## Millis 8th grade school project raises awareness for mental illness

#### GoFundMe catches attention of Boston news outlets

#### By Theresa Knapp

What started out as an 8th grade civic action project at Millis Middle School has turned into a larger fundraiser to raise awareness for mental health.

"It's okay to not be okay," according to students Sophia White and Isabella Schaad who, along with classmate Alivia Gordon, worked on the project.

The original assignment was to find a real-world problem and create a plan to take action to solve the problem. The team thought about mental health, specifically related to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, noting it has affected their peers in notable ways.

"We know a lot of people who have experienced mental health issues, and we just thought it was a really important issue, and people should really learn a little more about what's happening," said Schaad.

White agreed. "Everyone is dealing with something, no one is perfectly fine."

As part of their plan, the team worked with a school guidance counselor who spoke to the 8th graders about mental health, including what happens physiologically to the brain when students get stressed out, which the team said was informative and helpful. They also contacted school officials and encouraged them to create a club "where kids can go if they feel like they need to talk to someone," and

## Medway Police assisted Rhode Island Department of Justice in bank fraud case that exploited homeless people

The Rhode Island Department of Justice credits the Medway Police Department in an investigation that led to a Georgia man being sentenced in a bank fraud scheme that exploited homeless people.

In June, the Department of Justice, United States Attorney's Office, District of Rhode Island, issued a press release that said, "A Georgia man who solicited, transported, and paid homeless individuals from the Providence area to cash hundreds of thousands of dollars'

worth of counterfeit business checks in four New England states was sentenced today to two years in federal prison."

According to the Justice Department press release, Jalen Ronald Stanford, 28, of Riverdale, GA, and others, created counterfeit checks generally in the amount of \$2,000 or more. The checks were made payable to homeless individuals who agreed to be driven to banks in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Maine to cash them. These individuals were

contacted local and state government officials to raise awareness about mental health issues.

Another part of the team's action plan was to create a Go-FundMe account, where they say, "Being teenagers, we have seen the effects of mental health issues on our friends, family, and community. We are striving to be in the hospital for eight days." The girls say they have received so much positive feedback from friends, family, and the community – especially after their efforts were featured on Boston 25 News in early June – so they know the issue is important to a lot of people.

Even though school is out for the summer, and the girls will be freshmen next year, they say they will continue their efforts.

help provide awareness, and a sense of security to those suffering from mental illness."

As of press time, the team was more than halfway to its goal of \$7,000 which will be donated to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).

While researching their project, the team was surprised to learn that mental health issues are prevalent, and the cost of getting treatment is expensive.

"I never knew that people had to pay to get treatment," said White. "When we started the project, and we did our research, I thought 'Wow, that's a lot of money!' For clinical depression, it would cost around \$7,000 to the project because it's a really important thing, it's not just a school project," said Schaad.

"It's a real problem and we just want to be a few of the people to advocate, to raise more public awareness about it," said White.

Asked what they learned doing the project, White said, "I learned anyone can make a difference. If you believe enough in something, and you believe that it's worth the work, then you can do anything."

Schaad agreed. "We're just eighth graders and we've made such a change already."

often paid approximately \$100 per check that they successfully cashed. From October 2018 through February 2021, numerous homeless individuals were arrested at banks throughout the region as they attempted to cash some of the counterfeit checks.

A United States Secret Service investigation determined that approximately \$677,687 worth of counterfeit checks were presented to banks throughout the four states, causing actual losses to financial institutions of nearly \$481,000.

Stanford pled guilty on March 10, 2022, to conspiracy to commit bank fraud. He was sentenced on June 14, 2022, by U.S. District Court Chief Judge John J. McConnell, Jr., to 24 months in federal prison to be followed by three years of federal supervised release. Stanford was ordered to pay restitution to financial institutions totaling \$480,943.71.

United States Attorney Cunha thanked the Provi-

dence, RI, and Medway, MA, Police Departments for their assistance in this investigation.

Medway Police Lieutenant Detective Matthew Reardon told Local Town Pages that "Medway was the lead agency in the case working with Secret Service. We began the investigation in late 2018 after fraudulent checks were cashed in Medway. We learned homeless or transient individuals were being recruited in and around homeless shelters in Providence and driven around southeastern MA and RI to cash these stolen checks. We learned business checks were being stolen out of the mail of businesses then reproduced on a computer in the name of the cashers. Once the cashers were recruited, they were all being taken to a CVS in Providence where one of the handlers would walk away and come back a short time later with computer-generated checks in the casher's name. The handlers would then drive the cashers to various branches of the issuing bank to have the checks cashed."

Reardon said numerous local departments participated in this investigation including Medway, Holliston, Bellingham, Wrentham, Blackstone, and many more.

come information is not needed. TEENS are welcome to stop by and grab some lunch too.





## **Medway High School Students Award Third Place for Reverse Engineering Project by Mass STEM Hub**

pal John Murray and science and engineering teacher Jon Jasinski are pleased to share that Ryan Zambrowski, Matthew Caputo and Annabelle Hazell were recently awarded third place for their engineering project submitted to Mass STEM Hub's Student Industry Connects program.

Zambrowski, Caputo and

Medway High School Princi- Hazell, who are currently in the school's Introduction to Engineering Design class, submitted their reverse engineering project analyzing the Chinatera Clockwork Wind Up Pink Dog. Their project was recognized by STEM industry professionals and they were awarded third place among all high school engineering projects submitted for consideration.

The students' project involved studying the toy's visual qualities to analyze the principles and elements of design, conducting a functional analysis to understand how the toy worked, and conducting a structural analysis by disassembling and measuring each piece to recreate it as a 3D model. They also sketched the toy's structure and produced renderings of the assembled dog as well as all of its separate parts.

"Student Industry Connects continues to be an exceptionally valuable program for our students to get feedback from professionals and recognition for their hard work, and it's great to see so many projects submitted from our high school courses each year," Principal Murray said. and electricity issues, and computer trouble.

"If anybody needs any help, I can help them," she says, adding "It feels really good that I am able to help people and make a difference. I have had people come back and say 'thank you'.'

Sand says Millis has a "strong community" of residents who help her assist people, noting the Millis Housing Authority and The Millis Fund.

Sand explained the most difficult part of her job is not being able to help those who are in immediate need of housing, since being accepted into the town housing is a six-month wait for homeless people.

"It is very hard to say sorry, you need to find an alternative," she said.

Sand explained her goal as Outreach Coordinator is for everybody in Millis to be aware that she is available to help those of all ages.

She says she enjoys working in Millis because it is a "very welcoming town" and the people are "fantastic."

Patty Kayo, Director of the Millis Council on Aging, says, "Outreach's impact on the community is invaluable. Outreach services provide residents with peace of mind when dealing with situations. It's comforting, when dealing with problems, to have a professional just listen and steer you in the right direction...Debbie has only been with us for a year now and she has quite a following."

frequent guest and a favorite musician of his, Warren Zevon, on for an entire show. Zevon, who'd disclosed terminal cancer, performed and interviewed throughout. Dave at one point asked, "Anything you know now, that I should know?" to which Zevon wittily deadpanned, "Enjoy every sandwich."

Those raising children and helping aging parents often feel rushed and are distracted thinking about what's next, overlooking the beauty of daily, mundane moments.

July is National Sandwich Generation Month, celebrating a generation of people sandwiched between caring for their young children and aging parents at the same time.

I'm a Sandwicher, as are approximately 15% of Americans between ages 40-60 who face the challenges of planning, communicating and executing for 3 generations at once.

In 2018, my parents were struggling with health to remain independent in NH after 60 years in their home. Stress raised on my mom as a caregiver and daily living/house routines began to slide. My wife, our daughters (then 5 & 3) and

Once David Letterman had I lived comfortably in our Ashland home. The adults agreed on a Plan B supported by updated financial planning. Sell both homes, buy a new home for 3 generations and live as one household sharing in daily responsibilities.

The urgency was greater than anticipated and not without challenges since our move to Holliston, here's some antidotes for Sandwichers:

Small talks instead of "The Talk." Families don't like to think about declining health and elder care, let alone discuss it. I used single topics tied to a recent story about a friend, asking what they would do. Gained small agreements, the changed topics as would address others another day to frame a mutual plan.

#### Bring in outside mediators. My aunt shared with my mom that time is not your friend. She encouraged the positives to take action now, rather than later when fewer options are avail-

able. Additionally, we consulted with an elder care attorney on understanding MA Health options, current trusts, POAs and proxies before making the move.

Your spouse's support is critical. Incredibly fortunate to have a spouse that pushed me to see the positives and embraces bringing family in as "you'd want your daughters to treat you the same someday."

#### Through the eyes of a child.

It's not all about you, the girls show the love and benefits of learning by being around grandma and grandpa. And vice versa, as health has improved so has activity as the girls provide motivation and energy.

Sometimes timing is everything. I couldn't imagine the anxiety and ill-advised actions my parents would have faced on their own these past 2-plus vears.

Your parents sacrificed many things to make sure you had it better, including concealing issues to not worry you. Be open with communication and embrace change, the best ways to prevent costly unintended consequences and ensure positive lasting memories.



## A Hidden Gem Expands its Offerings

## Anne's Market feeds the community, one sandwich at a time

One of Norfolk's hidden gems, Anne's Market is expanding its offerings this summer. From custom sandwiches to craft beer to homebaked cookies, Anne's Market is becoming part of the fabric of Norfolk's community.

Christa and Todd Wiggin are the owners of Anne's Market. "We wanted our shop to capture the spark of being in Norfolk," says Christa. "I've lived in Norfolk since I was two. My husband's family has been here since his grandmother arrived from Sweden at age seven. This community is really important to us, and buying this market is one way we can contribute to it."

Tucked away in the residential River's Edge neighborhood, Anne's Market has an old-school feel. The shelves feature an eclectic mix of convenience-store items and higher-end purchases that are sure to make customers smile. From penny candy, to Howie's Spiked Cherries, to unique doggie donut treats from a woman-owned small business, the offerings are varied and often surprising. For example, alongside the register is a display for Ella's Yarn Barn, stuffed animals handcrocheted by a Norfolk resident.

Christa says, "We've set up a gift section with mugs, canvas

bags, and several other items. If someone needs a last minute present, they can stop in for a wine bottle and a wine-sized tote to deliver it."

By and large, the most important part of Anne's Market is the deli. Todd says, "We carry highend Boar's Head products, and off our everyday menu, you can order twenty-four different sandwiches." The sandwiches range from comfortable standards like a barbecue chicken sub, to interesting and fun ones, like the turkey gobbler, with cranberry sauce and stuffing.

Customers who aren't sure what they want can ask for a recommendation, and the staff takes it as a challenge to match them with the perfect sub. Todd says, "We also offer rotating daily specials, and we'll make breakfast sandwiches anytime."

The Wiggin family is everpresent in the store. "Todd's often behind the counter, or our daughter Dani," says Christa. "Some of our employees have been with Anne's Market for longer than we have, so between family and longtime friends, it's a really friendly atmosphere."

Christa is involved in the wider Norfolk community, as well. In addition to regular donations to



community events, such as the recent Color Fun Run or Norfolk Girls Softball, Anne's Market has helped with food donations to Gilly's House and the Federated Church.

Anne's Market has a thirtyyear history, initially founded by Anne Brunelli of Franklin. Anne eventually moved the market to Medway, then sold it. The new owners moved to the Norfolk location in 2019, and then Christa and Todd Wiggin purchased it six months ago.

"It's been a really exciting time, with a huge learning curve," says Christa. "I love talking with the customers, hearing about their lives and learning what they want."

That means stocking some local favorites. In addition to apple tarts and cookies baked right on the premises, Anne's



Market also offers My Grandma's Coffee Cakes and Cape Cod Pizzas.

Anne's Market does catering, too. "When people hold graduation parties or summer gatherings, they want to spend time with their guests rather than in front of a stove. We can set them up with sandwich platters, cold cut platters, trays of macaroni and cheese, and salads."

Plans are in motion to expand the prep area so Anne's Market can sell high-quality meat and sausage. "My day job is with Orleans Packing Company," says Christa, "so I already have a relationship with all the best vendors. When we bought the market, I immediately reached out to them, and now they're distributing to us."

This summer, Anne's will begin a reward program for their customers. "We'll use the Clover app to make every tenth sandwich free," says Christa. "Customers will also be able to opt-in to special offers. Maybe at the end of the day, they're commuting home, exhausted and not wanting to cook—and up on their phone pops a notification for half off Grab-and-Go meals."

Christa knows the welcoming atmosphere, the fun products, and the commitment to community will draw customers back again and again.

"I know it's a little off the beaten path, but we strive for that old-school feeling," says Christa. "I want our customers to feel like everything is family."

Sara Sheehan of Medway was recognized in the annual "Salute to Nurses" published in The Boston Globe for her im-



#### Hot Weather Reminder: Plug Air Conditioners Directly into Wall Outlets Plugging Appliances into Extension Cords or Power Strips Is a Fire Hazard

With a hot weather weekend approaching in the midst of National Electrical Safety Month, State Fire Marshal Peter J. Ostroskey reminded residents that air conditioners and other major appliances should be plugged directly into wall outlets, not extension cords or power strips.

"We're looking at a hot, humid weekend, and many folks will be bringing out their air conditioners or heading to the store to buy them," State Fire Marshal Ostroskey said. "Like all major appliances, these devices should be plugged directly into a wall outlet. They can overload a power strip or extension cord and cause a fire."

Electrical fires are the secondleading cause of fire deaths and the third-leading type of residential fires overall in Massachusetts, the Marshal said. Protect yourself and your family by following these safety tips at home:

Avoid overloading outlets
Use only one device plugged into a power strip at a time

• Remember that extension

cords are for temporary use

• Check electrical cords for damage and keep them out from under rugs and furniture

• Charge laptops, phones, ecigarettes, and other rechargeable devices on hard, stable surfaces, not beds or couches

• Call a licensed electrician if you experience flickering lights, frequently blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers, or unusually warm plugs, cords, or switches

• Call your local fire department if you see arcs or sparks, hear a sizzling or buzzing sound, or smell the odor of something burning in the home

• Have a licensed electrician review your home's electrical system every ten years

"No matter the weather, every household should have working smoke alarms on every floor and a practiced home escape plan that accounts for two ways out," State Fire Marshal Ostroskey said. "A fire at home can become deadly in less than three minutes."



#### Millis COA and Permanent Building Committee discuss senior center options **CONCEPTUAL DESIGNS - OPTIONS OVERVIEW**

The current Millis Senior Center has been located in the basement of the Veteran's Memorial Building since 1999, when it was renovated into a community center and town offices.

The Millis Council on Aging, Wayne Klocko, chairman of the

Millis Permanent Building Committee, and Abacus Architects, proposed ideas for a new center to Millis residents at a focus group on June 7.

The three options for a new center are: Option 1, a partial renovation and addition to the current site; Option 2, new construction at Cassidy Farm; and Option 2A, new construction at

Cassidy Farm to include a gymnasium.

According to the Community Center Focus Group Presentation, a pro of Option 1 is that it is located in the center of town and within the existing community center. A pro of Option 2 is there is more outdoor space for walking trails and a community garden. A pro of option 2A is

there would be expanded recreational facilities.

According to the presentation, the total cost of Option 1 is \$15,500,000 with 14,855 square feet, Option 2 is \$16,000,000 with 15,000 square feet, and Option 2A is \$21,000,000 with 22,400 square feet.

Director of the Millis Council on Aging Patty Kayo says, "There is no question as to the need for a new Millis Senior Center. The Council on Aging responsibilities include meeting the unmet needs of our senior population. The way we do that is through programs, activities and outreach."

Says Kayo, "Unfortunately, our current space doesn't allow us the ability to offer the varied and diverse programming necessary to appeal to all seniors. It's truly exciting to think of the endless possibilities a new Center would bring to Millis residents. We would happily rise to the challenge if the voters choose to do so."

Klocko says that, after the completion of the focus groups, the Permanent Building Committee and Council on Aging will report to the Select Board which will then decide which option to present at a town meeting in November

## Millis-grown leafy greens sell in local supermarkets

Vertical farm produces lettuce and arugula year-round

#### BY THERESA KNAPP

While shopping in the salad section of your local supermarket you are likely to see a plastic container that says, "locally grown without pesticides in Millis, Massachusetts."

Those leafy greens were grown in a vertical farm named "Crop One Holdings" located behind the former Ann & Hope and packaged under the label "FreshBox Farms." Their greens are grown year-round and without pesticides, herbicides or fungicides. They wholesale to stores in Millis, Bellingham, Natick, and Boston.

Crop One was founded in 2012 in standard shipping containers containing grow rooms, then moved to the Millis facility in 2015.

"We're a small local company but we have big plans for expansion," says Jackie Hynes, Director of Marketing and Communications at Crop One. "We started

in Millis, this is our headquarters, but it's really the beginning of something much bigger."

Hynes says the company hopes to share its technique to grow "good quality food made with care" across the United free and weather resistant. States so even more people can have "fresh local and safe food that was grown around the corner with no pesticides they can get all year round, regardless of climate and other things related to conventional farming."

Hynes, who has been with the company for four years, explains that vertical farming utilizes nutrient-rich water and LED lights to grow plants in a completely sealed "envelope" which is bugAccording to its website, the

company uses "95 percent less than what's required in outdoor farms" and their "on-site multistep water purification system removes unwanted contaminants, chemicals, and heavy metals."

The four-step process is also explained: non-GMO seeds are germinated; plants are transplanted into modular growth units; plants are grown with the right recipe of light, nutrients,

environmental controls to optimal stage for harvest; and greens are packaged on-site and shipped to local retailers.

By using their farm manager software, "we can trace the greens on your plate back to the original seed."

## **Sports** Millis Volleyball Teams Focuses On The Right Stuff

#### Guinan's Coaching Perspective a Big Plus

Jay Guinan is a very knowledgeable and successful volleyball coach but it's his method and mindset that set him apart from the vast majority of coaches who focus on winning records, tournament berths and championships.

The 60-year-old Guinan, who's been the Millis boys volleyball coach for 15 years, has a 175-116 career record and has directed his teams to 11 postseason playoff appearances. That kind of success is linked to the goals he sets at the start of each season, his philosophy that focuses on building citizenship, and the life lessons he believes can be learned in athletics.

This year's Mohawks, who finished their regular season with an 8-8 record, qualified for the Division 2 tourney and split a pair of games, beating Burlington, 3-2, and losing to Westfield, 3-0.

"I didn't stress qualifying for the tourney or winning a certain amount of matches when we discussed our objectives for the season," said Guinan, who played volleyball at the national level after college. "Our goals were to improve match by match, build stamina and physical strength, and to develop team chemistry and camaraderie. If those three things occur, then a tourney appearance will be the by-product."

The Mohawks rallied against Burlington by dominating the fifth game. Against three-time state champion Westfield, Guinan said, "We got beat by a better team. We kept up with them on offense but we struggled with our serving. It was a satisfying season and we achieved as much as we could."

Millis ended the regular season at No. 19 in the power rankings.

Guinan's athletic philosophy doesn't mirror winning or reaching one's potential. Instead, he talks about citizenship.


"My philosophy is to develop better citizens," he emphasized. "That means monitoring my players' work ethic and their attitudes. It also means that academics come first and that community service is important. I coach like a dad. I give the boys wiggle room as long as they don't cross the line."

Another key to Guinan's successful style is emphasizing life lessons, especially on the court.

"I want my players to focus only on what they can do on their own," he said. "I'm a competitive person so I am about winning and teaching players how to win. But I also emphasize learning how to accept defeat without becoming defeated. Other life lessons I hope they learn are to be team players, to be nice when in doubt, and to let their game speak for itself."

The 2022 edition of Millis' boys squad, which had seven seniors, seven juniors, and one freshman, relied on a style that was all about strong net play, balance, consistency and above average depth.

"We had blue-collar kids at all positions," Guinan said. "Our





Senior Emmett Clark, a Tri Valley League all-star as a junior, started at outside hitter.

"Emmett plays with a disability," Guinan said. "He has no left hand but he's got terrific spirit. A productive player, he's very versatile. He can pass, attack and block. A team-first guy, he comes from good stock. His brother and sister both played for Millis."

Juniors Andrew Maher (setter) and Luke Bennett (outside hitter) proved to be key cogs for the Mohawks.

"Andrew is very calm and the team thrives when he's on the court," Guinan said. "At six feet, he serves and blocks effectively. He's a setter who attacks the ball, getting 31 kills in the 16 regular-season games. His volleyball IQ improved and he was able to identify where a good set was. Luke was the surprise of the season. As a first-year player, he started and got strong at the net and passed well. He was second in kills and third in aces. His reach enabled him to block well."

Junior Nicholas Almieda and senior Matt Kraus displayed versatility, playing middle and rightside hitter.

"Nicholas was the starting quarterback in football," Guinan noted. "He often started because of his vertical leap, power, athleticism and defensive ability. He was a go-to-guy wherever he was needed. Matt can play any frontrow position. He's strong at the net, blocks well, is athletic and puts his focus on the team."

Freshman Henry Kiggen played libero after starting out as a setter. A first-year player, Guinan likes his potential. "Henry has a lot of natural technique," he offered. "He sets well and is a very strong passer."

Guinan didn't play volleyball in high school or college but after graduating from Boston University, he played for USA Volleyball at the New England level. He later competed in the adult age group at the national level. In high school, at Bishop Hendricken in Warwick, RI, he competed in the shot put in track and field. Swimming and diving, however, were where he excelled. He won a state title in diving, was a captain in swimming and an allstate selection.

The girls' jayvee volleyball coach at Millis before taking the reins of the boys' program, Guinan is the owner of Technology Representatives Inc. of Attleboro, a security and surveillance firm at the homeland security level.

## **Sports** Protect yourself from scams and fraudulent schemes.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has a list of 31 common fraud schemes on its "Scams and Safety"1 web page, including credit card theft. The thief makes small purchases with your stolen credit card number and sees if they go through, if they do, then they hit your account for bigger purchases. You should have an email, text message, or phone alert set up with your credit card company, so that the bank will contact you if there are any unusual spending items, if there are illegitimate charges, you must report to the bank as soon as possible so you won't be charged for those items. The bank will lock your account and send you a new card in the mail. This can be frustrating when you have set up monthly withdrawals to be charged against your card. You'll have to go to those companies' websites and change the card numbers you use for those charges.

#### How to protect yourself from Internet scams and fraudulent schemes.

The FBI says protect your computer2 by keeping the firewall turned on and by installing and updating your antivirus and antispyware software. Be careful what you download and only download from trusted and secure websites. Also, keep your operating system up to date, and turn your computer off when it's not in use. You will pay a yearly fee for antivirus, antispyware, and firewall software services, but the safety they provide makes it well worth the cost. If you've been the victim of a scam, file a complaint with your local/state police department's cybercrime unit and file a complaint with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3).3

the safer you will feel. Another way to protect yourself is by going to the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC's) 4 website. Its function is to protect America's consumers by educating and taking consumer complaints on everything from identity theft to unwanted telemarketing solicitations by phone or by email. It runs the National Do Not Call Registry,5 which you should sign up for. Once you are on the donot-call list for at least 31 days, the calls/emails should stop, and if they don't then you can file a complaint with the FTC.

You can register each phone number that you have, and your registration won't expire. You can check the FTC's website if your phone number is still registered.5 Remember, it's not OK for companies to leave recorded voicemails on your phone, so you can file a complaint if you receive unwanted telemarketing robocalls. Once you are registered on the do-not-call list, it's illegal for those telemarketers to continue to call you. Use your common sense. If you don't recognize the area code or the phone number on your caller ID, chances are it's a telemarketing call. Don't answer it, or if you do, insist that they take you off their call list.

To keep up to date on current scams that are plaguing consumers, the FTC has an email alert system that you can sign up for.6

Medway Community Farm has long wanted to participate in a renewable energy program. The opportunity presented itself when Carol Collord, the president of the farm, attended a webinar on agricultural sustainability in early 2021. The United foundation which had fallen into disrepair years earlier. It had been deemed unsafe but, as luck would have it, was the ideal site for solar panels. It was cleared out of old debris and then filled in with the help of DPW.

With the help of a bridge loan

States Department of Agriculture and the Massachusetts Department of Agriculture both had grants available for farms wanting to convert to a renewable source of energy. The first grant under the USDA was the Rural Energy for America Program. That grant was awarded in May of 2021. The MDAR grant, the Climate Smart Agriculture Program grant, was awarded five months later in October. With both grants in hand, the farm was able to move forward with the goal of converting to solar.

Tom Emero, of Summit Energy, was the local representative from Medway who helped to guide the farm through the process. The farm needed 52 panels to supply the electrical energy needed to run the organization. That amount wouldn't fit on the farmhouse roof, so it was agreed that ground panels were the answer. The farm had an old barn

from Middlesex Savings Bank, the farm was ready to begin the solar installation in earnest. The panels were installed in May, the permits were obtained, and the farm celebrated the "flipping of the switch" on June 2nd. Todd Sandstrum, the Farm Manager at MCF, noted that this conversion to solar "has started us on a path to sustainability. The carbon footprint in our food system is great, so any change that the farm can make towards carbon neutrality is a positive step forward." Collord noted that the benefits of converting to solar are numerous, especially to increase the farm's financial stability as she "wants the farm to be around for generations to come." Gerry Palano from MDAR acknowledged that the goal of the state is to obtain statewide net-zero emissions by 2050 and the farm, as well as the town of Medway, is 28 years ahead of the goal!

## **Register O'Donnell Reports on May Real Estate Activity** in Norfolk County

Norfolk County Register of Deeds William P. O'Donnell reported that the May 2022 numbers relative to Norfolk County recordings indicate a continuing decrease in overall real estate activity compared to the

May 2021 numbers but show a significant increase in average sale prices.

"Our data indicates that the Norfolk County real estate numbers in May signal a continued slowdown in the market

compared to 2021 but show a slight uptick from last month,' noted Register O'Donnell. "There were 11,556 documents recorded at the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds in May, a 29% decrease from May, 2021 but an increase of 3% from April, 2022".

"The number of deeds for May 2022, which reflect real estate sales and transfers, both commercial and residential, show a slight decrease of 3% from May, 2021 but an increase of 25% from April 2022. Sale prices continue to surge as compared to last year but may be starting to level off. The average sale price in May was \$1,264,350, a 26% increase compared to May 2021 but down 18% from last month. Total dollar volume of commercial and residential sales also showed gains from one year ago, increasing 22% and up 3% from last month," noted the Register.

Overall lending activity show a continued trend downward for the month of May. A total of 2,283 mortgages were recorded during the month, a significant decrease of 40% compared to a year ago. "It appears that the interest rate increases by the Federal Reserve Board and the fact that many consumers have already refinanced are impacting mortgage activity," noted O'Donnell.

A continuing cause for concern in Norfolk County is the number of pending foreclosures. The Norfolk County Registry of Deeds has been closely watching the foreclosure market. During May, there were 5 foreclosure deeds recorded as a result of mortgage foreclosures taking place in Norfolk County, one more than in May, 2021 and one less than in April. However, there were 21 Notices to Foreclose, the first step in the foreclosure process, recorded in May, up significantly from 14 recorded in May 2021. "The dramatic increase in the number of these notices is alarming. It indicates that more of our neighbors are facing financial challenges going forward", said O'Donnell. "We will continue to monitor these numbers."

For the past several years, the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds has partnered with Quincy Community Action Programs, 617-479-8181 x376, and NeighborWorks Housing Solutions, 508-587-0950 to help anyone facing challenges paying their mortgage. Another option for homeowners is to contact the Massachusetts Attorney General's Consumer Advocacy and Response Division (CARD) at 617-727-8400. Register O'Donnell stated, "If you are having difficulty paying your monthly mortgage, please consider contacting one of these non-profit agencies for help and guidance."

Homestead recordings by owners of homes and condominiums decreased again this month at the Norfolk Registry of Deeds. There was a 8% decrease in homestead recordings in May 2022 compared to May 2021 but increased 16% from last month. "The comparison from last May is not too surprising where the sales of homes have started to level off, but all homeowners, not just new purchasers, should keep in mind that a recorded Declaration of Homestead provides limited protection against the forced sale of an individual's primary residence to satisfy unsecured debt up to \$500,000," noted O'Donnell. "We want to see folks protecting the biggest asset most of us have, our homes. I would urge anyone who has not availed themselves of this important consumer protection tool to consider doing so. The recording fee is only \$36. Feel free to visit the Registry website at www.norfolkdeeds.org to get more information on homesteads and to make sure you have taken advantage of this protection."

Register O'Donnell concluded, "May real estate activity in Norfolk County continues to show a decline from last year. We still see the increase in sale prices from last year as indicating a continuing lack of available real estate inventory but looking at the numbers from last month, it appears the market may be starting to cool down a bit."

The Registry of Deeds continues to be open to the public for business. Registry personnel are processing in-person recordings as well as electronically filed recordings. The drop-off box located at the main entrance of the Registry building will continue to be available for use by those members of the public who may not be comfortable entering the Registry of Deeds building The volume of documents recorded electronically for many of our institutional users continues to increase.
