Residents' appeal granted in lawsuit against town for allegedly not following special town meeting mandate

Eleven residents say selectmen agreed to terms beyond their discretion

A group of 11 residents who filed a lawsuit against the town for allegedly mishandling a town meeting directive regarding a land purchase at 364 West Street, has won an appeal with the Single Justice of the Appeals Court.

The judge's decision, issued on April 8, 2021 and obtained by Hopedale Town News, reads in

- I find that the plaintiffs have demonstrated a likelihood of success in showing that, pursuant to the statutes discussed herein, the select board lacks the authority to purchase the land described in the settlement agreement without an authorization from the town at town meeting.
- · I further find that a preliminary injunction pending a determination on the merits would serve the public interest in preventing the unauthorized expenditure of public funds. Consequently, the Hopedale Board of Selectmen is enjoined from issuing any bonds, making any expenditures, paying any costs, or transferring any property interests pursuant to the Settlement Agreement dated February 9, 2021, entered into with the Grafton and Upton Railroad, pending final judgement or further order of this court, or a single justice thereof, whichever is first to occur.

Town Meeting to consider a bylaw amendment to include marijuana cultivation

Change needed to grant permits in light industry zoning district

Hopedale Town Meeting will be asked to amend the Planning Board's Table of Uses to allow for marijuana cultivation in the town's Light Industry zoning district.

The issue came to light during the permitting process for MACA which signed a host community agreement with Hopedale in June 2019 for a location at 2 Condon Way. The site will be used for cultivation only with no manufacturing or retail sales.

According to town counsel Brian Riley of KP Law in Boston, the current Table of Uses does not provide an avenue to permit MACA in the light industry zone.

"This came to my attention when I got a call from one of the representatives from MACA," Riley said.

In a decision letter sent to MACA representative Michael M. Kaplan, and discussed at the Board of Selectmen's April 12 meeting, Riley explained that the table lists specific uses allowable in the Commercial and Industrial districts, and includes a "catchall" category that could be used for marijuana cultivation, but there are no such provisions laid out for the Light Industry district.

Riley says the "bylaw would require amendment to authorize the Building Commissioner and the Planning Board to approve a marijuana cultivation facility in the Light Industry district. This could involve either adding marijuana cultivation specifically



in the Table of Uses, or perhaps changing the catch-all provision for commercial uses to apply to the LIght Industry district, as allowed or allowed by special permit."

In order to effect a zoning change, the Planning Board will have to hold a public hearing before the annual town meeting. As of press time, that hearing date was not set. For more information, monitor the town website for a hearing notice, likely the first week in May.

- The plain language of that statute [G.L. c. 61, § 8] would not appear to authorize the select board to acquire any less than the entirety of the real property subject to the right of first refusal. "No sale of the land shall be consummated if the terms of the sale differ in any material way from the terms of the purchase and sale agreement which accompanied the bona fide offer to purchase as described in the notice of intent to sell except as provided in this section." G. L. c. 61, § 8. Here, the significant reduction in both the acreage of land to be sold and the purchase price as set forth in the settlement agreement constitute a material change in the terms.
- To be clear, I am not deciding this case on the merits; only that the plaintiffs have demonstrate[d] some chance of success on their claim.

Attorney David E. Lurie of Lurie Friedman LLP in Boston represents the residents in Reilly, et al. v. Town of Hopedale, et al. "We are gratified that the Court vindicated our position," Lurie told Hopedale Town News. "It ruled that the Board of Selectmen acted illegally here, by abandoning the Town's clear right to obtain and preserve 130 acres of forestland and allowing Railroad development on 90 of those acres, without the approval of Town Meeting.

Lurie added, "The Board should do the right thing and proceed to enforce the Town's right to acquire all 130 acres. If it doesn't, we will ask the Court to order that to happen."

The decision was issued on April 8 and was not discussed by the Hopedale Board of Selectmen at its April 12 meeting. It will be a topic in executive session at a special selectmen's meeting on April 20.

In early March, these residents filed suit against the Town of Hopedale, two selectmen, and the Grafton and Upton Railroad (including its owner, president, and an associated realty trust) related to the recent settlement agreement between the town and GURR for the purchase of land at and near 364 West Street.

In late March, Worcester Superior Court denied their Motion for Preliminary Injunction and the group filed an appeal with the Appeals Court.

Plant a Tree in Hopedale program moving forward

Soon residents can name a tree in honor of a loved one

The Town of Hopedale is in the process of creating a program called Plant a Tree in Hopedale ("PATH") which will enable people to make honorary or memorial donations through the purchase of trees to be planted in town.

The program will be administered by the Tree Warden who will determine the species and location of each tree to be chosen from a limited list of tree species. People can also donate to a gift fund if they would prefer not to choose a specific tree or honoree.

"I heard from the tree warden there is quite a bit of tree planting that is necessary," Town Administrator Diana Schindler told the Board of Selectmen at its April 12 meeting.

The Selectmen expressed their support of the PATH program and a gift account will be created in the near future.

"There is a time-honored tradition of being able to plant trees to make a contribution to the environment," said Carole Mullen who has volunteered to do the administrative work necessary to set up the program. "We have a real need in Hopedale to replace a lot of trees, hopefully people will see this as a way to help the town."



Mullen explained the program is meant to help the Tree Warden purchase supplies noting there are few funds in the town budget for that department which makes it difficult to purchase new trees. Other town departments will help with planting.

Becca Solomon, the town's Tree Warden (and chair of the Hopedale Conservation Committee), attended the selectmen's meeting. "I've heard of this program. It's an excellent program and I would be very much in support of putting this in place."

Title work continues regarding ownership of land at end of Overdale Parkway

Town records show land is likely still under control of Park Commission and cannot be gifted by a private resident

Title work continues on who controls the land at the end of Overdale Parkway at the entrance to the Hopedale Parklands.

The ownership issue came to light again earlier this year when developer Richard Lima submitted plans to pave an additional 703 feet of roadway, toward the Parklands and past the town's metal gate, in order to build four houses on the easterly (righthand) side of the road. A second unnamed developer has proposed six houses on the westerly (left-hand) side of the roadway.

The development was discussed at a Feb. 22 meeting of the Board of Selectmen as part of a conversation to "Accept gift from Virginia A. Larkin and Richard D. Larkin (a 30-foot-wide paved road into the Hopedale Park-

lands from the present end of the pavement on Overdale Parkway...)."

There is a question related to the authority of the Larkins to gift the land in question.

After a lengthy conversation at the February meeting, the parties -- the Board of Selectmen; Katherine Klein of KP Law, Hopedale's town counsel; Tom McLaughlin, attorney for Lima, developer of easterly property; and Stephan Rodolakis, attorney for unnamed developer of westerly property -- agreed that more title work was necessary.

Overdale Parkway is a private dead-end road that has not been accepted as a public road, though the town does maintain the 1,500 foot portion it first paved in 1955. Decades ago, the Park Commission installed a metal security gate to block vehicle access to the path to the Parklands.

The proposed development is planned for the northerly side of the security gate.

Previous developments proposed in 1959, 1985 and 1999 were denied because the unpaved portion at the end of Overdale Parkway is reportedly under the jurisdiction of the Park Commission

Town records show:

- August 14, 1917: A letter from the "Town Solicitor" to then Park Commissioner Frank J. Dutcher regarding [generally] roads under the Park Commission's control:
 - "A highway cannot be laid out or constructed over a park dedicated to the use of the public, except in the way provided by statute...This has not been done and the road is not a highway but still a part of the park...It would also seem to me desirable to have these streets entirely in control of the park commissioners, so that they could be closed, temporarily or permanently, and their use be subjected to such regulations as may be advantageous in the use of the park.

• **December 31, 1945:** Annual Report of the Park Commissioners regarding the purchase of the land in question at the end of Overdale Parkway:

ment, approximately 31.5 acres of land, with a frontage on Overdale Parkway, and adjoining the Old Salt Box and other land already under the jurisdiction of the Park Department.

- June 24, 1985: Special Town Meeting was asked to accept the "gift" from the Larkins.
 - First draft of the minutes read, in part: "[Special Town Meeting] Voted that the Town accept as a gift from Virginia A. and Richard D. Larkin, a 30

foot wide paved access road into the Hopedale Parklands from the present end of the pavement on Overdale Parkway approximately 703 feet, more or less, northerly into the parklands, all as shown on the plan attached to this warrant..."

- However, the motion had been ruled "out of order" by the moderator on Town Meeting floor
- Special Town Meeting minutes were revised to reflect:

"Article 33. Ruled out of order by Moderator, as

Park Commissioner Richard Vitale notified him by letter and in person at this meeting that the Commissioners unanimously voted not to release the land. Town Counsel's ruling is as follows...Article 33 of the Annual Town Warrant inserted at the request of private citizens seeks to have the Town petition the legislature to release a section of parklands roadway for approximately 800 feet. According to the legal description attached to the warrant the parcel would be approximately 800 feet long and 50 feet wide and it appears to be intended to lay this out as a public way in order to give frontage and access to certain lots of land which now have no frontage on a public way.

Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 79, Section 5, states "No portion of land taken for or held as park by a Town under Chapter 45 shall be taken or used for a public way, canal, railroad or railway, or for altering or widening the same, WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF THE BOARD HAVING CONTROL OF THE PUBLIC PARKS OF SUCH TOWN. [author emphasis]

Hence before taking action on this article it must be determined whether or not such consent to the release

of [this] parcel of land has been given by the Hopedale Board of Park Commissioners and such information must be on file with the Moderator so it can be made a part of the vote and the record regarding this Article.

Motion of Attorney Antonellis to Pass Over was voted by unanimous voice vote."

At the selectmen's meeting in February, Don Howes, chairman of the current Park Commission said the unpaved accessway is under his commission's jurisdic-

The issue was on the agenda for the Board of Selectmen's April 12 meeting but it was postponed because they have not received the title search results. Selectmen are expected to discuss it at their next meeting on May 10.



The Town of Hopedale has officially been designated a "Green Community" by the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources. The signs should arrive in the next 60 days.


Hopedale is one of nine communities just added to the list of 280 participating Massachusetts communities. The other newly-designated towns include Braintree, Clinton, Falmouth, Norton, Princeton, Rowley, Walpole, and West Stockbridge.

The designation starts with an initial grant of \$137,759 which is a base grant of \$125,000 "plus an amount adjusted for population and income."

"We have projects on our energy reduction plan that we would like to submit," Town Administrator Diana Schindler told the Board of Selectmen at its April 12 meeting. "After this grant, we would have to file for competitive grants," specifically mentioning the hope to replace LED interior lighting at the library and the police department.

"This is fantastic, a huge win," said Board of Selectmen Chairman Brian Keyes.

According to mass.gov, "Green Communities are eligible to apply for grants to implement energy conservation measures that help them cut energy use and costs. They track their actual energy use and costs, acquire

fuel-efficient vehicles as required by their Fuel-Efficient Vehicle Policy, and ensure new construction activities are in compliance with the Stretch Energy Code."


Hours shortened again this year

New Hopedale Coach Looking to Get Team Back to The Finals

Kevin Bresciani has lived in the town of Hopedale his entire life and his family has a deeprooted history within the town. Now the 2015 alumni will be taking over the baseball team he once played for under Coaches Small and Crescenzi.

The Blue Raider alum began playing sports for Hopedale in the seventh grade where he was part of the soccer team, the three-time district finals basketball team, where they captured one championship and two-time district champion baseball squad. The baseball team was one out away from capturing a State Title with Bresciani and his teammates.

Following high school, the Hopedale native went onto play baseball for Bridgewater State University where the catcher and occasional pitcher, hit .398 during his senior campaign and was named the Massachusetts State Collegiate Athletic Conference (MASCAC) catcher of the year. Right after college he was the Assistant Baseball Coach at Worcester State before landing his ideal job back home in Hopedale.

"The previous Coach (Josh Crescenzi) helped me to land the Hopedale job. When I had heard the job had opened up, I was super excited. Being an PE teacher, I knew that I wanted to coach, and this was the perfect opportunity," Bresciani said. "Having family history in the town, coaching here means ev-

erything to me as I get to represent Hopedale."

Crescenzi who had the luxury of coaching Bresciani on the junior varsity as well as the varsity level.

"Not only was Kevin one of the most talented baseball players I've coached, but he was also one of my favorite people," the former Blue Raider Coach said. "Not only was he a great defensive catcher he also had the offensive skills as well. With him behind the plate it weas like having another coach on the field."

When Crescenzi decided to step down as the Head Coach there was only one person, he believed totally capable of taking the reins of the team.

"After I realized that this year was not going to work for me as my kids were starting to play sports themselves and I was to Coach their t-ball and soccer teams I decided to step down," he said. "My first call was to Stephanie (Ridolfi, Hopedale Athletic Director) and second to Kevin. It was a hard decision but the best for my family. Now that it's in Kevin hands I am mor than confident that t was the right decision."

With an athlete that had played for Hopedale in numerous District Tournaments the Blue Raiders are looking to take to heart Bresciani's tutelage and not only get into the tournament but win it. Two years ago, the Blue Raiders lost to Tahanto in the District 4 Central Finals. This year's squad will be made up of seniors who were sophomores on

that team in 2019.

The new coach is optimistic about the team's chances with the amount of talent he has returning to the diamond. Under the Covid restrictions, the baseball season will be played under a bunch of unfamiliar rules as well as in pods, but at this time Hopedale is not sure who they will take on in their pod.

"Giving the athletes a chance to play competitive baseball once again (last season was cancelled due to the pandemic) is at the top of their priority," Bresciani said. "The MIAA also noted that there will be some sort of tournament play despite the shortening of the season. This is great as it give the players something to play for and they are deserving of that after losing last year."

While the season nor tryouts had begun at the time of this writing, the incoming coach did know of a few of the returning athletes that will lead his squad back into a deep tournament run.

Alex Luccini, who has already committed to play for UMASS Lowell, will be behind the plate once again for his senior campaign and provide the team with exceptional leadership. Two other seniors Sean Ryan and John McDonough will also be returning to suit up for the Blue Raiders this spring. The two will not only see action on the mound this season, but Ryan will also play some infield while Mc-Donough will play the infield as well as the outfield when he's not pitching. The duo were impor-



tant pieces to Hopedale's playoff run as sophomores the last time they were able to lace up the cleats.

Junior middle infielder Will Parker will also see some action as part of the pitching staff in the upcoming season.

In addition to the new Covid regulations, the MIAA has added a pitch count on pitchers, a rule that was supposed to be initiated last year. It's a rule that will allow coaches to only use their pitchers over a certain number of innings per week, thus not allowing high school coaches to overuse a kid and jeopardize his arm.

Spending focus on college baseball the years prior Bresciani is unfamiliar with what is going on with a lot of the DVC teams, but is looking forward to getting back on the field allowing the athletes to play one more season of baseball for Hopedale.

"After missing last year, the kids are defiantly hungry and ready to work," said the new coach. "They are looking forward to putting on that Hopedale unform and representing their team once again."

Hopedale's Sr. Center Van is available for rides for seniors and disabled adults.

Seniors and disabled adults who don't drive and need transportation may use the Sr. Center van to go grocery shopping, personal shopping or get to the bank, hair salon, barber or other local non-medical destinations.

The current van schedule is:

Monday, Tuesday and Thursday

9:00 am - 2:00 pm (Times and dates subject to availability of the driver.)

The cost for most roundtrips is \$3.00. Please call to schedule an appointment at least forty-eight (48) hours before your appointment.

If you would like to use the Hopedale Sr. Center van you must register as a van rider by calling the Sr. Center at (508)634-2208. The van will come directly to your home and pick you up!

Please remember that we have a separate van service for medical appointments and prescription pick-ups. Call the Sr. Center directly at (508)634-2208 for rides to your medical appointments.

COVID-19 Requirements:

All van riders will be required to:

- Answer screening questions
- Have temperature taken
- Wear a mask
- Use hand-sanitizer before taking a seat

The van's high-contact surfaces will be wiped-down with sanitizing cloths between trips. There is a two (2) person maximum on each trip. Please let us know if you have particular questions or concerns. We can assist with your van rider registration.

The van is available through a partnership between the town of Hopedale and The MetroWest Regional Transit Authority. The service offers Hopedale residents a wonderful opportunity for expanded transportation services. Spread the word.
