Fourth-grader Rhys Morse placed second and fourth-grader Caleb Raczkowski placed third.





Tax Preparation with Liberty Tax

Local tax professionals help navigate an increasingly complicated system

Winter brings two things to Massachusetts: snow, and tax preparation.

“Everyone can benefit from a tax professional’s help,” says Dawn Porthouse of Liberty Tax in Franklin. “This is true of individuals, but it’s even more true of small businesses.”

When a taxpayer receives a letter from the IRS, before even opening the envelope, panic sets in. Porthouse says, “One of the first things I tell them when they call is to take a deep breath: we’re on their side. I will research the problem, discuss so-



lutions, and then educate them on how to avoid similar issues in the future.”

Staying on the right side of the IRS is in every business’s best interests.

Keeping on top of changing regulations is a challenge in and of itself. “Last year, Congress altered the tax laws right in the middle of tax season. Moreover, those changes were retroactive, meaning anyone who’d already filed may have to go back and amend their returns. We handled all of that for our clients so they could rest easy. We may be looking at a similar situation this year if Congress passes leg-

islation which includes retroactive provisions such as the Build Back Better bill.”

Since taxes are inevitable, it makes sense to have an ally who can provide a roadmap to help families and businesses navigate them. Porthouse says, “I educate my clients. I make sure they understand this year’s return and help them plan for next year’s. I’m passionate about helping clients achieve their financial goals.”

Tim Harris for Medway Select Board

Tim Harris is running for one of two seats available on the Medway Select Board to be decided at the May town election.

Proposed Millis Bylaw to Force Sewer Hookup for Septic Users

Millis residents are up in arms about a proposed bylaw that, if passed at a May 2 town meeting, would require homeowners with functional septic systems over 15 years old to hook up to town sewer.

Bill Myers will be affected by this change. He posted to Facebook, "I've gotten one estimate so far from a contractor. \$25,000. Plus the fee to the town, another \$4800 [sic]? So I'm looking at \$30,000 to spend on something that I have no idea how I will pay for."

The Millis Select Board discussed the Sewer Bylaw at its Feb. 7 meeting (see <https://youtu.be/tzn4u7vEb6c> at 11:15). At Local Town Pages press time, the bylaw

was scheduled for public discussion at the board's meeting on March 28.

The Town of Millis is out of sewer capacity. Lacking sewer capacity limits town growth. This bylaw would bring the town from 105% capacity to 90%.

The Charles River Sewer Processing plant assesses capacity by assuming every home produces 100 gallons per bedroom per day, even though actual usage is only 50 to 75 gallons. Although actual usage is not over capacity, on paper, Millis is theoretically over capacity.

As Select Board member Craig Schultze commented, "Once the homes are connected, we get some of our sewer capacity back, since the usage will be calculated on actual use, not the

title 5 estimated use."

CGC Associates, Inc., a civil engineering and surveying company, has drawn up a list of 380 potential sewer connections, including addresses and number of bedrooms. The document estimates a total of 140,250 gallons per day in capacity savings.

Stephanie Schneider, administrator of Facebook group "Millis, MA Septic Users," says the bylaw does not solve the problem. "Even if all 300 homes connect, we'd still be at 90% capacity...dangerously close to 100% capacity of actual use with no reserve amounts, and we'd be staring this issue in the face again."

Schneider recommends other solutions, such as accessing the State Revolving Fund that exists

to provide funding for new wastewater treatment facilities and upgrades of existing facilities.

Some Millis residents have looked into sewer hookups only to be quoted estimates ranging from \$20,000 to \$30,000. The cost varies based on the location of the existing plumbing and the home's setback. Millis Public Works Director Jim McKay told the Select Board at its Feb. 7 meeting that those costs are due up front (not on a payment plan), and the town's hookup fee is \$4,094 and is charged separately.

At its meeting on Feb. 7, the Select Board had a lengthy discussion about waiving fees and how to handle hardships.

Schneider, the Facebook group administrator, hopes the residents of Millis can work to-

gether on the issue. "Instead of asking 300 families to take on sizeable financial burden in the current economic climate, let's pause and pursue the funding available to us from the state. Septic users did not create this problem. It's in everyone's best interest to come to a solution that gets to the heart of resolving the matter."

Select Board member Erin Underhill said at the Feb. 7 meeting, "This isn't going to be something that anybody's going to be happy with but it's necessary and I'm hoping that people will see that we've tried to be extremely fair through the bylaw."

Your Money, Your Independence

April Brings Spring, Baseball and Tax... Squirrel!

Time for the annual, “You know, we should be doing more to pay less taxes”.

Then like a dog seeing a squirrel, you get distracted, run in another direction and think “It’s ok, we’ll pay a lot less taxes in retirement.”

Let me share a secret, if your wealth is mostly in tax deferred retirement accounts (i.e. 401(k)s, 403(b)s and Traditional IRAs), your taxes will be much more than you realize.

Income Sources

Retirees receive income from a variety of sources, including distributions from tax deferred retirement accounts; payouts from company pensions and annuities; rental income; savings and earnings from investments.

Tax deferred retirement accounts enjoyed tax-deferred growth on contributions and investments; but when distributions

are taken, these are fully taxable as earned income and added to your adjusted gross income (AGI).

What if you don’t need the funds? Don’t worry the government wants its taxes, so starting at age 72 you have Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs).

For example, at age 62 your spouse and you retire with \$1.25M across all tax deferred retirement accounts. You live within your means, don’t take from these accounts and grow 7.2% annually. By age 72, the accounts total \$2.5M and time for RMDs. Per IRS Table III divide by 25.6 at age 72 for \$97,656 taken as RMD, taxed as earned income and added to your AGI.

Social Security

Factors such as your total income and marital status determine what/if a portion of your Social Security benefits are tax-

able. If your AGI plus any tax-free interest exceeds \$34K for individuals or \$44K for married filing jointly, then up to 85% of Social Security benefits are taxable.

Ways To Minimize Taxes

Taxes are inevitable with retirement savings or pension income, but there are many strategies to reduce amounts owed, here are a few:

During Retirement - Distribute funds in certain years of claiming large deductions, such as the breaks for medical expenses or charitable gifts, temporarily lower your tax rate.

Before Retirement - Contribute to Roth 401(k) and Roth IRA (if eligible) now. After age 59 1/2 and owned for at least 5 years, withdrawals are completely tax free. Added bonus is RMDs don’t exist for Roth accounts nor are balances in Roth accounts a

factor in determining RMDs for your tax deferred accounts.

Before or During - Roth Conversion and Backdoor Roth. Yes, pay the taxes now for benefits listed in the prior paragraph. Consider greater amounts in years of lower income if self-employed, change jobs and/or take away from work. Also, 20% (or more) market corrections provide an opportunity to convert investments over to Roth, pay less in taxes and let them rebound inside the Roth.

There are many more strategies to consider beyond this limited space. Bottom line, plan now for the tax implications of your retirement income.

World-Class Eyecare and Cataract Surgery Closer to Home

Cataract surgery is by far the most common surgery performed in the United States. With advanced technology and if you choose an experienced and highly skilled surgeon, modern cataract surgery should be a rather quick outpatient and a minimal risk procedure. If you are considering cataract surgery, your expectations should not only be to improve your vision, reduce glare at night, see more vivid colors and improve your day to day activities, but you should also be given an opportunity to reduce your dependence on glasses or contacts and in many cases eliminate this need. Your expectations should also be to have your surgery by a world-class surgeon close to where you live and not be told to travel hours for testing and surgery. Many choices exist on where to have the surgery and

by whom. Here are the specific questions to ask when it's time to have the surgery:

1. Why are you referring me to this surgeon? Your optometrist may ask you to travel miles and hours away from home to have your surgery with a particular surgeon of their choice. When you have experienced surgeons within minutes from where you live and when those top-notch ethical surgeons with excellent nationwide reputation will perform your surgery in a state-of-the-art surgery center closer to home. Ask your provider why they want you to travel hours and miles away. your provider has with the far-away surgeon. Beware referral bias. In our center, 100% of the surgeries are performed in a state-of-the-art facility in Milford. Very close to home. Your interest comes first.

2. What is my cost? Did you know that when your optometrist refers you to a surgeon who will perform your surgery at a hospital your insurance deductible and co-insurance will be higher at a hospital? 3. What type of anesthesia am I going to get? With modern cataract surgery, most

4. What are the risks? One of the most dreaded risks of cataract surgery is accidental damage to the posterior capsule, which is the back wall of the bag holding your lens. Ask about the complication rate of the surgeon you are being asked to travel to. In our center this rate is close to zero percent.
5. What is the rate of infections in your center? Another potentially devastating risk of cataract surgery is an infection inside the eye called "endophthalmitis". Ask the complication rate of the surgeon you are being asked to travel

to. In our center this rate is close to zero percent.

6. What type of technology is available at your surgery facility? Different centers have different equipment and resources. For instance, Massachusetts has only few centers offering laser-assisted bladeless cataract surgery. This should be an option if you want to reduce dependence on glasses and treat low grades of astigmatism at the same time as your cataract surgery. Our center was among the first in the State and New England to offer this technology. Did you know that many hospitals and other centers do not offer laser-assisted bladeless cataract surgery? We do!
7. What type of implant am I going to get? Different lens implants can be used during cataract surgery with different materials, quality and ability to reduce your need for glasses. Ask your referring provider about his/her surgeon choice of implants. Our center was the first in the greater Boston area to offer the new diffractive and extended-focus implants. With those implants you can see clearly at distance, close and intermediate like your phone and computer screen with little or no dependence on glasses.

8. Will my need to wear glasses be reduced? Cataract surgery is a wonderful opportunity to limit or eliminate your need for glasses. As the surgeon removes the cataract, there is an opportunity to replace the cloudy lens with a special high-tech implant able to achieve this goal. Ask your referring provider about his/her surgeon of choice ability to achieve those goals. Our center has many happy and glasses free patients.
9. Will I have stitches? It is ideal to eliminate the need for stitches such as the surgery is a no-stitch surgery. Placing a stitch can be complicated by stitch induced astigmatism, a foreign body sensation and a broken and irritating stitch. Ask your referring provider if his/her surgeon of choice is still using stitches. 100% of our cataract procedures are stitch-free.

10. What will be my vision on day 1 after the surgery? One of the measurements defining quality of outcomes after cataract surgery is the quality of vision on day 1 after the surgery. 



Medway Nine Aiming For Some Even-keel Success

For the last three years, Medway High's baseball program has been on a roller-coaster ride — some ups and definitely some downs.

Start with 2019. The squad finished 12-6 in the regular season, qualified for the tourney and advanced all the way to the State final where it lost to Taconic, 4-1. Then came 2020, and with seven of nine starters returning, another shot at the playoff final seemed realistic. The covid-19 pandemic, however, ended that dream when state officials called off all spring sports.

Last year, Medway opened its 2021 season losing nine in a row. But, the Mustangs won five of their last seven, finishing 5-11. An open tourney was offered and coach Mike Coppinger and his players decided to opt in. The Mustangs caught fire and defeated East Bridgewater, Apponoquet and Fairhaven before bowing to Middleboro in the sectional final.

Medway will begin its 2022 campaign hosting Dover-Sherborn on April 8 and Coppinger is hoping this season will be more of an even-keel ride.

"We definitely feel like the last three years have been up and down," Coppinger said. "We've been a historically steady team over time. We've been to the playoffs four times in six years and we've had three winning seasons in six years. I expect that our players will be a driven, mo-

tivated group and I'm optimistic because of the way they jelled and peaked after starting 0-9 last year."

Medway, which has six starters returning, has some strengths that could be very telling. "We've got experience, our baseball IQ is good and our speed and quickness are okay," said Coppinger who's starting his eighth year as head coach. "We've got players who can hit for power and our pitching is capable. But, we need to improve our infield defense, build some depth and lower our strikeout rate."

Coppinger's goals this year are to improve daily, for the players to reach their potential, qualify for the tournament and contend for the Tri Valley Small Division title. "Our goals are realistic because we were a very different team last year after that 0-9 start," he emphasized. "The kids overcame adversity and showed they were resilient."

Medway will likely rely on a style that will blend small ball with a power approach. "Our bats will produce some offense," Coppinger noted. "We could be executing a suicide squeeze one inning, then hit a home run or a triple the next."

Two seniors who'll play key roles are Ryan Abrams, a right-handed pitcher who can also play first or third base, and Jake Garvin, a second baseman/outfielder.

"Ryan pitched well in the sectional last year," Coppinger said. "His fastball and off-speed pitches make his effective in our

rotation. His accuracy and control are good, he hits for power and he's solid at third. Jake is a team-first guy who's scrappy. He's not polished but he gets the job done. We hope he'll give us some strong at-bats."

Luke Fraiton, a left-handed pitcher who also plays centerfield, heads a group of four juniors who'll give the Mustangs versatility.

"Luke throws off-speed pitches but he's been clocked at 83 mph," Coppinger said. "His

control is very good. A strong competitor, he started at quarterback and also plays ice hockey. An excellent defensive outfielder, he's got good range and runs like a deer. On offense, he's got gap-to-gap power."

Sean Anderson is also a left-handed pitcher who can compete at first base or in the outfield. "Sean's about 6-4, he's athletic, has good range in the outfield and has power," Coppinger said. "His best pitches are a fastball, curve and change-up. He showed lots of command as the regular season was winding down. He relies more on finesse than power."

Two other juniors — left-handed pitcher/outfielder Jack Reynolds and catcher Matt Childs — are dependable, scrappy and athletic.

"Jack was our best pitcher at times last year," Coppinger said. "Throwing a fastball, curve and change-up, his control is fine and he rarely walks anyone. He's got good range in the outfield and he's always grinding as a hitter. Matt is a man among boys. He's big and strong, super athletic and hits for power. His arm is strong

and he's an above-average hitter. If necessary, he could play either the outfield or the infield."

Sophomore Caden Reisman played shortstop down the stretch last year and Coppinger was pleased with his effort. "He made some big plays as a freshman," Coppinger said. "He's got a high baseball IQ, he's instinctive and he's also aggressive. A versatile athlete, he could play the outfield."

James Owens, a transfer from Texas, could be a major addition. Coppinger views him as a potential designated-hitter or a corner infielder. "James respects the game and it looks like he swings with power," Coppinger said. "He played a 50-game schedule in Texas. We hope he'll provide some depth and that his lengthy schedule in Texas will give us some added experience."

Medway's freshman class looks strong and Coppinger likes the players' serious approach to baseball. "Several of them could break through and help us in a variety of positions," he said.

The 35-year-old Coppinger, who was a two-time TVL all-star pitcher at Medway, emphasizes that his competitive philosophy is all about his players working hard, reaching their potential and having fun. "If those things occur, then winning follows," he said. "It's about getting the kids ready for the next level."

A native of Medway, Coppinger also uses baseball to teach valuable life lessons. "Our players learned how to overcome adversity last year when they excelled after going winless in nine straight games," he offered. "They learned what resilience is all about. Our sport also helps kids set goals and be strong leaders and good teammates."

Coppinger is humbled that his 2019 squad that played in the state final owns the deepest run in the program's history.

"I played for Medway and I'm proud how far we've come as a program," he noted.

Getting to the state final this season would no doubt be very rewarding, especially after three years of roller-coaster rides

Don't gamble on retirement

When people save for retirement, the biggest concern is the return on investment. When they retire however, it's not only the returns they need to care about, but also the order of those returns.

Negative returns during the first couple of years of retirement can increase the risk of running out of money, much more so than the same negative returns happening later in retirement. This is sequence of returns risk.

People who experience even one year of market loss early in retirement may need to make significant adjustments to their plans. Conversely, the same loss later in Key retirement will likely have much less of an impact one's retirement income or lifestyle.

“The weekday division scheduling supports a day off between play dates for players who choose to play in multiple divisions,” said Bill Cerrato, the new Thursday division coordinator. “It will help us better balance the skills, improve safety and provide more flexibility for those who want to play more

than one day a week.”

“EMASS shuffles up team rosters in every division each year to enhance connections across our large softball-loving community,” said Don Gould, the National division coordinator. “Our members enjoy competing with and against their friends.”

EMASS players cherish their weekly double-headers playing with their softball-loving buddies. The league employs paid umpires and has recently invested in team manager training, umpire clinics/certification, new equipment and a rich website to ensure a safe, well-managed and competitive league.

managers and division coordinators do a very professional and collaborative job of operating this league. Our players appreciate the fun and camaraderie enabled by our volunteer leadership team.” said Royce.



Millis Middle/High School library media specialist Patsy Divver wins grant to purchase graphic books

The Massachusetts School Library Association (MSLA) has named Patsy Divver, Library Media Specialist at Millis Middle/High School, as the recipient of the 2022 Judi Paradis Action Grant.

The grant of \$500 honors the memory of the late beloved Waltham Public Schools library teacher and colleague Judi Paradis who was a key leader in the school library community and the MSLA. As a champion of social justice, diversity, multicultur-

alism, and advocacy, her dedication, leadership, creativity, and enthusiasm inspired many school librarians.

In her goal of attracting more students to the pleasure of reading, Divver chose to increase the school library's collection of books in graphic format, a format very popular with many students. The format is especially appealing to students who are reluctant to choose a traditional book by encouraging students to "Grab a graphic and go!"

Divver, who was honored at the 2022 MSLA Annual Confer-

ence in March, says the award has great personal meaning to her.

"Judi [Paradis] was both a colleague and a friend. Her advocacy for the school library was inspiring and remarkable; this grant exemplifies her desire for school libraries to take action in making a difference. Over my 25 years at Millis Public Schools and as an active member of the Massachusetts School Library Association, I have strived to make a difference for our students," says Divver.

"During this school year, when students are returning to in-person learning and beginning to revisit the school library, I wanted to offer them a space where they could reconnect with books. This focus on graphic novels was encouraged and supported by my library staff, colleagues and the students themselves. Graphic books offer visual appeal, and often connect with students who would not usually visit the library. Additionally, the books themselves are preferred by many students and offer a diverse option for reading," says Divver, adding the books will be enjoyed by both middle and high school students.

With this grant, Divver plans to purchase "approximately 40 books and two 'seat cushions' to add to the comfort of our space." Book titles are being solicited from students, staff and library reviews, based on interest, appropriateness, and availability.

Millis High School Principal Mark Awdycki says it is quite fitting that Divver received this award as she prepares to retire at the end of this school year.

Senate Passes Bills to Recognize Holidays Honoring Black History

Legislation would make Quock Walker Day and Negro Election Day State Holidays

(BOSTON – 03/02/2022) On Thursday, February 17, 2022, the Massachusetts State Senate passed two bills, each designating a new state holiday commemorating Black history in Massachusetts. One bill would designate July 8 as Massachusetts Emancipation Day, also known as Quock Walker Day, while the other would designate the third Saturday in July as Negro Election Day. Both holidays, which have been celebrated in Massachusetts by members of the Black community, would be officially recognized under the proposed legislation.

“You cannot properly celebrate Massachusetts history without acknowledging the achievements, contributions and traditions shared by Black residents of the Commonwealth,” said Massachusetts Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland). “Quock Walker Day and Negro Election Day give recognition to longstanding and uniquely local traditions celebrating the role played by Massachusetts residents in our nation’s history of Black freedom, voting, and self-determination. I thank Senators Friedman and Lovely for their work to elevate the voices of community organizers and historians who called for state recognition of these holidays so that future generations may know and have the opportunity to reflect on the past.”

“In light of Quock Walker’s significant place in our state’s history, it is important that we celebrate his achievements by officially and annually marking this monumental step toward abolishing slavery,” said Sen-

ator Cindy F. Friedman (D-Arlington). “Recognizing Quock Walker Day is one of the many ways the Massachusetts Senate is celebrating Black History Month this year, as we work to acknowledge the injustices in our history as well as celebrate our state’s part in setting a nationwide precedent for human rights. I am thankful to my Senate colleagues for supporting this legislation and am grateful to Sean Osborne and the Association of Black Citizens of Lexington for helping to ensure that Quock Walker’s story receives the recognition it deserves.”

“I am deeply grateful to the Massachusetts Senate for passing my bill establishing Negro Election Day,” said Senator Joan B. Lovely (D-Salem). “This annual celebration illustrates that our communities of color have always been engaged in our Commonwealth’s civic process. This bill celebrates a little known but historically important annual event that has been taking place in Massachusetts since the 18th century. We must continue to commemorate the meaningful milestones African Americans have contributed to Massachusetts and our nation today and in all the days going forward. I would like to thank Salem United and their President Doreen Wade for their unwavering advocacy and support to make this legislation possible and to Senate President Karen Spilka for making this a priority during Black History Month.”

Quock Walker Day commemorates the life of Walker, who was born to enslaved African parents in

Massachusetts and was the driving force behind the 1783 Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court ruling that slavery was incompatible with the constitution of the Commonwealth. After being promised his freedom on multiple occasions, Walker self-emancipated but was nonetheless beaten and locked in a barn by his former enslaver, Nathaniel Jennison. Walker sued Jennison for assault and battery and was found to be a free man by a jury of the Worcester County Court of Common Pleas. This ruling was appealed to the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court where the decision was upheld on constitutional grounds. This critical decision served as the precedent that ended slavery in the Commonwealth and led to Massachusetts becoming one of the first states in the nation to abolish slavery.

“I am very happy that the state Senate has passed this legislation recognizing the significant contributions made by Quock Walker to abolish slavery in the Commonwealth,” said Sean Osborne, the Founder of the Association of Black Citizens of Lexington who brought the significance of Quock Walker to the legislature’s attention. “When we celebrate Quock Walker Day on July 8, I hope that we recognize that the end of slavery in Massachusetts led to the growth of a sizeable Black middle class in Massachusetts, which fueled the abolitionist movement and filled the ranks of the Union armed forces. Like their contemporaries, the Walker family understood that the fight for equality for Black people in Massachusetts and across the United States did not end in 1783 or with Quock Walker’s generation.”

“Members of the Walker family were active in the Underground Railroad,” continued Osborne. “One of Walker’s nephews was a Black Freemason who, in 1826, helped to form the Massachusetts General Colored Association in Boston. The MGCA is believed to be the first all-black abolitionist organization in the United States and was dedicated to fighting slavery in the USA and racism in the Commonwealth. Two of Walker’s grandnephews fought in the Civil War, one as a sailor and the other as a soldier. When we celebrate Massachusetts Emancipation Day on July 8, I hope that each community comes to appreciate its role in the passage of the constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in 1780 and the impact of the Quock Walker Cases of 1781 to 1783 on its residents.”


