Also in February, just after the conclusion of the Beijing Winter Olympics, local residents will be able to witness Olympic-caliber talent at the Skating Club of Boston

There will be a lecture at the Morrill Memorial Library on April 28, on the history of Norwood's Police and Fire Departments and a Town Trivia Night by the Norwood High School Alumni Association.

On May 17, the Norwood Historical Society will host 'Influenza and Inequality,' by P. Fanning and on May 22, Veterans' Day celebrations will include a performance by the Parkway Orchestra, a ceremony at the Old Parish Cemetery, and a parade to

the Highland Cemetery. Sites in South Dedham, on October 27.

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

The Center's Annual Holiday Party will be held on December 9. Crooner Tommy Roe will serenade attendees with holiday music, followed by a luncheon.

On December 17, local historian Anthony Sammarco will return to share the history of "Christmas Traditions in Boston." That evening The Friends of the Council on Aging will hold their monthly dance.

And closing out the year on December 31, a bus trip is scheduled for "An American Bandstand New Year's Eve Day," at the Danvers Yacht Club. A fitting end of year celebration for the over-60 set!!

In addition to its regular daily activities, the Senior Center's popular hot lunches, which are served Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, will continue through the winter. If you are unable to come to the Center, your meal can be delivered to you. Weekly menus are posted on the monthly newsletter and cost \$5 each. If you'd like a copy of the newsletter mailed to you each month, the cost is \$7. Alternatively, you can read the newsletter online at www.norwoodma.gov/departments/council\_on\_aging/newsletter\_calendar.php.

For all activities during the month of December and throughout the winter, if the Norwood schools are closed, the Senior Center will also be closed. Always call and check if vou are unsure.

"We've been very fortunate to be able to run our programs at the Senior Center due to the size of the center itself," Mc-Carthy said.

However, she acknowledged that the scheduled speakers, entertainment, and daily programs will be subject to change based on Covid conditions.

And speaking of Covid, vaccine clinics are up and running at the Senior Center. Call if you need a booster shot.

Not only does the Senior Center have great fitness classes and fun group activities, it helps the over 60 community with accessing fuel assistance if needed, sorting through the maze of elder insurance options, and providing transportation to local grocery and retail stores.

McCarthy said she is excited about the Center's out of town medical rides for Norwood residents who are 60 and older.

"It's great to be able to offer that service, especially because of the lack of taxes in town," McCarthy said. "The transport team is busier than they have ever been. Thanks to a vote at Town Meeting, since

May, residents are now able to obtain transportation to medical appointments in Walpole, Westwood, Dedham, Foxboro, Newton, and Needham."

You must call three working days in advance to schedule a ride and be capable of getting in and out of the van independently. The cost for out of town trips is \$5.

The fuel assistance season has begun. If you quality for fuel assistance and would like to apply, call Outreach Coordinator Trish Monahan at 781-762-1201, extension 6804, to set up an appointment to fill out your application. To determine if you qualify, check out the November 2021 newsletter for income limits and list of documentation that must be submitted with your application (http:// cms5.revize.com/revize/norwoodma/document\_center/ Senior/Newsletters/November%202021.pdf).

Do you have questions about your Medicare, Medicaid, or health insurance coverage? Two SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) counselors at the Senior Center continue to assist people with Medicare needs. In-person appointments

are available to people who are fully vaccinated. Appointments are available Tuesdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Appointments by telephone are available if you are not vaccinated. To make an appointment, call 781-762-1201, extension 5.

The Norwood Council on Aging/Senior Center is a vibrant organization serving the 60 and over elder community.

"We are here to help; we're just a phone call away," McCarthy said.

If you have not taken advantage of the programs or entertainment available from the Center, you are doing yourself a disservice. Stop by. Pick up a newsletter to see what's happening and meet your neighbors. You'll be glad you did.

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### Hamwey Among 7 to be Inducted into Millis Hall of Fame

Local Town Pages sports 54 years ago, focused on Millis' writer Ken Hamwey will be inducted into Millis High School's Athletic Hall of Fame on March 19, 2022 at the Medway VFW.

The 78-year-old Hamwey, a Bellingham resident who's worked for Local Town Pages for 10 years, was a unanimous choice of the selection committee. The veteran sports journalist continues to cover feature stories in semi-retirement for Local Town Pages, focusing on seven communities — Medway, Millis, Norfolk, Wrentham, Holliston, Natick and Franklin.

Hamwey, who previously lived in Millis after earning a bachelor's degree from Babson College, started his newspaper career in 1967 with the Framingham News, now known as the Metrowest Daily News. His first story, which was published

varsity football team. Early on, his reporting ranged from high school and college sports to the professional beat where he covered the Boston Celtics and the New England Patriots.

"I'm honored and humbled to be selected for induction into Millis' Hall of Fame," Hamwey said. "It's heart-warming to have a wonderful community like Millis recognize me for my reporting. Some of my fondest memories during a 54-year career involve Millis. Gordon Browne, a three-sport athlete at Millis High, will be presenting me at the ceremony in March and for those unaware of his stature, he was the first Tri-Valley League football player to be drafted (second round by the Jets) into the National Football League. He was an offensive tackle who blocked for quarterback Joe Namath for two years



before suffering a career-ending injury."

Hamwey will be inducted as a contributor and he'll be honored along with star athletes Molly Breen, Dennis Breen (posthumously) and Rich Monaghan; coach and athletic director Peter Vigue; the 2008-09 girls state championship basketball team

and the 1980 boys track team.

After six years in Framingham, Hamwey was hired at the Providence Journal where he spent the next 35 years working for the four-time Pulitzer-prizewinning newspaper. He finished his career there as the paper's Night Sports Editor, retiring in 2008. On Hamwey's last day in Providence, the Rhode Island State Senate read aloud a citation for his efforts and contributions to R.I. athletics. Two years later, in 2010, he was honored by the Mass. Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA), which presented him with its Distinguished Friend Award.

At the Metrowest News. which included the Milford News and the Country Gazette, Hamwey wrote a popular weekly column — "Yesterday's Heroes" - that focused on athletes' and coaches' past achievements.

In 2007, Hamwey began covering sports for the Bellingham Bulletin. As Sports Editor at the Bulletin, he launched a column similar to Yesterday's Heroes called "Where Are They Now,"

reporting on former Bellingham athletes. For the next 11 years, Hamwey extensively covered Bellingham sports while also filing stories for Local Town Pages.

Hamwey's upcoming induction in Millis will be his first Hall of Fame honor. However, he has been nominated for induction into Bellingham's Hall of Fame but that committee has yet to select him.

Hamwey moved to Bellingham in 1972. He's married to Pauline Allard, a school teacher who taught in Bellingham at the Macy Elementary School. His son, Travis, graduated from Bellingham High in 1989.

Tickets for the ceremony cost \$50 and can be ordered until March 12, 2022. They can be obtained by writing a check to the Millis Athletics Hall of Fame and mailed to 155 Plain St., Millis, MA 02054. Tickets can also be obtained via Venmo (money amount to @Millis-AthleticsHOF). A cocktail hour will begin at 6 p.m. and dinner will be at 7 p.m. followed by the ceremony.



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## **Norwood Sports** Giovanni Shines as Norwood Soccer Has Tough Season

It was definitely not the year Coach Tom Healy and the Norwood boy's soccer team was hoping to have, especially for the outgoing seniors. However, while the team as a whole was struggling on the field, senior goalie Chris Giovanni was doing all that he could to keep his team in games while searching for that elusive win.

After a season that included Covid last fall, the then junior was going into the season with some skepticism as he and his teammates didn't know what they were up against. The season was not only abbreviated and had no tournament after the regular season, but as a goalie, Giovanni had restrictions put upon him that he was not used to. He was unable to punt or throw the ball past midfield, something that a goalie relies on to get the ball out of their end. However, once he got those restrictions under wraps, he was fine and felt that having to get rid of the ball in shorter distances helped his game.

Giovanni had such a good season he was named to the Tri-Valley All Star team, something that was not on his radar.

"It was awesome, I really didn't expect it at all," the Norwood goalie said. "Although I was named to the team it was just not me. The team defense was a major contributor to my success and without them I don't think that it would have been possible."

While Giovanni discounts his play as the reason he was named



to the TVL All Star team, his coach disagrees.

"Last year was a strange season with Covid, but Chris really shinned and was able to stay back in the box having four experienced defenders in front of him," Healy said. "Playing only 10 games we didn't get to play the younger kids all that much, but although there were a lot of seniors on the field, he played fantastic and was worthy of that All Conference nomination on the All-Star team."

With the pandemic a major distraction to the high school season, Healy's decision to play all his seniors in the minimal time frame had an effect on this year's campaign.

"Chris is a great leader and understands last year's predicament with not being able to play the younger kids all that much and realizes that it trickled down to this year and what is happening on the field," the Mustang Coach said. "His play from last year

transferred to this year and he is playing at a high level. He has also worked well with the young defenders on the field and has told them when and if they need to make adjustments."

According to Healy, Giovanni has taken some risks throughout the season because of the inexperience playing in front of him where some have gone his way and others not.

"I can't really fault him for wanting to win, but there have been times that he shouldn't have taken the chance," Healy said. "With that said, we have talked about it, and he understands my thinking and has come to the conclusion that chances don't always work."

Although his goals against average, which was under three last



year, has risen this fall, Healy still believes that his goalie has been playing on an All-Star level and hopes that the voting Coaches realize that his average has gone up because of the inexperienced backfield that the Mustangs have trotted out onto the field this year.

Growing up, Giovanni's parents had him trying all different sports, but according to the Nor-

wood senior they all fizzled out. That is except soccer, a game that he not only enjoyed but felt he was good at. Having found something that he excelled at, Giovanni played town soccer, joined a winter league and a club team. Once he got to elementary school, he was introduced to the position of goalie, something with which he was not all that thrilled.

"Prior to elementary school I liked using my feet to do different skills, but being the biggest kid that put me in net. Originally, I didn't like the position as I preferred running, but eventually I began to like the position," Giovanni said. "In sixth grade, my winter soccer team went to the finals and after that season a friend of mine suggested that I try out for the club team as their goalie."

Giovanni took his friend's advice and found that club soccer helped him immensely to get ready for high school soccer as it was much more challenging and competitive than the soccer he was playing with his friends. As a freshman for Norwood High School, there were four goalies on the junior varsity team, Giovanni being the number one net minder. During his sophomore season, he won the starting varsity position and has improved each year since then.

"As the starting varsity goalie, it was a big difference for a player my age and skill level going up against others that were two years older and a lot stronger," he said. "It was a big jump at first and the play of the game was much more competitive and a challenge, but practice with my team gave me a lot of encouragement."

Coming into his final year playing for Norwood, Giovanni was hoping for much more of a normal season compared to last year. He set three goals for himself prior to the season getting underway: to be a better player than last year, to be recruited to play collegiate soccer, and help the Mustangs make the playoffs. Although Norwood was unable to make the playoffs this year, Giovanni definitely took his game to the next level and should be looked upon as a collegiate soccer goalie.

"I didn't come into the season with a negative mindset, I was just excited to get back on the field and play soccer again," the Norwood goalie said. "I knew that we had a lot of kids moving up and what they could do. There was definitely going to be a change in momentum in defense until they got used to the game, much like my first year."

In regards to college, Giovanni has been talking to a few schools but has not made any decisions as of yet. He is hoping to find a school that offers him the option to play soccer as well as offering his major (mechanical engineering or computer science).

"I'm open to whatever school comes calling, but education comes first," Giovanni said. "I would love to be part of the soccer program, but if I can't play soccer collegiately, I can always play in some other capacity, like club or intramurals."

As the season came to a close, Giovanni noted that earning another All-Star nod would be great, but it's not necessarily something he needs to cement his legacy on the field.

"Being an All-Star is definitely on my radar and I would love to achieve it for a second year in a row, but it is not something that I'm shooting for," he said. "I would have rather had the team improve so that when they return next season, they will be ready and competitive once again."

### Norwood Girls Volleyball Came Close to Tournament Qualification

In the past, it was rather black and white if you got into the Sectional Tournaments. If you happened to win at least 50% of your games, vou were in, but beginning this year things have gotten a little more confusing. In order to extend your season, teams can still advance if they finish with a .500 record or better during the regular season, or they can also qualify if they finish among the top 32 teams in their division based on the new power ranking system. The power rankings revolve around a team's strength of schedule and margin of victory.

The Norwood girls' volleyball team, which plays in the Tri-Valley League, one of the tougher leagues in the state, finished with a 5-15 record. However, playing in the TVL they square off against some quality competition giving them a top-notch strength of schedule. Of the Mustangs 15 losses, the team was able to win at least one match in eight of those contests.

Although it wasn't one of Norwood's better seasons record wise, Coach Paul Nimblett believes he had himself one of his better teams in some time. The Mustangs possessed great senior leadership this fall and their younger athletes played some significant roles in what should help the future of the program.

Leading the charge onto the court were senior tri-captains Liz Hinkson, Kimmy Hanoian and Kati Melen. All three athletes have been on the varsity squad for three years, including the unique Covid campaign last season. At the time of this writing, Hinkson, an outside hitter, was one of the team's top point scorers with 68 kills and was a top server with 30 aces. Hanoian, a right side or outside hitter, notched 44 kills and 34 aces while being moved around the court. As a left-handed hitter, it made it tough for the opposition to pick up her hits. Melen



was a middle hitter who posted 83 kills and was the top blocker on the team with 14.

"The three of them definitely kept us in the matches," the Norwood Coach said. "We needed them to get us those points as well as their providing leadership to the rest of the team."

With Covid, the volleyball team was one of many fall sports that were shifted to a Fall II season in February. Having the season being played five months later than normal, the turnaround from last year to this season was relatively fast. Norwood ended the Fall II season on a two-game winning streak and Nimblett was hoping that it would carry over.

"The team was raring to go this year and we knew that we had a good senior leadership group that could teach the underclassmen," Nimblett said. "We also knew that with the new format and because of our strength of schedule that we should be right in the fight for a tournament berth.

Not having the long wait from one season to the next, a lot of the girls decided to dedicate their summer to getting better for the upcoming season. Although they were ready to go, Norwood didn't start the season off on the right foot. The Mustangs opened the 2021 campaign with seven straight losses before putting together a four-game winning streak and a tough fought 3-2 loss to Norton.

"We didn't play the way that I had hoped to open the season, but we eventually got things going and put together a four-game winning streak," the Norwood Coach said. "We started to play real good volleyball, including two 3-2 matches with Norton (one win and one loss). I was hoping that we'd keep trending upward while being competitive. This was definitely a different team from the beginning of the season."

In addition to the senior tricaptains Norwood middle hitter Shannon Brady playing opposite of Melen was having herself a complete season. The junior had 30 kills and 15 block shots and made up a front line tandem with Melen for the Mustangs. Nimblett was excited to see what the junior was doing as she progressed through the season.

Two other juniors having good seasons were Sam Rose and Kati Mills. Rose, the team's first-year varsity libero, stepped right into the position and excepted her role compiling 140 digs thus far, while allowing the coach to move her around on the court with success no matter where she played. Mills began the season setting but as the season progressed, she turned the corner as a hitter (right side opposite). Her hitting ability allowed the Mustangs to have a balanced attack giving Nimblett two 6-foot girls and two others with good agility and jumping skills. The team currently has 40 blocks so far, averaging 4 per match.

Another outside hitter who fills in when Hinkson is not on the floor is junior Brie Fitzgerald. The junior allows Nimblett to move her around and give the other girls a break here and there.

While having talented hitters up front, the Norwood Coach was also fortunate with two girls who could play the setter position with skill. Freshman Colleen Brady and sophomore Molly Federico both have played an exceptional role for the Mustangs this fall and should continue to do so in the future.

"Colleen came in as a surprise," Nimblett said. "She had a great tryout and I had to take her onto the varsity squad with what she showed me. Molly had moved up from the junior varsity team and brought with her a new energy to the team. She is very competitive and the two will have a great future with us."

Rounding out the seniors on the squad are defensive specialist Mary Kate Kenny, opposite hitter and utility player Lexi Martinez and Maggie Federico. Being a versatile individual on the court, Federico has done whatever is needed of her this season while bringing an energy that picks the team up every time she steps onto the court.

When the rankings were computed, Norwood found themselves at 33, unfortunately finishing one spot out of Tournament contention. Although the Mustangs were edged out on the final day of the regular season, Nimblett saw that his team improved a lot from opening day and is very excited about looking toward next season.

Visitors are welcome to stroll through the walkways in search for their personal messages in memory of lost loved ones. Even residents who have not posted a luminary, visit the Common to share their sympathies and to take a moment to embrace the spirit of the season.

For the past 19 years, luminaries have lit up the Town Common



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walkways in remembrance of lost loves ones and in support of their neighbors who are battling a medical tragedy. The luminary bags are engraved with an individual name, message, prayer or date as a symbol of Life, Hope, the Season or in Remembrance of others.

"Every candle that is lit is helping someone in Norwood," Cofounder Lee Kennedy said. "You don't know when you light that candle who you are helping."

The Circle of Hope foundation was established in 1998 in memory of Kennedy's daughter, Norwood resident Michelle Kennedy, who suffered from leukemia. Local residents united during her battle, many who did not even know her personally. The Circle of Hope established in her memory preserves that community spirit by donating fundraising proceeds to Norwood families who need assistance due to a catastrophic medical illness. To date, the COH has provided over \$885,000 to Norwood residents.

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### **Snow & Ice Policy**

This information provides a general overview of our snow and ice program, frequently asked questions, winter tips and also seeks your support in providing safe streets and sidewalks during snow and ice emergencies.

The Town of Norwood's Public Works Department is responsible for removing snow from and de-icing 110 miles of roadway and 6 municipal parking lots in the winter season. The Town also plows 31 miles of sidewalk to ensure safe passage for pedestrians.

The Public Works Department uses 5 large salt (de-icing) trucks to de-ice roadways. When conditions warrant the plowing of roadways to make them safe, the Town uses 26 municipal vehicles and up to 30 contracted pieces of equipment on 32 plow routes. Many factors can determine the Town's response to a snow event, some of which may include:

- the temperatures before, during and after a storm;
- the amount of accumulated snow;
- $\ensuremath{\bullet}$  the duration of the storm
- the road surface temperature;
- the weather forecast for the following days



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### Plan of Operations:

When the snow starts falling, salt trucks are dispatched to apply de-icing materials such as road salt and liquid magnesium chloride to keep the roads safe.

When 2-3 inches of snow has accumulated on the streets, the snow plowing operation usually begins.

Once the snow stops falling and the roads have been plowed, the streets will again be treated with de-icing materials to prevent a freeze-up of the road surface.

Department personnel will then clear intersections and plow sidewalks and parking lots.

### **Black Road Policy:**

Within four hours after the storm has ended it is the policy of the Norwood Public Works Department to have a bare (black) road surface on all main streets and arterial collectors. Residential side streets and cul-de-sacs will also receive similar treatment but may take longer to have a bare (black) road surface.

### **Parking Bans:**

Norwood Town By-law (Article XII, Section 30) prohibits parking a vehicle on a street so as to interfere with the snow plowing or removal of snow or ice. Such vehicles will be subject to towing at the expense of the vehicle's









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### owner. Norwood's Parking Regulations also prohibit parking of vehicles for longer than 2 hours, 12 a.m. - 6 a.m., on any street or Town owned parking facility from November 15th through April 1st.

### Plow Damage:

The Town is not responsible for damaged lawns, sprinkler heads, fences, steps, trees or shrubs that are located within the public way.

The Town will be responsible for mailboxes that are physically hit by a plow. However, mailboxes will not be repaired if they are in a deteriorated condition or are damaged by snow pushback. Mailboxes and posts damaged by a snowplow will be fixed and/or replaced by the Town with a standard wooden post and black box. The Town will provide a check in the amount of \$50.00 for homeowner's use for any specialty mailbox and/or post that cannot be repaired.

All plow damage must be reported to the Public Works Department by May 1st of the current snow and ice season. Damage reported after May 1st will not be considered for repairs or reimbursement by the Town of Norwood.

Residents are urged to place stakes with reflectors along the edge of lawns and the corner of driveways / walkways.

Plow vehicles, while employed by the Town, cannot be hired or requested to clear private driveways or walks.

#### Sand/Salt Mixture for Residents Norwood residents can pick up a sand/salt mixture in the following locations:

Babel's Paint Store Parking Lot (Cottage Street / Nahatan Street)

370 Winter Street (on Winter Street at entrance to Landfill).

Hawes Pool Parking Lot (Washington Street)

Norwood Memorial Airport Parking Lot (Access Road)

Please bring your own container (limit 5 gallons) and shovel. Commercial and/or private contractors not allowed.

depositing of snow or ice onto or across any public way, including sidewalks or public property. This by-law addresses the ongoing problem of private contractors plowing snow from private driveways into the public way. This causes unsafe road conditions which must then be corrected by the Public Works Department. Any such owner or agent violating this by-law shall be punished by a fine as well as any cost incurred by the Public Works Department to correct the condition.

### **Good Neighbor Policy:**

In the interest of you and your neighbor's personal safety, please shovel out nearby fire hydrants.

Please keep nearby catch basins clear of snow or ice to prevent street flooding during heavy rains or snow melting periods.

Andrea Reed is turning to the local community again to assist with funding to place wreaths of local service men and women's graves at Highland and Old Parish Cemeteries.

"Norwood has such a wonderful history and part of that includes the men and women who sacrificed so that we can have the way of life that we enjoy today," Reed said. "Every year, we show a united front of national unity across the USA as we remember the fallen, honor those who serve, and teach our children the value of freedom. We also remember and honor those who are prisoners of war or missing in action. Our freedoms and way of life are protected by those who are willing to serve and protect. As my brother noted, When you are in the military, you may not feel or understand how important your service is... being able to defend the country and protect the people back home is a great responsibility and it's a great honor.""

The event will take place on Saturday, Dec. 18, 12 noon, at Highland Cemetery. As in previous years, this moving pre-

For the past three years, local and corporate donations have been impressive. In 2018, 128 were donated, 195 in 2019, and

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
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
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### Norfolk County 2021 Holiday Food Drive

Noting that some Norfolk County families are more worried about putting food on the table this holiday season, Register of Deeds William O'Donnell is December 29.

asking people to contribute to the Annual Registry of Deeds Food Drive, that started Monday, November 20 through Wednesday,

"There is no doubt that Norfolk County is a destination place to live and to work," Register O'Donnell said. "However, there are people throughout the county that are truly hurting. Just looking at our monthly foreclosure numbers, we at the Registry of Deeds can see firsthand how people are being adversely impacted. Misfortune can strike anyone in a number of ways, from a job loss to a medical catastrophe to an elderly person on a fixed income."

Today, according to the latest Project Bread statistics, 1 out of every 10 households in Massachusetts is considered food insecure. Furthermore, 1 out of every 7 children in the state is also considered food insecure. In fiscal year 2017, Project Bread received more than 28,000 calls for food assistance.

"As we near the holiday season, there is definitely a need for more food assistance," Register O'Donnell noted. "Household expenses are higher due to the cost of home heating fuel and also food bills are higher with kids home during school vacation.

Non-perishable food items can be brought directly to the Registry of Deeds, which is located at 649 High St., in Dedham. A donation bin will be set-up in the Registry's lobby and food can be dropped off Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Suggested donations include canned goods, breakfast cereals, pasta, sauces, toiletries and paper products.

If you can't get to the Registry to drop off food, you can visit the Registry website.at www.norfolkdeeds.org for a pantry location in your community.

"Working together, we can truly make a huge difference this holiday season," concluded Register O'Donnell.
