MCA Testing for 3rd-5th graders is next week!



First grade worked on opinion writing this week. We focused on identifying a topic sentence and giving detailed sentences to tell the reasons for our opinions. The kindergartners are practicing reading, writing, and letters. We are working on including spacing, punctuation, and correct spelling in our writing.

In math, the first graders and kindergarteners learned about money. We learned about the penny, nickel, dime, and quarter. We practiced counting them all together. We played a few whole group money games. The older kids got to pair up with the younger kids and practice their leadership and helping skills! We are also reviewing a few key concepts in preparation for the NWEA testing in a few weeks.

The students don't seem to be phased by the temperamental weather. They are excited when it is warm and sunny and when it's cold and snowy. This week many of them were experimenting and manipulating the slushy melting snow, puddles, and the new 'rivers' in the woods. Expect them to come home wet and happy!

We will be focusing some of our attention to migrating birds, features, and identification in the next two weeks, along with answering all bird related questions that our visitors have sparked. This week has been a major preparation week for the MCAs, which are next week. We have been using review sheets from our math curriculum and Freckle, to focus on skills related to expressions, the order of operations, and measuring angles. As I mentioned before, the novel study guide for our book The Homework Machine provides emphasis on core skills for the MCAs. I have also sprinkled in a worksheet or two, along with some work on Freckle to help supplement that as well. In science, we have been discussing predator and prey relationships, and renewable and non-renewable forms of energy. Our social studies unit has been focused on the Bill of Rights in the United States Constitution.

Next week is MCA week, with all of the fourth and fifth grade students taking the math and reading assessments. Fifth grade will also take the science assessment. Information regarding the MCAs was sent home last week, please be sure to review that if you have not already. Because of MCAs, there will be no spelling test next week, and I am not planning on any other tests either. I plan on reading more of our story as time allows, and getting in some various activities that should serve as a welcome break from testing.
