The GCBDD operates the Metzenbaum Center, which was established in 1966 to serve the needs of developmentally disabled individuals in Geauga County. It provides services from birth through adulthood. The Early Intervention Program serves children under the age of three, the Transitional Youth program provides educational services to individuals aged 4-22, and adult services are available for people 18 years of age and older.

In addition to traditional services such as family supports, educational programming and work placement, the GCBDD also emphasizes the importance of social programming and community events. The GCBDD and all of its staff members aim to build a caring community where individuals are integrated and accepted.

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Dating violence

Assault prevention workshop to teach how to avoid, control and escape

id you know that there are 1.5 million high school students in the U.S. alone who experience abuse by dating partners each year? That statistic includes one-third of all 10th-graders, with nearly the same amount being the perpetrators. While this behavior affects all demographics: age, gender, race, occupation, education or income level, there is more risk for teens from low-income families, racial and ethnic groups, and LGBTQ students.

Abuse, be it physical, emotional, sexual, or digital, has become so prevalent in adolescence that it is now considered a public health problem because victims are more prone later to depression, anxiety, suicide, and substance abuse.

The first step in reducing those somber statistics is education. Teaching young people about healthy relationships can reduce physical and sexual dating violence by 60 percent. Learning how to prevent it, or handle the outcome, is something all teenagers, as well as parents and educators, need to know.

That's why two professionals, Sensei Salvatore LaCorte, owner of North Coast Aikikai, and Gabriella Kreuz, founder of the organization, "Love Doesn't Shove," have made awareness of this issue their mission. Together they are hosting an interactive event, Assault Prevention and Dating Violence Workshop, which will take place at LaCorte's martial arts studio in Mentor on Sunday, March 8 from 1–3 pm.

The workshop is open to all ages, although those under 18 must be accompanied by an adult. LaCorte says the afternoon seminar is designed to not only address the problem itself, but to get attendees involved in knowing how to prevent and deflect the problem.

"The event will be split into two

phases, LaCorte explains. First, Gabriella will discuss her mission behind Love Doesn't Shove and how to recognize warning signs of abuse. She'll talk about dating issues and address situations that get out of hand and how to deal with them. Then I'll show a few short videos to demonstrate certain situations, and follow up by giving hands-on self-protection points."

The three core points that LaCorte always addresses in his classes are:

- 1) Avoid
- 2) Control
- 3) Escape

"The idea is not to harm, but to neutralize the situation," adds La-Corte, who gives classes for students ages 8 to 70. "The thing is, if you can't avoid a confrontation, then you need to learn how to take control of the situation, and then, if you can't do that, you need to know how to escape. Many times you won't need to use steps two and three, but you'll know what to do in all cases."

Kreuz's talk will emphasize a healthy relationship—what it is, and what it isn't. "I'll be deep-diving into the various aspects of abuse," she says. "The physical, of course, but also the emotional and sexual impact, and we'll have an interactive conversation about it."

The issue is close to Kreuz's heart because she knows about it first-hand. "My personal experience was the springboard that led to my advocacy. I had a boyfriend in high school and it quickly became a very unhealthy relationship. When there was a physical altercation in school, I was fortunate to have found myself surrounded by a lot of supportive people, including school officials. He was a charming young man so prior to that, I was afraid no one would

believe me about his behavior."

She wants people to understand the dynamics that often accompany dating violence and abuse. There is a cycle that often includes four stages: honeymoon, tension building, outburst, and apology. Many stay in a dangerous relationship because the apology stage gives them hope that the abuser will change. "Some people assume that it's just common sense not to stay with someone who abuses, but there are many factors that play into it. Everyone comes from different backgrounds, personal experiences, and thought processes."

LaCorte has been teaching Aikido, a martial art form that emphasizes defense, not offensive tactics, for 40 years. His Mentor school is now in its 6th year. Kreuz's "Love Doesn't Shove" began as a fundraiser in 2014 and became a nonprofit organization in 2016.

"The most important thing I want people to realize is that abuse is not just a woman's issue," says Kreuz, who gives more than 50 school presentations a year. "This is not a political movement, it can affect men, too. And teens are especially vulnerable because their brains are still developing and they have little life experience to know how to deal with it, or even talk openly about it. So this kind of knowledge can truly be a lifesaver."

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YMCA has something for everyone for fitness & fun

Spectacular new West End Branch is a game changer

ast fall began a new chapter for the 150-year-old West End YMCA. While the organization remains in Willoughby, the branch has moved to what is now called the Union Village—a complex uniting Willoughby Middle School, Willoughby South High, the YMCA and the Willoughby Senior Center. The campus, located off Shankland Road between Euclid Avenue and Ridge Road, supports the Y's ongoing efforts to foster strong community connections.

The YMCA has always been a community-rich environment, stressing personal fitness, camaraderie and recreational activities. The Lake County YMCA alone engages approximately 49,000 people a year through a variety of programs and annual membership. The recent move, which includes a four-court field house with indoor walking/jogging track and multi-purpose aquatic center, is expected to increase that number.

"The great thing about this move is that we can continue to offer all our programs, but now we can do it on a bigger scale and reach more people," says executive director, Sherry Emerick. "We have two indoor, heated pools—a recreational pool for open swim and classes, and the school's eight-lane competition pool. So we're able to serve the community for all ages and abilities." The YMCA also provides lifeguards.

Another feature of the West End YMCA includes comfortable viewing access to the pool, and a splash/ play area for young children. There is also a nice space for parents to watch other family members participate in classes while their small children are in the child watch area. The fee for child watch is \$2 per month for members. There are also after-school programs, and a free drop-in program where a parent can take a break and drop off their child so they can swim or exercise without worry, or perhaps enjoy a night out for a quiet dinner at a nearby restaurant for two hours. The Y child care programs are licensed by the Ohio Department of Job & Family Services.

In addition, the new facility boasts four basketball courts, along with a large shared space for people to congregate. "The social area is particularly welcome for students who want to hang out after school, do homework, or just relax with friends," says Emerick, who has worked at six different locations in a YMCA career that spans 38 years.

The programs and classes encompass recreational sports, personal fitness, group exercise, strength training, group cycling and more. Popular programs and sports activities include pickleball for adults, teen dodgeball, as well as gym & swim and martial arts for kids.

And for seniors, ages 55 and older, the Y offers a number of exercise programs, and accepts Silver Sneakers members. There is also a wellness center, located on the second floor, that features state-of-the-art strength and cardio equipment, exercise studio and coed steam and sauna rooms.

The YMCA has always been a great place for children, offering a number of programs and classes that nurture the values, skills, and social relationships that are so important to a young person's education, socialization, and overall health. Along with swim lessons and other sports activities, there are the ever-popular summer day camps where kids can explore and experience new adventures, cultivate friendships, and create lasting memories.

"We also have our 5K race coming up on Sunday, May 3, which is our biggest family event," Emerick notes. The annual 5K or two-mile brings together hundreds of runners and walkers of all ages. The race starts and finishes at the West End YMCA. The age groups for teams span from 10 and younger, to 70 and older.

"The partnerships are going great," Emerick says of the new complex. "We've all worked hard to make this a smooth transition and it's all been hugely successful. It has certainly been a great addition to the community and we're all excited about the future."

A Prom to Remember

Local organization sponsors special night for northeast Ohio teens battling cancer

very spring, teens around the country participate in what has become an annual right of passage that many take for granted — high school prom. For kids battling cancer, prom is just one of the things they may need to set aside on their road to wellness. And that's something Jane and Mike Knausz set out to help change.

Wedding photographers by trade, the couple's first experience with A Prom to Remember took place when their daughter, Kim, asked them to volunteer with her at the first A Prom to Remember held in Fort Lauderdale, Florida in 2009. That experience impacted the couple so dramatically that they knew they wanted to bring the experience home to Cleveland.

The couple gathered together with friends to figure out how to host a similar event the very next spring. Ten years later, the event is firmly entrenched in Cleveland, giving area teens battling cancer an opportunity to celebrate their lives and their youth in an environment of accep-

tance and camaraderie.

The event is open to guests who are currently or have recently received treatment for cancer at three area hospitals — Akron Children's Hospital, Cleveland Clinic Children's Hospital, and University Hospitals Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital. Patients aged 12-19 who are receiving treatment or have recently received treatment for cancer are extended invitations to attend the annual gala. Each year, roughly 75 children and their guests attend the special event, which will once again be held at the Ritz Carlton in Cleveland. This year, A Prom to Remember will be held on March 28.

As you would expect, the event garners a great deal of excitement. That night, these special kids are treated like movie stars arriving in limousines, walking the red carpet, and dancing the night away at a fabulous gala created just for them.

Local celebrities come in to make their evening even more amazing with live performances, autographs and pictures. Local police and fire department personnel attend, acting as escorts, and doctors and nurses from local hospitals serve as chaperones making it a parent-free evening for the honored guests. And best of all, the prom is held annually at no cost to the kids or their families.

"With the help of sponsors and donations, we provide everything necessary to make their prom unlike any other," shared this year's event chairperson Marianne J. Sumego, MD, a physician with the Cleveland Clinic,.

Once she learned of the event, she was hooked. "Everyone has day jobs, but make time to help create a memorable event every year. This is a phenomenal organization," she exclaimed. When she learned of Jane's desire to 'retire' from running the event, she knew she wanted to help make sure it would continue.

"Everything from tuxedos for the boys, dresses, hair and make-up for the girls, limousine transportation, prom photos, food, entertainment and much more are all provided for these courageous teens," she shared. She acknowledges that the event wouldn't be possible without the work of a large team of volunteers who begin planning up to a year in

advance.

New and gently used dresses, shoes, wraps, and accessories are collected throughout the year. In mid-February, participants were invited to a dress extravaganza at Our Redeemer Church in Solon, giving young ladies the opportunity to select a gown from the hundreds available to them at no cost. The day after the extravaganza, any remaining items were offered for sale to the public, with all proceeds benefiting A Prom to Remember.

"Our Redeemer Church has been a wonderful new partner, providing a venue for the sale, and helping to set up dresses, shoes, and accessories, even providing food for our volunteers," she marveled.

Local seamstresses volunteer their time to make minor alterations that day, and a wide selection of shoes, wraps, and jewelry are also available, free for attendees and their guests. Volunteers prepare for that event at least two months prior, shared Sumego.

Jackie Custer, a previous A Prom to Remember attendee from Akron Children's Hospital, admitted she was more into sports than shopping.

"But when it comes to prom," Jackie shared, "I was really excited to go shopping!" Her mom, Julie Custer, went to the dress extravaganza with her to help Jackie pick out a dress. "I was just overwhelmed with how many dresses were there," Jackie marveled.

According to Jackie's mom, her daughter's battle with cancer had been long and difficult. In fact, during her treatment, Jackie suffered a stroke. But Jackie battled back. "She's just amazing," Julie shared. "She takes it all one day at a time." Through hard work and determination, Julie learned to walk again, and was thrilled to be able to try out her dance moves at A Prom to Remember.

Reminiscing after prom, Jackie noted, "Arriving at the Ritz Carlton was just absolutely amazing! It made me feel like a star when I saw the Cavs and Browns players. I'll never forget being out there with all the kids who had cancer, and feeling normal." she shared. "Being able to dance...it was a dream come true," she added.

"Brown Aveda has been a fabulous partner, as well. They've been with us since the beginning," Sumego noted. "Not only do they provide hair styling and makeup services for attendees at no charge, the salons also serve as drop-off locations to collect new and gently used dresses, shoes and accessories for eventgoers as well. Sumego noted that gentlemen who attend the annual event are fitted for eve-

ning wear courtesy of American Commodore Tuxedo, another long-time event partner.


At each event, the guest list is comprised of patients, doctors and nurses from the participating hospitals, giving young attendees a night away from the watchful eyes of caring parents. Special guests also include celebrity athletes from local sports teams, television personalities, and usually a surprise guest or two. Last year, attendees and volunteers alike were thrilled to meet Cleveland Indians pitcher Mike Clevinger.

Sumego explained, "Everyone who volunteers gets drawn in." Most end up volunteering at the next year's event, just like she did. "It speaks a lot to the atmosphere here," she noted

Student groups have been formed at Mentor High School and Notre Dame Cathedral Latin High Schools to provide opportunities for local teens to help make the event successful for kids their own age.



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Is your family protected in the case of a freak accident?

Imagine a child and his friends playing with the family puppy in the backyard. Suddenly, the dog bites one of his friends in the face causing permanent disfigurement. How to choose a summer camp your kids will love and that you approve

hether you're looking for enrichment for your child, a way to keep your child occupied and supervised while you work, or a short reprieve from parenting, there's a summer camp out there that's just right for every family.

The benefits of summer camp.

Getting started in your search.

Before you begin looking into summer camps, first create a list of the criteria you're looking for. Here are some initial things to consider.

- What is your budget for summer camp?
- What is the purpose of sending your child to summer camp?
- Do you want a resident (overnight) or a day camp?
- Are you looking for a shortterm (week or two) or summer-long program?
- Do you want a camp that's very structured or one that provides your child lots of freedom and choices?
- What are your child's interests, such as a particular sport, hobby, or other interest?

Once you've narrowed down some of the criteria, you can begin your search. An excellent place to start is right here in Today's Family and on www. TodaysFamilyMagazine.com! The American Camp Association (ACA) accredits summer camps. So this is another excellent place to look for a camp. The ACA educates camp owners and directors in health and safety for staff and campers as well as program quality. It then accredits camps that meet the organization's standards.

Next steps to finding the perfect summer camp.

Once you've selected a few summer camps that meet your primary criteria and that fit your child's interests, share the choices to see what excites your child. Let your child know up front that you still need to thoroughly investigate the camp(s) before making a final decision. But do keep your child's choices in mind to ensure your child gets the most out of summer camp.

Once you and your child have narrowed the list to a manageable selection, you'll want to investigate the camps further. Several things to consider:

What are the staff's qualifications?

Many summer camps use teens to staff the camps. Teens make excellent mentors and can bring liveliness to summer camp programs. However, the programs themselves should be developed by professionals and have professional oversight to ensure kids are getting the most from the camp programs.

How does the camp ensure your child's safety?

Find out what kind of safety training the camp provides its staffers. Also, is there staff on hand at all times that knows CPR? What are the camp's procedures in the event your child becomes ill, has an accident, or there's an emergency?

What is the daily schedule for campers?

Ask for a daily itinerary, so you know your child will be getting everything you and your child anticipate from the program.

What are the rules?

Each camp has its own set of rules. So, find out whether your child is allowed to call you. If it's a summer-long residential camp, can parents come and visit? Can your child bring along a cell phone or electronics? Also, how much money should your child bring, and how is your child's money managed?

Don't sweat it.

Keep in mind, although there are many great camps, no camp is likely to offer everything precisely the way you want it. 



Types of camps to consider

There are so many choices it can be overwhelming to figure out what type of camp would be a good fit for your child. Hopefully, the following descriptions will help you to match your child with the correct camp.

TRADITIONAL DAY CAMPS

A traditional day camp is six hours (half day options may be available) and offers a variety of activities such as sports, swimming, art, and music. These camps are located at YMCAs, schools, or private settings.

Is this a good fit for your child?

Most of the activities are outside so if your child loves the outdoors and playing sports or team building activities then this would be a good type of camp for them. Since there is a variety of activities this would also be a good fit for a child that likes to try different things.

SPORTS CAMPS

Specialty sports camps usually are

one sport such as baseball or soccer that the child plays either for three or six hours. Depending on where you live there may even be an option for tennis, golf, surfing or sailing camp. This type of camp is typically owned by private organizations. Some towns may have town operated sports camps.

Is this a good fit for your child?

If your child loves a specific sport and would like to improve their skills, this would be a great option. It could even be a way for your child to try a sport such surfing that they might not otherwise have exposure to it.

ART/MUSICAL THEATER CAMPS

Specialty art or musical theater camps focus solely on the arts. Musical theater camps typically showcase a production such as "Beauty and the Beast," whereas in an art camp a child would use a variety of art mediums like painting or drawing. These type of camps are located in public schools or private organizations. In the public school setting the

drama teacher usually runs the camp, and it isn't widely advertised but it is available for anyone to participate. To find out more information call schools in your area.

Is this a good fit for your child?

If your child is creative and prefers the indoors, then these types of camps would be worth looking into. It may be a good way to introduce the arts to your child since most of these camps are time-limited for one week.

EDUCATIONAL CAMPS

An educational camp focuses on learning a new skill or subject matter. Since it is camp and not school these types of camps tend to be handson with an emphasis on fun. These camps are located in schools, museums, and colleges.

Is this a good fit for your child?

If your child is curious and always asking questions about how/why things work, this may be a good match for them. If a child is interested in learning a new skill such as



computer programming or speaking Spanish, some educational camps offer that as well.

OVERNIGHT CAMPS

Overnight camp is when your child lives at the camp for either a week or longer period. There are Boy/Girl Scout camps and private residential camps. These camps tend to offer options such as sailing, boating, archery, horseback riding and other activities that may not be available close to your home.

Is this a good fit for your child?

An overnight camp gives your child the chance to meet other kids from different states and countries. There is also more time to do activities and foster independence compared to traditional day camps.


