

Helping students succeed

Huntington Learning Center cares about your child's education

"It is our mission to help students succeed," shared Kim Walter, the executive director at Huntington Learning Center in Mayfield Heights and Mentor. "With the help of our tutors, students can strengthen academic skills, master new concepts, prepare for standardized exams, and build crucial study habits for academic success." Huntington Learning Center was the first supportive education facility in the US and has been serving this niche for 45 years. "We get great results," Walter explained, "because our tutoring is tailored specifically to your student's academic needs."

The process begins with an initial evaluation that includes a number of multi-disciplinary assessments that identify where and why your child is struggling. The evaluation results are used to craft a personalized learning plan for your student, along with the total number of hours estimated for success. The one-time cost of the evaluation is \$195.

There's no set recommendation for the number of tutoring sessions per

week, as the learning plan depends on the individual student's abilities. "As an example, for a student who currently has a B in chemistry and wants to improve the grade to an A, an hour of tutoring per week may suffice." Walter continued, "For a student several grade levels behind, more time will be needed to see improvement. Each student is unique and special to us."

Tutors at Huntington Learning Center are unique as well. Each has at least a bachelor's degree, and many are experienced classroom teachers. "We even have college professors in subjects like finance and physics," Walter noted, "and a chemistry and higher math tutor who works as a chemist." Tutoring services range from \$52 to \$78 per hour depending on the student's age and subject area covered. "Financing opportunities are available; we want to provide every family with the support they need," Walter explained.

Jami Burns of Mentor shared, "My daughter was struggling because school was virtual and she does much better face-to-face. This caused her to lack confidence in

her overall academic performance. Huntington's one-on-one process is really amazing. She has been showing a great amount of improvement; this has also boosted her academic confidence in all subjects. She looks forward to her weekly in center tutoring sessions."

5 reasons why your child should (and can) learn how to play chess

Chess is one of the oldest and most popular games in history, with early forms of the game dating back to the 6th century CE. Through chess, kids also learn to explore the thoughts of the person sitting across from them, which helps develop important social skills and emotional intelligence.

4. Chess teaches sportsmanship. Win or lose, kids will learn it's fun to play the game of chess with a friend. In the game, they'll grow to understand the consequences of a bad move and how to embrace failure. But, at the end of every game, they always give a "good game" handshake. This teaches kids how to lose with dignity and win with humility.

5. Chess is the ultimate executive coach. Grit is a powerful driving force and predictor of success in the business world, and an important trait kids can learn by playing chess. The game teaches kids patience as they work through different scenarios, learn to plan, course correct and wait to see how things play out, instead of being tempted by easy, more immediately gratifying moves.

Plus, learning chess is more accessible and approachable than ever before. There are after-school programs, private tutors, online classes and now an innovative board game that uses proven silly, story-based curriculum to introduce chess to kids as young as three years old. Learn to Dance!

The art of dancing has been around for ages and has grown in popularity over the years. Just look at the popular dancing shows such as Dancing with the Stars. Learning how to dance has many physical, emotional and social benefits for children and adults alike.

Dancing teaches many skills and develops many abilities that will extend to other relationships outside of the dance studio. Here are a few of the benefits of learning to dance.

Great cardio exercise

Dancing is a great form of exercise for all ages. It involves a greater range of motion, strength and endurance than most other physical activities. It utilizes the entire body and is a great form of exercise for total body fitness. It is also much more fun than traditional exercise.

Self control and cooperation

Being in a dance class with other children is good for their development of self-control and cooperation. In class, children will have to follow directions, learn to control their bodies and work with other kids their own age. They will learn to concentrate, memorize, control impulses and learn responsibility.

Teaches about different cultures

Dance is a basic form of cultural expression. All cultures organize movement and rhythm into forms of dance. Children learn movement patterns as readily as they learn language. By learning different dances children can get a peek into cultures different than their own.

Increased self-confidence and self-esteem

For both children and adults dance is a highly social activity. Studies have shown that strong social ties and socializing with friends contribute to high self-esteem. Strength and endurance

into the air. Along with strength, dancing builds endurance, which is the ability of the muscles to work hard for increasingly longer periods of time without fatigue. As with any form of exercise, raising the heart rate can increase stamina.

Improved flexibility

Dance requires a great amount of flexibility over time. Dancers strive to achieve full range of motion for all major muscle groups. Most forms of dance require dancers to perform moves that require bending and stretching, so it is easy to become more flexible simply by dancing.

Wildfire Dance Studio

Over 40 years of helping to make successful young adults

Wildfire Dance Studio has been impacting children through the art of dance for over 40 years! As a parent, you make choices about activities for your child – choices to make them stronger, to make them happier, to help them grow into successful young adults. It has been their mission to provide classes that do just that . . . and that has been the key to their success.

Wildfire Dance Studio opened their Lake County location in 2018, but the program has deep roots in the area. The dance program, which originated in Ashtabula County in 1980, had always had satellite locations in Geauga and Lake counties. The decision was made in 2018 to make it permanent and they opened their doors at 1657 Mentor Avenue in Painesville.

The studio owner, Scott DeCola, danced professionally and toured with Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo, Joffrey Ballet II, Ohio Ballet and the Richmond Ballet. Following his performing career, he joined the staff of Wildfire Dance Studio in 2014 under the direction of Mary Murtha, who originated the program in 1980. DeCola had a lifelong dream to own his own studio and that dream became a reality in 2021 as he took over the well-established studio. Wildfire currently has two

locations and over 300 students, with instruction for children ages 3-18.

Many students who continued dance in college have been very successful due to the “team” culture of the curriculum. Wildfire offers classes in ballet, jazz, acrobatic arts and hip hop, but in addition to the styles most common to studios, they also have pom and combo classes. “Most dancers who attend universities with competitive dance teams will need to be fluent in pom and kick. Precision of movement is also key for collegiate styles. Two of our 2022 graduates just made their college teams and scored very high because of their diverse training and knowledge in many genres,” said DeCola.

The Painesville location offers rec classes for ages 3-18. Children who enjoy many activities including sports can also enjoy dance with the once per week format. Curriculum is focused on creating an enjoyable experience for the students while improving coordination, rhythm, and agility. Dance can build self-esteem and confidence, especially if the classes are structured towards that goal.

Wildfire is also nationally recognized in competitive dance, winning the Studio of Excellence



Award twice in 2022. The high school division competes at studio competitions and also at The Dance Worlds in Orlando, Florida. The younger Starz teams, ages 5-12, are also challenged with more advanced choreography set for the stage. “If rec students find that dance is more than a secondary activity, we have the competitive option for them.” said DeCola. “We have something for everyone who enjoys music and movement!”

Fall classes begin on September 6 and students may enroll through the months of September and October. If you are new to the studio and would like to try a free class, call 440-789-9541 for days and times by age.



As the popularity of Grandparents Day caught on, forget-me-nots were designated as the official flower of Grandparents Day.

Today, Grandparents Day re-

mains a great opportunity for family get-togethers — marked with greeting cards, flower bouquets, special Grandparents Day gifts, or for treating grandparents to a dinner out or homemade feast in their honor.

Grandparents Day fun facts

- In the U.S. and Canada, Grandparents Day is celebrated in September on the first Sunday after Labor Day. Meanwhile, in the UK, it's the first Sunday in October. In Germany, Grandmothers Day is observed on the second Sunday in October. Dia del Abuelo, or Grandparents Day, is celebrated in Mexico every year on August 28.

- In the U.S., it's grandma and grandpa. In Latin America and Spain it's abuela and abuelo. In Italy, it's nonna and nonno, and in Germany oma and opa are the traditional names for a grandmother and grandfather.

- Famous people who have been raised by their grandparents include Oprah Winfrey, Presidents Barack Obama and Bill Clinton, actor Jack Nicholson, singer Willie Nelson,



funny lady Carol Burnett, and poet Maya Angelou.

- Grandparents are younger than ever today with a median age of 48. More than half the grandparents in the United States are baby boomers

and about 10% have tattoos!

- Grandparents are wonderful caregivers (think about all the experience they have!) with more than two million grandparents in the U.S. acting as the head of household.

Grandparent rights in Ohio

As a local attorney, people ask about this legal dilemma quite often. The reality is that under Ohio law there are grandparent rights but there are many other factors to determine what "rights" are available. This is hard for most to understand. The law does not give grandparents any automatic rights to see their grandchildren. So, in almost every case, parents can keep children away from grandparents if they choose to. Normally, grandparents visit with their grandchildren by making arrangements with their son or daughter.

Unlike many other states, Ohio actually recognizes grandparent rights to visit and care for their grandchildren through the Ohio Revised Code. Grandparents can motion the court for these rights. There are three statutorily protected instances in Ohio that has authorized grandparent companionship or visitation rights: (1) when married parents terminate their marriage or separate, (2) when a parent of a child is deceased, and (3) when the child is born to an unmarried woman. In such cases, a court may order rea-

sonable visitation if it is in the best interest of the child.

However, before awarding grandparent visitation rights in Ohio, a court must consider all relevant factors, including all factors listed in the statute.

Grandparent visitation schedules usually provide less time than visitation schedules provided for a parent. A typical grandparent visitation schedule may be one or two days per month and visitation during important and significant holidays.

Note: This article does NOT provide legal advice. Each scenario and facts may warrant a different outcome. Please contact legal counsel for your own matter. In addition, the Ohio Revised Code does not expressly provide for grandparent visitation when a child is alleged or adjudicated by the juvenile court to be an abused, neglected, or dependent child. However, the Ohio Department of Jobs and Family Services has adopted a rule that requires a public children services agency to arrange for such visitation in certain circumstances.

Testing wells to safeguard your water

According to the EPA you should test your private well annually for total coliform bacteria, nitrates, total dissolved solids, and pH levels. If you suspect the presence of other contaminants, you should test for those also. You can also contact your local health department to find out what substances may be common in your area's groundwater.

You may want to test more frequently if small children or elderly adults live in your house or if someone in your house is pregnant or nursing. These segments of the population are often more vulnerable to pollutants than others.

You should also test your private well immediately if:

- There are known problems with ground water or drinking water in your area.
- Conditions near your well have changed significantly (i.e. flooding, land disturbances, and

new construction or industrial activity).

- You replace or repair any part of your well system.
- You notice a change in your water quality (i.e. odor, color, taste).

In addition, well owners should also determine if the ground water you rely on for household use is under direct influence from

surface water. Ground water under the direct influence of surface water is susceptible to contamination from activities on the surface.

Protecting and educating Lake County residents and businesses

Learn about the divisions and services of the Lake County General Health District (LCGHD)

The Lake County Health District provides programs and services that benefit residents and business owners of Lake County. Its establishment in 1919 was a direct response to the influenza epidemic of 1918-1919. Since then, the Health District's mission has been to prevent disease, promote health, and protect the community. To fulfill their mission, the Health District established five divisions to serve as a shield around the community and to provide support to those marginalized and most at risk:

Environmental health

This impactful division at the Health District is responsible for over 15 programs and services that include monitoring bacteria levels in lake water and parks, food inspections, sewage treatment, solid waste management, mosquito control and more. Some services are at no cost to the public while other specialized services for businesses and homeowners may have a charge.

Population health & emergency planning

This division helps facilitate the ongoing surveillance of disease and other health concerns through collecting, investigating, and analyzing



various communicable diseases, providing supportive resources and care, and other measures. It most popularly provides potassium iodine (KI) tablets to residents and businesses within 10 miles of the Perry Nuclear Power Plant and also educates the community on various topics including the dangers of texting while driving, and provides lifesaving Naloxone (Narcan) to areas in Lake County most at risk of seeing overdoses.

Community health services

Community Health recognizes that there are more factors contributing to the overall health and safety of county residents than the prevention and management of communicable diseases alone. Among facilitating school nurse placement, immunization clinics, and tuberculosis (TB) testing, this division provides case management for kids with medical handicaps and car seats and cribs to income-eligible families—while quantities last.

Birth & death records

This division provides birth certificates for everyone born in the state of Ohio. Death certificates at the Health District, on the other hand, are only provided for those deaths that occurred within Lake County. Learn more information about this division at www.lcghd.org/birth-and-death-records.

Women, Infants & Children (WIC)

WIC is a nutrition education program and provides nutritious foods that promote good health for pregnant women, women who just had a baby, breastfeeding moms, infants, and children up to
