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Celebrate The Season!

The Lake County History Center brings nostalgic magic to the holidays, along with new experiences

There's always something to do at the Lake County History Center, but the holidays are indeed special. "We're always excited about this time of year," says Amy Kapostasy, History Center director. "This year, our displays are new and different as we've partnered with the Western Reserve Junior Service League and the Daughters of the American Revolution to re-create some nostalgic displays, in addition to what we offer every holiday season."

The center's mission is to preserve, educate, and honor the amazing history of the people and events that have been a part of Lake County lore for centuries. While the Historical Society is known for capturing the county's local past, as well as hosting activities and special events, the building itself, located in Painesville Township, dates back to 1876, and is considered a historic community gem. Inside features permanent and temporary exhibits observing time-honored stories and culture with a museum that offers an array of exhibits, a research library, and gift shop. The eight-acre educational complex includes a restored vintage barn used for special events, with community meeting rooms, and reception hall.

With a look toward the holidays, Kapostasy knew to bring back some honored seasonal displays, but she also had another idea. For that, she enlisted the help of the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), an organization of women who pay tribute to their heritage and make a difference in their communities, and also summoned members of the Junior Service League, which also honors history and traditions. "These women are always so helpful and so I pulled them together and we had a few brainstorming sessions," Kapostasy says.

Those talks led to the development of re-creating the former Candy Cane Cottage, the beloved holiday display that was housed in Carlisle's department store in downtown Painesville from 1983-1987.

"Our vision was to bring back the holiday magic that so many experienced there," Kapostasy says. " I was especially excited to get Carolyn Blackwell on board because she used to be my art teacher in high school and she's very creative."

The new display not only took some creativity, but a little ingenuity as well. "Carlisle's was a blank canvas, with bare walls to paint and decorate, whereas in this building, we couldn't totally duplicate the original look," says Blackwell, who served as project co-chair, along with fellow WRJSL volunteer, Molly Hill. "The biggest reason was that there was nothing saved from the department store display so we relied on what was in the center's basement, which actually turned out to be a treasure trove."

The treasures included boxes of holiday ornaments, twelve sparkling trees, loads of garland, and vintage wreaths.

Along with the Candy Cane Cottage, visitors will enjoy twinkling festive decorations throughout the building while wandering through the Enchanted Forest (featuring the Talking Tree!), the ever-popular Fantasyland (where Maleficent will cast her spell over Sleeping Beauty) and of course, see the jolly ole elf that is the very spirit of Christmas.

Not only will the big guy himself, Santa Claus, be on hand, but young visitors can enjoy breakfast or lunch with him (in their PJs) in the History Center's Heritage Hall. Afterward, they will take a walk with Santa to the brightly lit event barn. "The children will follow Santa out to the barn where each one will decorate their own holiday cookie to take home," Kapostasy adds. There will also be photo opportunities with





Santa as well. Dates for the Santa visits are as follows:

Kapostasy is grateful for the many volunteers that put their time and efforts into events all year, but it takes a lot of Santa's helpers to pull off Christmas. "And this year, it's been made even more special with





the addition of the new Candy Cane Cottage display."

How to balance receiving with giving

ne of the key challenges of holiday time is that our children get so used to receiving oodles of gifts that they begin to expect that they will always get more and more. Learn that less is more

How many dolls does one little girl really need? If you dig through your children's old toys, you may be taken aback by how many of each item they actually have: multiple puzzles, games, cars, trucks, plastic figures, and art supplies. It never ends. When they are showered with too many presents, it reduces the interest value of each toy very quickly. According to Kim John Payne in "Simplicity Parenting: Using the Extraordinary Power of Less to Raise Calmer, Happier, and More Secure Kids," kids who are inundated with toys are so overwhelmed that they are unable to play by themselves and can even develop focus issues.

It is so important to teach our children how to pick and choose a few special gifts that they would like and to not go overboard. Parenting coach Carla Naumburg developed a fabulous poem to inspire the types of presents to give to children for the holidays that helps make each gift meaningful. This approach goes beyond just the obvious toys that children typically want, allowing both parents and children to be more creative with gifts.

Choose experiences over stuff

Research over the last decade shows that experiences make us happier than possessions. Christmas in the 1980s

Talking about this iconic '80s Christmas song also prompts me to reminisce about the era and share my memories of Christmas in the "old days." In the 1980s, I would spend hours flipping through catalogs to find my dream gifts. I circled what I wanted or folded down the pages. In my house, it was the Toys R Us Big Book, but some of my friends also had the Sears catalog.

One year, I wanted a Cabbage Patch doll for Christmas. My mom had to be determined and patient to make my dream come true because she had to physically go to a store, stand in line, and do her best impression of a linebacker to wrestle that toy off a shelf for me.

No, she couldn't order it on the computer, because our family didn't have a computer. I guess some wealthy folks may have had a Macintosh 84, but it wouldn't have mat-



tered, because there was no Internet. Imagine that, a world without Amazon Prime.

I loved visiting the mall at Christmas, when it was brimming with shoppers and decorated to the hilt. When I was little, my mother would take me and my sisters to the mall to see Santa. When I became a teen, I still waved at Santa while shopping for stirrup pants at Express, dining on sausage samples at Hickory Farms, and buying Bananarama and Prince cassettes at Sam Goody. 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Sprinkling some safety on your holiday spirit

"It's the most wonderful time of the year – there'll be Christmas trees glowing and candle flames burning and good times when loved ones are near — it's the most wonderful time of the year!"

Making the season merry and bright can be beautiful yet dangerous. Let's get in the holiday spirit by putting safety first!

- Whether your Christmas tree is real or fake, keep it a safe distance from a fireplace, wood burning stove, or other heat-producing sources. Three strings of lights should be the limit on any power strips or outlets. Be sure the UL symbol appears on the electrical items you purchase and pay attention to the color – green means it's for indoor use while red is for indoor/outdoor. When using older lights, check that the cords or wires are not cracked or frayed. Always unplug indoor lights when you leave your home.
- Candles are pretty, but they're still open flames. December is the peak time of year for candle-related house fires. Sure they set a glowy holiday mood, but lit flames and Christmas decorations don't exactly mix. Here are a few important reminders:
 - \star Never leave a burning candle unattended.
 - ★ Keep lit candles at least 12 inches away from surrounding objects.
 - ★ Trim wicks to a quarter of an inch before you light them.



- ★ Keep candles and matches out of reach of children.
- ★ Don't burn candles near trees, curtains, or other flammable items.
- \star Candles should be on a sturdy surface.
- When decorating your tree, refrain from putting glass or breakable ornaments within children's reach. When trying to reach up high, use a stepladder rather than a chair or other piece of furniture.
- When selecting gifts for young children, stay away from toys with coin lithium batteries or small parts that could easily be ingested or create

a choking hazard.

- Never toss anything but logs into your fireplace. Don't try to burn evergreens or wreaths in a fireplace or wood stove. Greenery and tree needles burn much faster than logs, creating sparks, which can fly into the room or onto the roof. Don't burn wrapping paper because it can contain metallic materials that could be hazardous to breathe in. Always make sure the fire is out and the embers have cooled before you leave the house or go to bed.
- Don't forget to prep the outside of your house. Keep your driveway and walkways clear of ice and snow, especially if you're expecting guests.

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27th annual "Protect & Serve Tavern" drive sober event

This holiday season, the Lake County Crime Prevention Taskforce, the Lake County Association of Chiefs of Police and the Lake County Safe Communities Coalition will team up with the United States Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to host an event to remind all drivers about the dangers of drinking and driving. The 27th annual Protect & Serve Tavern will take place Saturday, December 10 from noon – 4:00 pm at the Great Lakes Mall, located at 7850 Mentor Avenue in Mentor.

What is the event about?

This event will help remind the folks of Lake County – and beyond – to drive sober this holiday season and to encourage those at or above the legal drinking age to consider a fun "mocktail" drink instead of drinking alcohol and possibly getting behind the wheel while intoxicated. Local police chiefs and judges will hand out the nonalcoholic drinks with snacks to mall shoppers, and due to many generous donations from local businesses, this event is free to the public.

Local police departments will also invite shoppers to try the "Fatal Vision" goggle demonstration, which mimics alcohol impairment to raise awareness about the dangerous results of drunk driving. Free recipes featuring tasty nonalcoholic beverages created by the Lake County police departments will be available, and there will be a raffle opportu-



nity for two "mocktail" baskets with all the fixings to make your own nonalcoholic beverages.

With the holiday festivities and extra office parties taking place, it is essential to plan a sober ride home before the events begin. Here are a few simple tips to ensure that everyone has a fun evening and gets home safely:

- Plan a safe way home before festivities begin.
- Before drinking, designate a sober driver.
- If you are impaired, take a taxi, rideshare, or call a sober friend or family member for a ride home.
- If you happen to see an impaired driver on the road, call #667 to reach law enforcement.

What is the Safe Communities Coalition?

The Lake County General Health District is the lead agency for the Lake County Safe Communities Coalition and the goal is to reduce the number of traffic-related motor vehicle deaths in Lake County by increasing seat belt usage, increasing motorcycle safety awareness, and reducing distracted and impaired driving. The coalition also participates in national campaigns including "Click It or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over."

Hands-on birding with Geauga Park District

Attempt to hold some seed, then a hungry black-capped chickadee!

Have you ever hand-fed wild birds? Now through April, head out to give it a try at the Bird in the Hand Feeding Station at The West Woods in Russell Township – in optimal conditions, volunteers have reported as many as 60 chickadees in 20 minutes!

Hand-feeding works best with just one or two people or a small group, like three or four. Time your visit between 10 am and 4:30 pm and dress warmly with extra layers, hat and gloves, since you will be standing still. Cold days, especially in the morning, are often the best times to visit, as birds start feeding soon after they wake up to put on fat and have energy to survive the cold weather. Late afternoon is another good time, since birds need to stock up on nutrition before roosting somewhere for the night.

Your first stop should be to The West Woods Nature Center to collect a packet of black oil sunflower seed. Then follow the Trout Lily Trail and hang a right at the fork after the boardwalk across the wetlands,

following the sign. Soon you'll come upon the feeding station marked by a mannequin who keeps the birds familiar with a human presence. ("Parker" is pretty realistic; then again, birds are fairly easy to fool.)

As soon as you arrive, cover the on-site feeder with the bucket. (A reminder to do this is also posted on site.) Place a few seeds in your hand, hold it out flat, stand very still, and wait for birds to arrive. They tend to come in waves, so you may need to wait a little while for the next wave to come, but odds are you'll have at least a few takers if you are patient. Enjoy!

When finished, please be sure to remove the bucket from the feeder, place any unused seed into the feeder, and place your empty seed packet in the marked receptacle.



7 activities to try this winter at Lake Metroparks

Snowshoe the Parks: Have you ever tried snowshoeing? It's a great way to explore the outdoors and also has many health benefits. Lake Metroparks offers visitors opportunities to snowshoe on a variety of terrain throughout the park district. Girdled Road Reservation offers backcountry snowshoe trails, Chapin Forest Reservation offers nearly six miles of trails and Penitentiary Glen Reservation offers seven miles of trails.

Snowshoe rentals are available at Chapin Forest Reservation Pine Lodge Ski Center (first-come, firstserved) and at Penitentiary Glen Nature Center (first-come, firstserved).

Skiing Fun: Because Lake and Geauga counties are blessed with the best snowfalls in the state each year, cross-country skiing is a great way to get out and enjoy the parks! Lake Metroparks offers both groomed and ungroomed trails for skiers of all abilities.

Sled Down the Hills: Lake Metroparks offers a variety of winter activities for all ages, but by far, sledding is one of the most popular. The parks offer four different places to bring your family for a day of thrills upon whatever apparatus you choose to bring.

Hike the Trails under the Lights: Feel free to hike under the lights this winter at Chapin Forest Reservation. A mile of trail lights will be turned on at the Arbor Lane Loop Trail (Hobart Road entrance) each evening from dusk until the park closes, regardless of ski conditions. If hiking and snow is on the trail, watch for skiers, respect groomed trails and do not walk in ski tracks.

View the Dunes: Have you ever seen the ice dunes along the Lake Erie shoreline? Visit one of their lakefront parks and discover what happens to the lake in winter.

Winter Bird Feeding: Many of our feathered friends fly south for the winter in search of food, but many stay right here in northeast Ohio. We also see some species in the winter only—these birds nest north of us and fly south to Ohio for their winter vacations.

Winter Camping: Have you ever thought about camping in the winter? Lake Metroparks offers winter camping at Girdled Road Reservation in Concord Township. It is a hike-in or ski-in site about ³/₄ of a mile into the Big Creek Valley. Enjoy this park in a new way from the comfort of your tent!

Cross-country ski and snowshoe rental equipment is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Equipment cannot be reserved. A driver's license is required as a deposit with all rentals.

A new home for the holidays

If adopting a pet is on your list this year, here are a few things to keep in mind

The holiday season is upon us and we're all thinking about that perfect gift. Wish lists are shared and it should come as no surprise to many parents when a new puppy or kitten is right at the top of that list.

If you've been thinking about adding a new member to the family, there are some important things to keep in mind.

If adopting from a breeder, do your homework and ensure that the breeder is reputable. Don't be afraid to ask to see where and how the dogs are housed – the breeder should not object. That great deal you find online may be the result of a life of misery at a puppy mill. In addition to unknown health and behavioral issues that can develop at a mass breeding facility, these dogs can also be susceptible to genetic disorders.

A great alternative is adopting through a shelter and the reason is simple; when you adopt a shelter animal, you save a life.

Adopting a pet is a long-term commitment that shouldn't be taken lightly and it's a decision that should be made by the whole family. Your family needs to determine how responsibilities will be split up and most importantly, you need to ensure that your family has the time to give your pet the



love and attention that it deserves.

Everybody wants to have the cute puppy and cute kitten on Christmas morning with the bow on them, but families have to understand that this is a significant commitment and that they will need to spend time with the pet. A pet adoption should never be a surprise. When a family is ready to adopt a pet, all adults in the family should agree that the adoption is a good decision.

Your newest family member is going to be with you for quite a while so making the right choice matters. Some of the things to take into consideration include making sure your family's energy level is in line with your new pet's energy level. Puppies and kittens are incredibly cute but also require a lot of patience, training, and care. Messes will be made, and boundaries need to be set before poor behavior sets in.

Costs need to be weighed as well. Like humans, animals require medical exams and sometimes additional care to live a happy and healthy lifestyle. what they're looking for in a pet as well as assessing what kind of home they have to offer. They'll also spend time making sure that it's the right fit. Like humans, dogs and cats have unique personalities and some situations are better than others.

The worst situation is when a family and their new pet have bonded and have to be separated.

If you've checked all of the boxes and made the decision to move forward, keep in mind that any time is a good time to adopt. You'll be home for the holidays and that certainly helps, but experts agree that it takes about three months for a shelter pet to become completely acclimated to your environment and develop trust in your family.

The best thing you can do is establish a routine, define boundaries as well as positive reinforcement, and also give the pet the ability to have

some space as well as quiet time to itself as it adjusts to its new home.

Most local shelters post available animals on their websites and those can change daily. People are encouraged to visit often to see if their perfect pet becomes available. Shelters have different hours, fees, and rules in place. Some host regular visiting hours while others are done by appointment only. Be sure to visit their websites to learn more.
