Family-run Affordable Junk Removal takes the stress out of cleanups

Whether it's one old fridge in the garage or an entire home of unwanted goods, the team at Affordable Junk Removal offers a cost-efficient, stress-free approach to waste management. "You don't lift a finger," says owner Jason Schadler, who started the company along with his wife Christine in 2005.

The business offers same-day service for both residential and commercial clients across eastern and central Massachusetts and northern Rhode Island. In addition to junk removal, the company rents 15-yard dumpsters.

Eventually, the business grew into a full-time endeavor, and the Schadlers invested back into the company with new equipment and techniques. "When I first started, for example, we didn't have any tarps. I'm driving around and things are flying out of my truck," Schadler laughs. "I'm like, 'Oh my god, I need a tarp."

Schadler says his wife Christine "was equally as involved" in getting the business off the ground. "She handled the backend while I did the heavy lifting, all while she was working at EMC," he says. "Fast forward 17



years, and we both work full time managing the company as well as other endeavors. Business is doing great; it has grown tremendously to a fleet of trucks and dumpsters, and we've also been able to buy a pizza place, The Corner Market in Holliston."

In addition to delivering an in-demand service to the community, Schadler is appreciative that Affordable Junk Removal has helped provide a work-life balance that suits his family. "It allows me to be able to do what I like doing and spend time with my kids," he says. "I'm home to see my babies play softball and do all that stuff. We are also able to give back to the communities we serve."

As for Medway and Millis in particular, Schadler says they are proud to have many repeat customers and friends in the area. Hidden Hill Farms in Millis does all the business's welding work,

Millis Youth Enjoy a Perfect Day for Swimming on Spectacle Island

In August, 290 kids from six organizations in six communities — including 16 kids from Girl Scout troop #82362 in Millis — set sail to Spectacle Island as part of Save the Harbor/Save the Bay's free All Access Boston Harbor program.

"These free trips to the Boston Harbor Islands are some of the best parts of the summer," said Kristen Barry, Deputy Executive Director at Save the Harbor/Save the Bay. "No matter what community they come from or what group they are a part of, they always come back to shore with new experiences and new perspectives."

The groups gathered in the Leader Bank Pavilion in Boston's Seaport where Save the Harbor's Historian, David Coffin, told kids about the island's history. Coffin spoke about how Spectacle Island was a dumping ground for Boston's trash, burning continuously for more than a decade. Today the island is now the most popular destination in the Boston Harbor Islands National & State Park.

"This is one my favorite stories," said Coffin to the gathered groups. "You can be a flaming pile of trash for ten years and you can still turn your life around."

This summer Save the Harbor's youth and beach program staff of 40 will run three free cruises a week to the Boston Harbor Islands, as well as scores of free events and programs on Boston's waterfront and on the region's public beaches from Nahant to Nantasket.

On most trips to Spectacle, the youth break into groups to explore the beach and hike to the top of the north drumlin for the spectacular views of the harbor. However, when the weather is hot and the tide is high they just can't wait to hit the water.

To beat the heat, some kids swam in the clean, cool water of Boston Harbor under the watchful supervision of four DCR's lifeguards. Others caught crabs and fish from the pier or searched for the "Treasures of Spectacle Island" with Save the Harbors program staff, collecting shells and sea glass, which they shared with each other before returning them to the beach where they belong

"Our free programs give kids and families who might not otherwise have the opportunity to experience these beautiful natural resources firsthand," said Save the Harbor/Save the Bay's Executive Director Chris Mancini. "We are



proud to share our spectacular harbor, beaches and islands with them."

Compare PPO costing \$247 biweekly with \$6,000 maximum out-of-pocket versus HDHP at \$142, a \$13,000 maximum outof-pocket, and employer providing \$1,500 to enroll in Health Savings Account (HSA).

PPO guarantees \$6,422 paid in premiums while HDHP is \$3,692 less \$1,500 given by employer to contribute to HSA, thus equals \$2,192 or \$4,230 less than the PPO. Thus, maximum outof-pocket expenses differential is \$2,770 and not \$7,000. Furthermore, you'd need \$10,230 of out-of-pocket medical expenses to make this PPO breakeven with this HDHP.

World-Class Eyecare and Cataract Surgery Closer to Home

Cataract surgery is by far the most common surgery performed in the United States. With advanced technology and if you choose an experienced and highly skilled surgeon, modern cataract surgery should be a rather quick outpatient and a minimal risk procedure. If you are considering cataract surgery, your expectations should not only be to improve your vision, reduce glare at night, see more vivid colors and improve your day to day activities, but you should also be given an opportunity to reduce vour dependence on glasses or contacts and in many cases eliminate this need. Your expectations should also be to have your surgery by a world-class surgeon close to where you live and not be told to travel hours for testing and surgery. Many choices exist on where to have the surgery and by whom. Here are the specific questions to ask when it's time to have the surgery:

- **1.** Why are you referring me to this surgeon? Your optometrist may ask you to travel miles and hours away from home to have your surgery with a particular surgeon of their choice. - **5.** What is the rate of infections in your center? Another potentially devastating risk of

- cataract surgery is an infection inside the eye called "endophthalmitis". Ask the complication rate of the surgeon you are being asked to travel to. In our center this rate is close to zero percent.
- **6.** What type of technology is available at your surgery facility? Different centers have different equipment and resources. For instance, Massachusetts has only few centers offering laser-assisted bladeless cataract surgery. This should be an option if you want to reduce dependence on glasses and treat low grades of astigmatism at the same time as your cataract surgery. Our center was among the first in the State and New England to offer this technology. Did you know that many hospitals and other centers do not offer laser-assisted bladeless cataract surgery? We do!
- 7. What type of implant am I going to get? Different lens implants can be used during cataract surgery with different materials, quality and ability to reduce your need for glasses. Ask your referring provider about his/her

A beginner's guide to fall planting and maintenance


Spring and summer are perhaps the busiest times of year for gardeners. However, fall also is a prime time to tend to gardens.

The tree and bare root retailer Bower & Branch advises that soil temperatures in many regions of the country may still be warm enough to encourage root growth well into the start of winter. Furthermore, fall is often the ideal time to plant, fertilize and keep a garden going or to get a head start on next year's bounty.

Here are some tips to make the most of the fall gardening

• Think about fall annuals and bulb planting. Near the end of September, start planting cool-weather-loving pansies and violas for pops of color as summer flowers fade. Also, it's a good idea to stock up on bulbs that will bloom in the months to come before they sell out in stores. Wait until the temperatures really cool down before planting them in desired spots for spring sprouts.

- Sow salad seeds. Lettuce, spinach, radishes, and arugula tolerate cooler temperatures. Try new and interesting lettuce varieties and enjoy salads well into the fall season.
- Take inventory of the sun. Positioning a garden carefully means maximizing hours of sunlight, which begin to dwindle in the fall. Experts say gardens grow best in sunny locations that receive six hours of direct sunlight each day. This is where container gardens can be helpful, as they allow gardeners to move plants into spots that will get ample sunlight.
- Fill in landscaping gaps. Some fall plants can add color around the landscape and brighten up homes to add curb appeal. In addition to pansies and violas, asters, kale and chrysanthemums are fall blooms. Keep in mind that mums can come back year after year.



So take them out of those flower pots and get them into the ground. They can be enjoyed next year as well, sprouting in early spring and developing leaves and buds through late summer.

• Clean up unwanted growth. Fall is an ideal time to cut back spent vegetable plants and get rid of errant weeds. Rather than bagging leaves, mow them with a grass catcher and then add the

mix to a vegetable garden as an excellent soil insulator. The nitrogen and carbon will fertilize the soil, enhancing growing possibilities and limiting weed growth.

- Propagate plants in the fall. As temperatures gradually begin to cool, start taking cuttings from perennials, gathering seed pods from azaleas and rhododendrons and dividing hardwood cuttings, says the resource Gardening Know How. Consult with a garden center or horticulturist on the proper ways to propagate stems using rooting hormone and other techniques.
- Continue to water plants. Water is essential in the fall and winter as roots can still be growing. Gradually reduce watering duration as plants go dormant.

Fall planting and maintenance can extend gardening season and improve the chances of growing a healthy spring garden.

Wood floor installation dos and don'ts

Jaw-dropping features can sell a home in a heartbeat. A penthouse apartment with floor-to-ceiling windows and a panoramic view of a city skyline likely won't prove a hard sell, nor will a home with an infinity pool overlooking a landscape of rolling hills. As awe-inspiring as such features can be, some more subtle components, such as authentic hardwood floors, also can do much to make a home more appealing to prospective buyers.

home renovation experts at Bob-Vila.com, squeaky floors could be an indication that the sub-floor has begun to warp or twist. Sinking floors are another indicator of deteriorating subfloors. Subfloors should be somewhat level before new hardwoods are installed, so DIYers should inspect and address subfloor issues before installing new flooring.

DO expose wood flooring to the elements in your home prior to installation. The home im-



Hardwood flooring is a sought-after commodity. Data from the National Association of Realtors indicates that 54 percent of home buyers are willing to pay more for hardwood floors. In fact, NAR figures indicate that 28 percent of buyers between the ages of 35 and 54 consider hardwood floors "very important" when looking for a home. Homeowners who are considering selling their homes, or those who simply want to upgrade their existing flooring, may want to consider installing hardwood flooring. Though it's a project best left to professionals, hardwood flooring can be installed by skilled DIYers. In such instances, homeowners may want to keep these dos and don'ts in mind.

DO hire a professional if you have limited or no DIY flooring experience. Hardwood flooring installation is not generally a project for novice DIYers. Hardwood flooring projects may present some common challenges, but no two homes are the same. So unless they have prior experience installing floors in multiple rooms or homes, homeowners may save themselves time, trouble and a significant amount of money hiring a professional to do the job.

DON'T ignore the subfloor. New hardwoods won't erase the problem of subfloors in poor condition. According to the provement resource BuildDirect recommends acclimating hardwoods to the space where they will be installed. Skipping this important step could result in gaps during the winter and cupping over the summer. To acclimate hardwoods, open the boxes and spread them out for about a week while running the air conditioner or heater at normal levels. When storing hardwoods prior to installation, avoid keeping them in potentially moist areas like a basement.

DON'T skimp on tools. A DIY hardwood flooring installation might be less expensive than hiring a professional, but homeowners should resist any temptation to increase those savings further by purchasing less costly tools or fewer tools than is necessary to complete the job. Build-Direct notes that DIYers will need at least a miter saw, table saw, cleat-nailer or stapler, finish nailer, compressor, jamb saw, chalk line, nail set, and tape measurer when installing hardwood floors. Purchase all necessary tools and read product reviews to ensure each tool is up to the task.

Wood floors can be awe-inspiring. Some homeowners can install such flooring on their own, and the project can be much easier if they learn as much about installation as possible prior to beginning the project.

Signs your gutters are in need of repair

Fall is a great time to tackle projects around the house. The weather each fall allows homeowners to make improvements to their homes' exteriors without worrying about extreme heat or cold, while interior projects like painting are made easier because homeowners can open the windows to allow for proper ventilation.

Fall also marks a great time to prepare for upcoming projects that can make winter work that much easier. For example, fall is a great time to take stock of your gutters so you can address any issues before leaves begin to fall or the first snowstorm touches down. Compromised gutters can contribute to water issues in basements and adversely affect a home's foundation if not addressed immediately, so it behooves homeowners to learn the signs that gutters are in need of repair or replacement.

• Gutters hanging off the home: Gutters were once installed predominantly with spikes. However, many industry professionals now install gutters with hanger brackets. Why



the change? Spikes loosen over time, leading to the gutters hanging off the home. That can contribute to serious issues if left untreated. Gutters hanging off the home need not necessarily be replaced, but rather secured to the home, ideally with hanger brackets instead of spikes. Brackets hook into the front of the gutter and are then screwed into the fascia of a home. A professional who specializes in gutter repair can perform this task relatively quickly, and it's an inexpensive yet highly effective solution.

• Gutter separation: Gutters that are no longer fastened together can leak and contribute to issues that affect the home's foundation, siding and appearance. Clogs and the accumulation of debris can cause gutters to separate because they are not designed to hold too much weight. Replacement of separated gutters may or may not be necessary depending on how big the problem is and the condition of the existing gutters. If

replacement is not necessary, separated gutters may be remedied by securing the joints, another relatively simple and inexpensive fix.

- Peeling exterior paint: Paint that appears to be peeling off of your home may indicate that water is seeping over the edge of the gutter closest to your home. When that happens, water is coming down the side of the house, causing the paint to peel. In such instances, replacing the gutters is often necessary.
- Basement flooding: Not all signs of deteriorating gutters are outside a home. Many a homeowner has been flummoxed by flooding in their basements, and such flooding can be caused by aging, ineffective gutters. That's because deteriorating gutters sometimes allow water to leak near the foundation of a home, contributing to basement flooding.

Fall is an ideal time to inspect gutters and have any issues fixed before leaves begin to fall or harsh winter weather arrives.





Medway High Golfers Aiming For Tournament Berth

Jim Bruce is hoping his third year as head golf coach at Medway High will end with a berth in the state tournament.

The 50-year-old Bruce, who has an extensive background in golf, guided the Mustangs to a 6-4 record in 2020, but because of the Covid-19 pandemic, post-season tourneys were canceled. Last year, his squad finished 6-10, unable to qualify because it fell short of a .500 record.

The current team, which includes eight returnees, has experience, a solid nucleus and several other strengths.

"Our team chemistry and work ethic are excellent," Bruce said. "I also like our competitive nature and our putting and chipping technique. Our kids play and practice at Maplegate Country Club in Bellingham and that course is a challenge. It forces players to know the hazards and it takes a lot of knowledge to play well there. It's a championship style course."

Bruce knows how to teach golf and he knows the details needed for success. He played golf and baseball at Belmont High and he was a two-time assistant golf pro (Canton and Watertown) before becoming the head golf pro at Winthrop Golf Club.

"I was fulltime for 19 years as the head pro at Winthrop," he said. "And I've been an active member of PGA of America for 24 years. As a member, I ran tournaments and taught PGA rules."

Bruce's goals for the 2022 edition of the Mustangs incorporate a common-sense approach that emphasizes improvement. "We want to qualify for the state tourney and to achieve that objective means improving daily," he noted. "It's also imperative that we develop and help a large number of younger players."

Competing in the Tri Valley League isn't a walk in the park, especially with teams that include Dover-Sherborn, Hopkinton, Medfield and Westwood.

At Local Town Pages deadline, the Mustangs were 0-3 but Bruce remained optimistic. The losses came against three competitive squads — Medfield, Norton and Norwood.

"We still have a chance of getting into the tourney," Bruce said. "Our schedule is tough early on. Dover-Sherborn, Westwood, Hopkinton and Medfield are talented teams. Their players compete on junior tours and some of them will play golf in college. The scores that we've compiled early in the season will make us competitive against everyone left on our schedule. Our 262 score in the loss to Norwood was 10 strokes less than our score against Norton. That improvement bodes well for the future."

Bruce, who now works as a real estate agent, firmly believes his squad can qualify for postseason play because of three

key attributes. "A solid work ethic is a must and the kids have to stay calm and positive," he emphasized. "It's also crucial to be competitive."

Medway's captains — seniors Colin Roberts and Jackson Horan — embody the necessary ingredients that Bruce stresses for success. Roberts' nine-hole average last year was 42 and Horan's was 43.

"Colin is a two-time captain who's in his fourth year of varsity play," Bruce offered. "He leads by example, he's consistent, has a strong work ethic and he's coachable. His putting and chipping are assets and his demeanor on the course is like being an assistant coach. He often helps, guides and supports younger players."

Horan, now in his third varsity season, is adept at driving the ball. "Jackson hits long and solid," Bruce said. "Driving is his No. 1 strength. He's mentally tough, always in control and always positive. A good leader, he's calm and maintains a steady attitude."

Sophomore Gavin Shipos, who averaged 45 for nine holes last year, is a second-year varsity player. "Gavin hits the ball accurately and solid," said Bruce. "He's got an athletic golf swing, which means it's balanced and it's smooth."

Another sophomore, Zach Nielsen, is a second-year varsity player who also averaged 45 for nine holes. "Zach's top strengths are wedging and chipping," Bruce noted. "He's accurate in all phases of the game, he's consistent and he keeps the ball in play."

Senior Jack Reynolds, who played jayvee golf last year, has now become an integral part of Bruce's nucleus. "Jack is very effective chipping and putting," Bruce said. "He's accurate with his ball-striking. Jack's very committed and dedicated in practice and he's averaging 48 in his matches."

Junior Owen Spellman, who averaged 47 last year, is in his second year of varsity play. "Owen's ball-striking is solid," Bruce noted. "He has the ability to deliver a low score. He's calm and he's a top-notch teammate. His score of 40 against Medfield was the best in that match."

Relying on an athletic philosophy that focuses on reaching one's potential and enjoying sports, Bruce says that "if those two situations are occurring, then winning will be the byproduct." He also admires golf because it teaches younger players valuable life lessons. "Overcoming adversity is a great life lesson that can be learned from golf," he emphasized. "Every match has adversity. There's always going to be a bad shot or a poor hole. Golf also helps teach discipline, leadership and how to be a good teammate. There are no referees in high school golf, so sportsmanship is another attribute that can be learned."

A native of Belmont, Bruce, who is married and has two children, earned his bachelor's degree from Fitchburg State where he majored in business and finance.

As a real estate agent, Bruce often deals with numbers. On the golf course, he's hoping to get favorable numbers — results that will end Medway's tourney drought.

Register O'Donnell Promotes Consumer Notification Service

Dedham, MA – Taking note of publicity relating to "deed theft," Norfolk Register of Deeds William P. O'Donnell today reminded Norfolk County homeowners about the Registry's Consumer Notification Service.

Deed theft can take different forms. The most common type of fraud preys on people who are in danger of losing their property, usually rental property, through foreclosure. The owners are told that they qualify for a "short sale" – a process where the foreclosing lender settles for less than the amount owed or the mortgage - and that if they sign the deed over to a third party, they can avoid the foreclosure. The owner signs a deed over to the thirdparty scammer, not realizing they are still responsible for the debt, and the scammer, rather than negotiating the short sale,

collects and keeps the rental payments until the lender eventually forecloses. Another form of deed theft preys on the elderly homeowner who, subject to undue influence often by a family member, signs over their property, not realizing what they are signing.

Less common is forgery, where a scammer fakes a homeowner's signature on a deed and records it in the registry of deeds. A forged deed is not valid and conveys nothing. If a buyer or a lender rely on a forged deed and don't do their due diligence on a property's title, they are out of luck. They, not the legitimate property owner, will ultimately lose any money paid to the thief. Forgery is a felony in all fifty states, punishable by jail time and heavy fines. The court may also require restitution for damages caused by the forgery, such

as the costs of clearing the title.

There are companies that now offer paid subscription services that will periodically monitor the public records and notify an owner if a deed has been recorded transferring the ownership of their property. It is not title insurance and usually will offer no additional services if a fraudulent transaction has taken place.

Commenting on the issue, Register O'Donnell stated, "Our mission at the Registry of Deeds is the safety and security of all property records. We recognize that there are unscrupulous individuals that may try to take advantage of the property rights of others. We have initiated a Consumer Notification Service at the Registry, a free service whereby subscribers sign up to be notified when any document is recorded under their name. While I can't speak to the paid subscription services, we have confidence in our "alert" or notification system."

Information on "Consumer Notification" can be found on the Registry website, www.norfolkdeeds.org under the heading, "Services". The Registry Customer Service Department can assist anyone who would like to set up the notification for their property.

Register O'Donnell concluded, "I want to reiterate that our free notification service, like the paid services, does not protect against fraud but will at least alert an owner if a fraudulent deed has been recorded. Owners should be always be aware of what they are signing when it comes to any document that may affect the title to their real estate and should scrutinize any company that promises to alleviate debt if you sign over a deed to them. In Massachusetts a deed should always be signed in front of a notary public. Massachusetts notaries are obligated to request identification from the party signing the

Real Estate Corner

August Real Estate Activity

Norfolk County Register of Deeds William P. O'Donnell reported that the August 2022 numbers relative to Norfolk County recordings indicate a notable decrease in overall real estate activity, particularly with mortgage activity, as compared to the August 2021 numbers, but continue to show an increase in average sale prices from a year ago.

"Our data indicates that the Norfolk County real estate numbers in August demonstrate a continued slowdown in the market compared to 2021 but a slight increase from the month of July," noted Register O'Donnell. "There were 11,640 documents recorded at the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds in August, a 29% decrease from August 2021 but up 7% from July, 2022".

"The number of deeds for August 2022, which reflect real estate sales and transfers, both commercial and residential, show a decrease of 16% from August, 2021 but an increase of 5% from the previous month of July, 2022. Sale prices climbed again when compared to 2021. The average sale price in August was \$1,107,598, a 13% increase compared to August 2021, but surprisingly show a 17% decrease from July. Total dollar volume of commercial and residential sales is down, decreasing 5% from one year ago and decreasing 13% from last month," noted the Register.

Overall lending activity show a continued pronounced trend downward for the month of August. A total of 1,991 mortgages were recorded during the month, a significant decrease of 46% compared to a year ago but slightly up 6% from July, 2022. "It appears that the increase in the mortgage interest rates and the fact that many consumers have already refinanced continue to impact mortgage activity," noted O'Donnell.

A continuing cause for concern in Norfolk County is the number of pending foreclosures. The Norfolk County Registry of Deeds has been closely monitoring the foreclosure market. In August, there were 7 foreclosure deeds recorded as a result of mortgage foreclosures taking place in Norfolk County, one more than in August, 2021 and two fewer than in July. However, there were 33 Notices to Foreclose, the first step in the foreclosure process, recorded in August, up significantly from the 15 recorded in August 2021. "The dramatic increase in the number of these notices is alarming. It indicates that more of our neighbors are facing financial challenges going forward", said O'Donnell. "We will continue to track these numbers."

For the past several years, the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds has partnered with Quincy Community Action Programs, 617-479-8181 x376, and NeighborWorks

Housing Solutions, 508-587-0950 to help anyone facing challenges paying their mortgage. Another option for homeowners is to contact the Massachusetts Attorney General's Consumer Advocacy and Response Division (CARD) at 617-727-8400. Register O'Donnell stated, "If you are having difficulty paying your monthly mortgage, please consider contacting one of these non-profit agencies for help and guidance."

Homestead recordings by owners of homes and condominiums decreased again this month at the Norfolk Registry of Deeds. There was a 13% decrease in homestead recordings in August 2022 compared to August 2021. "The reduction in recorded Declarations of Homestead is not too surprising where the sales of homes continue to level off, but all homeowners, not just new purchasers, should keep in mind that a recorded Declaration of Homestead provides limited protection against the forced sale of an individual's primary residence to satisfy unsecured debt up to \$500,000," noted O'Donnell. "We want to see folks protecting the biggest asset most of us have, our homes. I would urge anyone who has not availed them-
