### Landowner Site Visits

Site visits will be offered to landowners in Lake and Cook counties. Each site visit will have an SWCD staff and FreshWater Engineering staff on location. Landowners may invite 2-3 neighbors to join in on the site visit. FreshWater Engineering will walk the area of concern with you and discuss what is happening at the site, along with discussion on potential recommendations. A brief summary of the visit and list of potential recommendations will be provided to the landowner following the site visit.

- Site visits will take place in Lake County on July 10th and 13th / Cook County on July 11th and 12th.
