OUTDOOR CLASSROOM IS COMPLETE


The outdoor Classroom has been stained, tables have been placed and it is being used by classrooms. What a great addition to our school.

Aspen, the Therapy Dog

Beginning in mid-October, a registered therapy dog will now be available at Cook County Schools several days a week. Aspen's owner, Lisa, is the district's Technology Coordinator. Aspen has been involved in the reading program at the Grand Marais Public Library and does Sunday afternoon visits at North Shore Health Care Center. Prior to her move to Grand Marais, Aspen worked with disabled veterans for approximately 2 ½ years at the State of Minnesota Veteran's Home.

To be respectful of those who fear dogs or have allergies, Aspen's "home base" will be near the Media Center area. This is where the offices for the school counselor and social worker are located.

Therapy dogs in schools can help students with anxiety, reduce stress, and provide an overall calming effect. Even if a student is in crisis mode and does not want to communicate, therapy dogs can provide comfort by simply allowing students to pet and interact with them.

Selective Service Registration

Hello Parents, Students, and
Friends. This week I received a letter
from the Director of Selective Service
asking us to remind parents and students
about the importance of selective service
registration. I'm sharing this with you
because males that fail to register will not
be eligible for federally funded college



loans and grants, federal employment, and many state and local government jobs in the future. "Registration is not only a legal requirement, but a civic duty and a key component of our national defense readiness". Male students are required to register within 30 days of their 18th birthday but can preregister at 17 years and three months. It is a very short process and can be done online at sss.gov.

Reading Challenge

By reading more complex books, your child can learn new words, facts, and ideas. They'll also be exposed to more complicated plots and will grow as a reader.

Here are some suggestions for you to increase challenging reading:

- Knowing something about the topic or setting makes a tougher book easier to comprehend. if your youngster is reading a novel set in China, they could talk to someone who has been there or look up the country online (try a children's safe link like kids.nationalgeographic.com).
- Encourage your child to look at a simpler book on the same subject. A picture-book biography about Harriet Tubman may help your youngster better understand a textbook chapter on the civil rights movement, for instance.
- Suggest that your child read complicated material with pencil and paper in hand. They can jot down questions, words to look up, or facts they want to learn more about.

MS/HS Media Center has NEW BOOKS!



Human Anatomy and Physiology

Human Anatomy and Physiology (HAP) is being offered to CCHS students for the second time during the 2019-2020 school year. HAP students learn about the parts of the human body and how they function in this year-long course with lots of lab work.

Students started the year by learning medical vocabulary and anatomical terms.








Students had a practical exam on anatomical terms by following directions in making a play-doh figure in anatomical position.











Recently, students have worked on learning about various tissue types in the human body by making concept maps and play doh models.

Students in Mrs. Dumas' Science Class are learning about the different spheres that can be found on Earth. Fourth grade student Katie Shannon summed up half of what she has learned with the following, "Atmosphere is the air and Hydrosphere is the water." Isabella Olson summed up the other half, "Geosphere is the rocks and minerals that can be found on the ground and Biosphere is many different kinds of life like plants, insects, animals and us!"

Pictured are a few of the 4th grade students cutting out examples of the spheres from some magazines and putting them in the different categories. During this process students were heard exclaiming, "I can't believe that I can just look at a picture and pick out anywhere from 1-4 of the spheres!" and "I never thought I would learn them all, but now it is so easy and I am actually having a lot fun!" Now, I understand the importance of each sphere and how they all work together to create and shape our beautiful planet Earth!



Exploratory Day!

Cook County Middle School ventured far and wide for our Fall Exploratory Day field trips, with the 6th graders traveling to Tettegouche State Park,

the 7th graders going to the end of the Gunflint Trail, and the 8th graders exploring Grand Portage. Each trip has its own focus, learning, and exploration that happens based on the location and the experts that participate.

The 6th grade Field Day was led by DNR officials and included stations relating to Fisheries, Wildlife, Forestry, and Outdoor Education. Students enjoyed a perfect fall day and experienced different specialties within the DNR, including seeing how fish are live-trapped for research, how grouse are dissected to test for West Nile Virus, how cookies and Pi are related to tree growth, and how important observation skills are to experiencing the natural world.

The 7th graders spent time exploring cultural and natural history at Chik-Wauk Museum and Nature Center, hunted for aquatic invertebrates along the lake shore, tested houses and cabins to see if they meet our county's FireWise safety guidelines, and hiked along and canoed on Lake Saganaga.





The 8th graders visited Grand Portage National Monument and participated in station activities of their choice, visited the Little Cedar Tree Spirit with John Morrin, and studied natural history and hiked to High Falls at Grand Portage State Park.

All trips would not have been possible without the many expert leaders, volunteer instructors, and parent/guardian chaperones who make these field trips such positive learning experiences for our students. Thank you!


Volleyball Fun
