Operated by Dean and Sarah Schnurr, Funny Bus is a family business which started in Charlotte, North Carolina, and has been successfully operating since 2015. "My sister told me she was going to start a comedy sight-seeing tour, I thought she was crazy; but after seeing how much the people of Charlotte embraced her business, I was easily convinced to get one rolling on the streets of Cleveland," said Dean.

Dean and Sarah have more than 50 years combined experience in marketing, public relations, and management. As seasoned event planners, they have a keen understanding of what is necessary to



make an experience memorable and they have used those skills to ensure the Funny Bus provides top notch entertainment.

"We intend to use the Charlotte model which started modestly and grew organically to a point pre-COVID when they were offering more than 21 tours per week," said Dean. Funny Bus Cleveland will initially offer four tours per week one on Friday, two on Saturday, and one on Sunday. Tickets cost \$28

and include all taxes and fees.

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Lake County History Center

Historic records, great exhibits and awesome special events for the family

ooking for something different to do this summer? How about a visit to a museum with an array of exhibits, a library to dive into the past, a gift shop with unique items, even the perfect venue for your special occasion?

The Lake County History Center, located in Painesville Township, is not only a fascinating place to spend a day, it's also historic in its own right with 84 years of capturing our county's local past, as well as hosting activities, special events, and permanent and temporary exhibits honoring those Lake County stories.

Did you know the LCHS holds approximately 3,000 surname files or boxes in its genealogy room, plus 10,000 digitized photographs, period maps, and old telephone directories? The research library also has a collection of reference books covering local city and township histories that include businesses, clubs, various associations, churches and schools. The 13-room museum is indeed a treasure trove for those seeking out their family stories.

"We're a well-hidden gem," says Amy Kapostasy, History Center director. "We're hoping to get the word out for people who haven't yet discovered us. Many don't realize how big the house is and all the relics that we have." The center provides educational programs to groups of all ages. This summer, the facility has a lot planned for history buffs, both young and old, all the way through the end of the year.

While many events take place at this eight-acre complex, the center also holds off site activities, such as the "Wine Around: Marine Mishaps," which will take place at the Lake Erie Bluffs in Perry on Wednesday, June 9 at 6 pm. Here, you'll learn the stories of shipwrecks on Lake Erie and enjoy a barbeque dinner.

Then, on Saturday, June 12, it's time for Brats with Pops, from noon until 4 pm. German bratwurst, Italian sausage and other choices, such as BBQ pork and hot dogs, will be provided by Frank's "brat mobile" food truck, from the Westside Market, with music by singer/songwriter, Steve Madewell. Beer and wine will also be available.

Kapostasy is especially excited to bring the United States Air Force Band of Flight, Flight One ensemble to the museum on Sunday, June 27 at 6 pm. "It will be their first time here so we're really looking forward to it. It's a great musical event for families and it's free." She emphasizes that you must RSVP to keep within the capacity limits as they are still honoring CDC rules for safe distancing.

The recently renovated event barn, located behind the museum, is sure to be a hit this year now that special occasions are in full force. The air-conditioned building and picturesque grounds, including a gazebo, are currently available to rent for weddings, showers, class reunions and other parties of up to 100-plus people.

"The full kitchen and both men's and women's restrooms are brand new, and the interior has been completely redone," Kapostasy says. "We realize a lot of events had to be canceled last year and many venues are booked up. We still have some open dates, and with these beautiful grounds, this is an especially perfect location for an outdoor wedding."

Volunteer Opportunities!

LCHS is also a great place to spend some volunteer time. The center's mission is to preserve, educate and learn about Lake County, Ohio history, and they are always in need of volunteers, including teens. Volunteers help with varied events, work with children in school programs, can aid in grant writing, do light clerical work, and help out with site maintenance.

The center is now back to normal operating hours, which are Tuesday through Saturday, 10 am–4 pm. However, it's best to call 639-2945 to confirm the day's museum hours.

"When people visit, they often say how amazed they are at our collections," Kapostasy notes. "They leave here much more connected to Lake County."

Admission is \$5 for individuals and \$8 for guided tours, which must be arranged in advance. Children 5 and under are free. Prices for group events vary based on the program.



Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging

Provides services for older adults and individuals with disabilities

hen it comes to senior healthcare, the various concerns that can develop can be overwhelming, and often times we don't know where to go for help and guidance. That's where The Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging comes in. The WRAAA provides advocacy, assistance, and answers for those who are aging and disabled. The organization offers a variety of services that can aid in a broad spectrum of healthcare needs.

"We're always here to help, and we have been here for a long time," says Fatima Perkins, director of community outreach and advocacy, who has a 30-year history with the organization. "Even during the pandemic, we've stayed in touch with our consumers with the wellness check program, the meal programs, and our new TeleCare Program."

The agency leaves no one behind, whether the need is for information

and guidance or referrals to any healthcare question. As a member of the National Association of Area Agencies on Aging and Ohio Association of Area Agencies on Aging, the WRAAA offers a number of programs throughout Cuyahoga, Lake, Geauga, Lorain and Medina counties. These include PASS-PORT Homecare, Medicare Waiver, Residential State Supplement and Care Choice Ohio. It assists families by providing for long-term care and preadmission screening of nursing home applicants.

The nonprofit organization helps in planning, coordinating and administering state and federally funded programs. It provides escort, home and personal care, food and transportation, legal services, and offers individual counseling and support groups.

"Yes, that's a lot to cover," Perkins admits. "But we manage because each of our many programs are targeted for a particular need, and



we have a lot of dutiful folks that want to make a difference and serve people who need help."

The coordinated community-based services for persons 60 years and older include—but are not limited to—family caregiver support (connects caregivers to supportive resources), nutritional program services, such as home-delivered meals, congregate meals, coupled with nutrition education and risk screening, and wellness supportive programs. The agency has also increased programs to adjust to the challenges of the pandemic.

"COVID really brought out the innovation in all of us," Perkins says. "We created the Telephonics Case & Care Management so we could keep in contact with the most vulnerable. For some, we are a person's only contact they have, so we take that seriously." Three of the new programs include the Great Grocery Giveaway Program, Restaurant Voucher Program, and the Circle of Food.

"The TeleCare Program is where we keep in contact with our consumers at home for a wellness check," Perkins explains. "There have been many during this time who experience fear about going anywhere outside their homes for care and food. We not only deliver food but include a Safe Home & Health Wellness Box that has many necessary household items like hygiene products, flashlights, CO detectors — things like that. And some have already asked us to continue this program indefinitely."

Perkins adds that they receive great help from the nonprofit organization, Edwins Leadership & Restaurant, who prepare and provide the meals in the program. "The grocery programs have doubled in each county due to need," she says. "We deliver hot meals to social service organizations as well as private homes, and we have it available also for pickup."

The WRAAA family caregiver support team is another much needed program that connects caregivers to the right resources, including often assigning a professional care coordinator to work with each caregiver. When appropriate, care coordinators may help caregivers create and implement a respite plan. Information, assistance, and care planning are provided at no cost for anyone requesting help.

The WRAAA anticipates administering their Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP), through 2021. The program is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture, the Ohio Department of Aging, and the WRAAA.

The Aging and Disability Resource Center is the first go-to step in getting help and direction to all these resources. The department provides information, assistance, and referrals. "We've nicknamed the center the 'front door' because that's the access to everything," Perkins says. You can begin by calling (216) 539-9240.

Horizon Learning Centers

Child care, before- and after-school care, summer camps and free preschool for qualified families

here's a lot that goes into child development and Horizon Learning Centers gives kids a whole new world to explore with a play-based curriculum that sparks creativity, independent thinking, self-help skills, and social interaction.

"We believe in dramatic play as being one of the best ways to learn," says program supervisor, Nihada Nabulsi. "We set the stage for them with all the needed materials and they take off from there."

Ćreative Curriculum is where students use dramatic play, such as a store setup, to learn how to navigate real-life activities in a fun, collaborative, and educational way.

"The classroom is set up for the particular interest that day and we provide things like calculators, pen, paper, whatever they need," Nabulsi adds. "They learn through engagement."

Horizon Learning Centers provide a clean, safe, educational setting and welcome infants (starting at six

weeks), toddlers, preschoolers, kindergartners, and school-age children up to 14 years of age.


There are three locations in the Greater Cleveland area: Tremont, Euclid and Mentor. All curriculum is researched-based and age-appropriate with quality certified, degreed teachers.

Beginning at prekindergarten, students learn reading, mathematical concepts, science and nature studies, and computer skills. Educational activities include brain games that are fun and interactive.

Each center also has their own kitchens so they can provide healthy, balanced meals every day. Spring and summer allows the children to get out and learn hands on, by helping to plant vegetable gardens, often with their parents, giving them a personal connection to their nutritional enjoyment.

During the pandemic, the center has always remained open.

"We've done well with the COVID restrictions," Nabulsi says. "We keep strict protocols. Everyone must keep masks on, and we take

In conjunction with cognitive and creative learning, students develop needed social skills as they interact with their peers and teachers in a classroom environment. And that includes playing together during before-and after-school care.

What truly sets Horizon Learning Centers apart is that they offer a state-funded free preschool program, provided to them by the Ohio Department of Education.

"We are fortunate to have this grant, which allows us to provide free preschool for qualified parents. This allows the children to attend our center five days a week for two and a half hours," says Nabulsi. "It's a wonderful opportunity we are proud to offer."

Now that summer has arrived, the center is looking forward to getting kids back to a variety of outdoor activities. "Our day camps are varied and a lot of fun. We're planning several field trips that include going to the zoo, Westside Market, and some parks, as well," Nabulsi says. "We'll also be having a camp within," where we'll have a lot of visiting instructors for science camp, soccer camp, basketball camp, karate camp, and dance camp."

Clearly, there is a lot going on at Horizon all year long. So whether you're looking for child care, preschool, before-or after-school programs, or summer camp, parents can be assured, their child will receive the quality educational experiences to help them grow and thrive, and have fun while doing it.

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6 Tips for Safe Grilling

The sun is out, the birds are chirping, and barbeques are a weekly event. The smells of a charcoal grill and sizzling meat can take you back to happy memories, but there are also some safety concerns when grilling. Here is a list of preventative tips to help you safely enjoy grilling and being outside.

Maintenance: Make sure the grill itself is clean and any excess grease or fat is cleared away. If you are operating a gas grill, check the gas line regularly to make sure there are no leaks. Maintenance is recommended at least once a year. The beginning of grilling season is a good time to clean and check everything.

Location: Keep your grill a minimum of 10 feet away from any structure or flammable household items (cleaners, fertilizer, wood piles, etc.). Do not put your grill under an overhang that could lead to damages if a flareup occurs.

Ventilation: Never use a grill indoors; carbon-monoxide is a silent, odorless killer that can build up from grill exhaust. The grill needs to be used outside in an open space to vent properly.

Ignition: Be sure to light your grill with the lid open to avoid gas build up. A build-up of gas can create a fireball and explode causing injury to yourself and property. For charcoal grills, use only lighter fluid designed for grilling. Never use gasoline or other flammable liquids and never add more lighter fluid once the fire has started. Don't move the grill once it is lit.

Monitor: Never leave your grill unattended. Even if there is only one item cooking on it, when a fire starts it spreads quickly and you could be up in flames before you know it. Do



your prep work ahead of time so you can enjoy grilling and the outdoors. Always keep children and pets away from the grill.

Extinguish: Keep a spray bottle of water on hand while grilling. The water can be used to quell minor flare-ups, and water will not affect your food. Have a fire extinguisher in reach and know how to use it. Knowing how to extinguish a fire properly can save you a lot of damage.

Grilling is a favorite summer activity and a great way to enjoy food, fellowship, and the great outdoors. Be cautious when grilling, safety is key!



Lake County officials seek to reach summer vaccination goals

Summer is nearly here and with Ohio health orders expiring, officials are looking for novel ways of achieving vaccination goals. The city of Mentor is offering a "shot and a beer" at their popular Mentor Rocks summer concert series this year.

"Mentor Rocks traditionally attracts about 6,500 music lovers per week," says Kenneth J. Filipiak, Mentor city manager. "We felt this was a fun way of reaching those who might not necessarily go out of their way to get the COVID-19 vaccine."

The program was developed with the support of the Lake County General Health District.

A COVID-19 vaccination station will be located near the main vendor area. The single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine will be available and administered by a nurse free-ofcharge. Those who elect to receive the shot will be asked to stay in an observation tent for 15 minutes

after which they will be presented a voucher courtesy of the city redeemable for one beverage item.

Mentor Rocks is held Tuesday evenings from 7-9 pm at the Mentor Civic Amphitheater. The 2021 schedule runs for 14 weeks, from June 1 through August 31. The series features top tribute bands from across the country as well as featured national acts. This year's lineup includes rock legend, Lita Ford, and 90s alt-rock hitmakers, Cracker.

The Mentor Civic Amphitheater is located at 8600 Munson Road. Grounds open at 5 pm. Free admission and parking. The venue features lawn seating so attendees should bring a lawn chair or blanket.



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Local Girl Scout receives national life-saving award



Girl Scout Brownie Elizabeth (Ellie) Costanzo was awarded Girl Scouts of the USA (GSUSA)'s Medal of Honor for saving the life of a family friend during a trip to her grandparents' lake house. The Girl Scout Medal of Honor is presented to Girl Scouts who have performed acts of heroism beyond the degree of maturity and training expected for their age.

Ellie was awarded the Medal of Honor along with a congratulatory letter from GSUSA in a ceremony at Church of the Gesu in University Heights on Monday, May 3. Girl Scouts of North East Ohio (GS-NEO) Chief Executive Officer Jane Christyson presented her award.

While visiting her grandparents' lake house, Ellie was standing on their dock with her siblings and two family friends. Her brother was fishing on the dock and had a bite on his line, but soon after the fish

bit, it swam under the dock. At that moment, one of the family friends on the dock, who was 3 years old at the time, bent down to look at the fish and fell into the water. Ellie saw him having trouble breathing and struggling to stay above water because the water was too deep for him. Sensing the danger, but knowing she was able to stand in the water herself, Ellie jumped in and pulled him out, putting him on the ladder of the dock. From there, her family was able to pull him completely out of the water and on to the dock to safety.

Ellie recognized the danger and thought quickly to save her family friend from the water.

"Because of her quick thinking and willingness to jump right into action, someone's life was saved," said Christyson. "It takes courage and confidence to do what she did, and we are happy to present her with this national award."

Girl Scouts have been honored since 1913 for meritorious deeds that have helped save lives. Training in health and safety is a part of the Girl Scout program. A Girl Scout, because of the promise and law to which she has subscribed, is expected to be resourceful, skilled, and competent – to have presence of mind and to be of service to others. Each situation has many unique factors, and many things are taken into consideration for determining if an act is of unusual bravery beyond that which is expected of a Girl Scout.



New books offer children simple ideas to stay healthy

Senders Pediatrics in South Euclid introduces four helpful new children's books aimed at reminding children of steps they can take to remain healthy and safe during and beyond the pandemic. Way to Go Elbow, Sammy the Shot, Embrace Your Own Space and Task of the Mask all make use of fun illustrations and rhyming language to engage and educate young children.

Highlighting the importance of taking simple steps to help contain the spread of germs are themes of three of the books written by Joan Morgenstern, Senders Pediatrics parent coach and educator. With a COVID-19 vaccine for children coming soon, Joan's fourth book, Sammy the Shot, helps ensure children are well prepared when it is their turn to receive the vaccine.

The release of the books is timed to remind children (and parents) that many of the practices learned to combat the spread of COVID-19 should remain in practice long after the pandemic is over.

Way to Go Elbow encourages the



safe practice of sneezing into ones elbow to prevent the spread of germs. Embrace Your Own Space uses the concept of a bubble to explain to children the abstract notion of physical distancing and personal boundaries. Task of The Mask is a reminder to young children to continue to wear face masks.

"I was inspired to write these books when I observed how difficult it was for parents to explain and reinforce the messages to their children that sneezing into their elbow and physically distancing from friends and family was so critical", said Joan Morgenstern.




