RE: Proposed Health Officer Order Prohibiting In-Person Dining in Los Angeles County

Honorable Board of Supervisors and Dr. Ferrer,

The City of Manhattan Beach strongly opposes the proposed Los Angeles County Health Officer Order, prohibiting in-person dining at restaurants, breweries, wineries and bars due to COVID-19. We have been informed that the proposed effective date is tomorrow, November 25. The proposed modifications will devastate businesses, particularly on the cusp of Thanksgiving. Businesses have indicated that they will have to close permanently.

Our business community has expressed grave concern that prohibiting inperson dining will result in irreparable harm. Having struggled since March, restaurants have made extraordinary investments in health and safety measures such as installing outdoor dining improvements and purchasing personal protective equipment to comply with all the Health Officer Orders. These investments have served to keep their customers safe, and continue to provide jobs and contributions to the economy.

Business districts, employees, families, and communities as a whole rely on the economic activity that restaurants, breweries, wineries, and bars generate. Take-out and delivery only is not sustainable. Closure of these businesses will have an immense impact on the economic and mental health of many that are already on the verge of bankruptcy and struggling to provide for their families.

Over 59 businesses in Manhattan Beach and 209 in the South Bay have signed the "Safe in the South Bay" commitment, pledging to adhere to and implement the latest safety guidelines and best practices to combat COVID-19, consistent with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health protocols.

We understand the need to find the right path to reducing exposure and that difficult sacrifices must be made, but let's not put this on the backs of our restaurants, breweries, wineries, and bars that have gone to great lengths to show compliance and remain open.

The City of Manhattan Beach urges you to take action today by reconsidering the proposed prohibition on in-person dining and present other options that strike a balance between economic recovery and the protocols to keep the public safe.
