The children had a wonderful Valentine's celebration at school. They enjoyed handing out their valentines to their peers and getting valentines! It is such a fun day to be in school!

The Kindergarteners learned about the letter Qu this week. We talked about how Q is never found without U. There is a silly story about how they are married and always together, how fitting for Valentine's Day! The first graders read a book about where food comes from. We talked about the author's purpose and finding supporting details in a book. Everyone is working hard to improve their reading skills. We are constantly practicing sight words, letter sounds, and reading!

In math, Kindergarteners are working on learning 3d shapes. We played various games practicing sorting, identifying key features of a 3d shape, and building 3d shapes. 1st grade practiced graphing. We took various polls to collect data. We learned about different ways to represent the data in graphs. We introduced comparison bars as well.

Have a great long weekend! Remember to have your child read every day for at least 20 minutes. Everyone is capable of reading themselves!

2nd & 3rd Grade Elementary Teacher

We did so many things this week. It would be hard to list them all. Highlights included making our Valentines collection containers, complete with glitter glue and bedazzled jewels. Wednesday we ended up eating our math lesson. Don't worry we did it after (and during) instruction, and it was Twizzlers. We measured pieces of Twizzler in both centimeters and inches. Did you know, one piece of Pull n' Peel licorice unraveled is over 100 centimeters? The next two days we used meter sticks to measure ourselves. Thursday's highlight was learning what coding is, why it's important, and how to do it. We spent some time coding movements around the room and then finished with some time exploring www.code.org.

The phonics focus this week is red words, or sight words as you may know them. We turned our attention to remembering and practicing these words that just don't make reading and spelling sense. As usual the kids jumped right in and made great progress.

The Tickets to Treasure incentive is well under way. Remember that students can earn tickets by reading at home, working on their www.Freckle.com progress, doing extra credit pages, and working hard at school.

We have turned some of our focus during the day on building social and emotional skills. This week we learned what it means to be true to yourself and make your own decisions as well as began expressing the effect that our choices have on others. We also began looking at how our brains work and how they are different from anyone else's. This week we learned our brain's working memory, things we hold in our memory while we are working with them.

As usual we are busy and making progress. Keep reading and have deep conversations with your children at home. Ask and answer those who, what, when, when, where, and how questions to build understanding of the world around them.

4th & 5th Grade Elementary Teacher

Over this last week we have started talking about the importance of electricity, the sources of electricity, and how we use it in everyday life. Of course, these conversations also lead to how we need to be safe around electrical outlets and devices. In social studies we have further discussed other types of governments such as monarchies and dictatorships. Math has primarily been focused on the metric system and converting the different units of metric measurement. In a recent Starbase Minnesota activity, students were able to do an online simulated rocket launch. In the exercise students were required to adjust the amount of thrust used in order to launch a rocket to an ideal height for deploying a communications satellite. After completing the assigned steps, students were allowed to freely experiment with the different controls, some of those changes worked well and others ended up being quite explosive (in a virtual sense). We also took some time during morning meetings to discuss the importance of grit and perseverance, both inside and outside of school.

Next week is the Textile Traditions project at North House Folk School in Grand Marais. We will be at North House in the afternoon on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. On Thursday, we will be leaving a little earlier to go to Joy and Company. They will be guiding us through a special art project that ties in well to our recent science unit on space. Students are excited about these opportunities!
