

But just last year, all plans for the new studio were put on hold. Heather explains. "When we first shut-down, my initial mindset was to scrap the buildout and hunker down in our existing space. It was a tough time for all of us in the beauty industry. But, later, when we returned to work, there was a very different landscape waiting for us. My staff had to split shifts and reduce hours to accommo-

date the new safety guidelines. I knew right away they needed a bigger salon to work at full capacity and our clients needed a safe space to relax and enjoy their services."

A new plan began to unfold for the studio when Heather realized that the timing of the pandemic actually enabled her

Planning Board Welcomes Public Comment Regarding Massive Facility at 555 Hopping Brook Road

Residents were able to ask questions for 90 minutes, town officials and applicant expected to respond at next meeting

Because their last meeting ran late and did not allow for much public comment, the Holliston Planning Board dedicated the majority of its April 15 meeting to public comments regarding the public hearing regarding 555 Hopping Brook Road where applicant CRG Integrated Real Estate Solutions is proposing a 820,000 square foot building.

The building is proposed to be 820,000 square foot footprint and 52 feet high, with two parking fields (one north with 200 spaces, one south with 200 spaces), 180 truck dock spaces, and 278 trailer parking spots.

Before the discussion began, Planning Board Chairman David Thorn said, "To date, 52 people have spoken. We've received 132 letters from people in the town, some of the people have submitted multiple letters."

Issues raised by Holliston residents and Medway direct abutters during the 90-minute session included, among many:

• Who owns the land and who should the town be dealing with -- CRG, the applicant, or John Delli Priscoli, a [possibly sole] trustee of the owner trust. Did the owner cede to the board the right to deal with CRG as its representative, did it need to?

- World Health Organization has listed diesel exhaust as carcinogenic to humans -how does CRG respond?
- Sound engineer has provided data but is that theoretical or real data taken from a building with these particular specifications?
- What is the length of the left-hand lane headed west on Route 16?
- Traffic on Hopping Brook Road is very relevant as it affects the entrance to the Rails and Trails path.
- Where is the list of Holliston abutters notified at the beginning of this process, please post the list of Holliston and Medway abutters notified.
- Is the applicant allowed to have 24/7 access with no restrictions when that is typically not allowed in town (one current exception for a medical facility)?


- CRG should do a more thorough MEPA study based on current information, specific concerns about wildlife including spotted turtles and fourtoed salamanders
- Fire Department: Will Holliston volunteer firefighters be trained to respond to safety issues that might occur in a building of this size? Will neighboring fire departments receive similar training if they are called on for mutual aid?

 Size of the building is much larger than anything in Holliston and a resident has created a graphic to show size comparisons (see photo)

Town Counsel Jason Tallerman of KP Law in Boston said, "We continue to make progress... We received some late information from CRG that we'll take up at the next meeting that's pretty important to your consideration."

The next Planning Board meeting is scheduled for April 29 at which town officials and CRG are expected to respond to the issues raised.

Note, this site was identified in February as a planned Amazon Distribution Center by the Metropolitan Area Planning Council, but CRG said at the April 15 Planning Board meeting that they do not know who the tenant will be.

If your taxes could talk, what would they say?

Get vour taxes done?

You have until May 17th to complete and find out what they say about you. Specifically, what are you doing well and can be done better?

Dedicate space to a home office. If you're self-employed or started a side-gig, dedicate a section of your house as a home office. Schedule C deductions are many and prorated across several aspects of expenses, maintenance and utilities on your entire home. Additionally, if you build or renovate a home office, there are additional deductions if you're self-employed.

Working From Home (WFH) becoming permanent. Is your company changing your role to WFH indefinitely, providing flexibility to move to another state? Understand workers are required to have taxes withheld in accordance with their state's tax rules, regardless of where their employer is located. Also, some states make employers withhold taxes from nonresident employees' wages.

Adjust your W-4. If you got a large refund, lower your withholding and do more with your money than letting the government sit on it. Additionally, if both spouses work and one is self-employed, consider raising your W-4 withholding to avoid potential penalties for underpaying estimated taxes on a growing small business.

Exercising Restricted Stock Units (RSUs). Did you sell some RSUs and get a large tax bill? Connect with HR to discuss withholding options before your next exercise. Also, learn of the benefits and drawbacks of converting to stock to qualify for long-term, instead of short-term, capital gains.

Revisit Work Benefits. You can impact your adjusted gross income (AGI) through 401k contributions as well as funding a

HSA funding, FSA for dental/vision or FSA dependent care. Additionally, you may want to choose Roth instead of Traditional to eliminate future tax liabilities. If you can't make some changes until open enrollment, don't forget if you have a life event (new child, spouse loses or changes job) you have 30 days to revisit and reset your work benefits.

Tax planning is complex, but it doesn't need to be complicated. Work with someone to help you save money, stay organized and reduce liabilities in the future.

Farmers Market Coming To Blair Square

Blair Square will be bustling with activity come mid-June, when the new farmers market opens.

Resident Robert Blair start of the project and is anticipating a popular response.

"I had too much time on my hands this winter and wanted to gauge people's feelings about a market. I have a dahlia farm and have been involved with the Ag/Com and Community Farm. [It was] just a natural progression of things, I suppose," he said recently.

And so it began. The farmers market began to take shape and the following mission was created:

The mission of the Holliston Farmers Market is to provide a venue for local farmers, artisans and handcrafters to sell their products, improve nutrition by providing greater access to fresh

local produce, educate residents about nutrition and sustainable agriculture, and to build community, while contributing to a vibrant downtown center in Holliston.

Vendors were sourced with the following criteria:

The Holliston Farmers Market seeks vendors based on a strong preference for:

1. Locally grown and locally produced products.

- 2. Diverse mix of products, encouraging selection, vitality, and freshness.
- 3. Products produced organically or through regenerative practices without chemicals.
- Livestock products from animals that are grass fed, humanely raised and processed, free range poultry, fed non-GMO or organic feed.



- 5. Local artisans, student artisans and crafters
- 6. Local businesses that promote a healthy, green and regenerative Community

Based on the response, Blair is expecting the market to be a robust one.

"A feeler was posted on Facebook this past winter and the town residents reacted with over 700 positive likes and comments," said the Holliston resident.

Anticipated excitement for the market was comparable to the foot traffic studies.

"The Rail Trail Committee has electronic counters and shared the counts from last year down to the day and hour that our first market will be operating. The least amount of people that passed through Blair Square last year between June 20 and Oct. 10th between the hours of 9 am to 1 pm on Sundays, was 225 in four hours; 450 was the most—a great incentive to be a vendor," he said.

Blair said the market will be rain or shine, but is unsure which

payment methods each vendor will accept.

"Individual vendors are coming in and this our first year, so I'm not certain which payments are accepted," he said.

The first market will be June 20, and will feature local artists/photographers and their works.

"This is a one-time-only, free venue for those talented folks," said Blair.

So what is Blair most looking forward to?

"I'm looking forward to people being outside and the market will act as a gathering spot for the community, much like the old dump used to. The market will also serve as an economic stimulus for farmers, crafts people and businesses.

"From some response I've been sent, people can't hide their joy that the market is actually happening," he said.

The market will run Sundays from June 20 through Oct. 10. It will be located in Blair Square, on Central Street, across from the CVS Pharmacy. Anyone wishing to display their works at the opening market, can contact Blair at mudvillemayor@gmail.com.



Holliston Public Library Opens For In-Person Visits



Tablets for Seniors

Would you like to attend virtual programs and meetings? Have you wanted a tablet but can't afford one? Do you have a tablet, but aren't sure how to use an app, such as Zoom? The Senior Center has received a grant from the MetroWest Health Foundation to use technology to help decrease social isolation in seniors.

As part of the grant we will also be hiring a technology assistant to both set up the tablets, and to teach seniors how to use either one of these tablets, or their own tablet. You must have internet service, but if you are low income you may qualify for Comcast low income service for \$10.00 per month. Examples of those who qualify would be those qualifying for benefit programs such as MassHealth, Fuel Assistance, or SNAP benefits. For those who qualify for low income internet, through the grant, we can assist you with up to 10 months of payment or through 10/30/21, whichever comes first. Those receiving tablets must agree to complete a quarterly survey on how they are being used. The tablets are being loaned out, for as long a period as you continue to use them. If you stop using the tablet, we ask that you return it so we can offer it to other seniors. For more information about this, or any other programs, call Bryan at the Senior Center.

Lacrosse Truly A Family Affair For The Schneelochs

Youngest Son In Final Season At HHS

Christian Schneeloch will begin his third and final year of lacrosse at Holliston High this spring, and when the season concludes, it'll mark the end of an era.

A midfielder, the 5-foot-11, 165-pound Schneeloch is the third in his family to play lacrosse for the Panthers, following his brothers A.J. and Zach. The trio has kept the Schneeloch name active in lacrosse for the last eight years.

But, there's another name linked to the trio that got the era started. The boys' father — Drew — served for 11 years with Holliston Youth Lacrosse, first as a coach and later as the group's president (six years). When he started in 2004, 70 youths participated and when he left the organization in 2015, there were 180 boys and girls participating.

A.J. graduated from Holliston High in 2015 and a year later Zach had his diploma. Both were Tri Valley League all-stars and both played club lacrosse in college. A.J. competed for Rutgers and Zach played for the University of New Hampshire.

"At Holliston, they both came into their own and enjoyed topnotch seasons as seniors," Christian said. "I'm blessed to be able to carry out what my dad and brothers started in the youth league. They paved the way and hopefully I'll be able to finish off the family's legacy in a memorable way."

That shouldn't be a problem as far as John Mulvaney is concerned. The veteran Holliston coach admires Christian's passion for the sport and his style as a defensive midfielder.

"Christian is one of our fastest players and one of the best athletes on the team," Mulvaney said. "He's great on defense. A good team player, he's athletic, has good field awareness and a high lacrosse IQ. An unselfish midfielder, I'm hopeful he'll generate more offense, whether it's by scoring goals or assisting on others"

Schneeloch, who stressed defense as a freshman and sophomore, is optimistic he can deliver on the offensive end. "Improving my stick skills will help and developing effective moves should be a plus," he emphasized.

Aggressive on defense, Schneeloch's calling card on offense is finesse. The 18-year-old enjoys the sport's fast pace and likes his role in midfield. "Lacrosse is challenging," he said. "To prevent goals you have to be aware of your surroundings and watch for cutters. As a midfielder, there's lots of transition and activity."

Schneeloch's team goals this season are to play plus-.500 la-

crosse, qualify for the sectionals and go as deep as possible. During his first two years, he's been on teams that finished 9-9. "Our prospects are good," he noted. "Our team has talent and experience. My individual goals are to be more of an offensive threat and to be named a TVL all-star."

All-star recognition would complete a triple-play. Schneeloch was chosen a first-team allstar as a cornerback in football as a junior and he was an honorable-mention choice as a defenseman in ice hockey as a senior.

Unable to compete in lacrosse last year after State officials canceled all spring sports because of the covid-19 pandemic, Schneeloch is extremely pleased to get another chance.

"It was disappointing to lose last year because our team could

have been very good," he said. "The lesson learned from the coronavirus is don't take anything for granted. It was a tough spring. I'm not worried about any changes and modifications to our sport this season. I just want one more year with teammates I've known a long time. But, the top priority still is to beat covid-19."

Schneeloch did a great job beating Wayland in Holliston's final regular season match when he was a sophomore. Leading by one goal with 45 seconds left in the contest, the Panthers needed to run out the clock. "If we won, we qualified for tourney play," Schneeloch recalled. "I ran around until time expired. We had lost to Wayland earlier in the year. I had a good game, assisting on two goals and forcing three turnovers."

Two teammates admired by Schneeloch are senior midfielder Kevin Lyons and sophomore goalie Austin Boardo. "Kevin is experienced, fast and skilled," he said. "Austin has good instincts, tracks the ball well and gained experience playing club lacrosse last summer."

Also bullish on his coach, Schneeloch calls Mulvaney "a great guy who's passionate about the sport and a motivator who strives to get the best out of everyone."

A good student, Schneeloch plans on majoring in business. His college destination could lead to Alfred University (New York), Endicott (Beverly) or the University of New Hampshire. "I'm open to playing football in college if I choose a Division 3 school," he said.

Calling his parents (Drew and Lynda) role models for their encouragement and commitment, Schneeloch relies on a competitive philosophy that focuses on winning, reaching his potential and having fun. He says athletics have helped him learn valuable life lessons. "Sports have helped me to overcome adversity, to be a leader and to be a good teammate," Schneeloch emphasized.

Whether it's Christian, A.J. or Zach, who all played in Holliston's youth league, their father is extremely proud of their achievements. A positive era will soon be in the Panthers' record book and Drew Schneeloch is acutely aware how blessed he's been.

"The boys played lacrosse with passion and they were all willing to learn the sport and improve their abilities," he said. "I wanted them to play a sport and they had the option to choose whichever one they wanted."

Christian and Zach selected football, hockey and lacrosse while A.J. picked football and lacrosse.

The boys' commitment to lacrosse is admirable and their play for the last eight years at Holliston has indeed left an indelible impression.

Nichols College Football Program Is TVL-friendly

Ex-Millis Coach Rebuilding The Bison

Nichols College in Dudley has 11 players from the Tri Valley League on its football roster for 2021. A coincidence? Far from it.

Dale Olmsted, who has been directing the Bison for eight years, coached in the TVL for nine seasons at Millis High where he compiled a 27-7 record in his final three seasons and guided the Mohawks to three straight playoff appearances. He also was selected Coach of the Year five times — twice by The MetroWest Daily News, twice by coaches in the TVL Small Division, and once by The Boston Globe.

The 52-year-old coach, who has lived in Walpole for 43 years, not only knows the TVL's players, but he has also developed strong relationships with the circuit's coaches. And living in Walpole makes it easy for Olmsted to travel to all 12 of the TVL's venues.

The schools include Medway, Bellingham, Millis, Dover-Sherborn, Dedham, Norwood, Ashland, Hopkinton, Norton, Westwood, Medfield and Holliston.

Olmsted is bullish on other conferences, like the Hockomock League and the Bay State Conference, but top-notch players from the TVL who commit to Nichols seem to adjust to the college quickly.

"Players from the TVL have a blue-collar work ethic," Olmsted said. "They're also fundamentally sound and many of them compete for traditionally strong programs."

Olmsted has another reason why the 55-year-old league is ripe with potential prospects for Nichols. "We're a small college (1,325 enrollment)," he said. "So, it's comforting for players who compete for small schools in the TVL to choose a college that's small. TVL players see comfort in choosing Nichols because its size isn't overwhelming."

Josh Pierre-Charles, an allstar running back from Millis, is a great example of a small-school halfback jelling at Nichols. He's been a dominant Division 3 player.

"Josh's career statistics are so good that the Houston Texans and Washington's football team came to Nichols in February to check him out," Olmsted said. "He's a senior who'll play in the fall, graduate in December, and possibly earn a pro-day invitation before next year's NFL draft.

The 5-foot-10, 195-pound Pierre-Charles is third in career rushing at Nichols with 1,858 yards. He's fourth in rushing attempts (350) and third in career touchdowns (15).

"Josh is old-school and his work ethic is relentless," said Olmsted. "He's got speed, strength and excellent field vision. An explosive back, his hand-eye coordination enables him to catch passes consistently. Solid physically, he's a very durable back who relies on swivel-hip moves."

Following is a capsule look at the other 10 TVL players on Nichols' roster:

JOSH JONES (junior, defensive end) — A 6-foot, 230-pound lineman, Jones played at Bellingham High where he was a TVL all-star and a team MVP. As a Nichols sophomore, he played in all 10 games, compiling 18 tackles and 2 sacks as a positional third-down player. "Josh has a good sense of the game," Olmsted said. "He's got quick hands and feet, his football IQ is high and he's got lots of potential."

ELIJAH BROWN (sophomore, defensive end) — The 6-2, 240-pounder played at Dedham where he was a TVL all-star. As a Nichols freshman, he saw action in five games. "Elijah is very coachable, a great kid who's got size and strength," Olmsted said. "His ceiling is high. We expect him to keep progressing and be a prime contributor in the future."

HAYDEN OLMSTED (sophomore, center) — The coach's son, he initially attended Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, Conn., where he was a walk-on freshman. The former

Millis High all-star, however, transferred to Nichols and now is a projected starter. The 6-foot-2, 285-pound center should get more opportunity with the Bison. "Hayden moves well, is adept at reading defenses, has a high football IQ and has experience calling the blocking schemes," Olmsted said.

SHAMAR HALL (freshman, halfback) — A two-year starter at Westwood, the 5-foot-11, 210-pounder was used primarily as a blocking back. "Shamar is strong physically, a good athlete with good hands," Olmsted noted. "We'll utilize him on short-yardage situations. He's kind of like James Devlin, who was used primarily as a blocker by the Patriots."

DAVID HARDING (freshman, defensive end) — The 6-foot-1, 225-pounder enjoyed a superb senior year at Holliston High. "David had a great playoff game against Stoughton," Olmsted said. "We project him as an end on defense. He's got a strong work ethic, he's crafty and quick. He'll bulk up and we see him doing good things in the future."

MARK JAMES (freshman, cornerback) — The 5-foot-11, 175-pounder was a three-year starter at Westwood where he was a captain and TVL all-star. "In pre-season, Mark was the most athletic freshman among our defensive backs," Olmsted said. "He's confident, competitive, quick and has good height."

JUSTIN KELLEY (freshman, linebacker) — The 6-foot, 200-pounder was a quality linebacker at Dedham High. Olmsted projects him as a reserve middle linebacker but has high expectations for him moving forward. "Justin has good instincts and a nose for the ball," he said.

"As a freshman, he'll play on special teams but he should be in the rotation eventually. He's got a bright future."

ETHAN MEISNER-NEL-SON (freshman, linebacker) — The 5-foot-10, 185-pounder, who played at Norton, will see action on special teams but Olmsted believes he'll be a starter eventually at outside linebacker. "Ethan has a great attitude," he said. "A solid player, he moves well and is athletic."

KYLE MORAN (freshman, guard) — The 6-foot, 220-pound lineman played at Medway High. "Kyle is a bit undersized," Olmsted noted. "But, he's a hard-worker who will progress. Dependable and reliable, he's a very coachable player from a good program."

CHRISTOPHER RYAN (freshman, wide receiver) — The 6-foot, 180-pound Ryan was a TVL all-star and a team MVP at Holliston High. "We expect a lot from him immediately," Olmsted said. "He's got strong hands, he's quick, athletic and runs good routes. His hand-eye coordination enables him to be top-notch receiver."

Nichols has a three-game schedule for this spring but Olmsted is using the abbreviated season to gauge his squad for a 10-game season in the fall. "The three games are important," Olmsted said. "They'll be learning experiences and if we win them, we'll know we're heading in the right direction."

Nichols competes in the Commonwealth Coastal Conference, which includes Curry, Salve Regina, Endicott, Western New England, University of New England, Husson and Becker. During the 2019 season, the conference champion was Western New England. Endicott was second and Nichols tied for third. Western New England hosted Nichols in both teams' openers on April 18, three days after Local Town Pages deadline.

"We'll contend for the title in the fall," said Olmsted, who twice has been named Worcester Area Coach of the Year. "We'll be competitive. We finished 6-4 in 2019 and we've played at .500 or better in three of our last four seasons."

Olmsted, whose career record at Nichols is 21-39, leans on a balanced offense that focuses on a run-pass option. "That's how we'll approach opponents if we have the talent," he said. "We may also employ a pro-style offense."

The attributes Olmsted prefers in prospective players are high character, mental toughness, size, speed, strength, leadership and a high football IQ. He also likes to recruit players from traditionally strong programs.

The 2021 recruits from the TVL no doubt give Nichols' grid program many of those traits. After all, five of the last six Super Bowls have been won by TVL squads (Millis and Holliston two each and one for Ashland).


