipment purchases, the

program hopes to put the additional funds toward new team uniforms.

Sutter Union High School track and field coach Sammy Zamarron said the program is focused not only on developing athletes but also on building teamwork and character.

"Our foundation is 'we over me,'" Zamarron said. "At Sutter, we're building athletes who work hard, lift each other up and take pride

in representing their school."

Zamarron said his goal is to help athletes improve their speed and strength while encouraging them to support one another as a team.

"When we make each other better, the whole team succeeds," he said.

Returning Sutter jumpers Alexizia Zamarron and Nyla Zwissig also attended Wednesday's meeting, where they spoke with Rotary members about the events

in which they compete and what the club's contribution means for the program.

Rotary Club of Yuba City President Tara Art said the club was particularly interested in purchasing equipment that could continue benefiting students beyond the current season.

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Tax Divide Deepens Across Sutter County

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The city councils of Yuba City and Live Oak have signed off on their shares of Sutter County's proposed 1% sales tax, leaving voters to decide Nov. 3 whether the latest attempt to raise local sales taxes moves forward.

The agreements come as Measure G has drawn increasingly pointed public debate, including on social media. At the Sept. 15 Yuba City Council meeting, Scott Kirschner of Yuba City urged voters to consider the financial pressures facing local government rather than become consumed by the rhetoric surrounding the proposal.

"The days of the old and obsolete phrase, no new taxes are over," Kirschner said.

Kirschner said the current campaign has also produced more substantive exchanges than previous efforts.

"This time around there are actual constructive conversations in our community in private and in public," Kirschner said.

Sutter County, Yuba City and Live Oak currently have a 7.25% sales tax rate. Measure G would add 1%, bringing the rate to 8.25% if approved.

Measure G marks the third attempt in four years to increase sales taxes locally. Sutter County voters rejected Measure A in 2022, a countywide 1% sales tax proposed for nine years. Two years later, Yuba City voters rejected Measure D, a separate 1% city sales tax.

The tenor of the current debate also drew concern from Yuba City Councilmember Toni Cole, who addressed the hostility surrounding Measure G and urged residents to allow room for opposing views.

"The people working on this are getting vilified and us as a community, we need to move past the stage in our psyche and evolution of vilifying people for having a different opinion than you," Cole said. "We need to do better."

She ended with a direct appeal aimed at the online debate.

"To our community, please just continue to respect each other online especially," Cole said.

Yuba City approved its revenue-sharing agreement Sept. 15, followed by Live Oak on Sept. 16. Both agreements would take effect only if voters approve Measure G.

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Linda's Soda Bar & Grill Marks End of Era on Plumas Street

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - For more than two decades, Linda's Soda Bar & Grill has offered visitors to downtown Yuba City a step back in time.

With its black-and-white checkered floors, bright yellow diner booths and walls covered from end to end in photographs, vintage trinkets, military memorabilia and local history, the restaurant at 668 Plumas St. has become nearly as recognizable for its atmosphere as for its breakfasts, burgers and homemade pies. But on Sept. 27, Linda's will serve its customers for the final time under its current ownership.

Owner Lori Pack announced the closure on the restaurant's social media page Thursday, Sept. 17.

"We will be closing as of Sunday the 27th," Pack wrote. "The landlord and I are working diligently to make sure another wonderful restaurant comes in. The

restaurant may be closed for a short time but it will soon have another great restaurant in its place."

The announcement came as a shock to many in the community who were unaware of the business's struggles. Speaking with the Territorial Dispatch Friday, Sept. 18, Pack said the decision ultimately came down to finances.

"Well, it's just the economy. I mean, we're not making enough money to pay the bills," Pack said.

Although the restaurant may appear busy during peak hours, Pack said those periods do not tell the whole story.

"People are like, 'It looks busy,' but it really just depends on the time of day you come in," she said.

The closure marks the end of another chapter for a restaurant whose history on Plumas Street stretches back decades. Former owner Linda McKenna began as a waitress at the restaurant before eventually purchasing the business. A 2017 Territorial Dispatch article reported McKenna had bought the restaurant roughly 18 years earlier.

Over the years, the restaurant became a fixture of Yuba City's downtown shopping district. In 2020, CNN referred to Linda's as a "local institution," while a 2014 Good Day Sacramento feature showcased the restaurant as a throwback to the "Fabulous '50s."

That aesthetic has remained largely intact. The restaurant's checkerboard floors, soda-counter atmosphere and retro furnishings are surrounded by an eclectic collection accumulated over the years. Its walls include vintage photographs and

advertisements, tributes to local military members and Beale Air Force Base, collectible items, pieces of Yuba-Sutter history and even a collection dedicated to "The Wizard of Oz."

Many of those objects also carry personal stories. As the restaurant prepares to close, Pack said she is contacting people who donated items to the collection and giving them the opportunity to take them back. She is also setting aside certain pieces for longtime customers who have developed attachments to them.

"I'm giving back to the people that have given us stuff, if they want it," Pack said. "And then certain regular customers want certain things, and I'm making sure they get it."

Pack said she purchased the business, including its collection of memorabilia, for approximately \$900,000 when she took over in 2021. She hopes her story will also shed light on the importance of

supporting locally owned businesses. As she spoke Friday, Pack fought back tears while describing the restaurant and what it has meant to her.

"I never expected this to happen because I love this restaurant," she said. "I feel like I let it down."

Pack also voiced frustration at seeing drive-thru lines at large chains packed with cars while locally owned restaurants with competitively priced menus struggle to fill tables.

"People don't realize that when they're not supporting, you know, it's like this is what can happen," Pack said. "It's just so important to support local businesses."

What comes next for Pack personally is less certain. Facing financial struggles herself, she said her next step will be finding steady employment. Even so, she remains hopeful about both her future and that of the restaurant.

"Something is going to come in here," Pack said. "The landlord's going to keep trying to get something in here. ... Even though I'm closing on the 27th, we're still going to work together to make sure that something comes in."

Pack said she has already received inquiries from prospective operators and hopes to find a buyer with the financial backing needed to bring the restaurant into a new era.

"It might be a little different, but I think they're going to keep it kind of the same," she said. "I couldn't give it what it needed, but I believe that it will come."

Linda's Soda Bar & Grill is scheduled to close Sunday, Sept. 27. ★

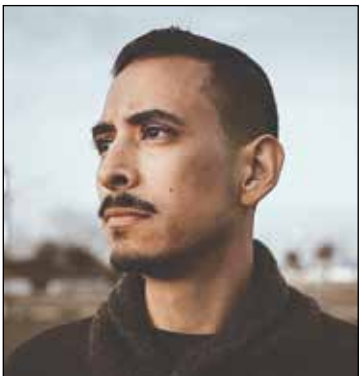

Mobile Simulation Lab Trains Medical Staff

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - A 26-year-old man has just undergone surgery when something begins to go seriously wrong.

His body is having a severe reaction to the anesthesia. His vital signs begin to change, his condition deteriorates and the medical team surrounding him has to quickly determine what is happening and how to respond.

Fortunately, this patient can blink, breathe and react to medication, but he cannot actually be harmed.

The patient is a high-fidelity mannequin inside Sutter Health's roughly 45-foot Mobile Simulation Lab, which visited Sutter Surgical Hospital North Valley in Yuba City on Friday, Sept. 18, giving local medical staff an opportunity to practice responding to emergencies in a realistic but consequence-free environment. Approximately 30 nurses and surgical technologists were expected to participate in training throughout the day, according to Sutter Health.

During Friday's sessions, staff were presented with a simulated case involving malignant hyperthermia, a potentially dangerous reaction that can

occur following the use of certain anesthetics.

"One of the things I noticed is we've come to this site a few times, and we have some repeat partners that want to come back and do it again because they had such a positive experience," said Brandon Fisher, manager of clinical education, clinical development and simulation. "Today we had like six or seven people that were here last time, and that's pretty cool."

Inside the trailer, the training space resembles a hospital room, complete with a patient monitor, medication cart, oxygen, blood pressure equipment, IV fluids and other supplies staff would expect to use during an actual

emergency. Behind the scenes, instructors sit inside a control room where they can manipulate the mannequin's condition in real time.

"Everything that happens with the mannequin is controlled with this computer," Fisher said. "He blinks, he has chest rise. It's pretty cool."

Instructors can communicate with participants through the mannequin and alter its vital signs according to the actions taken by the medical team. If clinicians administer medication, for example, instructors can adjust the mannequin's heart rate to simulate how a real patient might respond.

"We try to make it as real

as possible," Fisher said.

Typically, between three and seven staff members work through a scenario together at one time. In addition to practicing medical procedures, the simulations are intended to strengthen communication, delegation and teamwork during high-pressure situations. Staff can practice skills including CPR, defibrillation and medication administration without placing an actual patient at risk.

"They can practice on a mannequin before they ever touch a human," Fisher said.

Unlike simulations used in some medical and nursing schools, where students may be tested or graded,

Fisher said the mobile lab is designed as a low-pressure environment for working medical professionals to practice their skills.

"This is practice. We're not graded," Fisher told participants. "We support each other and try to have some fun too."

The mobile simulation lab itself is relatively new. Fisher said the unit was obtained by Sutter at the end of May after being custom-built specifically for the health system. The resulting trailer is 45 feet long, 15 feet wide and 14 feet tall.

Fisher and his team take the mobile lab to hospitals and medical facilities throughout its service area,

with an emphasis on communities farther from California's major metropolitan centers. The program is meant to supplement training already conducted by individual hospitals, some of which may have only one or two educators responsible for training an entire facility.

The Sept. 18 stop marked the mobile unit's second visit to Sutter Surgical Hospital North Valley. By the time of the late-morning tour, three sessions had already been completed, with additional training planned for later in the day.

Asked how participants had handled the simulated emergency so far, Fisher's assessment was simple. "They did fantastic." ★

Trash Collection Days Changing in Yuba-Sutter

YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG) - About 35,000 Recology Yuba-Sutter customers could see changes to their garbage collection days beginning the week of Oct. 12 as the company restructures routes across Yuba and Sutter counties.

The change marks the first substantial rerouting of the company's collection system in about 25 years. Recology said residential growth and uneven workloads across existing routes prompted the adjustment.

Customers who use

plastic carts could be affected. Commercial customers who receive service through metal bins will not see changes under the rerouting.

Residents can check their address at <http://recology.com/rysreroute> to determine whether their collection day will change.

Residential growth in communities including Linda, Plumas Lake and Yuba City has added customers to routes that have largely remained unchanged. Recology said some collection days now carry significantly heavier workloads for drivers,

trucks and equipment.

"Yuba-Sutter has grown significantly, but our collection routes have largely remained the same," Recology Yuba-Sutter General Manager Rigo Diaz said. "This reroute will allow us to better serve the community we have today while preparing for the continued growth we know is coming."

Under the new system, Recology plans to distribute customers more evenly throughout the service week and group routes more closely by geographic area.

The company said the changes

should also make it easier to respond to missed collections and requests for additional service. Under the current system, drivers may need to travel across the service area or cross county lines to address a service problem.

More centralized routes should reduce that travel and improve response times, according to Recology.

Driver safety also factored into the restructuring. The company said balancing the number of customers assigned to each collection day should help drivers complete routes within

operating and work-hour limits. The change could also provide additional flexibility when traffic, weather, equipment problems or other circumstances disrupt daily operations.

Recology plans to notify affected customers before the new schedules take effect. The company will use postcards, text messages, automated phone calls, social media and online notices.

Customers do not need to wait for a notification to check their schedule. Address-specific information is available at <http://recology.com/rysreroute>. ★

Pride Celebration Returns to Yuba City, Oct. 3

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Tri-County Diversity will bring its fifth annual Pride in the Park back to Sam Brannan Park on Saturday, Oct. 3, with live entertainment, vendors, community resources and activities for children.

The free, all-ages event will run from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the park, 806 Gray Ave. Organizers confirmed the festival will proceed at Sam Brannan Park despite the park’s closure to the general public.

Yuba City closed Sam Brannan Park to the public beginning Sept. 1. According to Tri-County Diversity, the organization remained in communication with Yuba City Parks and Recreation about its existing reservation.

Organizers said the city confirmed the closure will not affect the Pride in the Park reservation. The organization will have access to the park, including its pavilions and restrooms, and organizers said major construction is not expected to begin until later in October.

The festival will include performances throughout the day from Lizz Shine,

Cameron Love, KC Shane, Mercy and Just A Girl Band. A Show of Hands ASL Interpreting Services will provide interpretation for performances on the main stage.

Lizz Shine fronts the Northern California-based Lizz Shine Band, which performs rock music. KC Shane, a Sacramento-based singer-songwriter, will perform with his band, The Belonging. Mercy Rei Tang will bring poetry and performance to the stage, while Sacramento-based Just A Girl Band features singer-songwriter EuDora Star. Cameron Love is also scheduled to perform.

StarShine Productions and Lizz Shine are coordinating the stage and entertainment for the event.

Beyond the stage, Pride in the Park will include local artists, merchandise vendors, food vendors, resource booths, a kids zone and raffle prizes.

Organizations scheduled to have booths include Sutter County Public Health, Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health, Sierra Mental Wellness Group, Peach Tree Health and the Center for Workers’ Rights, along with other

community groups and businesses.

Food vendors listed for the festival include Dreamy Treats, Tacos Los Reina’s, Stupid Lemonade and Kie Kie’s Lumpia. Additional vendors and resources are listed on Tri-County Diversity’s Pride website.

Tri-County Diversity describes Pride in the Park as an inclusive event for people of different orientations, gender identities, races, ethnicities, abilities and backgrounds. The organization also operates peer support programs, social activities and resource services throughout the year.

Admission to Pride in the Park is free. Donation tickets are available for those who want to support Tri-County Diversity and TCD YOUTH! programs and future community events.

Golden 1 Credit Union is providing financial support for the festival. Live Oak Church of the Brethren will provide free water to attendees.

Evans coordinated with 17 agencies during the three-day operation, which involved more than 50 law enforcement personnel each day and resulted in 17 arrests.

Yuba City Police K9 Rip Retires - Yuba City Police Department K9 Rip retired Sept. 17 after nearly 300 deployments during his career. Police said Rip assisted with 13 apprehensions, 136 suspect surrenders and 59 article searches that located 29 items of evidence. Rip also served as the department’s SWAT K9 and was named YCPD K9 of the Year in 2025.

Marysville Reminds Drivers of 72-Hour Parking Rule - Marysville officials are reminding motorists that vehicles may not remain parked on a public street for more than 72 consecutive hours without being moved. Orange notices placed on vehicles are warnings, not parking tickets, and identify issues that may need to be corrected to avoid possible towing.

Marysville Police Resume Downtown Foot Patrols - Marysville Police Department officers have resumed foot patrols in the downtown area. The patrols are intended to increase police visibility, allow officers to check in with businesses and provide more opportunities for contact with residents and visitors.

Yuba County Shooting Under Investigation - Yuba County sheriff’s deputies are investigating a Sept. 11 shooting reported about 7:33 p.m. in the 5800 block of Lowe Avenue. Authorities said gunfire struck one occupied vehicle and one unoccupied vehicle. No injuries were reported, and the investigation remains active.

Vineyard Workers Feel Wine Industry Pain

California farmworkers suffered a wave of job losses during the past few years as work in the state’s winegrape vineyards dried up amid a yearslong market slump. Since 2023, declining wine consumption left growers with an oversupply of grapes, forcing many to sell their fruit at a loss or watch it rot on the vines. To limit their losses, growers cut back on labor and other costs, and vineyard owners removed an estimated one-quarter of the state’s winegrape acreage. As a result, the iconic sector likely shed at least several thousand vineyard jobs, industry leaders estimated, with some workers getting laid off and others losing hours. “It’s pretty ugly,” said Guadalupe Gonzalez, a Napa Valley vineyard crew supervisor who has worked in the region’s vineyards for more than a decade. Gonzalez said she used to work seven days a week during harvest, earning enough to save up for the offseason. But last year, she said, work slowed as grapes went unpicked and more wineries opted to harvest with machines. This year, “It’s a thousand times worse,” she said.

El Niño Increases Chances of Winter Storms and Floods

California’s water year will be shaped by the arrival of El Niño, a climate pattern that raises the likelihood of intense precipitation and flooding in the coming months. Experts call the upcoming system a super El Niño. A National Weather Service report in August said there’s a 69% chance its strength would exceed that of previous El Niño events dating back to 1950. Farmers said they were wary of extreme weather similar to atmospheric river

storms that flooded many California farms in 2023. Monterey County farmer Jynel Gualarte said those storms submerged 200 acres of her farm, broke her levee in multiple places and destroyed a house, causing financial damage that has been difficult to recover from. Gualarte said she wants the state to make changes that would better prepare people for future floods. “I don’t like hearing that it’s going to be a super El Niño because there’s no way we can have another flood like 2023,” she said. “That would be absolutely tragic.”

Owl Study Assesses Rat Management in Nut Orchards

For more than a decade, university wildlife researchers have studied how installing barn owl nesting boxes and accompanying owl predation help manage small rodents in vineyards. Now they hope to take a similar approach during a three-year study that examines the effects of barn owl predation alone or combined with trapping to potentially manage roof rats in nut orchards. “We’ve documented that barn owls do indeed reduce the number of voles, gophers and mice, and we’ve learned a lot in the vineyard systems,” said Matthew Johnson, a Cal Poly, Humboldt, wildlife professor who led much of the research. “Now we’re really excited to try some similar approaches in orchards.” Although many growers have erected owl boxes to control small rodents in vineyards, he said little scientific data existed until recently about barn owl predation and how cultural practices influenced it. There’s been even less research into the feathered predator’s impacts on orchard rodents.★

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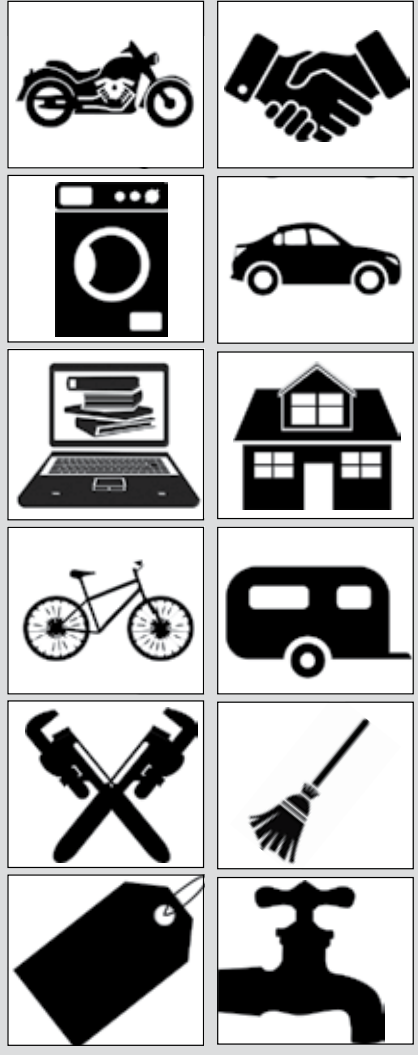
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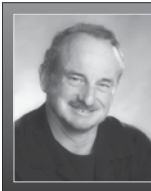

Insurance Plans Cause Inflation

Where a national insurance program goes, so goes inflation. An adage of mine hanging in my broadcast booth.

There is another saying also plastered on the wall of the studios of Money Matters radio and that one says, “where government money goes, so goes inflation”.

Most people scratch their head at that one but it's pretty simple to explain.

Using a fictional food insurance plan explains it quite succinctly and it's also a fun exercise.

Imagine the calls for food insurance arises from the masses because of rising food prices due to inflation.

We will call this fictional social-safety net the National Food Insurance Plan. It would be a single payer food insurance plan, much like Medicare or any other government funded plan covering the masses.

The program's function is to provide food to anyone that needs it, which is basically everyone.

The costs for the premiums would be calculated by including all the expense to procure, package, ship, warehouse and market all foodstuffs.

Like most government programs, almost everyone has to participate. Customers pay the premium with help from the government, and start to shop at the grocery stores with the National Food Plan Card. As the wheels are set in motion, many things start to happen.

The grocery stores, knowing customers have the card and won't care nor ask about costs since the food is covered, start to raise prices.

This is similar to what happens now with medical insurance.

When is the last time you asked about the cost of an MRI or X Ray?

Since food is essentially “free” to the customers, they now buy whatever they want and in whatever quantity the desire. This causes an increase in the demand over what would have been bought when price was a consideration.

Demand now skyrockets. This causes what is called “demand push” inflation, where higher demand causes prices to rise. Keep in mind the prices have already been raised by the grocery store because no one looks nor cares about what the food costs due to the insurance plan.

The costs to the insuring entity then skyrocket due to the higher prices set by the grocery stores because customers no longer care about price and therefore the stores can charge whatever they want. Adding insult to injury, the increased demand also pushes prices up even farther.

As the demand pushes prices up, the premiums are no longer sufficient to cover the program costs. The premiums then have to be raised to enable the program to continue. As long as the program continues to function, the cycle of higher food prices followed by higher premium prices continues in a never-ending upward spiral.

I know there will be some people that dispute the mechanism of government

fueled programs, but the economic machinations are functioning perfectly, although the result is the opposite of perfect.

The explanation is simple. Government spending is nuclear fueled spending. Their funds are unlimited and the costs are massive. Price constraint on the consumer side is removed. The demand is unlimited as the food is essentially free to the consumer. The price constraint of limited funds on the consumer side is eliminated as the program pays the bill. Much like the unawareness of medical costs in the case of medical insurance, the same is true for food costs under the National Food Plan. Consumers don't care about price as they don't pay it. Suppliers know the customer doesn't care nor even asks the price (much like today's medical environment), so suppliers jack up prices.

There are multiple examples of government fueled price inflation. Medical costs are a prime example. Fueled by medical insurance from both public and private funds, the cost for medical care has become astronomical and continues higher. The housing boom was fueled by government entities like Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. Supplemented by a variety of government backstops and monies, housing costs rocketed higher as more and more programs were initiated to help first time buyers and buyers in general.

Take a look at college costs. Once again funded by a variety of government programs, government monies funneled into colleges and university tuitions driving them through the roof where they continue to climb today.

Although inflation has rifled through the prices of many goods and services, college tuition, medical costs and housing costs continue to climb out of the reach of many Americans.

The mechanism of insurance was originally designed to transfer risk to a partnering entity in exchange for payment. On very large scales, such as at the national level, it can morph into an affordability program through a similar mechanism.

Instead of a one-off occasional occurrence, like a house fire, the problem arises when the risk is more like a necessity, or a widely used service by many.

What happens then is when it is government funded, coupled with huge demand, such as medical needs, housing or college, it can result in incredible price increases in any area where these programs exist.

G revenue generated within its boundaries. Preliminary estimates presented to the council put Yuba City’s share at approximately \$12.5 million annually, while Sutter County would receive about \$9.2 million.

Yuba City would also assume law enforcement responsibility for the South Walton area, now served by the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office, by July 1, 2028.

Live Oak would retain 100% of Measure G revenue generated within the city, with a guaranteed minimum of \$750,000 annually through June 30, 2029. Beginning July 1, 2029, the city would continue receiving all revenue generated within Live Oak.

Support for Measure G was not universal. Critics have questioned whether another sales tax is the right answer to the area’s financial pressures and raised concerns about how the money could ultimately be spent.

At the Live Oak meeting, Liz Cervantes argued that Measure G is a general tax, despite being promoted largely around needs such as public safety and roads.

“This is not a safety tax,” Cervantes said. “It is a general tax, therefore, a blank check out of the general fund.”

Cervantes also pointed to the unsuccessful Measure A effort and argued that local governments should find other ways to address ongoing budget pressures.

“How many times are they going to try this before they come up with some permanent solutions? Sustainable solutions,” Cervantes said.

The debate also extends beyond roads and public safety to broader questions about how limited public dollars should be divided among services, including those affecting quality of life.

Cervantes drew a sharp distinction between emergency services and other government programs.

“If my house is on fire, I’m not going to call the librarian,” Cervantes said.

She pointed to the Sutter County Library budget while questioning whether additional spending reductions could be made before voters are asked to approve another tax increase.

Live Oak City Manager Ben Moody said the city faces an approximately \$800,000 structural deficit in its general fund and that further reductions would be necessary if the gap is not filled.

“There’s no silver bullet,” Moody said. “We’ve been looking at this budget and trying to figure out a solution on how to turn the ship around.”

Yuba City approved its agreement unanimously. Live Oak approved its agreement 3-0, with Councilmembers Ashley Hernandez and Nancy Santana absent.

The decision now rests with Sutter County voters.

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Yuba County Sheriff’s Office continues to investigate two separate suspicious deaths after unidentified bodies were found in Dobbins and Plumas Lake on consecutive days.

Forensic autopsies were conducted Sept. 17 on both individuals, according to an update from the Sheriff’s Office. Authorities have not released the causes or manners of death and said both investigations remain open.

The first body was found Sept. 14 off Frenchtown Road in Dobbins. Deputies responded to the area at about 3:30 p.m. after receiving a report of a deceased individual

located off the roadway.

Investigators have since described the decedent as a middle-aged white man. He remained unidentified as of Sept. 17.

The following day, deputies responded at about 2:40 p.m. to Plumas Arboga Road in Plumas Lake after receiving a report of another deceased individual.

Deputies found the body of an elderly Black woman on the shoulder of the roadway. She also remained unidentified following the autopsy.

The Sheriff’s Office previously reported that the two bodies appeared to be in different stages of decomposition.

Detectives with the Yuba County Sheriff’s Office are

continuing efforts to identify both individuals and determine the circumstances surrounding their deaths. Authorities said the cases are being treated as two separate investigations.

The Sheriff’s Office has not released additional information about how long either person may have been deceased, whether investigators suspect foul play or whether there is any known connection between the two cases.

No further details will be released while the investigations remain ongoing, according to the Sheriff’s Office.

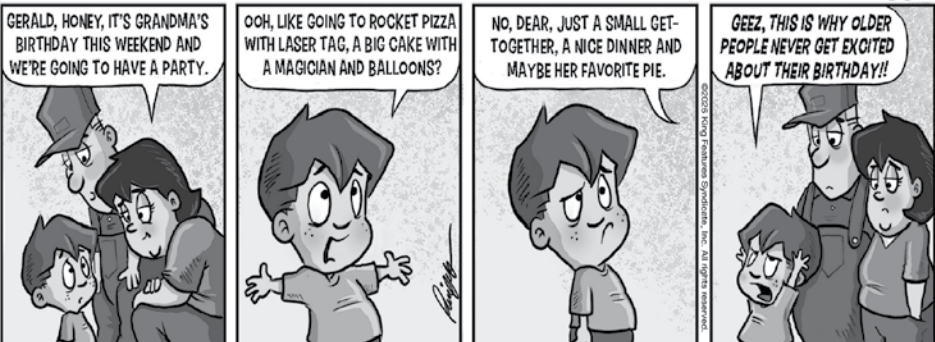

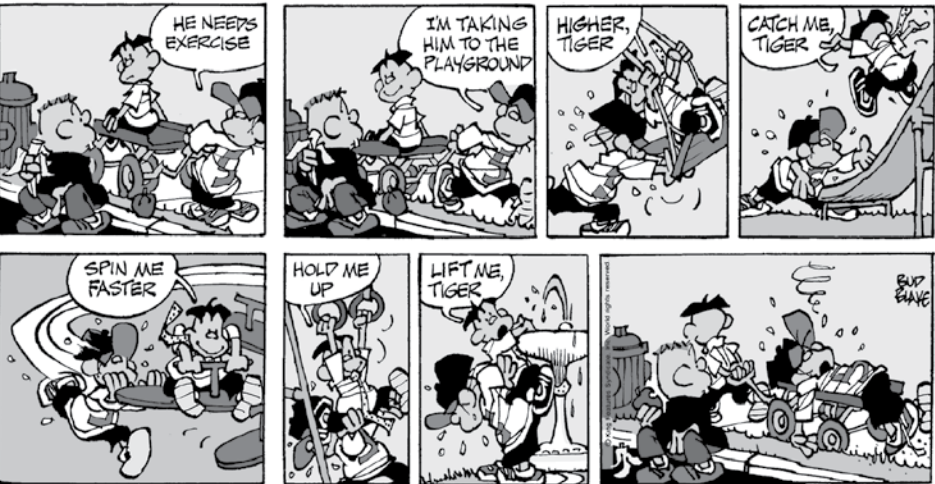

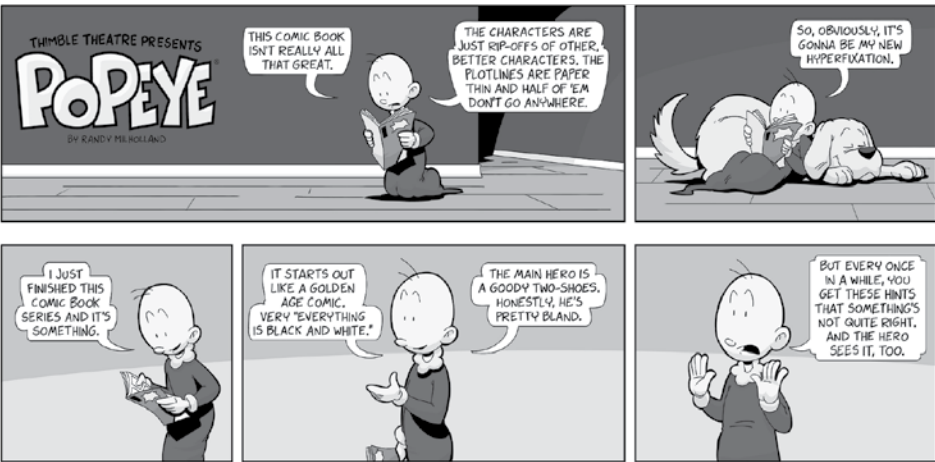

Parole Denied for Knife Attacker

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - A state parole board denied parole for three years to Clayton John, who is serving a 31-years-to-life sentence for a 2020 knife attack in Marysville, according to the Yuba County District Attorney's Office.

The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation denied parole Thursday during John's second parole hearing.

John became eligible for parole consideration after completing the base term for his conviction under Proposition 57. His base term for assault with a deadly weapon was three

years. He received an initial three-year parole denial in 2023.

According to prosecutors, John approached a stranger pumping gas at Flyers in Marysville in 2020 while John was under the influence and hearing voices. John began shouting at the man, pulled out a knife and lunged at him while threatening to kill him.

The victim defended himself and John fled. Marysville police later arrested him.

John had been on parole for about one month at the time of the attack. He previously received two strike convictions in Sutter County in 2017 and 2018, including a conviction stemming from another knife attack.

CDCR cited John's higher-moderate risk rating, criminal history and previous performance while under supervision when denying parole, according to the District Attorney's Office.

John could receive another parole hearing in three years.

"Prop 57 has allowed CDCR to hand out credits like candy, which is an insult to crime victims," Yuba County District Attorney Clint Curry said. "This legislation has made it harder for us to keep the community safe from individuals who obviously have no business ever being released back to the streets." ★

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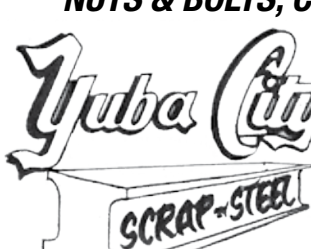

Appelt said. “They’re focused on getting the W up for East Nic each week.”

The Spartans scored on four straight possessions in the first half and built a controlling 27-0 behind a 71-yard rushing touchdown by junior running back Evan Cantrell.

Cantrell led the rushing attack for the Spartans as he rushed for 126 yards off four carries and a pair of touchdowns.

East Nicolaus senior running back Justin Welch

broke loose for a couple runs before he scored on a one-yard rushing touchdown in the second.

Welch also had two touchdowns in the win with 69 yards rushing and a reception for 49 yards.

Appelt and Angland linked up with Angland again as they scored on a 48-yard passing touchdown for the Spartans to have a commanding 27-0 lead.

Angland said the culture around the program is better this year across the team and the East Nicolaus campus.

“On game days we are all in good sync with one another and we are ready to play 48 minutes of football,” Angland said.

Angland’s two touchdown receptions combined for 88 yards

Defensively, the Spartans had 19 tackles for loss and seven sacks.

Angland, Welch and junior linebacker Dylan Robbin’s led the way with all double-digit tackles

The Bear River sideline was quiet and non-existent. The only cheer for the Bruins in the second half was when they scored on

The Spartans achieved more than 400 yards of total offense in the win.

Welch, Appelt and Cantrell told YSBC the key to success is just being there for one another.

Josh added that one of the biggest advantages of

this season is the looseness the team has had.

He added practices are in good flow, and the guys are holding one another accountable without the coaching staff needing to charge in.

East Nicolaus opens Sacramento Valley League play on Friday, Sept. 25 against Willows.

Josh told YSBC that the SVL is going to be a battle this year as teams are going to beat up on one another. Kickoff off is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. ★
